## DR. NILS L. MUENCH WILL BE ANTI-MISSILE COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

Dr. Nils L. Muench will be the chairman of the semi-annual meeting of the Anti-Missile Research Advisory Council to be held in Seattle, Wash., July 21 and 22, and to be attended by 450 scientists and technical personnel from U.S., England, Canada, and Australia.

Dr. Muench is Chief Scientist, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

The meeting, sponsored by Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Department of Defense, is a semi-annual report on current programs investigating the characteristic of ballistic missile flight affecting radio frequency, optical and infrared range of the electromagnetic spectrum.

The purpose is to assemble the leading scientists and technical (See DR. MUENCH on Page 2)

## Special Appeal Is Made To Help Quake Victims

Arrangements have been made to receive voluntary contributions from employes at Redstone Arsenal for the aid of the people of Chile who were recently stricken by earthquake. Announcement of this action was made by Col. Owen T. McCloskey, Redstone Arsenal commander, who said the effort will end Friday at noon.

This action was taken to cooperate with President Eisenhower's appeal to the people of the U. S. to help relieve the distress caused by recent earthquakes and volcanic eruptions, followed by tidal waves and floods in Chile. The resulting damage in material and personal casualties will take years to overcome.

Col. McCloskey said, "While it is realized that only one concerted solicitation for funds is made each year at Redstone Arsenal, this serious catastrophe has made it necessary to establish an emergency solicitation appeal to all military and civilian personnel of the government. The week of 18th to 22nd July has been established for the drive at Redstone Arsenal."

## COL. GRAHAM IS APPOINTED CHIEF OF AOMC CONTROL

The man who came to Redstone Arsenal in 1952 to establish the Ordnance Guided Missile School has been appointed Chief of the Control Office at the Army Ordnance Missile Command by Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General.

Lt. Col. Erwin M. Graham, formerly Deputy Chief of the Control Office, succeeds Col. Calvin A. Heath who retired from active duty last month.

An electrical engineering graduate of Mississippi State College, Col. Graham received his Master's degree and a professional doctorate from Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

He entered military service in August 1941 as a lieutenant, served in North Africa and the European Theater of Operations during World War II, and left the Army a major following the war.

When he returned to active duty in 1947, he became chief of the Instrumentation Laboratory at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md. He also served in the Ordnance School and the Ordnance Training Command at Aberdeen prior to coming to Redstone Arsenal to select the faculty and set up the organization of the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

He completed the Ordnance Advanced Course at Aberdeen and then spent three years overseas (See COL. GRAHAM on Page 3)

## COL. DICKINSON IS HONORED BY QUEEN ELIZABETH

On June 11 it was announced in the Queens Birthday Honours List that Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II had been graciously pleased to approve the award of the OBE to Col. Stanley E. Dickinson of the Royal Army Ordnance Corps. The announcement was made while Col. Dickinson was enroute to England.

Since February of this year, Col. Dickinson has been serving at Redstone Arsenal as the British Liaison Officer attached to U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command. Prior to this assignment he held the appointment of Assistant Director of Ordnance Services at the British War Office in London.

The full title of Col. Dickinson's decoration is 'Officer of the Military Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire.'

The colonel is married with two children, Paul aged 13 and Anne 7. Mrs. Dickinson and Ann, who are at present in England, plan to join him in Huntsville in early October. Paul who is attending school in England expects to visit his parents in Huntsville during the Christmas vacation.


## He Is One of Four Directors in Newly Formed R. and D.

Carl A. Pinyerd, Jr., new Project Director for the Army's up-and-coming Pershing missile, is a 37-year-old engineer with seven years experience in rocketry.

He became Pershing project Director when Dr. Arthur Rudolph, former director, moved up to head ABMA's newly formed Research and Development Operations. As Director, Pinyerd is "Mr. Pershing", responsible for overall management of the project.

He is one of four project directors for missile systems in the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, part of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, at Redstone Arsenal.

The Pershing is a solid-propellant, two-stage missile of high mobility, designed to succeed the Redstone. It is being developed

## Scouts Can Show Skills At Courtland Camporee



### Both Receive High Civilian Awards From Army

Dr. Arthur Rudolph and Konrad K. Dannenberg, both residents of Huntsville, Friday received the highest honors which the Army can confer upon a civilian, the Exceptional Civilian Service Award and the Meritorious Civilian Service Award.

Honoring the missile scientists for their contributions to the Army missile program, Major General August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, presented the awards at a 3 p. m. ceremony at the Redstone Arsenal post theater.

The ceremony was attended by family, friends and co-workers of the two men. Among those present were Major General John A. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General, AOMC; Dr. Eberhard Rees, Deputy Director, Marshall Space Flight Center; Colonel Richard M. Hurst, Commander, Army Ballistic Missile Agency;

Col. J. G. Zierdt, Commander Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency; and Colonel Owen T. McCloskey, Commander, Redstone Arsenal.

Introduced by Robert F. Mello, AOMC Civilian Personnel Director, Lt. Col. W. S. Fries read the citations, and Gen. Schomburg presented the accompanying medals to Dr. Rudolph and Mr. Dannenberg.

Dr. Rudolph, Director of Research and Development Operations, ABMA, received the Exceptional Civilian Service Award, the Army's top civilian award, for "exceptional performance of duty as Project Director for the Redstone and Pershing guided missiles."

His citation, signed by Secretary of the Army Wilbur M. Brucker, said, "His technical proficiency in coordinating and directing development of the Redstone has resulted in its deployment as the first successful large United States ballistic missile months ahead of schedule. custom, dress and folklore as well as racial stock. The average contemporary Indonesian is light brown in color, short, slender and frail of stature. His hair is black, ranging from straight to wavy, and his facial features are either sharply chiseled or Mongolian.

Since the beginning of the Christian era Indonesia has felt the impact of the Hindu, Moslem and European cultures, each of which has left its imprint, in varying degrees, upon the social structure of the islands.

Most of the land is good for farming and Indonesia produces 60 per cent of the world's kapok, 90 per cent of cinchona bark, 85 per cent of pepper and 29 per cent of the world's copra. Forestry and fishing are also prevalent on the islands.

After winning its independence from the Netherlands in 1949, Indonesia established a Republic a year later with a House of Representatives. That same year Indonesia was admitted to the United Nations. The country's government hasn't changed in the intervening 10 years.

As might be expected, there are

over 30 different languages, divided into 11 main groups with some 250 recognizable dialects. Basically, the people speak a tongue derived from Malay called Bahasa Indonesia.

# Post Exchange Celebrates 65th Anniversary July 25

## History Proves Sutler Wasn't Always Fair

The soldier's neighborhood store — the Post Exchange—will be 65 years old on July 25. It was on that date in 1895 that Secretary of War Daniel Lamong signed General Order No. 46 authorizing the establishment of exchanges on military posts to serve the U. S. Army.

The Redstone Arsenal Exchange will celebrate the event with a cake cutting ceremony at 8:30 in cafeteria No. 18, Building 3651, and free coffee will be served in all exchange feeding activities throughout the day.

Known by a variety of names to service families — The Exchange, PX, BX, Base Exchange, Post Exchange, Canteen — this military resale activity is rated among the foremost benefits of service. Each exchange is under the supervision of the installation commander, while overall policies and procedures for the world-

wide system are coordinated by the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, a joint instrumentality of the Department of the Army and the Department of the Air Force.

Since 1895, the Exchange Service has worked to fulfill a dual role for military personnel regardless of their duty station. First, it provides them with quality goods and services at prices suited to their limited pay. Second, it generates profits, which finance entertainment and recreation programs such as variety shows, service clubs, dances, libraries, athletic events and chapels.

Wherever the serviceman and his family is stationed the exchange is prepared to serve—providing the everyday needs which are so much a part of the "American way of life," and offering savings to stretch the family budget. Whether it is a Nike site in the suburbs, a large training center, or a remote front line post in Korea, the soldier will find the PX nearby.

There is nothing new about the exchange concept; it has existed as long as nations have had armies. The earliest forerunners of today's exchanges were a group of shops on Rome's Via Quintana which served Caesar's Legionnaires.

The men of George Washington's Continental Army bought knives, blankets, snuff and tobacco from roving peddlers called "sutlers." Many of these unregulated tradesmen sold poor quality merchandise at exorbitant prices. During the Civil War, Congress instituted a system of post traders. This system lacked uniformity and quality, and eventually was replaced by cooperative canteens financed by officers'


personal funds.

The canteens were abolished in 1895 in favor of the exchange system. General Order No. 46 stated in part, "The post exchange will combine the features of reading and recreation rooms, cooperative store, and a restaurant. Its primary purpose is to supply the troops, at reasonable prices, with articles of ordinary use, wear and consumption not supplied by the Government, and to afford them means of recreation and amusement." Although the hard-bitten trooper of Spanish-American War days might not recognize some of the merchandise stocked in today's exchanges, he would find that the goals have not changed in 65 years.

Another thing that hasn't changed is the limitation of exchange patronage to authorized customers—military personnel and their de-

pendents. The exchange is a privilege, accorded to the military in recognition of the hardships, privations and inconveniences of service life. Congress has warned that abuse of this privilege would lead to its abolition, and urges servicemen not to make purchas-

es for unauthorized patrons, lend their ID cards to civilians, or antagonize civilian merchants by boasting about comparing prices.

### White Sands Offers Reward For Targets Impacting Off-Range

White Sands Missile Range, N. M.—Uncle Sam has taken steps to save the money he's got tied up in parachute targets used in the White Sands Missile Range test programs and is offering a \$25 reward for the return of any of the targets that impact outside the WSMR boundaries.

The parachutes in question are the valuable 24-foot to 36-foot diameter silver-and orange checkerboard shrouds used by the Pogo Hi target rocket.

Despite preventive measures, the parachutes and their attached equipment sometimes ride a vagrant breeze to a landing outside the range's "off-limits" boundaries; rugged terrain makes radar tracking of the chutes impossible in some instances.


So, to make worth while the efforts of the range's good neighbors who come across one of the target parachutes, the chief of Range Services Division of the Integrated Range Mission has been authorized to approve the reward

for return of Pogo Hi target from off range or for information leading to the recovery of such an off-range impacted target.

Stenciled information on each parachute will tell the finder whom to telephone or contact at WSMR; targets employing acquisition or infra-red flares, dangerous if they have not functioned properly in the air, will be marked "DANGER, DO NOT HANDLE," along with the reward information.

Under the Army Missile Test Center establishing payment for return of Pogo Hi targets which have impacted off the range, military and civilian personnel assigned, attached or employed at White Sands Missile Range will be excluded from receiving payments for targets they locate.
