Railway Track Is Sold Here

The Redstone Arsenal railroad, already one of the slowest in the world (it stops for cars), is getting to be the shortest.

It had 3.8 miles of track sold right out from under its chugging engines this week. The railroad at the home of the Army's missile program, now has only 62.5 miles of track.

The Birmingham Rail and Loc

omotive Company of Birmingham purchased the track, switches, cross ties and spikes for \$54,595.95.

Now, this doesn't leave an eight mile gap in the track. The track was sold in the unused fringe areas of the 40,000 acre arsenal and declared surplus to the needs of the Army at this installation.

The railroad was sold on competitive bids advertised by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

'Open Season' Declared

Hardwood Harvest Is Gathered Here

More than 500,000 board feet of hardwood was harvested as of this month from a 400 acre section of Redstone Arsenal, according to J. N. Weldon of the Post Engineer Land Management Office.

Weldon said about 300,000 more board feet will be cut by the Pearson Lumber Company of Tuscaloosa, high bidders on the hardwood.

The trees were spotted and marked on a selected basis under the supervision of the Post Engineer and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, Mobile District.

Another timber harvest contract, covering cedar trees, was completed on July 30.

Weeden Mountain provided 410,521 board feet of cedar under that contract.

Another cedar harvest will be held in 1962.

Health Benefits May Be Changed Between Oct. 1-16

Federal employees will be given an opportunity to enroll, change options, or change insurance carriers under the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program during "Open Season" between Oct. 1 and Oct. 16.

This is the first opportunity Federal employees have had to make a change in carrier, or to change options since the inception of the program. Another chance to change will not occur for another three years.

During the past year, between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961, Roy Fox of the Army Ordnance Missile Support Agency Finance and Accounting Office, said that \$817,297.52 was withheld from employe paychecks and that the Government disbursed another (See OPEN SEASON on Page 2)

Hunters Will Receive Safety Lessons Today

Gunners who plan to hunt on Redstone Arsenal will be given an illustrated lesson in hunting safety today at the Post Theater at 4:45 p.m.

Attendance is mandatory for anyone who will hunt on the Arsenal during the coming season.

In a series of color slides, prospective hunters will be shown the dangers involved in hunting and how to avoid them.

The 25 slides, prepared by the Redstone Arsenal Safety Office will be explained by Dillard K. Womack.

For safety during the hunting season, the Arsenal hunting grounds have been divided into areas, with a limited number of hunters permitted in each section. Only military personnel, their dependants and guests may hunt on the Arsenal.

Main gunning target on the Arsenal is small game, including dove, squirrel, rabbit, and quail.

Highlighting the do's and don't's of hunting, the slides depict gub handling in the field and home smoking safety in the woods, and proper behavior and courtesy for the hunter.

For latecomers there will be a make-up session at the same time tomorrow and all newcomers to the Arsenal will be able to listen to the lecture on a tape recorder later in the season.

However, the opportunity to change from high to low option, or from one carrier to another is only offered during the "Open Season."

had never ventured much farther from her home than the 100 miles to Florence State College shortly after she was graduated from high school at Scottsboro, Ala.

"After the opportunity came through, I couldn't sleep for a week trying to make a decision whether to go or not . . . after I decided in favor of the assignment, I began looking forward and planning," Miss Foster said.

An airliner carried her to Japan with about 100 pounds of baggage. She returned with nearly a ton.

"Japan was wonderful, I can't describe the feeling when I first arrived," she added. She arrived in Korea in May, 1959, for a one year tour of duty. She promptly volunteered to extend another year as she was assigned as secretary to Maj. Gen Hamilton H. Howze, commander of KMAAG.

After working hours, she traveled. Many times she went to the front line area and talked to soldiers only short distances from their foxholes and bunkers. She said their morale was high.

She visited a number of cities remembered by Americans because their names rocketed into the headlines during bloody fighting . . . Pusan, Taegu, Panmunjon.

She went shopping in Formosa, Hong Kong, the Phillipines, Okinawa and Japan.

In Seoul, she met many soldiers and their families who were on their third or fourth assignment in Korea. She also has acquaintances from some 11 countries of the U. N. represented in Korea.

She corresponds with Koreans and Americans there.

In a nutshell, her view of Korea and the Far East is:

You have to learn to eat with chopsticks . . . but Oriental food makes her ill.

Hong Kong is the only place that looks like the picture I had of it.

Formosan people are friendly. Tokyo is a beautiful city where she bought "lots of pearls, silk and China" and a few other odds and ends that she doesn't know what to do with.

She has a jade and diamond ring, purchased in Hong Kong, which she cherishes.

She also sent her mother and father each a Japanese housecoat which have arched some eyebrows in Capshaw.

What's next for Miss Foster? Stay around awhile and then apply for AOMC? "I'm hoping to ply for Europe," she mused.

TRANSPORTATION KEEPS AN EYE ON EFFECTIVE MOBILITY METHODS

ATLANTA, Ga. — Army missile transportation experts are ever mindful of lessons that some do-it-yourself boat builders learn to their sorrow.

Lt. Col. Theodore Antonelli, chief of the Transportation Office of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, pointed this out in discussing Army missiles and their mobility requirements at the monthly meeting of the local chapter of the National Defense Transportation Assn. today.

"We can't be put in the position of a man who builds a boat in his basement and then can't get it out," the transportation expert said.

"The best missile in the world is no good if it is not where it is needed, when it is needed."

He described the great emphasis the Army places on mobility and transportability for its weapons, insisting that its missiles move with the soldier and fight where he fights.

In his talk at the Ft. McPherson Officers Club, Col. Antonelli illustrated some of the current transportation trends in Army military. The 41-year-old officer told the group that the Army is concentrating on transporting its missiles by as many means as possible.

Using film and slides he explained mobility designed into the Army's brand new Pershing ballistic missile which will be able to move

overland on rugged tracked vehicles or through the air in fixed wing aircraft or helicopters.

A member of the special staff, of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, which directs the Army's missile programs from its home at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., Col. Antonelli is responsible for movement of missiles and supporting equipment throughout the world.

Wounded in combat during World War II, his decorations include the Silver Star with Oak Leaf cluster, the Bronze Star and Purple Heart medals.







Locals Deserve Support





A clear pass is a backward pass which starts behind the line of scrimmage and is made by the receiver of the snap so that it definitely travels in flight after leaving hands of the snap receiver.

The length of the game is shorter and the ball may be handed in any direction after a clear pass, a legal forward pass, or a kick has been made.

Many changes are in effect to make the game more interesting to both the player and to the spectator.

Engineers Design Missile Systems to Fit Soldiers

Human Engineering Factors Considered In Every Design

Engineers who design and develop Army missiles have requirements for increased payloads and ranges, light structures, more efficient propulsion systems, more accurate guidance systems.

Under this load, it's easy to forget the soldier who must operate the system.

Making sure that he isn't forgotten in the job of practitioners of an art called human engineering at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency and the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Human engineering isn't new in the Army. During the Civil War, for example, it issued "crooked shoes" to soldiers, the first use of "left" and "right" shoes.

It would like to make operation of a missile as simple as opening a milk bottle or striking a match, but the job isn't that easy.

Donald J. Graham Jr. and his staff at ARGMA and their counterparts at ABMA, a program coordinated by Gerald Chaikin, are continuously studying missiles with the soldier-operator foremost in mind.

Their checking extends right down to the number of grease fittings and their location, the intensity of lighting provided inside ground support equipment, the amount of noise the equipment makes in operation, which way knobs turn and how much.

The Army has learned that some levers can be pulled better than pushed. For some vehicles, it has been found that an operator works best in a sitting position, but on other jobs, he should stand.

Missiles viewed by the public generally hold them spellbound, but to a soldier stationed at an isolated outpost boredom is his biggest foe. He knows the missile from top to bottom. He is continually put through alerts. False targets project on the screen in unannounced tests keep him on his toes. He checks and rechecks a weapon that he hopes he'll never have to use.

Keeping these factors in mind, human engineers attempt to make his work as easy and effective as possible. Engineers generally follow a theme of designing items which cater to the natural inclinations of man.

On vehicles, they keep an ordinary farm tractor in mind when studying maintenance. The equipment must be rugged, but easily repaired. It can't be carried "back to the shop" under combat conditions.

Stressing simplicity, the Army hasn't changed since it issued a contract for the first airplane in 1907.

A clause in the contract said: "The airplane should be sufficiently simple in its construction and operation to permit an intelligent man to become proficient in its use within a reasonable length of time."

And so it is with missiles. One of their primary objectives is to catch changes that might have to be made to fit the man to the machine early in the game. This avoids costly redesign and retooling after an item goes into production.

Many human engineering modifications can be accomplished while weapons are still on the drawing

board or exist only as wooden models. Provided of course that Graham, Chaikin and Co. are there to look over the designers shoulder and remind him that the average soldier, almost six feet tall in his bare feet and still growing may have to use the device with gloves on in sub-zero cold.

It once took 15 man hours to

check out the warhead of the Army's Honest John rocket prior to firing. Human engineering made this an operation that can be accomplished by inserting a key (large so that it can be found in a hurry) in a slot and turning it.

If the warhead is ready a green light comes on, if not, a red light appears. End of checkout.

Equipment is also being tested that will eliminate man as a key check-out item.

It is a standardized automatic machine that can be plugged into a variety of missile systems and assure a "go" or "no go" check in seconds.
