Advisory Committee Visits Cape

Missile Sites, Briefings Are On Itinerary

Twenty-eight leading citizens of Huntsville are touring Cape Canaveral, Florida this week as guests of the Citizens Advisory Committee of Redstone Arsenal.

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General, AOMC and his Deputy, Maj. Gen. J. A. Barclay, are participating with their guests.

The group left Huntsville at 1 p.m. yesterday, June 28, arriving at Patrick Air Force Base, near the Cape, at 4 p.m.

Today they will hear briefings on missile firing operations including the Army's program for testing the new Pershing Ballistic Missile system. They will visit Army missile firing sites, the Titan ICBM blockhouse and a Navy test (See ADVISORY on Page 2)

SECURITY GUARDS ARE RECEIVING TRAINING AT NASA

A security guard force of 70 men is being trained and equipped at the NASA-Marshall Space Flight Center. The force will assume responsibility for the physical security of the \$100 million center at Thursday midnight, when the transfer of the facilities from Army management to the NASA becomes effective.

The guards were outfitted with uniforms, badges and other personnel equipment, and automobiles last week.

They are undergoing a one-week period of training, which includes practice firing at the installation pistol range.

ABMA-to-NASA Shift Scheduled

Gen. Schomburg Will Officiate At July 1 Ceremony

The Army will officially transfer an important segment of its rocket and missile development organization at Redstone Arsenal to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in a brief ceremony July 1.

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General, U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, will turn over approximately \$100,000,000 worth of buildings and equipment here and at Cape Canaveral, Florida.

Dr. Wernher von Braun, Director, Marshall Space Flight Center, NASA, will accept the transfer of facilities and personnel. Approximately 4,700 Civil Service employees of the Army are being transferred to the Space Flight Center.

Col. Richard Hurst, Commander, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, will also participate in the ceremony. Most of the personnel being transferred are now employed in the Development Operations Division of ABMA.

The transfer was initiated by the President in October, 1959. His proposal was approved by Congress during the Spring and the Marshall Space Flight Center (See TRANSFER on Page 2)

EBERHARD REES RECEIVES HIGHEST CIVILIAN AWARD

The Department of Defense Distinguished Civilian Service Award—the nation's second highest civilian citation—was given June 21 to Dr. Eberhard Rees "in recognition of technical and administrative leadership he has demonstrated as deputy director of the Development Operations Division, ABMA.

The award, presented in Washington D.C. by Secretary of the Army Wilbur M. Brucker, cited Dr. Rees for his "contribution to such major accomplishments as the first successful launching of an intermediate range ballistic missile, the launching of the first U.S. earth satellite, and other major missile developments which have been of great importance to the U.S."

Dr. Rees was also commended for his "administrative and scientific ability and his patriotic devotion to the task of developing adequate defensive weapons for (See REES on Page 2)

transfer will be completed by July 1.

The Army also stated that 507 engineering and professional jobs remain to be filled. This number will be divided as follows: 450 to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency; 32 to the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency; and 25 to Redstone Arsenal. ARGMA has an additional requirement for 33 technical and administrative personnel.

ABMA must fill the following vacancies: 150 mechanical engineers, 90 electronics engineers, 90 electrical engineers, 30 physicists, and 90 aeronautical engineers.

In ARGMA, vacancies will exist for 11 missile engineers, four electrical engineers, three mechanical engineers, two general engineers, two aeronautical engineers, two mathematicians and two chemists. Single vacancies exist for a physicist, electronics engineer, chemical engineer, supervisory accountant, industrial engineer and analytical statistician.

Technical and administrative jobs to be filled in ARGMA are: six management analysts, five equipment specialists, three engineering technicians, three publications writers, three supply requirements and distribution officers, two contract specialists, two cost analysts, two production specialists, two supply catalogers, two administrative officers and two commodity management officers.

Recruiting of personnel to fill these jobs is being carried on by the Personnel Offices at AOMC, ARGMA, ABMA, Redstone Arsenal and AOMC's three existing field offices in San Francisco, Dallas and New York. Shortly after July 1, a new Area Technical Placement Office will be opened in Chicago to assist in the procurement of personnel for these jobs.

The Chicago office will be located in the headquarters of the Chicago Ordnance District.

RUGG IS 20,000TH TO FINISH OGMS MISSILE COURSES

Capt. Robert M. Rugg, 32, of Sonoma, Calif., was honored Friday as the 20,000th graduate to complete training at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School since the first class began in 1953.

Capt. Rugg was among 80 officers and enlisted men, including 14 Marines, who received diplomas from Maj. Gen. S. B. Mason of Birmingham, commanding general of the Fourth Army Corps, who was the principal speaker at exercises held in the Post Theater.

Will Halsey, Jr., of the Huntsville-Madison County Chamber of Commerce, presented Capt. Rugg with a commemorative plaque during the ceremonies on behalf of a Chamber committee consisting of Thomas Dark, president, and Jimmy Walker, executive secretary.

Gen. Mason was introduced by Col. Charles W. Eifler, OGMS commandant.

In a review of the nation's military strength today, Gen. Mason declared that the role of the Army missile specialist is underscored by the fact that potential enemies of the U.S. have almost three times as many men under arms today as this country.

Patent For Friction Drive Is Issued to Hermann and Boehm

FREEDOMS FOUNDATION:

Top Winners to Ride In Presidential Parade

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Top Service winners in this year's Freedom's Foundation Letter Writing Awards Program are in for some real VIP (very important person) treatment during inauguration ceremonies of the new President here Jan. 20, 1961.

According to Foundation officials the top service winners will be invited to Washington for the inauguration; ride in the inaugural parade; have reserved seats at the inaugural functions and receive their awards at special ceremonies.

It was explained that it doesn't matter in what part of the world individuals are stationed at the time they win the award. They will still be invited to the ceremonies. The only stipulation is that the trip is subject to the approval of his or her commanding officer.

In addition to the Washington trip for the inauguration, the top winners will be in line for one of the cash awards and a George Washington Honor Medal.

The cash awards this year are \$1,000 for first place and \$500 for second place. In addition there will be fifty \$100 awards plus fifty \$50 awards. All winners will receive the George Washington Honor Medal.

Officials emphasized that Armed Forces members who participate in the letter writing program do not have to be professional

writers. What counts will be the sincerity of thought, originality and the idea expressed.

The topic for this year, appropriately enough, is "My Vote — Freedom's Privilege," and the program is open to all members of the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty.

To enter the letter writing award program all an individual must do is write a letter of from 100 to 500 words on "My Vote—Freedom's Privilege" and send it to Freedom's Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa., before midnight of Nov. 1, 1960.

The letter must be non-partisan. Officials stressed that any letter "for" or "against" any candidate

or party will not be considered for an award.


Letter writers must sign their full name, grade or rating, and include serial number, branch of service, unit address and home address.

Freedoms Foundation is an independent, non-profit organization, affiliated with no sectarian religious group or political party. It was first formed in 1949, and it exists to:






