Gen. Schomburg Predicts Increase in Employment

He Expects Increase In Efficiency and Better Management

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, predicted a healthy increase in the Army Ballistic Missile Agency's employment which will offset the impending loss of personnel to the civilian space agency.

The prediction was made at the Rotary Club meeting last week. He did not mention specific figures in his talk but indicated that ABMA could gain approximately 1500 people to replace those lost to NASA.

NASA announced earlier that it will need from 300 to 500 employees in addition to the approximate 4,000 who will transfer from the Army Agency.

Gen. Schomburg also mentioned the realignment of the existing agencies and new duties that will be assigned to each. He told the assembled businessmen that the Research and Development Division had been created within ABMA to replace the Development Operations Division.

The general said that no great influx of new people could be expected in the area to compare with the surging growth in the past ten years, but he did suggest that the city should prepare for expansion.

Gen. Schomburg said that the changes after the transfer of DOD to NASA in July will contribute to "Greater efficiency in the management of the ordnance phase of all Army rocket and missile programs."

He predicted a leveling off in employment by the close of this year and that thereafter, barring something now unforeseen, employment will remain stable. (See GEN SCHOMBURG, Pg. 2)

R&D DIVISION IS ESTABLISHED IN MISSILE AGENCY

Establishment of a Research and Development Division within the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Redstone Arsenal, has been announced by Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General, Army Ordnance Missile Command.

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency is America's first and only government Agency created exclusively for the performance of technical service responsibilities in development of ballistic missile systems.

The new Division of ABMA will replace the Development Operations Division, which will be transferred July 1 to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The division's estimated budget for Fiscal Year 1961 will be \$216,328,000 for the following missile and rocket systems, Redstone, Jupiter, Pershing, Nike Zeus Target, Honest John, Little John, Corporal, Sergeant, Missile A, Missile B, Light Anti-Tank Weapon (LAW) and special weapons.

To employ approximately 1,000 scientific, technical and administrative personnel, the organization will retain the Army Ballistic Missile Agency's unique in-house capability in developing the Army's surface-to-surface guided and free-flight missiles.

In addition to the Office of the Director, the Research and Development Division will be composed of six laboratories, four project offices, two coordination offices. (See R&D CREATED, Page 2)

Organizational Changes Made in ABMA, ARGMA

Department of Army has approved an internal realignment of missions and minor organizational changes within the U.S. Army Ordnance Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, it was announced last week by AOMC Commanding General Maj. Gen. August Schomburg.

Affected are the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The change is necessary, Gen. Schomburg said, because of the proposed transfer of a portion of ABMA to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration July 1. Included in the transfer to NASA will be the Development Operations Division of ABMA, headed by Dr. Werner von Braun.

Continuation of Army programs under the plan announced, plus continuation of space programs by NASA, will result in increased employment at Redstone Arsenal, Gen. Schomburg said.

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency, commanded by Col. Thurston T. Paul, Jr., is currently responsible for the Redstone, Jupiter, and Pershing missile systems, in addition to the Saturn and other space programs which will be transferred to NASA. Col. Paul will serve as ABMA Commander until the arrival of Col. Richard M. Hurst, whose nomination to brigadier general has been announced.

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, commanded by Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle, currently has charge of the remaining Army missile systems.

When the changes announced are in effect, ABMA will assume charge of programs involving surface-to-surface missiles and ballistic-type rockets. These programs will include: Redstone, Jupiter, Pershing, Sergeant, Corporal, Honest John, Littlejohn, Missile A, Missile B, and LAW (Light Anti-tank Weapon).

Under the plan, ARGMA will continue to manage Nike Zeus, Nike Hercules, Nike Ajax, Hawk, Mauler, Redeye, Lacrosse, SS-10/11, Shillelagh, and target missiles. ARGMA's mission will be the management of systems requiring maneuverable and controlled. (See RE-ALIGNMENT, Page 2)

Army Fires Nike-Zeus From Underground Site

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M. — The Army April 28, successfully fired a Nike Zeus anti-missile missile from an underground launcher at White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

The firing was the first test of a new type launching facility proposed for use when Zeus becomes operational. Zeus, the only active defense system against intercontinental and intermediate range ballistic missiles now under development in the Free World, is designed to intercept and render harmless hostile ICBMs and IRBMs before they reach their targets.

Only the missile's first stage booster engine was fired in today's test. The second stage sustainer engine and the warhead section were inert since the firing was primarily a test of the underground launching cell.

Command At ABMA Is Changed

Col. Hurst Was With Tank Command

Col. Richard M. Hurst assumed command of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency from Col. Thurston T. Paul in change of command ceremony at 9:00 a.m. Monday, April 29.

The ABMA adjutant, CWO Sam R. Bourland read the change of command orders, following which the new commander received personal honors, ruffles and flourishes played by the 55th Army Band. The colonel then inspected the band, the honor guard, furnished by Detachment B ABMA, and the color guard, furnished by Hq. & Hq. Detachment USAG.

Following the inspection of the troops Col. Paul officially relinquished the command of the Agency, saying that he was happy to be turning over such a fine outfit to his successor.

Col. Hurst, who has been nominated for brigadier general, was formerly Deputy Commander, Ordnance-Tank Automotive Command, Detroit, Mich.

Col. Hurst served in the Field Artillery from 1935 to 1938. He returned to active duty in 1940, serving with the Ordnance Corps and was integrated into the regular Army in 1946.

Successive wartime duties took the colonel to Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind.; Fort Hayes, Ohio; and (See CHANGE OF, Page 2)

GEN. BARCLAY OPENS SAVINGS BOND DRIVE

Maj. Gen. J. A. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General of the U.S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, opened the United States Savings Bond campaign for 1960 at a meeting of Arsenal Savings Bond representatives in the Rocket Auditorium last Monday morning.

Gen. Barclay told the assembly: "We all know that power for peace is vitally important. The strength to keep peace, the knowledge to make it lasting costs money; yet, America's military supremacy offers the only deterrent to aggression—the only real hope for World Peace. Senate Confirms Promotion of ABMA Commander


The U. S. Senate has confirmed the promotion of Brig. Gen. John A. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General of the Army Ordnance

Among other reasons for the current test is that underground cells would be more resistant to enemy attack. The firing was conducted by Bell Telephone Laboratories and Douglas Aircraft Corporation crews under the supervision of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command. The prime contractor for overall system development is the Western Electric Company.

ployment would remain relatively stable.

He said that under the approved reorganization ABMA will be responsible for management of 10 programs, involving surface-to-surface missiles and rockets with essentially ballistic behaviour.

ABMA will continue to operate the other major divisions, industrial, field service and training and will be able to manage all phases of the weapons programs for which the Agency is responsible.

ABMA will manage the Redstone, Jupiter, and Pershing systems, already in hand, plus the Honest John, Little John, Corporal and Sergeant systems. Three newer programs in the early stages of design and development will also be handled by ABMA; the light anti-tank weapon LAW, Missile "A" and Missile "B".

ARGMA will manage all missile systems requiring maneuverable and controllable capabilities, both in the surface-to-surface and surface-to-air categories.

This will enable ARGMA to concentrate in an area where the agency has demonstrated "super competence", according to Gen. Schomburg.

Nine major systems fall in this category: Nike Zeus, anti-missile missile now under development; Nike Ajax, the country's first air defense missile; Nike Hercules, Hawk, Mauler, Redeye, Lacrosse, the SS-10 and 11 anti-tank missiles, and the Shillelagh.

Gen. Schomburg assured the meeting that although approximately 4,300 members of DOD will be shifted to NASA, the strength of ABMA will probably be stable.

The General said that the streamlining will result in balancing of manpower and physical resources, the assignment of programs recognizing inherent capabilities of the teams, and closer working relationships between the Agencies.

nance Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Alabama.

Army officials said an underground cell, if proven practical, would have several advantages over an above ground launch system.

Construction cost of a subsurface cell is less than that of an above ground complex which requires elaborate barricades and access tunnels. Uniform temperatures of a subsurface cell would eliminate the need for extensive air conditioning equipment and other artificial temperature controls. Underground cells would be more resistant to enemy attack. Maintenance problems would be lessened since the fixed, one-piece launching rail would not require hydraulic mechanisms. And upper sections of the Zeus missile could be removed and serviced without disturbing the lower sections.

A series of successful preliminary tests on the subsurface concept were carried out by a team of military and civilian agencies. ARGMA scientists conducted tests on the concept at Redstone and at White Sands. Other tests were performed at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Ohio River Division Laboratory, Cincinnati, Ohio; at the Thiokol Chemical Corporation, Huntsville, and at

trollable capability.

Personnel strengths after the realignment will be as follows:

AOMC Headquarters is expected to increase by some 100 people to a total of 699.

ABMA now employs 5,338 civilians and there are 352 officers and enlisted men assigned to the Agency. After the NASA transfer, ABMA is expected to have an overall strength of about 3,000.

ARGMA's overall strength will remain almost the same—about 3,400.

Redstone Arsenal will drop slightly, from 4,663 to about 4,400. The reduction will be in military strength. Civilian employment will increase by about 150.

White Sands Missile Range, N.M., which is another AOMC element, will increase to a total of about 6,300.

The Command will have a combined strength in the next fiscal year of 17,801—of which 14,380 will be civilians and 3,420 will be military personnel.

The Command's strength at Redstone will be approximately 3,000 less—11,500 as compared to 14,400 at present.



stitution, be of good character and a good citizen and be registered. Registration is permanent for those who voted once every two years.

ILLINOIS

Servicemen should mail the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) for an absentee ballot to Board of Election Commissioners or County Clerk no earlier than 100 days before election. Registration is not required for Armed Forces personnel.

Ballots will be accepted until the end of election day. Minimum voting age is 21 and minimum residence is 1 year in state, 90 days in county, 30 days in voting precinct.

INDIANA

Armed Forces personnel use the FPCA for both registering and the absentee ballot. It should be mailed to the Clerk of Circuit Court, county of residence, 60 days before the general election. Registration, however, is permanent for those who voted in each general election.

Ballots must be at the polling place by 6 p.m. election day. All

voters must be 21 by the date of the election. Residence requirements include six months in state, 60 days in township, 30 days in ward or voting precinct.

and financial circles. Bond savings help the Treasury to manage the National Debt so as to protect the value of our dollar and insure the greatest benefits from it for all Americans.

The General elaborated upon the theme of thrift for the individual and emphasized that savings bonds can help finance a new home, modernize an old one, provide better equipment for living, educate young people and provide more security and pleasure when working years are over.

Also on the program was the Treasury's Savings Bond representative from Birmingham, C. H. Stallings, who reminded the arsenal bond representatives that bonds insure security for the three "Fs": family, future and freedom.

Maj. Jesse A. Garner, Troop Commander and general chairman for the campaign, introduced the speakers and the Redstone Arsenal Savings Bond Officer, Lt. Francisco Fuentes.

The goal this year as it has been for the past several years is 65 per cent participation at the Arsenal. At present the civilian participation in the payroll savings plan is 44 per cent, the military 21.5 per cent.

Absentee Voting

(One of a Series)

ALASKA

Absentee ballots may be used by all qualified voters more than two miles from the polling place. Also, all physically disabled persons can use the absentee ballot. Armed Forces personnel can use the FPCA in making an application. Others should write to U. S. Commissioner, district of residence, within 90 days before election.

Voting qualifications: 1) Minimum age: 19 on date of election, 2) Minimum residence: 1 year in state, 30 days in voting precinct, 3) Other: Read U. S. Constitution; read and write English. Registration is part of the voting procedure. The ballot must be post-marked no later than the date of the election.

CALIFORNIA

Any qualified person absent from his polling place may vote by absentee ballot. Registration is permanent for those who voted in last primary or general election. Apply by Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) for registration and absentee ballot if you're in the Armed Forces. Others should request Affidavit of Reg-

istration from County Clerk 90 days before election. These should be returned prior to 54th day before election.

Armed Forces personnel can apply by FPCA to the County Clerk any time for the absentee ballot. The ballot should be post-marked no later than the date of election and received by the state no later than six days after the election.

Minimum age requirement is 21 on date of election. Minimum residence: One year in state, 90 days in county, 54 days in voting precinct. May vote for presidential electors after 54 days residence in state. Other requirement is to be registered.

COLORADO

Absentee ballots may be cast by any qualified absent voter and registration is permanent for those who voted in the last general election. Armed Forces personnel should use the FPCA for registration and the absentee ballot. This should be mailed to the County Clerk between Aug. 10 and noon Nov. 5.

Others should register by filing application with County Clerk up to 45 days before state election, up to 20th day before primary, general or special election. Ballots will be accepted until 5 p.m. election day.

Voters should be at least 21 by the date of election with a minimum residence of one year in state, 90 days in county and 15 days in the voting precinct. All voters must be registered.

FLORIDA

Voters in the Armed Forces absent from their polling place should send the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) to the Supervisor of Registration, county of residence, between Aug. 24-Nov. 3, requesting absentee ballots. Registration is permanent for those who voted once every two years. Servicemen may re-register when applying for absentee ballot.

Ballots must be in by 5 p.m. on the day before election. Voting requirements include being 21 on the date of election, having residence of one year in state and six months in county. All voters must be registered.

GEORGIA

Non-registered servicemen must register before sending their FPCA for an absentee ballot. They can do this by requesting a Military Registration Card from a tax collector, tax commissioner or registrar in their county of residence at any time.

The FPCA can be mailed any time to the county or residence for general election and to the county registrar for the primary. Ballots must be in before polls close election day.







Many of our sports here on post are organized and supervised, but the greatest responsibility for safety rests with each individual. It is only through the exercise of common sense and self discipline we can hope to make our ball games and other recreation periods safe and happy ones.

Boating is considered a major sport in our community. All boat owners, operators and lovers of this sport should become familiar with the water safety laws of this state. Incidentally, a synopsis of these laws has been distributed throughout the arsenal for information to all interested persons.

Here are a few general tips for a safer summer. Boating; be careful with gasoline. Keep fuel lines tight and bilges clean at all times. Use care when re-fueling. Whenever possible, motors and detachable gas tanks should be re-fueled when boat is at dock or beached.

Do not overload: Maintain adequate free-board at all times. Keep an alert lookout. Watch out for swimmers who may be outside of designated swimming areas. Children aboard and non-swimmers should wear life preservers at all times. If boat should capsize, stick with it as long as it floats. Watch the weather — be on the lookout for storms.

Special emphasis is being placed on safety in outdoor sports by the arsenal Safety Division through the cooperation of safety committees and supervisors at all levels. All personnel of the post are urged to observe the rules of safe conduct to insure that a good outing will not turn into a tragedy or other misfortune.



Nike Zeus Contract Awarded Western Electric Company

The Department of the Army announced today the award of supplemental agreement to a contract in the amount of \$4,077,000 to Western Electric Company, New York City, to provide additional Fiscal Year 1960 research and development effort on the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system.

The additional R&D effort covered by the supplemental agreement includes: new component development high frequency Zeus acquisition radar, discrimination study, plasma study, and identification radar equipment development.

Nike Zeus, now in the research and development phase, is designed to provide active defense against a wide variety of ballistic and glide-type missiles. It is the Army's proposed solution for defense of the U.S. against a possible attack of intercontinental ballistic missiles, and is the only anti-ICBM system under active development presently.

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, commanded by Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle, has overall charge of Nike Zeus development. ARGMA is an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Ala.

Bell Telephone Laboratories, Whippany, N.J., is technical director for Nike Zeus under ARGMA. Western Electric Company is the Nike Zeus prime contractor. Douglas Aircraft Company, Santa Monica, Calif., is a major sub-





ARGMA Sponsors Equipment Course at Ordnance School

The New Equipment Course for key personnel on the new 762mm Honest John Rocket, XM50 system was prepared by and conducted at the Ordnance School, Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md., Feb. 1 to April 15.

Two ABMA Scientists Are Granted Patents

The Patent Division, Legal Office, Army Ordnance Missile Command has secured patents for two inventions that have been very important in the success of the Army's ballistic missile program. Dr. Fritz K. Mueller, Deputy Director, Guidance and Control Laboratory, has been granted Patent No. 2,925,736 for a gyroscopic accelerometer. This instrument for measuring and signalling missile accelerations is a basic part of the Army's famous, gyroscopically stabilized platform. Its high degree of accuracy combined with low weight is made possible by air bearings and a friction-compensating means. The can of the accelerometer gyroscope is floated within a casing on a nearly frictionless, compressed-air film. The outer bearings of the casing, however, are of the ball type; and the slight friction of these ball bearings, if uncorrected, would cause an inaccurate precession of the gyroscope. This is prevented in Dr. Muller's instrument by an automatic friction-compensating means which is set in operation by the slightest tendency of the gyroscope toward accuracy-disturbing precession. Another patent, No. 2,926,530, has been issued jointly to Dr. Mueller and to Mr. Robert C.

JOHN E. LARKIN

LARKIN IS NAMED SAFE SUPERVISOR

John E. Larkin, Chief, Experimental Fabrications Section, Instrument Development Labs, OML, has been selected as the safe supervisor of the week. Larkin has been employed at Redstone Arsenal since July, 1950. He was responsible for setting up the instrumentations and metering devices for firing the first rockets at the arsenal. Some of the safety problems solved by Larkin in working with electronic equipment (used for test firing rockets and motors) include the elimination of static electricity and controlling the out-gassing from selenium rectifiers. 

Martin Road to Get Another Traffic Lane




