LITTLE JOHN SEMINAR ENDS

A two-day seminar ended Nov. 4 at Redstone Arsenal for 150 attendees representing several U. S. Army Ordnance Corps installations cooperating in research and development for the Little John rocket.

The purpose of the meeting was to review Little John program developments to date, to hold demonstrations of equipment, and group conferences.

Participants were welcomed by Col. H. N. Brownson, deputy commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, which has technical supervision of the surface-to-surface weapon.

Fourteen feet, five inches in length, and 12.5 inches in diameter, the Army's Little John can deliver either nuclear or non-nuclear warheads to targets more than ten miles distant. It weighs 760 pounds. It is designed to be used in Army airborne operations. It has no electronic controls, and is propelled by a solid-propellant motor.

The major contractors for the surface-to-surface weapon are Consolidated Western Steel Division of U. S. Steel Corp., Emerson Electric Mfg. Co., General Electric Co., Hercules Powder Co., and the Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator Co.

Army Seeks Bids On ARGMA Building

The Army today asked contractors to bid on the modification of one wing of a building on Redstone Arsenal to provide additional office space for the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Army Corps of Engineers at Mobile, Ala., said the mezzanine of a wing of building 4500 will be modified to include the installation of windows, partitions, acoustical tile ceilings, asphalt tile floors, wall and ceiling insulation; the alteration of the existing tile floor and plaster. New Road Links Quarters-Center

A new road, now under construction on Redstone Arsenal, will be named in honor of the first general officer to command this defense installation.

Vincent Road, named for Brig. Gen. Thomas K. Vincent, will be a two-mile stretch which will allow easy access to the post's community center from the family housing area. Gen. Vincent commanded Redstone Arsenal from 1952 to 1954, when he retired after 37 years of service. He died a year after his retirement.

Construction of the new road began in June of this year and is expected to be completed next March. It will lead from the housing area, past the Ordnance Guided Missile School and into the troop housing area, which is near the community center.

The community center consists of the Post Chapel, Post Exchange, commissary and other facilities provided for military personnel and dependents.

UGF Nears Record Total; Checks Shows 90% Give

The United Givers Fund Drive for 1960 ended officially Friday and observers say the amount is believed to be the largest raised at Redstone Arsenal.

Final results have not been tallied. It will be announced in the next issue of The Rocket.

At the end of the fifth week, however, a check indicated nearly

90 per cent of the fair share dollar goal had been collected.

A. A. Stewart, United Givers Fund executive chairman, said, "Now that the 1960 UGF campaign is over except for the final accounting, I wish to express my appreciation for the splendid efforts and enthusiasm shown by all the workers and contributors during the campaign.

"Your response to the campaign was gratifying and demonstrated a universal feeling of charity not normally found in an installation of this size.

"I wish to express special appreciation and gratitude for the tireless efforts of the eight chairmen, their solicitors, and of the campaign staff—Harold Carpenter, Ralph Perrill, W. T. Bledsoe and Clyde Brown.

Some of the things that contributed to the success of the 1960 Redstone United Givers Fund Drive include the following:

The Field Maintenance Division with approximately 275 people, gave 3.5 per cent above the fair share goal.

The Transportation Division Vehicle Maintenance shop with 108 people attained 100 per cent fair share collection on the day the drive opened, and reached 102 per cent on the second day.

The Redstone Arsenal Control Office had 100 per cent fair share ready in check and cash form at the initial meeting of key Agency representatives and solicitors.

The Italian Air Force contributed to the UGF fund. This group will leave for Italy as soon as studies at the Ordnance Guided Missile School are completed.

AUSA Ticket Sell-Out Causes Meet Change

Excessive demands for tickets to the first "open meeting" of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army have prompted chapter officials to move the location of the meeting.

A. A. "Tony" Demetriou, chapter president, said that he had expected approximately 300 persons to attend. The number of free tickets given out downtown and at the Redstone Arsenal indicate that attendance may reach almost 500.

New 'Main Gate' Road Link Connects Post With US 231

The Army today asked for bids on the first leg of a direct access road that will eventually link Redstone Arsenal's main traffic artery with U. S. Highway 231 south of Municipal Airport.

The thoroughfare, Redstone's Martin Road, is now being four-laned along its existing length under another contract. Under the new contract it will be extended from its eastern end, northeast to the Arsenal boundary.

Buildings housing the headquarters of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center all front on Martin Road.

The section now being four-laned ends at Patton Road on the Arsenal. Today's announcement by the Army asked for bids from construction firms to extend it further east as a two lane road crossing a wooded section from Patton Road intersection to the Arsenal boundary.

A new main entrance to the Arsenal is to be located at the point where the Martin Road extension hits the Arsenal boundary.

Gate One, which has previously served as the main gate, will remain open. It is on North Patton Road.

The State Highway Department has plans to construct the final link eastward from the Arsenal boundary to connect with U. S. 231 South. The Army will construct that portion of the new traffic link lying within the Arsenal boundary.

When completed the new artery will alleviate congested traffic entering and leaving the Arsenal at the beginning and end of the working day.

Colonel R. W. Love, District Engineer for the Army at Mobile, Ala., invited bids for the new two mile stretch of two lane asphalt road from the Patton Road intersection to the Arsenal boundary. The job includes three concrete bridges, two small masonry buildings with all necessary utilities and a parking area at the Arsenal boundary.


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
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First Aid Teacher Gets Real Patients

Requests should be submitted to the Huntsville USAR Headquarters at 1110 Meridian St., N., U.S. Army Reserve Training Sub-Center, and should include the following information: (1) Recommendation by USAR school commandant, (2) Date of removal from active reserve status, (3) Statement that officer meets all course enrollment prerequisites except that of age.





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'Good Samaritan' Candidate - - C. B. Masters

HUNTSVILLE, ALA. — If the Army Ordnance Missile Command ever passes out a Good Samaritan award, a leading candidate appears to be C. B. Masters of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Masters is a fellow who goes out of his way to help others.

He carries an array of spare parts in his station wagon to help stalled motorists on the highway between Redstone and his Asbury home near Albertville, Ala. He has never passed a motorist in distress in some 300,000 accident free miles of commuting since 1956.

In addition, he buys postage stamps regularly and piles them in his desk drawer for ABMA employees. He operates on the honor system and has never lost a penny yet.

Supervisors recommend Masters to new employees. He takes time to show them around and hauls them around to find a house after he gets off in the evening.

And, he's a great organizer of car pools. New employees can call Masters and find out how to get a ride most anywhere.

Masters has one motive for the way he operates—he likes people and has a deep satisfaction in making new friends.

His job is supervisor of the Mail and Records Section of ABMA, one which he thoroughly enjoys. But he takes advantage of his opportunity to get around the various offices and devotes much of his effort to helping others.

The antiquated carry-all vehicle he traded in recently had logged nearly 300,000 miles. The eye-catching thing about the car was

the fact it carried several extra fan belts, an extra tire and wheel, an array of mechanic tools, brake fluid, a first aid kit, flashlight, tire patching equipment, battery cables and a tow chain. All of this has been transferred to his new car.

He used this equipment to help stranded motorists at no cost to the other fellow. Sometimes Masters allows a motorist to pay for the replacement of a spare part, but there has never been a charge for the services rendered by Masters, who is also a skilled mechanic.

One of the motorists he assisted was a used car dealer who was towing a vehicle from Detroit. A transmission went out on the lead car driven by the dealer. Masters and his car pool members hooked his carry-all to the two cars behind and pulled them from Guntersville to Albertville in a three car motorcade.

Another time, he and a member of his car pool fixed a flat tire for a carload of women in three minutes flat.

The Army, too, has profited in many ways from the generosity of Masters. About four years ago, transportation was a critical item on Redstone Arsenal. A party of VIP visitors from Washington, were stranded after their arrival at Redstone Airport. Someone called Masters. He picked up the VIP's in his dilapidated station wagon and carried them to a conference. After the conference, he hauled them to the Post Exchange where he suggested they go for coffee. After a second conference, he carried the men to the Officer's Club for lunch and later hauled them back to the Airport.

A very special transportation officer here wrote him a letter of commendation for his assistance.

On another occasion, Masters helped a salesman whose car had stalled. The grateful salesman drove on to Birmingham and then decided to call Masters and tell him he made it in all right. He did, but Masters was already


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Defense Research By-Products Helps the Public - - Schomburg

The federal government pays for almost half of the total national research effort Major General August Schomburg told the Southeastern Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society at the Thomas Jefferson Hotel, in Birmingham this week.

The Army Ordnance Command, which Schomburg commands, will spend 1.8 billion dollars in 1960. Over 90 per cent of this money is being spent by contract with private industry and educational institutions.

"Dollarwise, we rank sixteenth if compared with the big corporations of the nation," he declared.

Observing that Birmingham produces 3,430 different chemical commodities in 1,000 mines, mills, and factories, Schomburg noted that chemistry also plays a vital role in missile development activities at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., his organizational headquarters.

"AOMC chemists conduct research in nose cone ablative materials, gas activation systems, plastics for filament winding of motor cases, and pressure vessels, metals ceramics and in many other areas."

Army Ordnance is working on 21 different systems, ranging in size from the Redeye, an air defense missile that can be held in

the hand, up to towering missiles such as Nike-Zeus, and Jupiter, Schomburg noted.

Referring to money spent on development of these systems, Schomburg declared, "we do only a small amount of our development 'in-house' — in Government laboratories . . . just enough to keep ourselves knowledgeable and thus protect the Government through effective technical supervision of contractor efforts."

Schomburg cited everyday items available for general use as a result of Army contributions to scientific progress naming torsion bar suspension, first used in the M-26 tank; improved rubber, electronic digital computers, aerosol pressure cans, and others.

Reviewing the achievements of Army missile experts in anti-missile research, Schomburg declared, "Only a few years ago many people assumed that the ICBM would be the 'ultimate weapon' against which the only defense would be the threat of retaliation with other nuclear-tipped missiles.

"Possession of a capability to inflict mass destruction is a main and necessary element of deterrence; however, imagine the great advantage this nation will have if it possesses both the ICBM for

retaliation and a defense weapon that can knock down ICBM's fired by an aggressor.

"Rejecting the concept of 'ultimate weapons,'" General Schomburg concluded, "the Army believes its Nike-Zeus system can effectively combat intercontinental ballistic missiles plunging toward targets at speeds ranging from 15,000 to 20,000 miles per hour."

ARMY IN THE AIR: The primary mission expected of the Modern Army's "Mohawk" is visual observation, with responsibility for the bulk of the Army's AO operations. Secondary missions include utility, resupply, liaison, and day or night photography.

"ONE ARMY" QUOTE: "Never has the mission of the Army National Guard been of such transcendent importance as it is in this present period of grave peril to our Nation and to the very survival of freedom itself," says Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker.

IN THE HUNTING SEASON WISE GUY'S A MENACE

There's something about the hunting season that brings out a frisky small-boy streak in normally sensible men. Maybe it's the tonic sense of getting away from it all with congenial buddies—the exciting magic of the autumn woods—the keen air—and maybe even a few swigs from the flask somebody brought along as a warmer-upper.

Anyhow, hunting is great sport, and the thrill of it can spur a man on to indulge in fancy shooting, TV-style. Specifically, take the case of three service pals who went happily off to bag some squirrels recently. One of them spotted his prey, and decided to shoot from the hip. Old Bushy Tail got away, but the two buddies weren't so lucky—one was killed, the other wounded.

Every season, commanders caution servicemen against violating the simple rules of hunting safety. But the close of every season sees a toll of casualties attributable to just plain carelessness. There's the man who carries a loaded weapon in his car, and the man who fails to check the safety lock, and the man who fires at a flat, hard surface, forgetting that bullets ricochet. The list is long and saddening; the tragedies that result are preventable.

Such accidents are bad enough when they involve civilians. They are doubly reprehensible when the culprits, or victims, are servicemen. For the latter have had formal training in the handling of weapons; they know range safety rules; they fire for practice repeatedly. If, with this experience, they still go in for show-off, wise guy shooting, or fail to take proper precautions, no excuse can be made for them. (AFPS)

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2,000 Fans Watch NATO Students Tie

A roaring crowd of more than 2,000 fans voiced their approval of football, European style, Thursday night when German and Italian Air Force students at OGMS battled to a 2-2 deadlock in the Third Annual "NATO Bowl" at Linton Field.

An unusual sport event between foreign students here has ended in a tie game. The 1958 match between the Vikings of Norway and Denmark, and the Continentals of France, Belgium and Germany, wound up 1-1, and last year's spectacle between the Greeks and the Italians also ended with both teams tallying once.

Germany jumped to an early 1-0 lead in the opening minutes of play Thursday when Sgt. Horst Windheuser's "shot" from the left side of the goal was good, following a steal around mid-field.

The Italian team bounded back with several demonstrations of fine passing that brought the ball into scoring position, but they failed to convert their efforts into a goal. During the rest of the 45-minute period, the ball saw-sawed back and forth with neither team getting an opportunity to raise the score.

The second half was a different story. The Italians manager to intercept a pass and capitalize to tie the score at 1-1 when A/2c Giuseppe Agorni booted in the first score for his team. The Italians continued to dominate the game somewhat during this period, keeping the play confined to an area 20 to 40 yards in front

Army Stores Fuel in Greenland Ice Cap

Washington (AFPS) — The Army has solved a fuel shortage problem in the Arctic by digging beneath the surface of the Greenland Ice Cap.

Fuel from the oil pit's 30,000-gallon capacity will provide heating and utility needs for personnel of the Army Engineer Research and Development Detachment, Camp Tuto, Greenland, during the winter of 1961-62.

The reservoir will have no lining of any kind, but it is not expected to reduced the purity of the oil. In a constant temperature of 17 degrees F. any moisture or other foreign matter in the fuel will freeze and settle to the bot-

tom. Initial tests of this method of storage were conducted in 1957 when aviation gasoline was stored for six months in an ice pit. Tests at the end of this period showed the gasoline contained less moisture than before and none was lost through evaporation.

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

The burner assembly contains 9 ounces of leaded gasoline. Weighing only 5 pounds, it folds into a package 12½ inches long by 9 inches wide and 4 inches thick.


Thiokol's Redstone Division, one of the Corporation's six rocket motor divisions, is located on the Redstone Arsenal in Hunts-

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
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CATHEDRAL CHOIR PLANS CHRISTMAS MUSIC PROGRAM

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
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

Engineers Award Contracts For Expansion of MSFC


Colonel R. W. Love, U. S. Army District Engineer at Mobile, Ala., announced today the award of two contracts totalling over two million dollars to the Pearce and Gresham Company of Decatur, Alabama, for constructing additions to missile assembly buildings at the Marshall Space Flight Center at Huntsville, Alabama, to provide additional space for research and development work on the Saturn space booster.

Under the first contract, amounting to \$1,817,153.70, Pearce and Gresham will connect the existing missile assembly shop and missile assembly hangar by means of a one-story addition with mezzanine, which will provide about 23,000 square feet of additional floor space. The job will include the relocation of several small buildings, the construction of exterior utilities, paving and fencing, and the installation of a 20-ton bridge crane.

Under the second contract, amounting to \$517,511.84, the contractor will construct an addition to the missile assembly and inspection hanger. The main addition,

two stories high plus basement and penthouse, will provide about 14,000 square feet of additional floor space, and areaways, a bottle pit and a pressure test cell will add another 8,700 square feet. The job will include the construction of exterior utilities, paving and fencing and the provision of laboratory equipment.

The contracts were awarded to the Decatur firm on the basis of separate competitions following formal advertising. On the first job, the Corps of Engineers sent advance notices soliciting bids to 1,433 contractors and material suppliers, furnished plans and specifications on request to 32 prime contractors and 134 sub-contractors and material suppliers, and received bids from 15 prime contractors. On the second job, the Corps sent advance notices to 1,433 contractors and material suppliers, furnished plans and specifications on request to 26 prime contractors and 113 sub-contractors and material suppliers, and received bids from 8 prime contractors.
