Missile Support Agency Is Formed

Dual Role Assigned Col. T. W. Cooke

Designation of a new Army agency at Redstone Arsenal was announced Monday by Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command.

The AOMC element commander Colonel Thomas W. Cooke formerly known as Redstone Arsenal has been renamed the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Support Agency effective immediately.

Gen. Schomburg emphasized that the move was an organizational change. Personnel will not be affected by the redesignation.

Redstone Arsenal remains the name of the 40,000 acre Army installation at Huntsville and will continue to be the mailing address and official home of the new agency, AOMC headquarters, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

Col. Cooke's command has dual missions. Local support services backing up ABMA, ARGMA, and AOMC Headquarters, the Guided Missile School and the Marshall Space Flight Center and new tasks national in scope.

The Missile Support Agency has now been established as a separate organizational element of AOMC by the Army Chief of Ordnance in accordance with Gen. Schomburg's recommendation. Naming the new agency recognizes several national support missions which have recently been assigned to Col. Cooke's command.

Col. Cooke said: "The redesignation is an acknowledgement of the change in mission emphasis. Heretofore our missions have been primarily local in scope but during the past few months we have assumed missions which are national in scope and importance. This trend will continue."

National missions assigned to the renamed agency include a Missile and Rocket Inventory Control Center, Computation Center, Calibration Laboratories and an Army missile patent center.

The Missile and Rocket Inventory Control Center handles all supply activities and data processing for all Army Ordnance de-

Assigned to Redstone Arsenal since July, 1958, Col. Holmes holds a bachelor of science degree from North Carolina State College and a master's degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Southern California.

A veteran of almost 22 years Army service, Col. Holmes was in the European Theater of Operations during World War II. After World War II he had several assignments in the United States and served a tour in Korea. He is a graduate of the Command and General Staff College and the Naval War College.

General Barclay Will Retire

General Is One Of Army's Missile Advance Pioneers

Retirement Will Be Effective June 30

Maj. Gen. John A. Barclay, one of the Army's foremost space and missile experts, today announced his retirement after 30 years in uniform.

Now Deputy Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, he will leave the service at the end of June.

Gen. Barclay was a pioneer in the Army's long range missile developments and the Free World's first achievements in space that Army missiles and know how made possible.

The list of projects with which he has been intimately associated

reads like a chronology of major space and missile achievements:

EXPLORER—The Free World's first earth satellite and three others that bore the same name, orbited by the Army.

PIONEER IV—The Free World's first successful deep space probe and satellite of the sun.

REDSTONE — The first large ballistic missile issued to U. S. troops and the basic vehicle for the MERCURY-REDSTONE rocket that lofted America's first space man.

JUPITER — The first intermediate range ballistic missile successfully fired in America.

JUPITER C — The composite Army rocket vehicle that propelled the first ballistic missile nose cone to successfully survive re-entry into the earth's atmosphere.

ABLE and BAKER — The first flight of primates (monkeys) in a ballistic missile nose cone and their recovery alive after a successful trip into space.

PERSHING — The new Army solid fuel ballistic missile that has set records for success in its fir-

GO HIGH ENOUGH AND THE WEATHER IS SUBZERO HERE

It was 74 degrees below zero the morning of May 31 at Redstone Arsenal, or more properly, above Redstone Arsenal.

A small weather balloon released at 6 a.m. recorded that temperature at an altitude of 46,000 while on the way to setting a new local altitude record of 124,000 feet.

Things had warmed up considerably by the time the balloon bearing its package of instruments reached the new record height. The temperature at that altitude was a balmy 31 degrees below zero.

Reserves to Host Orientation School

A local Army reserve unit will play host October 14-15 to reserve officers in the Third Army area during a Guided Missile Orientation School to be held at Redstone Arsenal.

The 3353rd Research and Development Unit said the course is to provide reserve officers with information on Army missiles and information concerning the facilities of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Officers attached to Reserve Research and Development Units, National Guard and active duty Army officers may apply for the course.

During the two day stay, the reservists will be told of the organization of the Missile Command and see both guided and ballistic missiles. They will also see the laboratories of the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center and receive information on the nation's space program.

Raytheon Receives Production Contract For Hawk Systems

The Army recently awarded a \$2,025,700 contract to the Raytheon Company of Waltham, Mass., for further production of ground support equipment for the Hawk guided missile system.

The award was made through the Boston Ordnance District. Work will be performed at Raytheon's Andover, Mass., facility.

Developed under the technical supervision of the U. S. Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, Hawk is now operational with Army air defense units.

It is specifically designed to kill high performance aircraft flying at extremely low altitudes. Recently Hawk demonstrated anti-missile capabilities when one fired in a test at White Sands Missile Range, N. M., intercepted and destroyed a Corporal guided ballistic missile.

ing test program.

NIKE ZEUS — The anti-missile missile system under development by the Army, one of the most severe technological challenges of all time.

In addition, as Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Gen. Barclay led Dr. Wernher von Braun and his famed organization at the time that group, which later left the Army to staff the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center, began work under Army management on the SATURN super space rocket.

Gen. Barclay has consistently and vigorously championed ballistic missiles as superior weapons delivery systems, the need for a fully-funded program for space exploration and the competence of both the Army missile team and those former members under Dr. von Braun who now work for the civilian space agency.

In November, 1960, Gen. Barclay

was honored by the Alabama Section of the American Rocket Society when he was presented the Dr. Hermann Oberth Award for that year. The bronze bust of Dr. Oberth, rocket pioneer, and a certificate are presented each year to an individual for "Promotion and advancement of astronautical sciences."

Hailing his leadership, Dr. von Braun recently, referring to the General as "my old boss" said: "Without him there would have been no Redstone missile, no Mercury-Redstone rocket and no American Astronaut in space."

Gen. Barclay first came to Redstone Arsenal in 1956 as Deputy Commander of the newly-formed Army Ballistic Missile Agency. He became ABMA Commander in early 1958 and moved up to Deputy Commander of AOMC in March, 1959.

His career in American Ordnance, however, has not been one solely marked with a preoccupation for big missile and space projects. The Army's newest weap-

on, the so called "hip-pocket rocket" or M-72 light anti-tank weapon illustrates his continuing concern for providing the best possible weapons for the soldier.

The men who conceived the idea for a small rocket weapon that could be carried anywhere and fired from a throw away container took their project to Gen. Barclay in their initial contact with the Army. He recognized its merit, encouraged them and got the project moving.

Gen. Barclay's Army career began at the United States Military Academy in 1927. He was graduated from West Point and was commissioned as a second lieutenant of Ordnance in June, 1931.

His early service years were spent in normal company assignments, both in Artillery and Ordnance. He attended the Officers Ordnance School at Watertown Arsenal, Watertown, Mass., prior to completing work on his master of science degree in engineering at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1936.

He also attended the Advanced Ordnance School at Aberdeen Proving Ground. During World War II he served in various Ordnance Corps assignments, and was

Theater Ordnance Officer in China when the war ended. Later he was Assistant Chief of Staff for Logistics in the Army Advisory Group to China.

Gen. Barclay's association with missiles and rockets began when he was named Executive Officer of the Ballistic Research Laboratories, Aberdeen Proving Ground in 1948. Following a tour of duty as Executive Officer in the Research and Development Division of the Office, Chief of Ordnance, he became Commanding Officer of Picatinny Arsenal in 1954. His assignment at Redstone Arsenal followed two years later.

During the years after World War II, Gen. Barclay also completed courses of study at the Armed Forces Staff College and the National War College.

Gen. Barclay's awards and honors include the Army Commendation Medal (twice), the Legion of Merit, the Order of Yung Hai and the Neck Order of Poa Ting. The latter two were presented by the Chinese Nationalist Government.

His interests are varied — from cabinet-maker, to hi-fi enthusiast, to flying. He earned his Army aviator wings upon completion of pilot training at Fort Rucker Ala., in

1953.

He is a Rotarian and actively supports Boy Scout activities. He served as Chairman of the 1958 Tennessee Valley Council Roundup and assisted the Council's Gold Anniversary Camporee in 1960. He presently serves on the Council as National Council Representative.

Gen. Barclay is a member of the Order of the Daedalians and the Space Science Committee of Stanford Research Institute.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John A. Barclay of Salt Lake City, Utah, he is married to the former Miss Gwendolyn Monagin of Uvalde, Texas.

The Barclays have two sons, Douglas, who was graduated from Auburn University this month with a degree in Industrial Management, and John, a graduate of the Citadel, in Charleston, S. C.

Gen. and Mrs. Barclay plan a Florida vacation before deciding on their post-retirement plans.

Gen. Adams is a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy and the National War College.

During World War II, Gen Adams participated in the Kiska Operations in the Aleutian Islands, the Naples-Foggia, Anzio, and Rome-Arno campaigns in Italy, the assault on southern France, the Ardennes - Alsace campaign and the Rhineland and Central Germany campaigns.

Following World War II, he served on the staff and faculty of the Command and General Staff College and the Army War College.

He held various positions in the Korean conflict, including those of Commanding General of the 24th and 25th Infantry Divisions. Later, he served as Commanding General of the 101st Airborne Division and the XVIIIth Airborne Corps.

During the deployment of United States forces to Lebanon in July, 1958, Gen. Adams was assigned as commander of all Army and Marine forces ashore in Lebanon.

Upon his promotion to lieutenant general in 1959, he assumed command of the Fifth U. S. Army Corps. He was named to his present position in October, 1960.

Gen. Adams is a combat infantryman and qualified parachutist.

(Continued From Page 1) pots responsible for missile and rocket components and is the national control center for all stock and stock levels of common production items maintained in stock in those depots.

The Army Missile Patent Center is responsible for all patent affairs of the Army Ordnance Missile Command and its elements. The Computation Center, which is yet to be built, will provide automatic data processing services to the organizational elements of AOMC located at Redstone Arsenal.

The Calibration Laboratories furnish calibration service, measuring devices against a known standard, to AOMC laboratories and other national activities in addition to monitoring and controlling calibration services of the Army Ordnance districts throughout the nation involved in Army missile programs.

Logistical and administrative support functions to be performed by the new agency at Redstone Arsenal include facilities upkeep, transportation, communications, utilities and maintenance.

Other functions under Col. Cooke's direction at Redstone Arsenal include the troop command, engineers, hospital, signal division, quartermaster, transportation and purchasing and contracting division, military housing, special services and recreational and educational facilities for military personnel.







"Our new administration has brought to Washington an able and dedicated group of individuals with which I have greatly enjoyed working," he added, "and under Secretary Stahr's leadership I am sure the Army will make tremendous progress." The President appointed Morse Assistant Secretary of the Army (Research and Development) March 3, 1961. The newly created office lent centralized direction to all phases of the Army's top-priority research and development programs. Morse served as the Army's Director of Research and Development from June 1, 1959, until his appointment as Assistant Secretary. During his term as R&D Director, unprecedented advances were scored in such diverse development programs as Army aviation,

the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system and communications satellite experiments. Dr. Morse was born August 19, 1911 in Abington, Mass., and received a Bachelor of Science degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1933. He served the national defense effort in many ways for many years. He was Civilian Advisor to the Atomic Energy Commission and the Office of the Secretary of Defense. He served on the Army Ordnance R&D Advisory Committee and on the Technical Advisory Panel of the Department of Defense on Chemical Biological Warfare. From 1957 to 1959, he was Chairman of the Army Scientific Advisory Panel. Mrs. Morse is the former Marion E. Baitz of Rochester, N. Y. They have two sons: Richard S., now attending Princeton University, and Kenneth P., a student at St. Albans in Washington, D. C.




