## President Eisenhower to Dedicate Space Center

### First Project Press Contract Awarded

Award of the first contract connected with installation of facilities for Project Press, an experimental program in the detection and identification of ballistic missile warheads, was announced today by the Department of the Army, on behalf of the Advanced Research Projects Agency.

The New York Ordnance District awarded a \$1,000,000 contract to the Western Electric Company for submarine cable systems linking the islands of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur in the Marshall Islands, Southwest Pacific.

Project Press, Pacific Range Electro-Magnetic Signature Study, involves experiments with radar systems of advanced design and other sensing devices that will be installed on Roi-Namur. The experiments are part of Project Defender, administered by the Advanced Research Projects Agency, Department of Defense. They are concerned with exo-atmosphere and terminal physics of ballistic missile flight. The program is intended to investigate missile discrimination and identification.

The U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command is acting as ARPA's executive agent for Project Press. Responsibility for installation of the equipment and carrying on the experiments has been assigned to the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, an element of AOMC.

The cable system between the islands, approximately 55 miles long, will be used for communication and data transfer. Western Electric will procure the cable from the Simplex Wire Company of Newington, New Hampshire.

Support for the Project Press installation on Roi-Namur will be furnished from Kwajalein. The Army is presently constructing facilities in and around Kwajalein with which to test its Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system against Atlas ICBMs fired from California. The Project Press experiments will use these missiles and other targets of opportunity available on the Pacific Missile Range.

A special cable laying ship, the Albert J. Meyer, owned and operated by the Army Transportation

### LT. BAYRUNS IS APPOINTED AIDE TO GEN. HURST

1st. Lt. Paul C. Bayruns has been named Aide-de-Camp to Brig. Gen. Richard M. Hurst, Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

He worked his way through the University of Kentucky, and was graduated in January, 1957, with a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering. He has also attended the Ordnance Officers Course at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and the Ordnance Guided Missile School at Redstone Arsenal.

### RCA Gets Additional Funds for Research On Project Tradex

The Department of the Army today announced the additional funding of \$1,545,993 to the Radio Corporation of America's Defense Electronics Division for work on research and development Project TRADEX.

The original contract is with RCA's Morristown, New Jersey plant. Today's award was administered by the Philadelphia Ordnance District.

### DIAL 117 TO REPORT FIRE

### Ceremony Is Scheduled In Front of Bldg. 4488

#### Mrs. Marshall Will Attend; Everyone On Arsenal Invited

President Dwight D. Eisenhower will dedicate the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's George C. Marshall Space Flight Center at Redstone Arsenal tomorrow morning in ceremonies which will include unveiling a bust of the late General of the Army, George C. Marshall.

The ceremony is scheduled at 10:30 a.m. in front of Bldg. 4488.

The President's plane is scheduled to land at the Arsenal airstrip. He will be welcomed at the plane by Dr. Wernher von Braun, Director of MSFC, Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance

### Symposium of Maintenance Technicians Is Scheduled

#### Meeting Will Be Held Sept. 13-15 In Rocket Auditorium

One hundred and two Ordnance Corps Maintenance Technicians assigned to 45 CONUS installations will attend the first Ordnance Corps Maintenance Technicians Symposium Sept. 14-16 at Redstone Arsenal.

Ordnance recently transferred responsibility for this facet of Technical Assistance Service from Raritan Arsenal to the commodity commands responsible for systems management: Weapons, Rock Island; Wheel and Track Vehicles, Detroit; Missiles and Rockets to AOMC, Redstone Arsenal.

The host organization is the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, an element of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command. This symposium will provide orientation for DA civilian technical personnel who advise and train user organizations on missile systems and ancillary equipment.

The concept of the preventive maintenance program in the missile area is to provide weapon system support in the form of timely assistance and on-site instruction by qualified technical personnel for an entire system of equipment rather than support of a single item of equipment. Overall control of this service is vested in the Field Service Division of the Office of the Chief of Ordnance.

Arrangements for the meeting are being made by the Technical Assistance Division, Field Service Operations of ARGMA. The Division Chief is Gustav Ingold who sparked the Army-wide program of preventive maintenance for Ordnance at the beginning of World War II when it was discontinued.

Col. John G. Zierdt, Commander, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, today announced two important changes in the agency's Industrial Operations staff.



Col. H. H. Wishart, Chief of Industrial Operations, said the new assignments would be effective Sept. 4. Industrial Operations handles the portion of ARGMA's national mission pertaining to the production and procurement of guided missile systems.

Hightower's office has responsibility for the Hawk, Mauler and Redeye missile systems. Prady's handles the Lacrosse and Shillelagh systems.

Replacing J. H. Turner who has resigned to accept another position, Hightower has worked at Redstone Arsenal since 1951 when he began as an industrial engineer. A graduate of Southern Technical Institute, he was born in Jacksonville, Fla. He and his wife, the former Geraldine Scott of Dalton, Georgia, and their three children live at 4407 Choc-taw Circle.

Prady, formerly deputy chief of the Anti-Missile Missile Division, is a native of Crossville, Ala. A government employe since 1942, he transferred to ARGMA in 1953 from the Anniston Ordnance Depot. covered that users did not have confidence in Ordnance equipment because they did not understand preventive maintenance, operation or capability thereof.

In 1942, OCO assigned Mr. Ingold to determine the causes for repeated delays of troop units in reaching staging areas.

Camp Edwards, Mass., was selected as the first activity site. A three months survey disclosed that the preventive maintenance of mobility was not up to required standards to enable the achievement of the same proficiency acquired by the soldier in the manual of arms, close order drill and other phases of basic training. An instructor team of 32 technicians was established. The division was ready for the staging area in four months.

Subsequently, Mr. Ingold was assigned to the staff of Gen. John Wood, Commander of the 4th Armored Division, as Chief, Civilian Technician, Ordnance, at Pine Camp, New York.

Mr. Ingold and his staff of 36 auto advisors moved with the division into the Tennessee Maneuver Area and from there to Mojave Desert, Calif., to complete training under desert conditions.

Upon completion of training, the division moved into the staging area and Mr. Ingold assumed duties at St. Louis Ordnance Depot in the capacity of Chief Advisor, supervising the auto advisors assigned in the 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th Service Commands until VJ Day. He received a commendation from Lt. Gen. Campbell, then Chief of Ordnance, for his accomplishments.

In 1945, Mr. Ingold went to the 1st Service Command, with Headquarters at Boston, Mass., as civilian chief, Ordnance Corps. In 1946, Mr. Ingold was appointed a member of the Staff in an advisory capacity to 1st U. S. Army Headquarters at Governors Island, N. Y., under Col. (now General) F. A. Hanson. During this time, Mr. Ingold received a number of commendations for his accomplishments. Upon release from this assignment, in January 1951 he joined the Staff of OCO Field Maintenance to assist in the establishment of the Preventive Maintenance Office. He contributed substantially to the guidelines set forth in DA Circular 26, dated April 2, 1951, "Preventive Maintenance". Publication of this pamphlet pioneered the Preventive Maintenance Ordnance support as it is known today.

For the ensuing 6 years, Mr. Ingold headed the Ordnance Corps Maintenance Technician Program and again received several well deserved citations.

On June 1957, he transferred from the Preventive Maintenance Agency, Raritan, to the Field Service Division, ARGMA, to be Deputy Chief, Supply Management Branch, a position he held until June 1960. At that time he was appointed Chief of the Technical Assistance Division, responsible for the administration of CONUS and overseas Guided Missile Technical Assistance Services.





The Marshalls reside at 2803 Fairacres Rd., Huntsville.







Missile Command, and Governor John Patterson of Alabama. Among the honored guests who will share the President's platform will be Mrs. Marshall, widow of the General, and Gen. and Mrs. Schomburg. Dr. T. Keith Glennan, Director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, will also be a member of the presidential party at the ceremonies. He will travel from Washington with the President's party. Employees and military personnel at the Arsenal, including contractor employees, will have the opportunity to attend the ceremonies. Administrative leave will be granted to civil service employees for this purpose.

No automobile traffic, including official taxis, will be allowed to enter the area after 9 a.m. Shuttle bus service will be provided by Post Transportation to the area.

Employees from other Arsenal areas may drive their cars to points indicated on the sketch below and use a shuttle service to attend the ceremony.

Audio amplifiers will be strung one-half mile along Martin Road to enable the spectators to hear the dedicatory addresses.

The speakers platform will be on the front doorstep of Bldg. 4488. The 55th Army Band will play for the dedication and the 291st Military Police Company will direct traffic. Also on duty will be Security Guards from MSFC.

A reserved section for 150 officials will be roped off.

ABMA and NASA officials who usually occupy the reserved parking area along lanes one and two in the parking lot adjoining Bldg. 4488 will park in lane three. The first two lanes will be left open for spectators and the official motorcade. The balance of the area will be open for general parking.

A press and radio section will be set up beside the speaker's

platform. Guide ropes will be used to aid spectators in finding positions in the sections reserved for them.

President Eisenhower is also scheduled to tour the Fabrication Division and the Test Division during his visit to the Arsenal.

No automobile traffic of any sort except the official motorcade will be allowed to enter the area during the two hours the President is scheduled to be a guest of MSFC.

The ceremonies will be televised over the Ordnance Guided Missile School closed circuit and on commercial channels after the ceremony.

All troops from the U. S. Army Garrison have the morning free to attend the ceremonies.



# R & D Operations Office Is Established In ARGMA

Establishment of a Research and Development Operations Office in the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency has been announced by Col. John G. Zierdt, ARGMA Commander.

The new office combines some of the functions and responsibilities of the Research and Development Division and the Ordnance Missile Laboratories Division which existed before the realignment.

Col. Raymond W. Burkett, formerly Deputy Chief of R & D Division, has been named Director of the new office. The office has assumed responsibility for research and development activities on all present weapons systems for ARGMA, while performing basic research for future systems.

Col. Burkett holds a BS degree in Electrical Engineering from Georgia Tech. Assigned to ARGMA since October, 1959, Col. Burkett is a graduate of the Army War College.

Deputy Director is Harry F. Vincent, a Redstone Arsenal employe since 1951. He received his BS degree in Electrical Engineering from Washington University in St. Louis. In the R&D Division, he served as Chief of the Electronics Branch, Chief of the Surface-to-Air Missile Branch and as Chief Project Engineer, Project Management Staff. Prior to his new assignment, he was Chief of the Research and Engineering Staff in R&D.

James E. Norman, Technical Director, supervises approximately 850 scientists, engineers and support personnel engaged in in-house laboratory activities. Norman holds a BS degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Alabama.

Prior to the realignment of functions, he was Assistant Technical Director for Physics and Engineering, OML Division.

The four laboratories under Mr. Norman's supervision are:

### Research Laboratory

The Research lab, under John P. Hallowes, Jr., will be active in areas of basic research of re-entry physics and chemistry. The lab will be primarily concerned with future weapons systems.

Hallowes has been at Redstone Arsenal since 1951. He received his bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering from Georgia Tech and his MS in Physics from Vanderbilt. He is presently a candidate for the doctoral degree in physics at Vanderbilt. Prior to his new appointment, Hallowes was chief of the Physical Electronics Branch of the Research Lab.

### Advance Components and Techniques Laboratory

Operating under the direction of W. E. Yoakum, the Advance Components and Techniques lab will conduct engineering development of components and systems applicable to ARGMA's family of future weapons. While guidance and control will be its main interest, the lab will also perform system synthesis and preliminary design of future weapons.

Yoakum received his bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering at the University of Virginia. He has completed the classroom requirements for his MS degree at St. Louis University. He has been at Redstone Arsenal since 1951 and, prior to the reorganization, was chief of the Missile Electronics Laboratory in OML.

### Test And Evaluation Laboratory

The Test and Evaluation Laboratory, under the direction of William P. Lloyd, operates five ranges, eight static stands and extensive environmental facilities in the R&D testing and evaluation of rocket, missiles and components. The lab employs approximately 210 personnel.

Lloyd received his BS degree in Mechanical Engineering at Auburn University. He has been employed by Redstone Arsenal since 1952.

### Propulsion Laboratory

Responsibilities of the Propulsion lab include research and development in propellant composition, combustion and ignition of propellants and components, structural materials and fabrication techniques as applied to propulsion systems. The lab also performs technical coordination of the total performance assigned to the GOCO contractors.

F. W. James, chief of the lab, received an MA degree from Columbia University. He supervised a propulsion branch of the original government research and development group in liquid rocket propellants, beginning in 1944.

## TO VOTE OR NOT TO VOTE— RESEARCHERS FIND MOTIVES

"See You at the Polls" is the slogan adopted in the last presidential election by the American Heritage Foundation and the Advertising Council in their non-partisan drive to get out the vote.

But prior to the campaigns to encourage more Americans to use their ballot, the two organizations undertook extensive research to find out exactly what motivations cause some people to stay away from the polls and others to exercise their franchise.

Why don't they vote? Here are nine reasons the researchers came up with:

(1) A single vote won't count. (2) Personal laziness. (3) Fear of social pressures—voting involves discussion, argument. It may endanger family relations, group position, even occupation. (4) Distrust of political and government forces. (5) The "protest" of not voting.

(6) Fear of making decisions and taking responsibility for them. (7) Emotional fatigue from the long campaign period. (8) Apathy based on cynicism or on naive confidence in the basic stability of society. (9) Disenfranchised—prisoners, ex-convicts, migrants, persons who moved too recently.

The researchers also offered another nine reasons why people do go to the polls. They are:

(1) Sense of patriotic duty. (2) Sense of participation, of belonging. (3) Sense of power and self-importance. (4) Strong personal feelings for or against candidates and issues. (5) Response to excitement of campaign.

(6) First time voters to whom voting means coming of age. (7) New citizens to whom voting symbolizes their hard-won citizenship. (8) Discovery of a champion who will represent the voter. (9) Desire

## VA NOW 30; PENSION NEED CONTINUES RISE

New York (AFPS) — It's cake and candles for the Veterans Administration this year as the organization celebrates its 30th year of service to the nation's veterans. In July 1930, President Hoover signed an executive order creating the VA as an agency of the Federal Government. At that time the veteran population was about 4.5 million.

World War II and the Korean conflict caused a tremendous increase in the number of veterans who now with their families make up more than 56 per cent of the total population. To serve them, the VA operates 170 hospitals which admit half a million veterans each year.


One of the VA's major problems in the past was the absence of any national policy regarding the number of hospitals and beds it could operate. Under a new policy established last year, it can maintain a 125,000-bed level.

The average age of veterans is rising, with a resulting increase in demand for VA pension benefits.

Nearly a million disabled veterans are receiving these benefits and the pension program is expected to reach its peak when the average WWII veteran reaches his 65th birthday. A new facet of the program provides a sliding scale of benefits based on the veteran's financial need.

Other benefits provided by the VA include compensation for service-connected disabilities, vocational rehabilitation and special grants for the severely disabled.

Providing these services is big business and is conducted as such, but the Veterans Administration still exists for the benefit of the individual veteran and his family.

Maj. Charles F. Owens has been named Chief, Quality Assurance Division, Industrial Operations, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.


Col. H. H. Wishart, Chief of Industrial Operations, in making the announcement said the 43-year-old native of New York would assume his new duties immediately.

# The Judge Advocate Advises



## PROPERTY IS A FAMILY AFFAIR

Property is a family affair, and should be so regarded by every married couple in their consideration of problems relating to their property and in their planning for the future.

The word "property" is derived from the Latin word meaning "belonging to one; one's own." But neither party to a marriage can afford to regard the family property as an exclusively individual possession or right, except in the sense that the parties are a unit by reason of their marriage.

Each must consider the other in the sale, use or acquisition of property, and intelligent planning designed to give effect to their joint wishes in the most efficient manner provided by law will often spare them regret and added expense later in life.

A number of jurisdictions in this country and abroad have community property systems which provide for marital partnership of property. In such a system, property acquired during marriage (except that acquired through individual gift or inheritance) is deemed community in nature and thus owned equally by each spouse.

Property which either spouse brings into the marriage or acquires by individual gift or inheritance remains that spouse's separate property. In the United States there are two opposing rules as to the nature of income derived from the separate property: Under the "Louisiana rule" such increment falls into the community; under the "California rule," income from the separate property of either spouse remains separate in nature. Although a cause of action for personal injury to a husband is generally regarded as community in nature, in several jurisdictions a wife's cause of action for injury to her person is her separate property.

## DEATH TERMINATES

The community in property is ordinarily terminated by death of either spouse, divorce, or in some cases legal separation evidenced by a court decree.

A few jurisdictions provide for partition of the community property in prescribed instances such as mismanagement by the husband who, as "head and master" of the community, is the manager

of all community property. In some instances, a spouse may forfeit all right to share in community earnings by abandonment or certain misconduct.

Upon the death of either partner in the community, the survivor is immediately regarded as owner of one-half of all community property while the other half is subject to the testamentary disposition or will of the deceased partner.

## U. S. JURISDICTION

United states jurisdictions which have community property systems in effect now are: Arizona, California, Idaho, Puerto Rico, Washington, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico and Texas. Community property laws of Michigan, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania and Hawaii have either

been repealed or declared unconstitutional.

Although the Revenue Act of 1948, though its income-splitting and marital deduction provisions, substantially equalized the tax burdens of couples in community and non-community property states, several desirable tax features still exist for the former.

For example, a corporate dividend which is community income is considered as having been received half by each spouse, thereby enabling each to qualify for a \$50.00 dividend exclusion even where the stock is registered in the name of only one spouse.

## RETIREMENT INCOME

Also, where retirement income is community in nature, each spouse may claim a full retirement income credit because each is legally entitled to one-half the retirement income. In the latter respect, however, it must be noted that earned income by either spouse would serve to diminish the retirement credits of both.

Perhaps the greatest tax benefit, based on domicile in a community property state, accrues to the service man who marries an alien while overseas

## NON-TAXABLE

The husband's domicile in a community property state fixes his wife's there also. But since she is a non-resident alien, her share of the community income, even though derived from her husband's performance of services for the United States in a foreign country, is not subject to Federal taxation because it was not income earned within the United States.

## INTE STATE DEATHS

The matter of the distribution of estates of intestate decedents is and always has been a matter for state regulation and law. The inheritance laws of the various states differ in many respects, but most follow, in a general way, the scheme of the old English Statute of Distribution.

The principles peculiar to the English Canons of Descent have for the most part disappeared from our law. Most United States jurisdictions now provide for succession to both real property and personal property by the same relatives.

It must be emphasized that in community property jurisdictions, separate and community property

do not pass alike and great care must be exercised by the parties concerned to insure that their wishes will be carried out to the last detail. A properly prepared will can save the estate many times what it otherwise might cost in court costs and legal expenses.

## CONSULT ATTORNEY

Married couples with any property - and particularly if there are children involved - should consult an attorney to check up on their estate situation, and it should be reviewed from time to time.

With ownership of property goes the responsibility for its proper use and management - and the essence of the ownership of anything is that aid which organized society will, through the courts as its agents, give the individual, to the exclusion of all others, to take or keep possession of it.

Property belongs to a person as long as he has the right thereto and the power by law to enforce and protect that right, but ownership is not a privilege conferred by government but a right which the government is organized to protect.
