Infra-Red Device Installed Aboard S. S. Mariner

The pilot model of an infra-red tracking device, under development by the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency at Redstone Arsenal, is to be installed early next month on the SS "American Mariner," the Army's floating missile tracking station.

ARGMA, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, will be using the device for research on missile re-entry problems when it is in operation on the ship.

Development and evaluation of the system is continuing at ARGMA's Missile Electronics Laboratory (See INFRA-RED on Page 2)

Redstone Personnel Office Offers Tips On Partisan Politics

Some of the do's and don'ts governing the partisan political activities of Federal employes have been compiled by the Redstone Arsenal Civilian Personnel Office in the form of an employe information bulletin which has been distributed to each employe.

The bulletin is based on the Hatch Political Act, and the law states: "It shall be unlawful for any person employed in the Executive Branch of the Federal Government or any agency or department thereof to use his official authority or influence for the purpose of interfering with an election or affecting the result thereof. No officer or employe in the Executive Branch of the Federal Government, or any agency

GEN. SCHOMBURG ADDRESSES AOA AT EL PASO, TEX.

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General, Army Ordnance Missile Command, addressed the annual meeting of the Missiles and Astronautics Division of the American Ordnance Association in El Paso, Tex., Thursday night on the subject of "Progress in Missile Technology."

The General's discussion and demonstrations covered many phases of missile technology, including not only the missiles themselves, but also devices such as computers and radar which are necessary parts of a missile's support system.

Gen. Schomburg was in El Paso while making his first trip to the White Sands Missile Range, N.M. since assuming command of AOMC in February of this year. During his stay the General will tour the missile testing facilities at the White Sands installation.

GEN. SHINKLE ATTENDS 'RECON' DEMONSTRATION

Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle, Commander, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, left Redstone Arsenal Wednesday (April 13) to represent the Army Ordnance Missile Command at a "full aerial combat reconnaissance demonstration" at the U.S. Army Aviation Center, Fort Rucker, Ala.

With Gen. Shinkle for the one-day event were Col. Raymond W. Burkett, Deputy Chief of ARGMA's Research and Development Division; Lt. Col. Nils M. Bengtson, Director of ARGMA's Ordnance Missile Laboratory Division; and the General's aide-de-camp, Lt. Gerald G. Gerasimon.

Also attending the demonstration, which portrayed an experimental armed helicopter unit in the role of reconnaissance by fire and maneuver, were senior officials from the Department of Army, the Continental Army Command and the Third Army.

Inventory Control Inspection Slated

The annual National Inventory Control Point for Inspection will be conducted here by representatives of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics April 25-29, it was announced by Col. Sylvester A. Hall, Assistant Chief of Staff for Support Operations, Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Hosts to the inspectors on April 25-27 will be Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, and April 28-29 the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The team will be headed by Col. J. Shaug, DCSLOG, Storage and Distribution Division.

The group will inspect all areas relative to the operation of national inventory control points for Army rockets and missiles.

Redstone Arsenal will adopt Daylight Saving time at 2 a.m. on Sunday, April 24—the same time as the City of Huntsville. Daylight Saving Time ends in this area September 25.

BIDS FOR BOILER PLANT WILL BE OPENED APRIL 29

Army Engineers announced today that bids for the rehabilitation of a boiler plant at Redstone Arsenal, will be opened at the Corps of Engineers district office at Mobile on April 29.

Specifications call for the removal of four existing boilers including foundations; the construction of foundations for four new boilers rated at 60,000 pounds of steam per hour, twice the capacity of the old boilers; the installation of new piping, a coal elevator-conveyor, induced and forced draft fans, a dust collector, and other items of equipment; the construction of a conveyor shelter on the roof; the modification of an existing pneumatic ash conveyor; and interior electrical work.

The plant serves the northeastern portion of the reservation, including the Ordnance Guided Missile School, troop housing, and other Arsenal facilities.

or department thereof, shall take any active part in political management or in political campaigns. All such persons shall retain the right to vote as they may choose and to express their opinions on all political subjects and candidates."

Following are some of the "don'ts":

Serve on or for a political committee, party, or similar organization nor as a delegate or alternate to a caucus or party convention.

Solicit or handle political contributions.

Solicit sale or sell political party dinner tickets.

Serve as a political club officer, or on any of its committees, address such a club or take active part in organizing one.

Organize or address a political rally.

Engage in activity at the polls at any election to solicit votes, assist voters to mark ballots, or transport or help get voters out on registration or election days.

Act as a recorder, checker, watcher or challenger of any party or faction.

Write for publication (signed or unsigned) letters or articles for or against any political party or candidate.

Become a candidate for nomination or election to office, Federal, State, county, or municipal, which is to be filled in an election in which party candidates are involved or solicit others to become candidates for nomination or election to such offices.

Distribute campaign literature or material.

Initiate or circulate political petitions of any sort.

Engage in political conferences, canvasses or solicitation for political support of a party, faction or candidate.

The intent of the law is to prohibit people subject to it from assuming political leadership or be-

atory by its designers D. J. Salomimer and C. R. Seashore, servo systems; N. J. Mangus and L. N. McClusky, infra-red systems; G. H. Widenhoffer, mechanical, D. E. Holter, optical.

The designers have said that the use of transistors and miniaturization techniques in the final model will permit it to be a very small and highly mobile package.

Its developers believe the tracker is capable of detecting and tracking automatically a small, hot light source, such as a light bulb, a distant star, or a missile in flight.

Since it is an optical device, a detector of infra-red energy, the tracker can operate at a distinct advantage over radar which is dependent upon the reflection of its own signals.

coming prominently identified with a political movement, party or faction, or with the success or failure of a candidate for election to public office in a partisan political campaign.

The direct language of the law assures every individual the right to vote as he may choose.

Individuals may express political opinions, but may not take active part in political management or political campaigns.

As an individual contributions may be made by an officer or employe to a regularly constituted political organization as long as it is not done on the premises of any Federal building or to some other office or employe within the scope of the above-quoted statutes.

At home, pictures of political candidates may be displayed.

Badges, buttons and stickers are not unlawful (except where forbidden by local ordinance), but it is regarded as contrary to the spirit of the law for a public servant to make a partisan display while conducting public business.

The restrictions on partisan political activities apply to all Federal employes whether on temporary appointments, leave of absence or regular career status.

All Federal employes assume responsibility to insure their political activities remain within the letter and spirit of the Hatch Act.

Before engaging in any political activity which might be prohibited, employes should contact the Employe Utilization Representative for his organization or write to the U. S. Civil Service Commission for guidance.



Huntsville had been selected as site of a new NDTA chapter because of the importance of the city's transportation preparedness to the defense of the area and the nation.


NDTA is a non-profit, professional society of military-civilian transportation and supply managers from the Armed Forces, local, state, and federal government agencies, and private industry.

Mortgage Problems Are Being Studied By Housing Authority

Senator John Sparkman's office issued an announcement last week dealing with the mortgage problem encountered by some Civil Service personnel involved in the pending transfer to the National Space and Aeronautics Administration from the Army activities at Redstone Arsenal.

The announcement, based on a letter received by Sen. Sparkman's office from the Federal Housing Administrator, says that FHA has determined that 203 FHA mortgage insurance will be made available to personnel now employed or to be employed by NASA if the individual has already started construction of a home, or who would otherwise be entitled to 809 Certificates by reason of Defense employment.

FHA is undertaking an economic survey of the Huntsville area to determine the feasibility of supporting additional 203s for others who will be employed by NASA in the future.

Congressional action has not been taken on the legislation proposed by Senator Sparkman which would extend the 809 program to NASA personnel.


Missiles Need Managers OGMS Graduates Told


He spoke to 37 officers and enlisted men receiving diplomas from the Ordnance Guided Missile School at ceremonies in the Redstone Arsenal Theater.
