Stewart Is Named UGF Executive

Drive to Begin In Early Fall

A. A. Stewart was named executive chairman of the 1960 United Givers Fund Drive for Redstone Arsenal Friday by Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command. Gen. Schomburg is the Redstone UGF Drive Chairman.

Stewart is Executive Assistant to the Chief, Field Service Division, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

The UGF campaign will get underway in the Fall. The kickoff date will be announced later.

Stewart expects to announce Agency and contractor chairmen for the Redstone campaign in the near future.

An Arsenal employe since 1946, Stewart came here from Third Army Headquarters at Fort McPherson, Ga., as civilian chief of the Arsenal Supply Division.

In 1953 he became deputy chief of Redstone Depot and in 1956 was named chief. He took over his present duties in Field Service.

He has been active in community and employe relations programs during his term of employment here. He is a past president of the Redstone Arsenal Federal Credit Union and is presently on the Board of Directors.

Stewart is also active in the First Baptist Church in Huntsville, presently serving on the finance committee and as treasurer of the church.

He has been associated with the Government for more than 20 years. He is a member of the Association of the United States Army and of the Masons.

HUGE COMPUTER IS INSTALLED IN ABMA LAB


A huge electronic computer, said to be the most productive data processing system yet developed, will be formally installed today at Redstone Arsenal.

Witnessing the dedication at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency's Computation Laboratory will be some 30 newsmen invited here by International Business Machines Corporation, developer of the new computer.

The IBM computer, designated the 7090 data processing system, will be demonstrated for the reporters representing daily newspapers and trade publications at New York, Washington, Los Angeles, and other cities.

Those taking part in the program will include Dr. Wernher von Braun, Director of ABMA's Development Operation Division, who will become Director of the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center here July 1; Maj. Gen. John Barclay, Deputy Commander, AOMC; Col. Richard M. Hurst, ABMA Commander; Dr. Helmut Hoelzer, Director of the Computation Lab; Charles L. Bradshaw, Deputy Director of the lab; and Dr. R. F. Hoelker, Deputy Director of the ABMA Aeroballistics Lab.

The computer, which will be used primarily in the Saturn rocket booster development program along with other ABMA laboratory facilities, will be turned over to the civilian space center July 1.

ZEUS EQUIPMENT IS AIRLIFTED TO ASCENSION

The last major component of the massive Nike Zeus Target Tracking Radar was airlifted last week to Ascension Island in the South Atlantic, as the Army continues the speedy but orderly development of its unique anti-missile missile system.

The four main segments of the 78-ton radar were transported individually — along with accessory equipment — aboard giant Air Force C-133 Cargomasters from Tulsa, Okla., in what may be one of the largest air-cargo shipments to date.

On Ascension, the Target Tracking Radar (TTR) will be tested under environmental conditions against actual intermediate and intercontinental range ballistic missiles fired from Cape Canaveral, Fla. The radar will be installed and tested in the future at White Sands Missile Range, N. M., and Kwajalein Island in the South Pacific. It is from Kwajalein that Nike Zeus missiles will be launched against incoming ballistic missile targets.

Designed and built by the Continental Can Company of Coffeyville, Kan., under sub-contract to Bell Telephone Laboratories, the TTR forms a major link in the accurate and highly complex Nike Zeus radar network.

The Western Electric Company is the prime contractor for overall system development, under the supervision of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Ala.

Vibration Exciter Bids Are Advertised

The U.S. Army District Engineer at Mobile, announced today that he will open bids on June 24, for the construction of a vibration exciter facility at Redstone Arsenal, for use by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency in testing rocket motors.

The facility will be in the form of an addition to the existing Structures and Mechanics Building. It will be of all concrete construction and will contain a floor area of about 1800 square feet. The construction job will include heating, air-conditioning and interior electrical work and alterations to the existing industrial water line, and air line.

Pershing Control Structure Tested

An Army Pershing ballistic missile, pre-set to perform erratic movements in trajectory, was successfully fired Thursday, June 9, from Cape Canaveral, Fla., in a test of the missile's structure and control system.

In making the announcement, Army officials explained that the Pershing, now under research and development, was put into a veritable "rock and roll" arc over the Atlantic at 11:19 a.m. CDT.

As in previous test firings to date, only the missile's first stage was live, with the second stage weighted to simulate a live second stage motor.

Both ground and air transportable, the Pershing, which will replace the Redstone, will combine an inertial guidance system with a nuclear warhead to add greatly to the Army's capability for accurate application of firepower on selected targets.

NASA Sets Up Directorate For Launch Operations

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration yesterday outlined the organization of its launch operations at U. S. missile ranges.

NASA launch operations will be coordinated by a Launch Operations Directorate (LOD). It will become operational on July 1 when the Development Operations Division of ABMA formally transfers to NASA, Marshall Space Flight Center.

LOD director will be Dr. Kurt H Debus, presently ABMA Missile Firing Lab director. Pending formal transfer he immediately assumes interim supervision of NASA launch activities at the Atlantic Missile Range.

Dr. Debus heads one of the world's most experienced launching teams, having been responsible for the R&D launches of the Redstone, Jupiter and Pershing missiles, including the first U. S. space satellite as well as the first American payload to orbit the sun.

In addition to NASA activities the Launch Operations Directorate will take over the completion of the Missile Firing Lab's current obligations to the AOMC for launching Jupiter, Redstone and Pershing missiles.

LOD will function as the central NASA organization at AMR and Pacific Missile Range or all matters relating to overall vehicle launch operations and will act as the official NASA contact with

ARMY OBSERVES 185TH BIRTHDAY

Retreat Parade Is Held at Arsenal

The Army's 185th birthday was observed at Redstone Arsenal with a retreat parade and review on the Arsenal parade field yesterday afternoon.

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, was scheduled as the reviewing officer and to troop the line in a jeep.

Parade adjutant was Capt. Calvin C. Guffey. The Adjutant read the Orders of the Day for the Army's organization on June 14, 1775.

All troops on post participated. The 55th Army Band presented the music.

Maj. Lloyd Depeensmith, Deputy Troop Commander, was Commander of Troops and project officer for the review and retreat.

The parade was held on the parade field adjoining the Post Service Club, the Chapel and the Theater. Military policemen kept the traffic moving and helped visitors park.

FIRST NATIONAL OPENS BRANCH AT REDSTONE

For the first time since Redstone Arsenal became a missile and rocket center, on-post banking facilities will be available to the personnel here.

Col. Owen T. McCloskey, Redstone Commander, is scheduled to cut a ribbon in Bldg. 3651 this afternoon, officially placing a branch of the First National Bank of Huntsville in operation.

Banking hours will be from 2:30 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, with the exception of holidays, in the building that formerly housed the Post Exchange.

All services will be available including deposit and withdrawal facilities for custodians of non-appropriated funds; selling and redeeming U.S. Savings Bonds; and cashing checks.

This Is First Kill Of Guided Missile By Another Missile

WASHINGTON, D. C.—An improved Nike Hercules guided missile in an engineering feasibility demonstration destroyed a Corporal ballistic missile fired June 3 at White Sands Missile Range, N. M., the Department of the Army announced Friday.

While the Corporal has much less range and speed than ICBMs the test yielded valuable information pertinent to the development of anti-missile defenses, the Army said.

Hercules utilized improved equipment in interception and destroying the incoming Corporal high above the desert range. The Nike Hercules was armed with a high explosives warhead.

This was the first known "kill" of a guided ballistic missile by another missile. The Hawk, a low level anti-aircraft guided missile, intercepted and destroyed an Honest John short-range, unguided artillery rocket at White Sands earlier this year.

The Corporal, the Free World's first operational ballistic missile, is a liquid propellant weapon with a range of 75 miles. It was fired over a shorter trajectory for this test.

Nike Hercules is a solid fueled guided surface-to-air system. Improved ground equipment such as acquisition, tracking and guidance radars have increased its capabilities.

The new radars can reach out further and more accurately than any similar Hercules ground equipment operational today.

Lt. Blackburn Is Appointed Aide-De-Camp to General

First Lt. Paul L. Blackburn has been named aide-de-camp to Maj. Gen. J. A. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Lt. Blackburn, a graduate of the University of Cincinnati with a bachelor's degree in physics, came to Redstone Arsenal from a teaching and advising assignment with the Military Training Missile to Saudi Arabia.

Before his present appointment, Lt. Blackburn was a project officer in the AOMC Control Office. He joined the staff at the Arsenal in May 1959.

The Corporal was launched southward down the missile range by troops of the 40th Artillery Group, 1st Battalion. Hercules was fired northward. The missiles closed at speeds of thousands of miles per hour and terminated in flaming intercept.

The target presented by the incoming Corporal is smaller in radar reflectivity than the targets for which Nike Hercules was designed.

Hercules is currently operational as an air defense weapon. It is the second generation of the Nike family of guided missiles. Nike Ajax was the Army's first air defense missile and has been operational since 1953. Hercules is a newer and bigger brother.

The Hercules range is in excess of 75 miles. Its altitude capability is over 20 miles.

Nike Zeus, the third generation of Nike air defense weapons systems, is under Army development as a defense against ICBM's.

The improved elements of ground equipment were developed by the Western Electric Co., and turned over to the Bell Telephone Laboratories by Army Ordnance for demonstration. Douglas Aircraft Corp., is the prime contractor for the Hercules missile and its launcher.


Also within the Launch Operations Directorate at the AMR will be created an Office of Flight Missions (OFM) under John W. Rosenberry. OFM will coordinate range support requirements for the spacecraft activities of the various NASA field centers and submit their range requirements to the LOD director.

Procedures Studied For Installation Of Nike Zeus Sites

A review of procedures in producing and installing the Army's anti-missile missile, Nike Zeus, on tactical sites is under way on Redstone Arsenal.

Nike Zeus has not been approved for production. The conference review, however, will, according to Col. John G. Zierdt, Deputy Commander of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, "minimize problems which may be encountered in the later deployment" of the system. "Planning activity of this type will definitely lead to a smooth and rapid transition from development to production once we get the go-ahead."

In addition, the ARGMA Deputy Commander said, "we have already received indications of the dollar savings which may accrue from efforts of this nature."

HEALTH BENEFITS REGISTRATION ENDS JUNE 30

Authorities for registering in the new Federal Health Benefits program are Department of Army Civilian Personnel Circular 15 dated 19 April 60 and U.S. Civil Service Commission Departmental Circular 1024, Supplement 9, according to the Civilian Personnel authorities handling the registration in the new program.

Federal employees have until June 30 to fill out Form 2809 for registration in the health program.

Registration officials and supervisors assisting in the registration process have been reminded that any coercive action to force employees to register before June 30 is contrary to Civil Service Commission regulations.

Employees generally are advised by the Civilian Personnel authorities that as soon as each employee has had sufficient time to study the insurance brochures and to make a selection of a plan, registration should be completed.

Persons attending the conference represent a cross-section of all responsible Army and contractor organizations. These include Army Air Defense Command, as the system "user"; the Corps of Engineers, the Signal Corps, which must make major contributions in construction and communications; the Western Electric Company and Bell Telephone laboratories, which are the prime contractors to ARGMA; and all elements of the U.S. Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Prompt filing of completed forms will tend to level out the registration work load that is put upon each agency and will facilitate timely handling of individual registrations by the carriers.

Employees have been advised in orientation conferences of the effective dates of insurance coverage: July 3 and July 10 depending on the end of the pay period.

Early registration will insure early receipt of identification cards for hospital admittance for individuals and dependents.

For employees who find it necessary to wait until just before the June 30 closing date, the AOMC Civilian Personnel Office has arranged with hospitals in the Huntsville area, including Arab, Athens, Scottsboro, Hartselle, and Decatur for admittance to the hospital without an I.D. card for a short period of time after June 30, pending receipt of the card.

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

Communications Merger Is One Step Closer for Armed Forces

Washington (AFPS) — Merger of the Armed Forces long-haul communications into a single agency moved one step closer when Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates signed two documents, authorizing the new system.

Tailored to fit the requirements of the Defense Department, the new agency will be headed by an officer of general or flag rank and be phased-in over a nine-month period beginning in about two months.

The move confirms plans announced in February 1960 for development of a department-wide communications system capable of providing all point-to-point requirements of the Joint Chief of Staff, the unified and specified commands and the military departments.

At that time it was announced that a committee was studying the problem, known to concern Congress and the Pentagon for a long period of time.

The two directives signed by Secretary Gates are designed to

increase the effective use of long-line communications by centralizing their control and providing for a defense communications agency and a defense communications system, both under the direction, authority and control of the Secretary of Defense.

The new system will furnish facilities for command and control functions, intelligence, weather, logistics and administration. Communications requirements which have been met by the three military services in support of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration will also be furnished by the new agency.

The Defense Department said the new system will provide maximum communications for dollar investment, support for more advanced weapons systems, maximum flexibility, a better routing capability and eliminate duplication.

The agency will not handle organizational tactical communications, land, ship or airborne terminal facilities of broadcast, ship-

to-ship, ship-to-shore and ground-to-air communications.

The Defense Department said the communications net encompasses 79 major relay stations throughout the world and represents an investment of \$2 billion.

Location of the agency's headquarters will be determined, the DOD said, when the organizational structure and staffing plans of the JCS and Chief of the Defense Communications Agency are submitted to the Secretary of Defense for approval.

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



in August 1942, serving in the South Pacific area from August 1943 to January 1946. He is a member of the Loyal Order of Moose, and the American Legion.







Still wondering why you missed that buck last fall? Chances are he was moving at a pretty good clip when you fired a him, and it's really no disgrace to miss a fast-moving target.

However, with a little practice at moving targets, combined with ordinary paper target shooting, your chances of hitting next time can be improved. The majority of military hunters usually have access to a rifle range.

If you haven't access to a regular range, perhaps there is a place nearby where a .22 can be used

safely (an abandoned gravel pit is ideal). Why a .22 and not your regular hunting rifle? If you can hit small moving targets with a .22, you should be able to score on larger targets with a more powerful weapon.

For targets, practically anything can be used from an animal crackers to tin cans. One way to use the crackers is to place a line between two stakes and tie the cookies to the line with a short length of thread. You'll find they are pretty hard to hit, especially when they dance in any small breeze.

Here's one with a tin can that sounds easy but can be tricky. Set one end of a board on a stump or rock so that it forms an incline of at least 30 degrees. Place a loose wooden block near the top of the board so that it will

keep the can from rolling down the incline. Shoot away the block and then try to hit the can before it reaches the bottom.

These are just two ways to sharpen your eye during the off season. Try them or think up some of your own and your shooting should improve.



TWO GENERATIONS OF GARRABRANTS ARE MISSILEMEN

Now that second and third generation missiles are being added to the nation's defenses, a second generation missile family is making Army history here.

They are the Garrabrants—father and two sons—who are daily getting deeper into the complexities of Ordnance missile operations.

CWO Andrew V. Garrabrant, 45 and a veteran of 16 years of

Army service, heads the all-out missile family. He's just come back to the Ordnance Guided Missile School to study the new Hawk air defense system in a gruelling 43-week course. It's his second session and will make him an expert in the spectacular low-level weapon slated for use by the Army and the Marine Corps.

His eldest son, Mark, 23, just received his warrant also after completing a course at the Missile School and is now assigned to the Unit Training Command.

Right on the firing line is a second son, Ward, 19, now assigned

to a Nike site at Fort McArthur, Calif. He also trained at OGMS, making the family the first to send three members through the seven-year-old "Missile Academy" which has now trained more than 20,000 technicians from the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and 12 Allied nations.

The age of missiles is still so now that the Garrabrants may well be the first Ordnance family to have three members working full-time in the rapidly expanding field.

Papa Garrabrant is the only one of the family, including his wife, who wasn't born in Elmira, N.Y. But his birthplace was at Athens, Pa., just across the state line from Elmira. He entered the Army in 1943 as an infantryman, served six years in Europe and transferred to Ordnance in 1949, serving his first tour at Aberdeen Proving Ground. He came to the Missile School, then worked with Field Service at the Army Rocket & Guided Missile Agency and now is back in school.

Mama Garrabrant is the former Ruth Davies, daughter of Mrs. Sarah Davies, 3515 West Church St., Elmira. She and the other surviving grandmother, Mrs. Louise Garrabrant of Horseheads, N.Y., could have established some kind of a missile family record.

The three male Garrabrants are unanimous about their chosen profession.

Army Steps Up Mobility Research

Washington (AFPS) — The Army is stepping up its research program aimed at preventing military vehicles from losing traction in mud or sand.

Sparked by the need for increased mobility of Army vehicles through any kind of soil and over any type of terrain, the scientific study is now underway at the Army Mobility Research Center, Vicksburg, Miss.

Roadbound military motor movements will be limited in the

future due to the nuclear threat, the Army explained, and the ability of motor elements to disperse and move across country is vital problem that must be solved.

During our last two wars, experts pointed out, Army trucks and tanks often were bogged down in the sticky clays of Italy or Okinawa, trapped in North African sands or mired in Korean rice paddies.

These stalled vehicles were "sitting ducks" for enemy fire and even if they were not destroyed they delayed delivery of vital supplies.

Specific aim of the new studies is to learn what conditions of continued traffic or moisture content will cause various soils to wheeled and tracked vehicles.

"Ordnance missile assignments are the best in the Army," they declare.

Papa Garrabrant takes a sanguine view of the future. Looking at his two sons of marriageable age he prophesies:

"When future generations of missiles are operational, maybe there'll be a new generation of Garrabrants to keep 'em operating!"



A call for re-emphasis on American ideals and morals was issued here Saturday night by the Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency in a speech before the Alabama Convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Speaking at the Community Center, Col. Richard M. Hurst, in his talk on "The High Cost of Obsolescence," drew a parallel between the danger of relying on obsolete weapons in this atomic age and allowing our patriotism to deteriorate when other peoples are striving to reach the ideals exhibited by America throughout her history.

"The cost of obsolescence can run as high in idealism as in hardware," said Col. Hurst. "We Americans need to put on a new patriotism today. Love of country is not something to hide," he added.

Col. Hurst pointed out that since the time most VFW members served in the Armed Forces, radical changes have been made in weaponry and logistical support. He illustrated his point by mentioning a few of the latest innovations: infra-red equipment enabling soldiers to "move and fight on the blackest night"; a new family of small arms using a shorter, lighter cartridge standardized for NATO; the "Davy Crockett," a front-line Battle Group weapon

capable of firing either conventional or atomic warheads; and the addition of missiles and rockets "capable of delivering devastating firepower over long ranges with pinpoint accuracy."


He dramatized these changes by stating that veterans in the audience "would have to undergo basic training all over again to catch up" with the advances. As an afterthought, Colonel Hurst said that "it probably would be advantageous for me to join you."

Col. Hurst stated that as soon as a new weapon is tested and proved, the old system becomes obsolete "This is a hard and expensive fact of life which we must accept if we intend to retain our challenged position as world leader," he said.

While noting that a weapon operates better after a few years of use in the field, Col. Hurst indicated that this kind of progress is too lengthy today. "Superior weapons could easily mean the difference between life or death for the individual soldier," he said.

"Industry has been quick to capitalize on the amazing technological advances made in military research and development," Col. Hurst declared. He pointed out that improved automatic appliances, transistor radios and better television sets are some of the items which would not be so easily within the average citizen's purchasing power without military research.

Of the work being done at Redstone Arsenal, Col. Hurst disclos-

ed, "We will average spending one and one-third million dollars every day in the year to meet our obligations. It is our solemn obligation to invest this tremendous amount of the taxpayers' money wisely and carefully for the most positive results in increasing our national security."

Col. Hurst said he had for a long time endorsed the objectives of the VFW, adding that such organizations are necessary to "to remind us that there are patriotic duties and standards of conduct that cannot be eroded by time or diluted by materialistic pursuit of happiness."

He asked the members to redouble their efforts "to arouse Americans to new heights of idealism and moral stature" and reminded them that "obsolescence is the price of progress, and progress is the activity of today which becomes the assurance of tomorrow."

Space Center Fills Management and Administrative Jobs

(EDITOR'S NOTE — This is the second in a series of articles intended to familiarize the reader with the administrative general support organizations being formed as a part of the new George C. Marshall Space Flight Center, which will become fully operational July 1.)

Administrative and management support functions will be provided the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center by the Office of Management Services. This Office has been established to advise and provide policy guidance to the Director and operating officials on administrative matters and to develop programs, procedures and services in the various management and administrative areas.

This is one of six major support offices of the new Center under the direction of Delmar M. Morris, Deputy Director for Administration. The others are the Office of Technical Services, Financial Management Analysis.

Victor Sorensen has been named Director of the Office of Management Services. He has been Chief of Administration for Development Operations Division, ABMA, since 1956. In his new position he will be responsible for a comprehensive program encompassing a variety of support services organized into the following branches:

Personnel Director for the Marshall Center, Arthur S. Sanderson, will serve as principal advisor on all matters pertaining to personnel management. His Branch is responsible for planning, developing and administering programs relating to recruiting, examining, training, employe relations, salary and wage administration, employe utilization, industrial health and incentive awards. Mr. Sanderson has been Director of Civilian Personnel for ABMA for several years and was formerly Personnel officer for the St. Louis Ordnance District.

The Security Branch Chief is Keith Wible, who has been Chief of Security and Intelligence for Redstone Arsenal. He and his staff will develop and administer comprehensive programs of physical, industrial, and personnel security

which will assure that necessary safeguards are established in the interest of national security.

The Administrative Services Branch will plan, develop, and administer programs relating to records management, food services, forms and reports, administrative procedures, signal communications, printing and reproduction, and related office services. This Branch will be directed by Henry Williams, who recently held the position of Executive Assistant, Adjutant General's Office, AOMC.

In the Traffic Management Branch Chief, Mildred Bobo, and her staff handle all matters pertaining to commercial transportation and traffic management and provide guidance and assistance to all elements of the Center on matters relating to transportation of space vehicles and associated support systems and equipment. She was formerly Chief of Traffic Management at Redstone Arsenal.

The Graphic Engineering and Model Studies Branch, will provide illustrations, models, posters,

vide creative artwork, engineering displays, and exhibits, animated photography, and other special creative artistic design, illustration and fabrication work. This Branch is under the direction of Gerd deBeek, who has been directing similar activities for the Ordnance missile program since 1945. Before that he was Chief of the Graphics and Models Branch of the Peenemuende Rocket Center and came to America with the German scientists following the war.

Frederick Ordway III has been appointed as Chief, Space Systems Information Branch. He will serve as principal advisor for the Center on all matters pertaining to technical publications, technical report writing and analytical information pertaining to space systems. His Branch will originate, write, review, edit and prepare all Center technical reports and publications, and provide direction and script preparation of technical documentary films and television presentations. Mr. Ordway has had broad business, management and writing experience in scientific fields.
