## Hospital Is Dedicated

### Ceremony, Music, Tours Mark Day

A tour, music by the 55th Army Band, a prayer and dedicatory remarks marked the dedication of the newly-renovated U. S. Army Hospital on Squirrel Hill, last week.

Maj. Gen. August Schomburg, Commanding General of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command mentioned in welcoming Brig. Gen. Robert E. Blount, Director of Professional Services in the Surgeon General's Office, that the hospital in Bldg. 112 puts the medical service in the center of the Army population on Post.

Gen. Blount, in his address said the hospital personnel are "companions in science . . . worthy of" (See HOSPITAL on Page 2)

### Contracts Awarded Businesses in Area

Contracts totaling \$593,755 were awarded to firms in Alabama and neighboring states for goods and services furnished to elements of the Army Ordnance Missile Command during the month of July.

Five Huntsville awards totaled \$131,530; three in Birmingham, \$37,312; and two Decatur firms got \$65,516 in contracts.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Alabama received an \$80,000 contract to furnish professional personnel and services necessary to conduct graduate studies in Science and Engineering Management and other fields as agreed upon by the contractor.

### Sec. Stahr Offers 12 Point Program To Bolster Forces

Redstone Arsenal military and civilian personnel will be affected in varying degrees by the announced build-up in Army personnel that came last week.

Elvis J. Stahr, Secretary of the Army, announced a twelve point program to bolster U. S. ground forces.

These points affect Regular, Reserve, and National Guard components of the Army.

"These steps are not merely crash measures designed to meet the Berlin crisis," Sec. Stahr stated. "but are a part of the build-up in our military strength to meet the world-wide threat."

Approximately 34,000 enlisted men whose terms of service expire after October 1 will be retained in their assignments for four months.

According to Sec. Stahr, "It will take approximately four months for the training centers to graduate soldiers in sufficient numbers to fill new requirements and to replace those involuntarily retained."

Approximately 4,000 reserve officers on active duty due to complete their tour during fiscal year 1962 might be held on active duty indefinitely.

Sec. Stahr commented, "An important requirement in the near future will be for trained junior officers to command platoons and companies and to train the large number of new personnel to be obtained through selective service calls."

The Secretary of the Army also announced that selective service calls would hit the 25,000 mark for September, and in October an estimated 20,000 would be called.

Individual recalls may be made for 700 officers and 2,000 enlisted (See BUILD-UP on Page 2)

## Department of Defense Will Conduct Nationwide Auction

The Atlanta Consolidated Surplus Sales Office will conduct the first Department of Defense nationwide telephone auction of its kind Wednesday, Aug. 30.

Surplus property worth over \$13 million and located at 48 different Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine installations throughout the United States will go on the block at six sale sites simultaneously.

Selling points will be located at hotel ballrooms in New York City, Columbus, Ohio; Denver, Colo.; Fort Worth Tex., and Berkeley-Oakland, Calif.

The chief auctioneer presiding at the control selling point will be located at the Henry Grady Hotel, Atlanta. Auctioneer services with audio and projected color

slides will be provided at each of the sale sites where the theater type auction will be conducted.

This nation-wide auction will attract buyer interest in a variety of equipment which includes truck mounted cranes, crawler cranes, rail cranes, bulldozers, low bed trailers, fork lifts, metalworking machinery, clothing, booths, vehicles, tug boats, supply vessel, barges and many other items.

J. B. Engle, property disposal officer at Redstone Arsenal, said a number of salvage items will be contributed from that installation.

Bidders at each sale site will have the same opportunity to bid on all property offered for sale, regardless of its physical location or the city from which they are (See AUCTION on Page 3)

## Hit by Army Missile Is Like Butting Brick Wall

Getting hit by an Army missile is like running into a brick wall . . . blindfolded.

That's the opinion of Ross Williams, one of the few men who knows for sure just how it does feel to get smacked by a missile.

Williams is the foreman for a group of 15 Army missile engineers who do their testing at the receiving end.

The men are safely tucked behind the armor plate of Army tanks when they ply their trade as clay pigeons in a missile shooting gallery at Redstone Arsenal, "but the thrill is there just the same," Williams says.

The missile fired at the tanks are not armed with their high explosive warheads, but the missiles don't know it. They come down range like lions looking for something to bite.

"Watching a missile come at you can be disquieting," says Williams, a man not given to overstatement.

"Once my navigator who was supposed to be telling me where to steer the tank got so fascinated with the sight of a missile bearing down on him that he forgot to give me directions. I drove the tank into a ditch."

Williams and the other men who pilot the target tanks work in the Test and Evaluation Laboratory of

the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Their job, like thousands of other Army military and civilian experts at Redstone consists of developing, testing and evaluating Army missiles.

In the case of anti tank missiles the Army wants to know how well they perform against moving targets.

That's where Ross and the other drivers come in.

The Army has found that live drivers operate the mobile targets in a more realistic manner. They also eliminate the need for a costly and not so effective remote control steering system for the tanks.

The tanks, most of them World War II types rescued from the scrap heap, are equipped with periscopes so that the driver can be safely "buttoned up" inside, yet see to drive.

In the pre-periscope days, a man sat in the tank turret to peer out through viewing slits and guide the driver seated below him by tapping him on the shoulder to indicate a change in direction.

"Now that we've got periscopes you never know when the missile is going to hit you," Williams said. "The navigator used to keep us posted, but now the driver is the" (See HIT BY MISSILE on Page 2)

our trust." Col Thomas E. Cooke, Commander of the Army Ordnance Missile Support Agency, and the Arsenal, recounted the history of the present building, including a survey he made for the Chief of Ordnance in 1950 when it was decided that Research and Development personnel needed space more than a hospital. Ten years later, the hospital was again determined more important.

Chaplain (Lt. Col.) John E. Baterson, Post Chaplain delivered the invocation.

The 55th Army Band played for the ceremony which was followed by guided tours of the hospital facilities.

The new hospital's day room will have color TV. Patients have a two-way intercom to communicate with attendants and nurses. Doctors are wired for sound on one-way transistor lapel radios—but the doctor needs a telephone or the intercom to communicate.

Four and six bed rooms are replacing the ward in Bldg. 7110 where the hospital has been located for the past ten years.

Ambulatory patients will have a lawn area to relax outdoors during fine weather.

Among the distinguished guests at the dedication ceremonies were Maj. Gen. and Mrs. Francis J. McMorrow. He is Deputy Commanding General of AOMC; Brig. Gen. and Mrs. John G. Zierdt, Mayor and Mrs. R. B. Searcy of Huntsville, civilian doctors in the community who have administered supplemental services to the Army medical staff, and representatives of staffs of hospitals in the Third Army area.

Project officers for the hospital renovation program were Maj. John C. McBroom and Capt. Earl W. Lauck. Both men are nearing the end of their present tours at Redstone Arsenal.

only man in the tank and he has to keep his eyes on where's he's going."

In many tests the missiles are guided to hit large sheet metal targets mounted atop the tanks instead of smacking directly against the tank.

Lloyd Dunham, another target driver, says that type test is not nearly so exciting.

"When the missile hits the target all you hear inside the tank is a tinny 'blank.'" "When the missile hits the tank the fillings in your teeth rattle."

Dunham is the only test driver who had wartime experience in tanks. He took basic training at Fort Knox, Ky., as a tankner in 1945. He was part of a unit scheduled to join the 4th Armored Division in Germany, but he drew another assignment when his group arrived in France.

"Most of my tank driving has been done right here, home of the firing range at Redstone," he said.

During a missile test, the tank driver receives the pre-firing countdown. This insures that he has his vehicle up to speed, traveling in the direction and at the point down range required for the particular test at the time the missile is fired.

"These unarmed missiles never hurt the tank," Williams said. "Oh the force of impact bent a tread once but that doesn't happen very often."

"Usually the test is over before you have time to think about the missile hitting the tank. I don't mind it at all, but they can look for another tank driver when they start shooting these things with live warheads."

men with special skills ranging through transportation, medicine, law, construction, and communication.

"Since the response to a voluntary program is not known at this time, the number of individuals that will be required through induction or subject to recall can not be determined," Sec. Stahr said.

Members of the Ready Reserve whose tour of duty would expire between Oct. 1, 1961, and June 30, 1962 will be extended by one year. One hundred and thirteen units of the Army Reserve and National Guard were designated as priority units for a possible call to active duty by the Secretary. No Huntsville area units were included in the list.

"The actual call of these units to active service will depend upon the developing situation," Sec. Stahr stated. "Alerted units will receive additional week-end active duty training at their home stations beginning very shortly."

"Approximately 250,000 ready reservists will be affected," according to Mr. Stahr.

Certain key personnel, other than Regular Army officers and warrant officers, due to retire during FY 62, may be retained on active duty if they possess critical technical skills.

"This action will insure experienced personnel for assignment or retention in key positions and will reduce turbulence of senior officer personnel during the build-up," Sec. Stahr maintained.

Personnel retained under these conditions will receive six months notice when their services are no longer required.

Sec. Stahr also disclosed that \$81 million of the \$2.5 billion budget that Congress had given the Army was allotted to missiles.

For persons with six month obligations, all Reserve Officer Training Corps personnel who have six months commitments have been extended for one year. This involves about 1700 officers who are currently attending their basic branch orientation course or are serving for training with active Army units.

Starting Sept. 1, the Reserve Forces Act will be limited to men under 20 years old.

Anyone over 20 who was planning to enlist under the RFA six months program has one of four choices, according to Sec. Stahr.

He "may enlist in the Regular Army, volunteer for induction, or enlist in a reserve two-year active duty program if he wants to enter active military service or wait until the restriction on RFA six month active duty for training enlistment is removed subsequent to Dec. 31, 1961."

"The active duty of RFA personnel now in training will not be individually extended but they will be fed back into their ready reserve units unless they choose to enlist in the Regular Army," Stahr stated further.

Other changes announced by Stahr were:

Effective Oct. 1, overseas tours for Army personnel have been extended. Tours will be extended six months in such areas as Japan and Germany, and three months in such areas as Korea.

Approximately 4,500 new ROTC officers not yet ordered to active duty will come on duty for 24 months.

Sec. Stahr stated that "most of the measures taken will have an impact on the personal lives of many people. The entire staff

**Melvin Shroeder Is Promoted to Lieutenant Colonel**

One of the key men in the U. S. Army's Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system development program has been promoted to Lieutenant Colonel.

Melvin W. Shroeder, Chief of the Systems Engineering Branch of the Anti-missile Missile and Space Defense Projects Office received his promotion from Brig. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commander of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Col. Shroeder joined ARGMA's Zeus team after graduating from the Ordnance Guided Missile School's staff officers course in December 1960.

He entered the Army in 1942 as a Second Lieutenant and re-

mained on active duty through 1946 rising to the rank of Captain. During World War II, he served as an Ordnance Unit Commander and Staff Officer in the Panama Canal Zone.

Self-employed when the Korean war broke out, he was recalled to active duty and assigned to the Defense Atomic Support Agency (DASA) at Sandia Base, N. M.

Col. Shroeder served with the 144th Special Weapons Unit, and as assistant logistics chief during his four and half years with DASA.

In 1955 he was assigned to the Office of the Chief of Ordnance where he served with the Nuclear Branch of the Research and Development Division through 1959 when he was assigned to the Military Assistance Advisory Group in Taiwan (Formosa).

He remained there as Advisor

to the Combined Service Forces of the Nationalist Chinese Production Services until he came to Redstone Arsenal in July, 1960.

Col. Shroeder is a graduate of Kansas State College where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering.


He and Mrs. Shroeder, who is presently serving as the treasurer of the Redstone Arsenal Officers Wives Club, reside on post.

## Two ARGMA Men Presented Agency's Executive Awards

### Paul Schaeppi and Ernest Young Cited

Two Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency employees were presented Friday with the Agency's Senior and Junior Executive Award.

Honored were Paul K. Schaeppi as the Senior Executive and Ernest A. Young, the Junior Executive. Brig. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Agency Commander, presented each of the two men with a plaque during a special ceremony witnessed by members of the staff.

The two were chosen from a number of employees nominated. The program is designed to single out those individuals in the Agen-

cy "who have displayed sustained interest, growth and development in the field of public administration and exemplary achievement or notable contributions in this field to the efficiency and quality of the public service," said General Zierdt.

Honorable mention awards were made to Neal E. Roberts for the Senior Award and Lloyd L. Lively for the Junior Award.

In order for an employee to be eligible for consideration for these awards they must have been employed at ARGMA for at least one year and be over 36 for the Senior Award, and under that for the Junior one.

Schaeppi, Chief of the Techno-

cal Staff of the Agency's Industrial Operations is 46 years old, and has spent 10 of those years in the Federal Service. He came to Redstone Arsenal in May, 1951, as a procurement specialist.

In 1958, he was appointed to his present position. The Director of Industrial Operations, who nominated Schaeppi, cited him for being instrumental in saving the government thousands of dollars through his unusual and effective methods of handling procurement matters, and for his ability to work out a plan of standardizing all engineering scopes of work on the Ordnance contracts for missile systems under ARGMA.

His work was previously cited on seven occasions when he received Department of the Army Outstanding, Sustained and Special Act or Service Awards.

Young, who holds a bachelor of science degree in physics from Furman University in Greenville, S. C., is the Chief of the Programs Control Office of Field Service Operations.

The 28 year-old Young joined ARGMA in September, 1958, as a Technical Program Control Specialist. He was nominated by the Director of Field Services for successful participation in basic provisioning for guided missiles; for outstanding contributions in applying automatic data processing systems; and his work as Assistant to the Director during August, 1960.

His supervisor had this to say about Mr. Young: "This young executive is vital, brilliant, aggressive, and a personable leader who demonstrates, by superior results, his leadership qualities on a daily basis."

Roberts serves as the Deputy Field Service Program Director of ARGMA and is a veteran of more than 20 years Civil Service.

of Minnesota. His first assignment was as an Ammunition Inspector with the Savannah (Ga.) Ordnance Depot. He came to Redstone Arsenal in 1953 after serving three years in Germany with the Army as a Civil Service employee.

Roberts was nominated because "he has been a part of and has made outstanding contributions to the many accomplishments and unprecedented achievements made in fulfilling the Maintenance Division Mission of Field Service Operations."

The winner of the honorable mention in the Junior Executive category, Lively, serves as the Deputy Chief of the Direct Support Systems Division of Industrial Operations.


Lively has been employed at Redstone Arsenal since 1953. A graduate of Auburn University, he was cited by the Director of Industrial Operations for his perform-

# Zeus Is Expected to Be Effective as Early Nikes

## It Is America's Best Hope Against Enemy Missiles

With Nike-Zeus the Army expects to attain the same effectiveness of defense against missile attack which previous Nike missiles have attained against manned bombers. Lt. Gen Robert J. Wood, Commanding General of the United States Army Air Defense Command, said today.

"Nike-Zeus is America's best hope for an anti-missile defense in this decade," Gen. Wood asserted.

His statements were made in a message to missilemen of his nationwide command in which he called attention to the 100th anniversary — Aug. 30, 1961 — of the first artillery fire against an aerial target in America.

He referred to the firing upon a Union reconnaissance balloon at Ball's Crossing, a point now in Arlington, Va. The Confederate artillery's shots did not hit the balloon, but forced it to be drawn down.

The incident constitutes the "unofficial beginning" of anti-aircraft artillery in America although official activation of such units in the U. S. Army did not take place until Oct. 10, 1917, Gen. Wood said.

The Civil War incident, according to Gen. Wood, emphasizes "the fantastic strides military science has made in the field of weaponry, especially against aerial targets."

He contrasted the six-pound projectile and the three-inch gun which fired those first "anti-aircraft" shots a century ago against a target only a few hundred yards off the ground with Nike-Zeus, which is designed to reach out into space with a nuclear warhead to destroy ballistic missiles.

Gen. Wood said that the first member of the Army's Nike family of air defense missiles, the Nike-Ajax, proved in 1953 "that supersonic guided missiles could outclimb, outspeed, and outmaneuver any known jet bomber."

Nike-Hercules, the "second generation," gave surface-to-air missiles an atomic capability, as well as improving on range and altitude, accuracy, and speed, he said.

They were designed to counter high performance bombers, a threat to which "has now been added that of ballistic missiles," Gen. Wood observed.

Nike-Zeus is the Army's "answer to this new menace," he said, adding: "With it we confidently expect to attain the same effectiveness against missiles of all ranges that we have already attained against manned bombers."

Gen. Wood acknowledged that the anniversary which he noted is one which the nation might otherwise overlook, during the observance of the Civil War Centennial, because attention is naturally focused upon the major battles of that war.

He said that war settled the

question of whether America would exist "as one country or two," but that the possible war faced by America today poses the question of whether that nation "may continue to exist at all."

"The North American Air Defense Command, of which the Army Air Defense Command is an integral part, is our best assurance of survival should an aggressor force a conflict upon us," Gen. Wood stated.

He noted that the scene of the first anti-aircraft fire a century ago "is now within the protective ring of Nike missile sites" of the Washington - Baltimore defense. Men of the 35th Air Defense Artillery Brigade there "take special pride" in helping to shield the nation's capital, he said.
