### Nike Hercules Destroys Another Nike Hercules

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N. M.—The Army's improved Nike Hercules guided missile system continued to demonstrate its antimissile capability today with a successful intercept in its toughest test to date.

Using the improved acquisition and guided missile radar being tested at White Sands Missile Range, the improved Nike Hercules destroyed another missile of the same type about 19 miles above the earth.

The test was designed to test the guidance and detection equipment's ability to acquire and track an extremely small target of high speed and altitude capability. It was the highest known kill of a fast moving target.

The second Nike Hercules was used to provide a target of high performance as part of a progressive stepped-up program to test the capability of the improved Nike Hercules. The killer Hercules, invisible to the naked eye at the extreme altitude, intercepted the incoming guided missile in a terrific flash.

Both missiles carried explosive charges. Only the killer missile warhead was set to detonate at intercept.

The missiles approached each other at combined speeds exceeding Mach 7, seven times the speed of sound.

The improved ground equipment used in the recent test has been developed to extend the capabilities of the Nike Hercules system which now defends major American cities against the threat of air attack.

Motion pictures of the intercept confirmed the "kill".

In previous missile against missile testing at White Sands, the improved Nike Hercules scored the first known "kill" of a guided ballistic missile when one destroyed a Corporal missile.

### HUMAN FACTOR IS STUDIED DURING REDEYE EXERCISE

Armed with motion picture cameras instead of missiles, Redeye missile system simulators were used by Army and Marine Corps troops in tactical exercises held recently at Hunter-Liggett Military Reservation, California.

The purpose of the tests was to determine the air defense weapon's compatibility with a human operator, including such factors as sight position, sling position and the positioning of safety, warm-up and firing switches on the weapon.

The simulators were operated by two-man Redeye teams. When the gunner pressed the trigger, the camera was actuated and a target was photographed. Evaluation of the film revealed the operator's ability to recognize and track a target as well as his over- (See REDEYE on Page 2)

### Engineers Ask Bids On Extended Runway

The Army Engineers have called for bids from contractors to strengthen and extend the runway at the Redstone Arsenal air field.

The present 5,540 foot runway will be extended to a total length of 7,300. Existing pavement will be beefed up with an overlay of asphaltic concrete.

It will enable the field to handle larger aircraft engaged in ferrying missiles and missile components to and from the home of the Army Ordnance Missile Command and two of its principal elements, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency and the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Necessary drainage facilities, electric ducts and fencing will be provided. Construction work will be scheduled to permit practically uninterrupted use of the runway by lighter aircraft.

Bids will be opened at the office of the U. S. District Engineer, 2301 Grant St., Mobile, Ala., at 11 a.m. CST, Oct. 6.

### Arsenal Deer Wear Reflectors to Avoid Being Hit by Cars

The most formidable enemy to the survival of the 36 deer turned loose at Redstone Arsenal earlier this year may be the automobile.

But Sgt. Buford Harrison, the Post game warden, thinks he has solved the problem.

He has equipped the deer with reflectors, visible from fore and aft, so drivers can see the deer at night. Apparently, none has been killed so far.

The reflector system also provides information as to where the deer are observed. Persons designated as "Spotters" also see the reflectors at night and report their whereabouts.

The reflector is clipped to the deer's ear. It is about one inch wide and three inches long. They were provided by the State of Alabama, which gave the deer to Redstone.



all performance with the weapon. High performance Navy jets and Army fixed and rotary wing aircraft served as targets during the three week tests conducted by the Combat Development Experimentation Center, Fort Ord, California.

The Redeye, a joint U. S. Army-Marine Corps effort, is a shoulder-launched, man-transportable, surface to air guided missile designed for defense of units in the combat zone of the Field Army against low flying aircraft of all types. Utilizing infrared homing guidance, it is approximately four feet long, three inches in diameter and weighs about 20 pounds.

Similar tests have been conducted by the Marine Corps at Camp LeJeune, North Carolina, and Camp Pendleton, California. Development of the Redeye

Weapons Command, Aberdeen Proving Ground and Watervliet Arsenal.

## Navy League President Visits AOMC for Briefing

Frank Gard Jameson, who heads a 35,000 member civilian organization which supports the Navy and Marine Corps, arrived here Sept. 14 for an orientation tour of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Jameson, 36, is president of the Navy League.

His itinerary called for a series of briefings immediately after a welcome to Redstone by Maj. Gen. J. A. Barclay.


The reserve lieutenant commander then studied the organiza-

tion and mission of the Army Ordnance Missile Command and the Nike Zeus missile system. Jameson then took an aerial tour of the Post in a helicopter.

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

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



**DEER POPULATION IS TRIPLED IN LESS THAN YEAR**

The Redstone Arsenal deer population has multiplied three-fold over the original 34 turned loose here earlier this year, the game warden estimated today, and upwards of 500 wild turkeys now roam the 39,000 acre reservation. The roar of missile engines at the home of the Army Ordnance Missile Command apparently has no serious affect on the deer, according to Sgt. Buford Harrison. He added, however, it scares the daylight out of them.

While they were turned loose here earlier this year, some of the deer promptly swam the half mile wide Tennessee River, the Arsenal's southern boundary. They returned a short time later.

The deer and turkey were brought here through the auspices of the State Conservation Department.

Harrison, who has promoted the wildlife movement for several years at Redstone, said William Kelley, district game warden stationed in Huntsville, asked Alabama state biologists to study wildlife habitat conditions in the Huntsville vicinity.

The biologists reported this area ideal for deer, turkey and other small game. Similar strides have been made in stocking fish ponds, mostly with bass and blue gill.

Harrison pointed out, however, it will be several years before

hunters will be allowed to shoot the deer and turkey. Then it will be only in limited numbers.

A total of 34 deer — seven buck and 27 doe—were released in January and February. They were trapped in the vicinity of Marengo County. The turkey were also caught in South Alabama.

Harrison said he believes these are the first deer to be released in this area in a number of years. He said they will multiply to "several hundred" in about five years.

Spotters have reported the deer are ranging near the river and a 12 point buck and several fawn were observed in the Igloo area of the Post. Fishermen said they frequently swim the river.

According to the game warden, who works in the provost marshal department, the nearest native deer other than those on the reservation are in the Bankhead National Forest in Walker and Winston counties.

He said the Redstone deer may range the approximate 50 miles to that forest. He said one tagged deer released in Walker County was killed the next season in Florida.

Those turned loose here were also tagged with a number and reflector which shines at night. The turkeys also wear a tag on one leg.

Next year, a planting program will begin so the growing number of wildlife in this area will survive and have the proper

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

## Make This September 27 A Day to Remember

The late George Jean Nathan put it neatly. "Bad officials," he said, "are elected by good citizens who do not vote."  
But his remark raises a question: is there such a critter as a "good" citizen who stays away from the polls? And that applies not only to civilians but to the men and women of the Armed Forces, because, wherever they are stationed, the polls come to them.

Defense Secretary Gates has designated Sept. 27 as Armed Forces Voters Day—a day on which service voting officers will concentrate their effort to urge eligible people in uniform to apply for their absentee ballot. For Nov. 8 is nearer than many of us realize.

It's a worthy idea, such an all-out effort. The pity is that we should need it. It's somewhat like a day devoted to urging servicemen into accepting free hundred-dollar bills with no strings at-

tached — except that the absentee ballot is worth incalculably more than a century note.

Perhaps the trouble is that some servicemen away from home and familiar habits feel that they have pulled up roots — that many of their hometown obligations are nullified by distance. Time enough for such civic duties as voting when they're back to their civilian routine.

Nothing can be more shortsighted. The serviceman who votes in November will be choosing the next Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces — an organization in which he has more than spectator interest. And he will be choosing the man whose qualities of mind and character will deeply affect his own future for the next four years.

So, none of us should have to be goaded into sending for our absentee ballot. But Sept. 27 will be a reminder that time is running out. (AFPS)

## Xmas Mail Should Go Early, Says Post Office Dept.

Washington (AFPS) — It's that time of the year for members of the Armed Forces stationed overseas to start reminding the folks at home to mail their Christmas packages early.

The deadline this year, as in the past, is Nov. 20. If parcels are to be delivered by Dec. 25, they must be in the mail prior to that date.

The Post Office Department has pointed out that parcels should be tightly packed in efficient double-faced corrugated carboard, wood, metal or fiberboard boxes and securely wrapped in heavy paper and well tied.

The mailing address should be clearly and correctly printed on the parcel, preferably twice, once on the front and another time on the back. It is also advisable, officials said, to print an extra set of addresses on a small card and put it inside the parcel.

Package size and limitations on weight remain about the same all over the world. No packages may be more than 100 inches in length and girth combined nor weigh more than 70 lbs. Exceptions are the United Kingdom and Turkey. Local postmasters can furnish specific information on these areas.

Local postmasters also have complete lists of articles which cannot be sent through the mails such as perishable items, matches and lighter fluid.

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## Ballots Protect U. S. Freedoms When Majority Casts Its Vote

Both by tradition and regulation, members of the Armed Forces on active duty do not engage in political campaigns, but in common with all other citizens they have the privilege of voting.

Three out of every four men and women in the service today are of voting age. But not even that high a ratio of eligible military voters bothers to cast his or her ballot.

So I don't vote, what harm is there in that?" a serviceman might ask. Well, there's a good deal of harm to the country when any citizen fails to exercise his inalienable right.

Were only a few people to vote, the U. S. government would not be representative of the majority. If only a slim majority went to the polls, minority opinion could determine the election's outcome and the government still be unrepresentative.

Case after case can be cited in which a person's individual liberties have been lost because the majority of the citizens ignored their balloting responsibilities.

In most countries that have experienced dictatorial forms of government, the dictators came into power not by the will of majorities but with the support of aggressive minorities aided by the indifference of the majority.

In the Soviet Union, the Communist Party, when it seized power, represented only a small fraction of the Russian people. Mussolini's Fascists in Italy numbered only a handful when they marched on Rome.

Nazi Germany had polled less than a third of the votes when Hitler took control of the government. And in each case, rule by a minority destroyed the freedoms of all.

"Ballots," said President Abraham Lincoln, "are the rightful and peaceful successors of bullets." And in his inaugural address President Grover Cleveland reminded the nation that "every voter, as surely as your chief magistrate, under the same high sanction, though in a different sphere, exercised a public trust."

A citizen who fails to use his vote is like a combat soldier who fails to use his weapon. As citizens in uniform, military personnel should shoulder, with civilians, the responsibility of Americans to defend the Nation's democratic institutions with their votes as they are prepared to do by force of arms.

# Some Find a Pot of Gold By Thinking of Savings

There's gold in the limestone hills and red loam soil at Redstone Arsenal but it doesn't take muscles and a pick to get it.

You have to think. Thoughts, generated by fertile minds at Redstone, home of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, saved the government a whopping \$1,787,855 in the fiscal year that ended in July 1 according to the Incentive Awards Committee at the Arsenal.

It's part of the world-wide economy program now underway in the Army with the active support of Secretary of the Army Wilbur M. Brucker.

Dubbed "Operation Searchlight" the program encourages federal employes to submit suggestions to improve the Army's equipment and operations.

"Searchlight's" beam is sharply focused at Redstone. Two employes, Chandler O. Barnes of Field Support Operations, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and Joe A. Hamil, Industrial Operations, ABMA, saved \$336,813 on one piece of equipment.

The men redesigned a 1,200 pound console test panel which detects leaks in the Redstone missile system and came up with a much simpler and equally efficient tester weighing only 40 pounds. The machine "invented" by Barnes and Hamil cost about \$400,000 less than the one it replaced.

For their effort, the men shared a \$1,015 award.

Not many suggestions, of course, are of this magnitude, but the government feels a number of small ones in its many installations will result in overall economy and efficiency of great magnitude.

Records indicate that about 10 percent of the Redstone Arsenal employes submit at least one suggestion a year. A goal of 26 percent participation has been established.

The Arsenal's champion suggester is Jimmy Traywick, a stock-keeper in the Arsenal Personnel Office, who submitted 37 recommendations for improvement in a three month period.

Looking at the various elements of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency's Industrial Operations staff has produc-


ed the most suggestions.

Suggestions solve problems, and like any big business, the Army has its share. The employes at Redstone are thinking about improvements, however, as evidenced by the 1,041 suggestions submitted for evaluation in the last fiscal year. The adoption rate was about 25 percent of those submitted.

The 318 improvements put into effect netted successful suggesters an average of \$43 each.

Many successful suggesters have received patents for their brain children.

Lt. Col. James W. Spellman heads the Incentive Awards Committee. The members, all civilians, represent a cross section of the agencies and activities on Redstone Arsenal. The staff sections


