ARGMA Transfers Systems, Reorganizes Concurrently

Two Staff Officers Have Been Created

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency announced today that an internal reorganization has taken place concurrently with the transfer of several missile systems to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

In making the announcement, Colonel John G. Zierdt, ARGMA commander said that two new staff offices have been created, and two divisions of the Agency have been merged.

ARGMA, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, is now primarily responsible for the development and production of all Army missiles requiring external guidance after launching, including the NIKE ZEUS anti-aircraft.

The ARGMA Training Office, created by the reorganization, will exercise staff supervision of all phases of ARGMA's training requirement including training of instructors for the Ordnance Guided Missile School, Redstone Arsenal; the Field Artillery School, Fort Sill, Okla.; and the Air Defense School, Fort Bliss, Texas. Major Lester B. Holmes has been named to head the new office.

Also new in the ARGMA staff organization is the Missile System Safety Office, which will be responsible for the overall Agency safety program. The office will be headed by Tom Davidson, who has been appointed Acting Chief.

To bring about a closer coordination of the Agency's in house research capabilities, the Ordnance Missile Laboratories Division and the Research and Development Division have been merged, to function in the future as Research and Development Operations.

The integrated organization will be under the direction of Colonel R. W. Burkett, until recently Deputy Director of the Agency's old (See INTERNAL on Page 2)


Col. Paul Is Reassigned to Army War College

Assigned to ABMA since its formation on February 1, 1956, Col. Paul also served as Director of the Agency's Field Support Division and concurrently as Jupiter Project Officer.

He will be succeeded in his present position by Col. Harold N. Brownson, who was formerly chief of the Control Office of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency. Both ABMA and ARGMA are installations of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Col. Hurst Is Brigadier General Aug. 1

The promotion of Col. Richard M. Hurst, Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, to brigadier General has been confirmed by the U. S. Senate.

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command of which ABMA is an element, in making the announcement said that the promotion became effective August 1.

Gen. Hurst, who became commander of the Agency in May, was formerly deputy commander of the Ordnance Tank Automotive Command in Detroit, Mich.

A graduate of Northwestern and Purdue Universities, he holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering, a Master of Science degree in Business Administration and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Industrial Management.

Upon graduation from Purdue in 1930, Gen. Hurst was commissioned as a reserve officer in the Field Artillery. For the next five years he worked as a student engineer and later operating engineer for public service and power companies in Illinois and Indiana. In 1935 he began a three-year tour (See GEN. Pershing Behaves As Planned

Army Claims 3-Fold Success in Firing At Cape Canaveral

The Army successfully fired its Pershing ballistic missile July 26, at the Atlantic Missile Range, Cape Canaveral, Fla.


The missile was fired from its self-contained transporter-erector-launcher mounted on tracked vehicle.

The entire Pershing system is transported by these tracked vehicles which give the weapon true battlefield mobility.

The Army said the firing was a three-fold success, proving out the transporter and the launcher carried atop the tracked vehicle. All the missile's test objectives were met.

Today's firing ran the Pershing record to six successes in as many tests in the firing program of the advanced, selective-range artillery missile.

Col. Richard M. Hurst, Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, said use of the tracked vehicle in the test was in line (See PERSHING on Page 3)

COL. COLLINS WILL GO TO PACIFIC COL. BURKETT TO DIRECT R AND D

\$30 Million Added To Martin Contract On Pershing Missile

The Department of the Army announced today that it has awarded a 30 million continuation contract to the Martin Company, Orlando, Florida, for further development of the Pershing ballistic missile system.

This brings the total for Martin's Pershing effort to 240,264,592 and extends the original contract to September 30.

The two-stage, solid propellant Pershing missile is in the research and development stage at present. To date, six successful firings of the Pershing have been conducted (See ADDED on Page 3)



Lt. Col. Glenn Crane, project director of the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system development, said preparation of facilities on Ascension Island in the South Atlantic; White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico; Ft. Mugu, California, and Kwajalein Island in the Southwest Pacific is progressing on schedule.

Special attention was given to preparation of the Nike Zeus installation on Kwajalein where full system tests will be conducted firing Nike Zeus missiles against Atlas ICBMs launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California.

Components of the system and some system tests will be conducted at the other sites. Firing of early test versions of the Nike Zeus missile have already been successfully conducted at White Sands, another element of AOMC.

AOMC has responsibility for management of the unique Zeus system. Technical supervision has been vested in ARGMA.

MISSILE DEFINITION: Guided missile — an unmanned vehicle whose trajectory is capable of being altered by a mechanism within the vehicle.

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
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

The Pershing is a selective range surface-to-surface ballistic missile system. It is being designed as an Army practical support weapon of extreme accuracy and high mobility. Reliability, short-reaction time, simplification of equipment, and versatility in all types of terrain and climate are primary goals of the system.

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama, is responsible for the overall development of the Pershing system. ABMA is an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

The Birmingham Ordnance District, under the command of Lt. Col. J. E. Barnhill, is administering the contract.

with the Army's philosophy of designing and testing the tactical ground support equipment as an integral part of the missile development program.

ABMA, exercising Pershing technical supervision and contract control, is an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command. The Martin Company of Orlando, Fla., is prime contractor.

As in two previous firings of the solid propellant missile, today's Pershing reacted to pre-arranged control signals simulating changes in wind velocity and direction. The missile weathered the "wind" variables thrown at it and completed its short range trajectory to a pre-determined point on the firing range. Only the first of the missile's two stages was fired. The second stage was inert.

Pershing firings began in February, less than two years after the initial contract was signed.


Known as XM-474, the full tracked vehicle employed in today's test is a product of the Food Machinery and Chemical Corporation of San Jose, California. The missile transporter-erector-launcher (TEL), mounted atop it is manufactured by TAPCO of Cleveland,

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES with 50 stars. Official debut for the flag with its new star for Hawaii was made at Independence Hall, Philadelphia on July 4. Just a year ago a new flag with 49 stars was raised for Alaska. That was the first new flag since 1912 when Arizona and New Mexico entered the union.

A Flag Does Not Become Obsolete

People owning a 48-star flags should hang on to them. The Flag of the Nation is considered a living thing that goes joyfully to its post at sunrise and leaves reluctantly at sundown.

This fact was brought home when the Philadelphia Quartermaster answered a request from

Ohio. The XM-474 is a low silhouette vehicle. It is approximately seventeen feet in length, six feet in height and eight feet in width; it travels at a maximum speed of about 40 miles per hour.

The TEL is an electro-mechanical system mounted atop the tracked vehicle, which carries the missile and erects the Pershing into its firing position. The missile can be put into firing position in a matter of minutes.

Redstone Arsenal last year for a 49-star flag, after Alaska became a state.

The Quartermaster indicated that 49 star flags were available, but that the 48-star flag should continue in use until it was unserviceable and ready for destruction. He pointed out that a living thing does not become obsolete.

When the present supply is exhausted, the Quartermaster will begin supplying all Army installations with flags carrying 50 stars, representing the full complement of 50 states, including the new State of Hawaii.

The National flag is always raised quickly by hand after it is unfurled and lowered slowly and with dignity.

General George Washington, when the flag was first flown by the Continental Army, is said to

have described its symbolism as follows:

"We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and white stripes shall go down to posterity, representing liberty."

'Prosecution Is Success'

Months of study and rehearsals were quite evident as the members of the Show Production Group garnered a harvest of applause as they ably presented their version of Agatha Christie's hit "Witness for the Prosecution."

Military personnel, dependents and guests were ushered into The Rocket Service Club's main lounge, which had been transformed into a "theater-in-the-round" on Thursday and Friday nights last week.

As the audience listened and watched from all sides, fine character interpretations and effective technical producing recreated scenes from England and the Old Bailey Court. The stage was simply a wooden platform with the barest of furnishings; yet it was more than enough when combined with the group's excellent acting.

Leonard Vole (Phil Collins) was accused of murdering a rich spinster who had befriended him. Vole's wife Romaine (Pat Brandenstein) testified against him in court as the defense counsel, Sir Wilfred Roberts (Fred Gros), and the prosecutor, Mr. Myers (Dave Hall), argued their cases before the judge (Al Kornbluth). Witness after witness paraded before the jury to create plot and counterplot. Since Vole's wife presented

herself as untrue and vengeful, her testimony did not convict Vole, but caused the jury foreman (Bob Czarnecki) to state 'Not guilty, my Lord.'

Supporting cast members filled in the necessary background convincingly. Peggy Johnson, who works as a secretary for ABMA, produced an English accent that would fool anyone who hasn't had the pleasure of meeting her off-stage, making her debut with the Group very promising. Dot Worley, a veteran to two other productions, (Holiday for Lovers' and "Let's Get Married"), did a fine job as the spinster's maid.

Pat Brandenstein, whose husband is First Lieutenant Howard Brandenstein, OGMS Logistics, carried a difficult double role very well, proving her acting experience and ability which stretches from Alaska to Europe, as she traveled with her Army WO father.

Phil Collins portrayed some fine emotional scenes as the defendant, Leonard Vole. Phil has worked with dramatic groups at Washington State College before his induction into the Army.

Fred Gros's deep, mellow voice and fine acting ability won him a place in everyone's memory of the show. Fred has worked in the professional theater in New York and has hopes of returning after he completes his military obligation.

Dave Hall, who usually entertains at the piano or as a clown, pleasantly surprised everyone with his serious part as prosecutor, Mr. Myers. Dave has been seen in two other Group productions and represented Redstone Arsenal in the Third Army Talent Contest earlier this year.

Dave Belcher did a superb job in handling lighting effects which, of course, is very important in establishing the proper mood. He was assisted by Carl Bilton, while Ed Alban and Bob Scaturro handled sets.

Other cast members were Lee Seifert, Jack Albert, Lovell Crandell Guy McAllister, and Charles Perkins.

Particular mention goes to Tom Tangway, producer of the show, who's ability was not openly seen but must be appreciated as part of the entire effort. Complimenting Tom's ability was Bob Sokoloff who as director put his magic touch to the written word and made actors' lines seem real.

20 to 30 minutes.

"Actually, the instrument can release the balloon electronically from a remote position, and two men can operate the entire system. But, it is advisable to have a third person at the recorder just to be sure that everything is working right while two are tracking the balloon," Sgt. Rice said.

The modest airman, who sees nothing complicated about the system, continued to explain that the computer body, rather ordinary looking and about three feet high, was made up mostly of standard parts with a few modifications to make it adaptable for wind data computations. Information fed into it from tracking instruments is reduced electronically to average wind speed and direction at approximately every 500-foot level in the atmosphere, and is simultaneously recorded in graph form.

The two recorder boxes, about 14 by 16 inches in size, are designed with ruled gauges—marked off from zero to 100—across the tops and metal arrows that indicate wind velocity in knots. At the same time, a stylus on each box charts the wind data on graph paper threaded in the machines. One recorder indicates wind speed evaluation in relation to east-west, and the other in relation to north-south.

Although preliminary accuracy checks are being made now on the system, its simplicity of operation and cheapness of construction—only a fraction of that of other computer systems—are outstanding features. And, so far, the only similar system is one developed recently by Missile Geophysics at

White Sands Adds Weather Facility

White Sands Missile Range, N. M. — A new range weather facility has gone into operation this week at White Sands Missile Range's Small Missile Range.

A low-level wind data computer system, another product of Air Force T-Sgt. Wilburn A. Rice, Det. 24, Fourth Weather Group, was installed in new quarters to expedite weather information in support of missile programs at White Sands Missile Range.

The mechanical minded airman, who within the past two years has contributed three major devices and numerous smaller ones in support of the missile programs, rushed installation and initial checkout on his new "brain child", the analog system, before leaving the post for a new assignment in Germany.

His other inventions include a

computer for field support in wind data for Pogo missile program, a calculator for atmospheric density and refractive index—both of which are operational—and a Rawinsonde low-angle recording device now under study by Air Weather Service for further evaluation.

This new computer system is simple in appearance but a wizard in performance, and consists of five parts—two balloon tracking instruments, the main computer body, and two modified recorders.

As a released balloon is followed with the tracking instruments—located some 6,000 feet apart—information is fed into the computer and the reduced data—wind direction and velocity at various atmospheric levels—are recorded immediately on graphs.

With the system, three men can do the work instantaneously that manually required seven men and

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
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Federal Employees Have Bigger Pay Checks Now

Washington (AFPS)—Over one and a half million Federal employees will draw fatter paychecks during the new fiscal year. The increase is the result of congressional action early in July which overrode President Eisenhower's veto of a pay-hike measure. The pay boosts vary from \$225 in grade one to \$1,235 in the top grade of 17. Grade 18 jumped a flat \$1,000 to \$18,500, the classified pay ceiling. 

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

TV Training Is Scheduled At Ft. Monmouth

"Training by Television" will be the theme of a series of Television Orientation Courses to be conducted at Fort Monmouth by the U. S. Army Signal School for Army and Air Force personnel beginning Aug. 8.

Established at the request of the office of the Chief Signal Officers, the one-week television course is designed to provide assistance and guidance to any military installation now engaged or planning to engage in educational television. The course will be offered each morning through December, if the interest warrants.

Participants in the course will include educational advisers, training officers, television staff officers and other administrative and academic personnel of the various Army training schools. Representatives of Air Force school will also take part.

During the week of August 8, the Signal School will be host to personnel from the U. S. Army

Quartermaster School, Fort Lee, Va., the Transportation School, Fort Eustis, Va.; the Army Security Agency School, Fort Devens, Mass. and the Ordnance Schools at Redstone Arsenal, and Aberdeen Proving Grounds.

The course will include discussion of various aspects of planning, establishing, equipping and administering a military television facility for training purposes. Kinescope film recordings and video tape recordings from operating television training facilities will be studied by the group.

The course will be supervised by Walter E. Whitaker, Television Coordinator for the Signal School and Fort Monmouth, and former manager of the television and radio broadcasting services of the University of Alabama. It will be held in the studios of the Television Division, U. S. Army Signal School.

Staff members of WFM-TV, the Signal School closed-circuit TV station, the Educational Research and the Instructor Training Branches of the Educational Instructional Services Department of the School will assist in conducting

the course. The participants will observe operations of the school studio remote TV facilities, and the training of television specialists conducted by the School including color TV laboratory work, and utilization of television in Signal School courses. One day will be spent in a field trip to the Army Pictorial Center and the closed-circuit television facilities of New York University.



From now to November let's never forget that our future as a nation hinges on the ability of the President we select to captain us through a fateful time in history—when the values we cherish most are under attack. His will be a job unenviable in the enormity of its pressures, but a proud one to fill if he takes it on with our nonpartisan support.

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
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
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Science Fair Winner Spends Week at Arsenal

An 18-year-old National Science Fair winner Friday wound up a week's visit at Redstone Arsenal, where he talked with the Army's top missile and rocket scientists and viewed latest Army developments in the missile field.

James Kirk Bramblett of Lafayette, Ind., won the trip to Redstone when he was presented the U. S. Army Science Award at the National Science Fair in Indianapolis, Ind., last May.

Bramblett, who will be a senior at Lafayette's Jefferson High School this fall, won the award for his exhibit of an "Ultraviolet Flying Spot Microscope," which is used for viewing living cells.

The young scientist was greeted on his arrival at Redstone Arsenal by Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Monday afternoon he began his tour of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, the Ordnance Guided Missile School, and the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center. During the next four days, Bramblett visited the laboratories and experimentation

centers where the Army's modern rockets and missiles are developed and tested. The attentive teenage amazed Army missilemen with his intense and broad knowledge of scientific fields.

Bramblett began his trek to the National finals by winning in his category at the Eighth Lafayette Regional Science Fair, sponsored by the Lafayette Journal and Courier newspapers and Purdue University.

His exhibit showed a method of viewing living cells by the use of a moving spot of ultraviolet light. The light scans the cells for an instant and projects a picture of the cells on a monitor tube. Such a method is of great value in medical research. The idea for the exhibit came from an article in a scientific magazine.

Bramblett does not come by his scientific interests accidentally. His father, Arduy M. Bramblett is a Mechanical Engineer with a B. S. Degree and his mother is an Assistant Professor at Purdue. Mrs. Bramblett holds a B. S. Degree in Home Economics. Both have encouraged their son's interest in science and technology.

Winning science fairs is nothing new to Bramblett—he's been doing it since 1956. He took first place awards at Purdue Science Fairs in 1956, 1957 and 1958.

In addition to his studies and scientific experiments, Bramblett also finds time to participate in an amateur radio club, and the high school orchestra and choir. In these latter activities he has awards for participation in State Music Contest Ensembles.

While planning a career in electronic research, Bramblett continues his other hobbies of pho-

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


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

Iraq Has 200 Million Dollar Oil Profit

Iraq, located in southwestern Asia, is one of the modern Arab states which arose after WWI from the ruins of the Ottoman Empire. Somewhat larger than California, Iraq's 171,599 square miles contain approximately six million people. And about 80 per cent of them derive their living directly or indirectly from the



soil. Oil is the only mineral extensively exploited and this industry ranks first in Iraq, accounting for a \$200 million profit each year.

Among the 142 career military men who received their college degrees from the University of Omaha (Nebr.) July 16 were Capt. Gilberto Cardinas - Lartique and Capt. William P. Hooker of the Redstone Arsenal.

The men attended Omaha U. under "Operation Bootstrap," a special, six month duty program for military personnel who are within 24 credit hours of completing their college degree re-

An estimated 18 million date palms make Iraq the world's largest producer of dates. Other fruits grown are oranges, apples, apricots and lemons.

The population of Iraq is not particularly homogeneous. Divided by native language, the breakdown is roughly 79 per cent Arabic, 16 per cent Persian and 2 per cent Turkish. Arabic is the official language but English is widely spoken as a second language among commercial, professional and governmental personnel.

Over 90 per cent of the people are Moslems, a little more than half of whom belong to the Shi'ite sect rather than the orthodox Sunite group. Education in its early stages is free but lacks adequate facilities for universal implementation. In 1947, 89 per cent of the population over five years of age was illiterate. This percentage, however, has been declining steadily.

Iraq has been a U. N. member since 1945 and its government is a constitutional monarchy with a Senate and Chamber of Deputies. Justice is administered by courts of various grades. Military service is compulsory for all men between the ages of 18 and 25 and lasts from 18 months to 2 years.

**University Seeks
Missile to Replace
Historic Cannon**

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency has received a request from the University of Utah to help them replace a relic cannon donated to the United States for use as scrap metal in 1942.

It had been given to the University by the government after the Spanish-American War.

An excerpt from the letter signed on Sept. 13, 1942, by the university president, Leroy E. Cowles, states:

"So far as our information goes, this gun was given to the University of Utah by the late General Richard W. Young. It was probably taken from the Spanish by the American forces in the Philippine Islands during the Spanish-American War and brought to Utah and, as stated, presented to the University. Professor Levi Edgar Young made the acceptance speech at the time of its presentation. According to the inscription on the gun it was made in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1862. It is likely that it was sold to the Spanish Government and taken to the Philippine Islands after the Civil War. The Regents felt that the gun


