Nike Zeus Budget Is Swelled by \$18 Million

Army Transfers Funds Saved on Other Programs

Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker today announced that \$18,000,000 which the Army saved in other areas this fiscal year, had been transferred to a fund to speed work on the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system.

Mr. Brucker said the funds were being transferred to the Department of Defense Emergency Fund. Defense will request approval of the Bureau of the Budget to transfer the funds to the research, development test and evaluation item, Army, in the budget to support Zeus system development.

Richard S. Morse, Army director of research and development, said:

"The Army's request for \$25,000,000, \$18,000,000 of which is presently being made available, will not only assist in expediting the Nike Zeus research effort and systems demonstration, but also will contribute technically to other defense programs whose success depends upon the use of advanced components that must have high reliability and lower costs."

Morse pointed out that the research and development effort on the Zeus system requires new electronic components and modification of certain existing components in order to meet adequately the performance requirements of Zeus.

Engineers Are Needed ABMA Commander Says

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency has immediate requirements for 296 civilian engineers, it was disclosed Tuesday by Colonel Richard M. Hurst, ABMA Commander.

The Agency is staffing a new research and development division.

Colonel Hurst identified the openings for engineers as follows:

Mechanical engineers, 103; electrical engineers, 79; industrial engineers, 34; general engineers, 38; aeronautical engineers, 13; chemical engineers, 4; electronics engineers, 25.

In addition, ABMA has openings for administrative, clerical and stenographic personnel in the Federal Civil Service.

HEALTH BENEFITS ARE EXPLAINED IN BRIEFINGS

Civilian Personnel Began Orientation Last Monday A. M.

The Civilian Personnel Offices at the Arsenal are conducting briefings this month to acquaint all Federal employes with the Federal Employees Health Benefits Act of 1959 which assures individuals and their families health benefits under a Government-sponsored plan.

The first meeting was held at the Rocket Auditorium on Monday morning with the capacity crowd of more than 480.

The Personnel Offices have also distributed Employee Information Sheets to each Agency and AOMC Headquarters in quantities which should be sufficient to reach each individual employe.

Since the Health Benefits Act requires everyone to register whether or not he wishes to be insured under one of the three plans offered, each individual is being contacted personally.

Registration must be accomplished before July 1, 1960 unless "causes beyond your control" can be established. For such cause, another opportunity to register will be offered. However, this must first be established "beyond your control" by the Civilian Personnel Office.

Between October 1-15, 1961, individuals will be given another opportunity to:

Register if eligible to register before July 1, 1961 and did not; (See HEALTH on Page 3)

NIKE-ZEUS WILL BE DISPLAYED AFD

Five Army missiles which have not been shown in Huntsville previously will be displayed around the courthouse square on Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 21.

The star of the show of Army missile strength will be the mighty Nike Zeus, only weapon system under development for defense against the intercontinental ballistic missile. The Zeus has been test fired six times, with four launchings completely successful, and the other two partially successful. Development is adhering closely to a schedule that calls for pitting the Zeus in the near future against Army intermediate range ballistic missiles and of establishing its effectiveness for the missile defense of the country.

At the other end of the spectrum of air defense missiles is the little Redeye. It is designed to give the front-line combat soldier the capability of destroying low-flying aircraft. The missile itself is a wingless cylinder with three main parts — an infra-red guidance system, a high-explosive warhead, and a solid propellant motor. It is fired from a "bazooka" type launcher about four feet in length.

The SS-10 and SS-11 are anti-tank missiles which are being added to the Army's arsenal as a result of research by the French. (See ZEUS DISPLAY on Page 2)

ARMED FORCES DAY IS NEXT SATURDAY

Parades, Flyovers, Displays, Movies Are On Schedule

Highlights of the annual observance of Armed Forces Day in Huntsville included a speech by the Chief of Army Ordnance, three flyovers of aircraft, a parade, and the display of five new missiles which are new to Huntsville, including the Nike Zeus, powerful anti-missile missile.

Lt. Gen. John H. Hinrichs, Chief of Ordnance, will arrive Friday to take part in the tenth annual display of America's military might, using the theme "Power for Peace." He will review the parade Saturday, look at exhibits around the courthouse square, and speak at the Armed Forces Day luncheon at the Russel Erskine Hotel at 12:30.

The Madison County Courthouse will be ringed with displays showing America's missile might. The larger weapon systems will be emplaced beginning at (See ARMED FORCES, Page 3)

Army Joint Relief Fund Drives Begin

"Even though the decision to initiate production on Nike Zeus has been deferred," Mr. Morse said, "advanced production methods and automated techniques will be required in order to insure the future capability of producing such new and complex components in the required quantity and with the required reliability."

"In February of this year the Army requested program approval which would require an additional \$25,000,000 for the Zeus project in order to conduct research and development on manufacturing techniques and processes in support of this general problem."

"The \$18,000,000 presently being made available will be used for development of new automatic processes for production of mesa type transistors, precision resistors, and other Zeus components which require an extreme degree of reliability and ultimately will be required in large quantities." Action being taken by the Army reflects the urgent necessity for proceeding as rapidly as possible with the Army's research and development program to develop and test the Zeus as an effective anti-ICBM defense system.

Nike Zeus development is being managed by the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency for the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Both are remotely controlled, wire guided missiles using solid fuel propellant, capable of putting out of action any tank known to exist in present day armies. They can be hand-carried, dropped by parachute from planes, and can be launched from the ground, a vehicle, helicopter, or airplane.


The Zeus, Redeye, and SS-10 and SS-11 systems are the responsibility of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command.

The other two missiles which will be new to Huntsville are solid propellant second generation successors to liquid-fuel systems.

The Sergeant, developed under direction of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, will replace the Corporal, which was the first large ballistic missile to be placed in the hands of troops. The Sergeant can carry an atomic warhead to a range of about 75 miles, but is smaller and more efficient than the Corporal. It requires less support equipment, and is easier, faster, and simpler to handle in the field.

The Pershing, developed under direction of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, of A.O.M.C. employs an inertial guidance system which is an outgrowth of research on the Redstone and Jupiter. Use of solid propellant eliminates oxygen-generating and fuel transporting equipment required in the Redstone. The Pershing system is completely air-transportable.

Jets Will Flyover Armed Forces Day

The roar of jet engines and the hum of propellers will join with the beat of drums and the footsteps of marching troops Saturday as Huntsville observes Armed Forces Day.

Air Force T33 jets from Craig Air Force Base will make four low-altitude passes, beginning at 11 a.m., just as the parade begins. The single-engine T33 has a 600-mph top speed and a maximum

altitude of 47,000 feet. At top speed the flying time from Selma to Huntsville is about 20 minutes. The fuel used in one minute would drive an automobile nearly 300 miles. The plane carries enough fuel to drive an automobile across the United States five times.

Planes of the Huntsville Squadron, Civil Air Patrol, will also make four passes. Roy Blackburn, CAP head, says his fly-over will start at 11:46, with passes made at five-minute intervals.

A flight of F-84s will make two passes Saturday afternoon, beginning about 2:30.

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

Register to be enrolled if previously registered not to be enrolled;

Register to be enrolled if at one time individual was enrolled and cancelled;

Change enrollment in any manner desired.

Change in marital status may effect change in the type of enrollment the individual needs. Those not enrolled may register for enrollment sometime within 31 days before the change in marital status and before the end of 60 days after the change.

If enrolled in a health benefits plan sponsored by an employe organization (such as American Federation of Government Employees) individuals may enroll in another plan if membership in the organization is terminated. However, the enrollment cannot change from an individual to include his family or the reverse, nor can he change the type of coverage offered in the original plan.

A man and his wife can both register if each is a Government employe; or the male member of the family may register under the self-and-family rate.

A wife can enroll for a dependent husband. A dependent husband is described as one who is incapable of self support for one year or more. Proof of disability will have to be furnished.

The effective date of coverage for employes who register before July 1, 1960 is the first day of the first pay period which begins after June 30, 1960, and after the pay period in which the employe has completed a pay period in pay status.

Effective dates for other enrollments or changes varies.

Enrollment continues for those who move from one employing office to another without a break in service of more than three days whether the personnel action is designated a transfer or not.

Individuals may cancel enrollment by filing with the employing office. Cancellation takes effect on the last day of the pay period following the period in which it is received by the employing office. Cancellation also cancels temporary extensions or conversion to individual contracts.

Supervisors in all branches of the Missile Command have been notified of the orientation sessions which each individual is required to attend.

The program is entirely new within Government service. The Personnel Offices have distributed brochures showing the costs and types of coverage offered under the Federal Health Benefits Act of 1959 and have issued statements to Employees in each Agency to study these plans and determine which fits the needs of the individual or family.

Study of the brochures and the Employe Information Sheet will help each employe to decide which plan he wishes to follow.

The American flag has been a symbol of Liberty and men rejoiced in it."

In a 1917 Flag Day message, President Wilson said: "This flag, which we honor and under which we serve, is the emblem of our unity, our power, our thought and purpose as a nation. It has no other character than that which we give it from generation to generation. The choices are ours. It floats in majestic silence above the hosts that execute those choices, whether in peace or in war."

"And yet, though silent, it speaks to us—speaks to us of the past, of the men and women who went before us, and of the records they wrote upon it."

"As the symbol of America's love for freedom, Mr. Rice says, the star-spangled banner should be shown the highest honor and respect, according to recognized customs."

"When the flag is passing in a parade, those present in uniform should render the hand salute."

Warns Graduates Not To Feel Inferior to Complicated Systems

Students at the U.S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School were warned against getting an inferiority complex with regard to their weapons at graduation exercises here Friday.

Maj. William R. Morrison, chief of the Lacrosse Missile Section, ARGMA, and a member of the

U. S. Marine Corps cautioned students not to be deluded by the idea that the next war will be a push-button affair where the man is forgotten.

"A complex weapon system pre-supposes a dependence on a man who pushes the buttons, a man who knows his job and has the ability to do it, and can keep the system operational," he said. In this regard he reminded students of the important part that they play in the national security. "Everyone in America, and in the

free world, has a stake in your business," he said.

Outlining the defense capabilities of the United States, Morrison noted the importance of maintaining a balanced military force, where each branch of service may be called upon for a specific job. "We can't gamble on one type of war occurring," he said, "and so we must be prepared not only for large-scale nuclear warfare, but must also maintain a day to day capability for waging small wars." 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
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PARADE ON AFD WILL BE BIGGEST STAGED TO DATE

The Armed Forces Day parade to be held in Huntsville Saturday will be the largest and most colorful ever held at this annual event, according to Parade Marshal Jackson M. Balch, Lieutenant Colonel in the Alabama National Guard.

The parade will include 2000 Army, Navy, Marine, National Guard, and Reserve troops, 25 floats and vehicles, eight bands, and 16 automobiles filled with dignitaries.

Supply of Engineers Is Inadequate Says General

Tuscaloosa, Ala. — There is an inadequate supply of competent engineers today, and the situation will become more critical in the face of sharply accelerated demand, Maj. Gen. J. A. Barclay told the Conference on Utilization of Scientists and Engineers last week at its banquet meeting at the University of Alabama.

In his speech, entitled "Research and the Professional Engineer," Gen. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General, AOMC, said, "Failure to utilize our scientists and engineers fully, and to insure an adequate supply of trained manpower, will imperil national security and impede the further progress of our country."

Defense requirements and industry's needs have whetted an insatiable appetite for scientific and engineering talent, he stated. To meet this demand, the number of persons classified as engineers has increased more than 100 per cent since 1940. During that period, however, industry has increased the number of professional engineers engaged in research and development activities by more than 1,000 per cent. At the same time, research and development by all branches of the military have increased to keep our defenses abreast of advancing technology, he added.

Gen. Barclay pointed out that the Army Ordnance Missile Command ranks in 20th place in a listing of the largest concerns in the United States. To perform its task of developing an entire family of missiles and rockets for the combat arms, the Command is responsible for the annual budget of more than one and one-half billion dollars. Among the thousands of personnel on the payrolls

of the Command are 2,647 scientists and engineers, the general pointed out. "Yet a bare 10 per cent of our total budget is spent in-house, the major portion being spent through contracts with private industry."

Gen. Barclay described several influences which have persuaded both young and experienced engineers, scientists, and technicians to enter Government service for the AOMC through its major subordinate elements, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, and the White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico.

"First is the fact that they share in the research and development of new techniques, processes, and equipment of such magnitude as to challenge the most creative mind and the finest scientific preparation.

"Second, the engineer may remain in the field of his specialization. Industry may also employ him in the same field today, since the missile program has nationwide impact. But since industry must respond quickly to considerations of profit and fluctuating market demands, the engineer has less assurance that he will continue in the same type activity outside the Government."

The third factor, Gen. Barclay said, is that "he receives adequate, timely and efficient support. The cardinal principle of the Missile Command's staff organization is that it exists only for the purpose of getting missiles onto targets. Anything which contributes to that objective re-

ceives immediate attention; anything which does not directly support our program has no place on our schedule."

Fourth, he added, opportunity for advanced study is afforded these employees.

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
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Safety Promotion At Arsenal Gains Wide Attention

Marshall Center has employed nearly 100 persons thus far.

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

ARGMA Awards Project Press Contract to RCA

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency last week awarded a contract for \$115,885 to the Radio Corporation of America to execute a computer study in connection with Project PRESS, an experimental program to determine the efficiency of radar in the detection and identification of ballistic missile warheads.

The study effort will have as its primary objective the design specification of a data handling and computer complex which will assimilate and process all data acquired on Project PRESS.

Project PRESS is known as the Pacific Range Electromagnetic Signature Study Facility. A project of the Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Department of Defense, it is under the supervision of ARGMA, commanded by Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle.

ARGMA's Research and Development Division will have cognizance of the RCA computer study, which will be conducted by RCA's Moorestown, N. J., Missile and Surface Radar Division.

Contractor officials said the study may lead to a design which could yield positive identification of warheads early in their trajectories.

RCA is already at work on TRADEX (Target Resolution and Discrimination Experiments) also a part of PRESS. A long-range, ultra-sophisticated tracking radar, TRADEX will yield a new order

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

Military Forces Mark Decade Of AFD May 21

New York (AFPS) — A decade has passed since the first Armed Forces Day celebration in 1950. That year the secretary of defense, with the approval of the President, gave official recognition to a one day unified observance of the important role our military plays in keeping the peace. The 1950 slogan was Teamed for Defense.

The 1953 slogan proclaimed Power for Peace. This phrase became so descriptive of our national effort that it has remained. The 1960 observance emphasizes the concept that the Free World, to which our Armed Forces are committed, is the real Power for Peace. In some overseas areas the same theme will be carried under the slogan Partners for Peace.

Armed Forces Day 1960 is intended to symbolize the unification, common interest and interdependence of all the Armed Forces. It gives the Armed Forces an opportunity to demonstrate the close working relationship of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Ma-

rine Corps, Coast Guard, Reserve Forces and auxiliary organizations.

A proclamation by the President on Mar. 5, 1957, officially proclaimed the third Saturday of each May as Armed Forces Day. From the first the Armed Forces Day observance has been devoted to emphasis upon the basic concept that our freedom and national security depend upon the power which comes from teamwork and national unity.

Most of the visitors are employed by ARO, Inc., which operates the Arnold Engineering Development Center at Tullahoma, Tenn., for the Air Force.

The Army has utilized the Arnold Center facilities in developing and testing components for its ballistic missiles and space vehicles.

During the morning the Rocket Society members visited the huge static test stand at Redstone where the Saturn space booster rocket is undergoing test firings. Saturn, a project of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, is the most powerful space vehicle in advanced development in the Free World.

Following lunch on the Arsenal the visitors toured the Thiokol Company's Redstone Division where they saw new Government facilities including a loading plant for solid propellant rocket motors and witnessed the static test of a solid motor.

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
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
