



PERSHING After Liftoff Speeds Successfully to Target

Pershing Test Culminates In Impact on Set Target

Firing Was Accurate Within Planned Area

The U. S. Army's Pershing ballistic missile sped down the Atlantic Missile Range from Cape Canaveral, Fla., Friday night in a successful test firing that culminated with the missile's impact in a pre-selected target area.

"The distance from impact to target for the missile we fired Friday night was well within the accuracy requirements for Pershing's intended use as a general support weapon for the field Army," according to Brig. Gen. Richard M. Hurst, Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Gen. Hurst said, "Tonight's Pershing was set to travel less than its maximum range."

The two stage solid propellant Pershing was guided to its target area by an inertial guidance system. General Hurst explained that Pershing's guidance is immune to any known counter measures. The missile was able to us immediately and indicates that we are achieving our objectives."

The missile was fired from a fully mobile transporter-erector-launcher (TEL). The TEL, mounted on the prime mover, is designed to provide simplicity of firing operations under combat conditions. Other elements of the Pershing system will be phased in.

DOD Announces

General McMorrow Will Be Deputy CG at AOMC

He Is Scheduled To Take Position Here on July 17

Has Been Nominated For Major General

Brig. Gen. Francis J. McMorrow will assume duties as Deputy Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command effective July 17, according to a Defense Department announcement June 13.

The 51-year-old brigadier general has been Director of Procurement, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics at the Pentagon since May 1, 1959. He has been nominated for promotion to Major General.

At Redstone he succeeds Maj. Gen. John A. Barclay as Deputy Chief of the Army's missile programs. Gen. Barclay, a pioneer Army space and missile expert, will retire from active duty with the U. S. Army at the end of June.

Prior to his present assignment, Gen. McMorrow was Assistant Chief of Ordnance, and Chief of the Industrial Division for almost two years.

Other assignments with the U. S. Army include:

Eight months as Commanding Officer and Commanding General of the Ordnance Training Command, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland;

G-4, Headquarters, U. S. Army in Europe; Office, Chief of Ordnance, Washington, D. C., where he served as Executive to the Chief, Industrial Division, and Assistant (See GEN. McMORROW, Page 2)

Jet Vest Unveiled Thursday Is Nothing New to Men Here

Studies Begun In '51 By Moore And Beduerftig

The jet vest unveiled Thursday which enables a man to fly with ease traces its beginnings to development work begun a decade ago at Redstone Arsenal.

The device demonstrated at Ft. Eustis, Va., was nothing new to Tom Moore, a physicist at the U. S. Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, and Herman F. Beduerftig, now with the Marshall Space Flight Center.

They worked on it in a project that began with studies and sketches in 1951 at Redstone Arsenal.

The same principle now being used by Bell Aerosystems Co., which developed the man-rocket device for the Army Transportation Research Command, a twin nozzle thrust of hydrogen-peroxide, was proven feasible here in early tests.

Initially, Moore recalls, a dummy was successfully lifted into a hovering position with the device in tests at Redstone. Later on a live pilot hovered for several seconds using the equipment.

The project was later transferred from the Army Ordnance Corps to Redstone to the Transportation Corps for further development work.

A Department of Defense announcement described the device demonstrated during "Project Mobility" at Ft. Eustis June 8 as

an experimental rocket device to achieve individual controlled free flight over the ground.

Bell reported that a test engineer has made lateral flights up to 360 feet and flights to the top of 30 feet high hills.

The man rocket powered by hydrogen peroxide straps to the back of the operator. The two nozzles direct their streams downward to provide the thrust necessary to lift the man clear of the ground.

Two control levers enable the operator to throttle the power and control his direction of movement. Pictures of the device indicate a striking similarity to the one used in the tests here almost ten years ago.

Moore is enthusiastic about possible uses of the device.

He envisions soldiers using it to cross rivers or leap up hills or other natural obstacles.

Another possibility he suggests is using it as an actual "flying belt" in space to enable space travelers of the future to actually leave the interior of their craft and move outside or transfer to another space ship.

He also feels that it could have future civilian applications. One might be equipping firemen or rescue workers with it to allow them to leap up the sides of burning buildings.

Moore pointed out however that the device is still a long way from the stage where it could be used for day-to-day commuting.

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Zeus Development Contract Awarded Western Electric

The U. S. Army recently awarded a \$4,656,660 contract for the development of an advanced radar designed for possible future incorporation into its Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system.

The award was made to Western Electric Company, prime Nike Zeus contractor, through the New York Ordnance District. Sylvania Electronics Systems will perform the development work at its Waltham, Mass., Laboratory under supervision of Bell Telephone Laboratories, responsible for system design and development.

Work on the radar will be carried on as part of the basic Nike Zeus development effort and as part of the Army's plan to incorporate advances in technology in the Nike Zeus system on a continuing basis.

Recent improvements in radar technology have made such an effort feasible.

After evaluation of proposals submitted by six contractors, Sylvania was selected with the approval of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, Redstone Arsenal, Ala., supervisor for Nike Zeus development.

TAPCO, a division of Thompson-Ramo-Wooldridge, Cleveland, Ohio, designed the TEL. The XM-474 prime mover was developed by the Food Machinery and Chemical Corporation, San Jose, California, under the technical supervision of the Ordnance Tank-Automotive Command, Detroit, Mich.

Western Electric Receives Contract

The U. S. Army June 6 awarded a \$2,280,000 contract to the Western Electric Company for further production of components for the Nike Hercules air defense guided missile system.

Work under the contract will be performed at Western Electric's plant in Greensboro, N. C.

Western Electric is prime contractor for the Nike Hercules system under the technical supervision of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Georgia Firm Gets Overpass Contract

Lt. Col. William R. Ledbetter, Assistant District Engineer of the Mobile, Alabama, Army Engineer District, announced the award of a contract last week in the amount of \$249,250.50 to R. G. Foster & Company at Wadley, Ga., for the construction of an overpass to separate two heavily traveled thoroughfares at Redstone Arsenal. The overpass will carry Patton Road over Martin Road.

The Georgia firm will relocate 2,000 linear feet of railroad track, construct a concrete and steel overpass 168 feet long carrying a 28-foot roadway, build a storm drainage system, construct asphalt concrete approach roads on Patton Road with connecting legs to Martin Road, and install two crossing signals.

Construction is expected to begin before the end of the month and to be completed by the end of May 1962.

The Corps of Engineers sent advance notices soliciting bids on this work to 822 contractors and material suppliers, furnished plans and specifications on request to 19 contractors and 23 subcontractors and material suppliers, and received 4 bids from prime contractors.

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

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



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Gen. Zierdt Tells Nashville Group of 'Advanced Radar'

Work Scheduled Is Part of Nike Zeus Development Plan

The U. S. Army has initiated development of an "advanced radar" for possible future use in its Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system, Brig. Gen. John G. Zierdt revealed tonight.

Zierdt, Commander of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency said the Army had funded work on the new radar with a contract awarded earlier in the day.

The ARGMA Commander mentioned the new radar in the course of discussing the Nike Zeus development program at a dinner meeting of the Volunteer Post of the American Ordnance Association in the Belle Meade Country Club.

The General is the Army's technical supervisor of the Nike Zeus program, currently the only defense against ballistic missiles in advanced development in the Free World.

He said work on the new radar will be carried on as part of

the basic Nike Zeus development effort and as part of the Army's plan to incorporate advances in technology in the Nike Zeus system on a continuing basis.

"Recent improvements in radar technology have made such an effort feasible," he said. Zierdt gave no further details on the new radar.

A 1937 graduate of West Point, Zierdt has been in charge of the Nike Zeus program since early last year. He became ARGMA Commander in June, 1960. This agency has development responsibility for all the Army's guided missiles.

He described Nike Zeus as the "number one priority project" under development in the Army. Zierdt expressed complete confidence in the ability of the Nike Zeus weapon system to defend against intercontinental ballistic missiles.

"It is our goal to provide the nation with an anti-missile defense system that will not only meet the threat of today but the need of tomorrow," he said.

"Every item and part of this anti-missile missile system has

been built with an eye to the future."

He used slides to illustrate the concept of the Nike Zeus system and how it is designed to operate: powerful radars to detect and track attacking ICBMs, electronic computers to make automatic decisions for the defense system and nuclear tipped Nike Zeus defensive missiles designed to intercept attacking ICBMs safely outside the defended area.

"It used to be popular to say that stopping one missile with another was like trying to hit a bullet with a bullet.

"Actually with Nike Zeus we are intercepting a target (ICBM) whose path can be predetermined with an explosion about the size of this Country Club," Zierdt said.

Touching on the cost of the defense system, Zierdt reported that the development program to date has involved commitments of approximately three quarters of a billion dollars. He said total cost of an operational Nike Zeus defense would be approximately eight billion dollars spread over a period of several years.

The contract awarded earlier today by the Army for development of the new radar was a \$4,646,660 grant to the Western Electric Company, Nike Zeus prime contractor. Sylvania Electronics Systems will perform development work on the new radar at its Waltham, Mass., laboratories under supervision of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, responsible for Nike Zeus design and development.

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
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OGMS Company A Takes Garrison




Saturday morning, June 9, was a long awaited and planned-for time for 108 government personnel and dependents of the Redstone Arsenal complex.



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MISSILE SCHOOL ADDS SUBJECTS

Three new courses on an improved version of the Nike-Hercules air defense weapon are beginning this week at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School here.

Col. Charles W. Eifler, commandant, said 23 civilian employees from Ordnance Corps depots across the nation are now beginning their studies of the weapon which has been adapted to use one of the world's most powerful radar detection systems.

The courses raise to 69 the programs of instruction now offered at the Missile School on eight weapon systems. A staff officer

supervisory course will run for 14 weeks, with lessons on acquisition and track radar requiring 11 weeks each, Eifler said. The classes are a permanent addition to the curriculum and will be conducted for hundreds of students expected to follow the first group.

The new radar system is ten times more effective in target discrimination than those hitherto used and extends the range of the missile against attacking aircraft substantially beyond its previously announced reach of 75 miles and altitude of above 20 miles.

The new courses are being conducted in the Officer Training and Air Defense Missile Divisions of the school. Lt. Ralph D. Scalzo is chief of the Improved Hercules Branch.



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

ABMA Leads List Of New Suggestions

Army military and civilian employees at Redstone Arsenal chalked up a record of 4,731 suggestions for increasing efficiency and

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economy during May.

More suggestions were submitted last month than the last three years combined, according to Frank Holmes, executive secretary of the Incentive Awards committee.

The record total represented Redstone's contribution to an Army-wide drive sponsored by Gen. George H. Decker, chief of staff.

One out of three civilians employed at Redstone submitted a suggestion last month, according to an avalanche of suggestions tallied by Holmes and his staff.

The suggestions result from alert employees who spot an idea which may enhance the efficiency or economy of any department or office at Redstone or military or federal government installation in the world. The savings resulting from a single suggestion some times is equivalent to the annual salary of an employee.

Many of the suggestions are not adopted by a committee studying the proposals, but some are adopted Army wide.

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency Operating Services section, which has 86 employees, turned in the greatest number of suggestions during the drive. Those employees submitted 180.

John L. McDaniel, technical director of ABMA Research and Development, submitted 37 new ideas in one day.

ABMA, an element of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, submitted the most ideas during the drive. Its 2,462 employees turned in 1,865 ideas.

Military personnel submitted 541 of the suggestions reported.

More than 500 suggestions have been received since the deadline ended May 31, according to Holmes.

After the suggestions are logged into the Incentive Awards office, they are sent to the office or agency affected by the proposal for comments. Once the comments are received, a committee studies the pro's and con's and makes a decision.

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The Execution of many formal documents requires the services of a notary public.

A notary public is a public official who is given, among other rights, the power to take acknowledgements and affidavits, to administer oaths, to certify to the authenticity of documents, to take depositions of witnesses, and to protect commercial paper.

The overwhelming majority of the notaries realize that they are significant facts in the legal system of the United States and perform their duties solemnly and earnestly.

Ordinarily, the notary charges a fee for his notarization, varying with the type of document, but the notaries on most armed forces installations perform their services free of charge for military personnel and their dependents.

A notary is primarily certifying that the signature is genuine, and of course, this requires that the notary actually see the signature being made. A paper cannot be notarized in the absence of the person who is signing the paper. Notaries are bonded to require compliance with the law.

As an addendum to this article, it should be noted that nearly all the states have statutes which allow a commissioned officer to act as a notary for military personnel.

However, the Armed Services' regulation (AR 600-11) states that it is advisable under normal circumstances that the services of notaries public be utilized in the administration of oaths and the execution or acknowledgments for commercial and other civil purposes, of instruments, such as power of attorney, deeds and affidavits.
