Western Electric Receives \$171 Million Zeus Contract

Award Is Made For Tests and Development

The U. S. Army today funded continued development of its Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system awarding a \$171,821,000 contract to the Western Electric Company.

The award extends development and tests of the Nike Zeus system for an additional twelve months. Production funds were not included.

Western Electric Company, prime contractor, has major plants in North Carolina. Subcontractors and suppliers in many states will share in the contract's funding including the Bell Telephone Laboratories in Whippany, N. J., responsible for system design and development, and the Douglas Aircraft Company at Santa Monica, Calif., builders of the missile.

Among other subcontractors funded under the contract are the Goodyear Aircraft Company of Akron, Ohio; Continental Electronics of Dallas, Texas; Avco Research laboratories of Everett, Mass.; and Cornell Aeronautical Laboratories at Buffalo, N. Y.

Others are: Continental Can Company, Coffeerville, Kan.; Remington Rand Univac at St. Paul, Minn.; Sperry Rand at Great Neck, L. I. and the New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, N. M.

The U. S. Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency is the Ar-

my's technical supervisor for Nike Zeus development. The system is the only one designed to provide active defense against intercontinental ballistic missile attack which is in advanced development within the Free World.

Some of the funds in the contract announced today will be expended for work at major test sites for the missile defense system. Components are now being tested at Ascension Island in the South Atlantic, at Bell Laboratories at the Army's White Sands Missile Range, N. M. and at Pacific Missile Range Headquarters Pt. Mugu, Cal.

\$16 Millions Awarded For Missile Work

The U. S. Army Sept. 29 announced award of three contracts totaling \$16,065,000 for work on its Mauler, Nike Ajax and Nike Hercules air defense missile systems.


One award was for \$13 million to the Pomona Division of General Dynamics Corporation, Pomona, Calif., for continued development of the Mauler, a highly mobile air defense weapon designed to destroy high-performance tactical aircraft and short range missiles and rockets on the battlefield. SERGEANT MISSILE Leaving Launch Pad for Target

All Test Objectives Are Met in Firing

Research and development firings of the U. S. Army's Sergeant ballistic missile system ended Sept. 28 with a successful test firing at White Sands Missile Range, N. M. Test objectives were met.

Final firings in the development program of the solid-fuel field Army support weapon, conducted at the overland missile test range in the past few weeks, tested the Sergeant missile and its ground support equipment in simulated battlefield conditions.

All missiles were checked out and fired using operational ground support equipment.

In one of the tests, a Sergeant was successfully fired from a launch site on a mountain and impacted on target several thousand feet lower and many miles distant in the desert.

The missile fired today was launched by a crew from Sperry Utah Co. assisted by Army personnel.

Future firings will be conducted by Army troops and test personnel for proof of characteristics, to check the quality of production line missiles and to train Army combat units in use of the missile system.

One of the objectives of the final series of development firings was to check out firing procedures to be used in troop training.

The Sergeant system is already in production at Sperry Utah Company, Salt Lake City, Utah, prime production contractor, under the technical supervision of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The solid fuel Sergeant is being readied to replace the operational Corporal missile which uses (See SERGEANT on Page 2)


Among the 85 delegates gathered in the ARGMA auditorium will be 40 technical writers representing 31 industries involved in missile production.

The Belgian Ambassador to the United States will visit Huntsville this week to attend the graduation of a missile support detachment of the Royal Belgian Air Force from the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED WEEK IS BEING OBSERVED AT AOMC

Demonstrating that in the field of rockets and missiles a physical handicap is not a disadvantage, 382 handicapped people are now working for the Army Ordnance Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal.

This represents an increase during the last year of nearly 100 new workers who have some sort of physical handicap. The Army Ordnance Missile Support Agency leads other elements of AOMC with 298 handicapped employees.

The week of Oct. 1-7 has been designated as National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week by President John F. Kennedy.

"If a man has the qualifications for the job," states Robert F. Mello, Army Ordnance Missile Command Personnel chief, "He gets the job, provided he has the physical capabilities to perform

"We employ the physically handicapped here at Redstone when we can hire them according to normal employment needs," Mello continued. "And we find that they are very good workers."

"When it comes to doing a job a handicapped person is no different from anyone else," Mello stated. "And we're glad to have them as part of the Army missile team here."

In 1945, National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week was set up by a joint resolution of Congress as the first week in October.

"But we must not forget that employment of the physically handicapped wherever possible is a year round opportunity and should not be restricted to one week," according to Mello.

liquid propellants and requires more time to check out and fire. Sergeant is a more mobile system and can be set up and fired under adverse conditions of weather and terrain by a smaller crew than that required for Corporal. Its inertial guidance system makes Sergeant immune to known countermeasures.

Initial development of Sergeant was carried out by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory of the California Institute of Technology under the technical supervision of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Another contract was for \$1,565,000 to Western Electric Company for continued production of components for the Nike Hercules missile system, with work to be done at the company's Greensboro and Winston Salem, N. C., plants. The third award, also to Western Electric, was for \$1.5 million for engineering documentation on the Nike Ajax and Nike Hercules systems. Work is to be performed at Western Electric's Winston Salem plant. General Electric at Syracuse, N.Y., and Douglas Aircraft Company of Santa Monica, Calif., will share in the award.

Nike Ajax and Nike Hercules are operational air defense weapons defending key cities and defense installations against attack by aircraft.

Ajax and Hercules are forerunners of the Nike Zeus, the Army's anti-missile missile system now in advanced development.

ARGMA is the technical supervisor for all of these missile programs.

The Ambassador is Louis Scheyven, a top-ranking member of the Washington diplomatic corps who has been in the foreign service of his country for almost 20 years, Col. Macpherson said.

His visit next Thursday will spark a round of official and social activities as Army and civic leaders mark the addition of the Belgian missile unit to the forces of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The Belgian airmen have been trained on the Army's powerful Nike-Hercules air defense missile system. They are the second group from their country to come here for instruction on the weapon which the Army says can destroy whole formations of attacking aircraft at altitudes beyond 100,000 feet.


The graduates number six officers and 29 enlisted men. Their commander is Lt. Jaques Herlant who has been residing here with his family for the past year.

The fifth and largest site, a complete Nike Zeus installation, is nearing completion on Kwajalein Island in the South Pacific. Nike Zeus missiles will be fired and controlled from Kwajalein in tests against target cones launched by Atlas boosters from Vandenburg Air Force Base Cal.

Nike Zeus is designed to use advanced radars and electronic computers in a fully automatic operation to detect and track ballistic missile warheads then fire and control Nike Zeus missiles to intercept them and destroy them outside the defended area.

The New York Ordnance District administers the contract.

Col. Napper, his wife and three children live at Redstone Arsenal.

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
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Troops Fire Redstone at White Sands

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N. M. — Army missilemen just back from Europe fired a Redstone ballistic missile here recently in a tactical exercise.

The 70-foot tall Redstone was fired by troops of "B" Battery, 40th Artillery Group, stationed in Europe with North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces. Range optical and electronic instrumentation followed the missile's flight on its 80-mile trajectory.

Handling of the weapon for the training firing conducted on sand and sagebrush terrain was almost identical to conditions in a tactical situation.

It was the third such firing of a Redstone at White Sands since June.

The battery, under command of Captain Luke A. Vavra, will return to its station in Europe. The 40th Artillery Group commanded by Col. Royal E. McShea is made up of the 580th Engineer Company, the 630th Ordnance Company, Headquarters and Headquarters Battery and A and B Batteries.

Support of the operation was provided by the 209th Artillery Group (Redstone) from Ft. Sill, Okla., under the command of Col. Thomas M. Crawford.

Redstone, operational with U. S. Army units in Europe since 1958, was developed by the ABMA. Chrysler Corporation, was prime production contractor.



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



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Pershing Missile Lands on Target

The U. S. Army put another of its Pershing ballistic missiles on target Sept. 26 in a successful firing test at Cape Canaveral, Fla. Brig. Gen. Richard M. Hurst, Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, said preliminary data available immediately after the firing indicated that all test objectives were met.

Designed to move in helicopters as well as overland on tracked vehicles or in fixed wing aircraft, the Pershing is being developed as a selective range weapon for field army support.


It can be wheeled out of helicopters and moved into firing position almost immediately.

The missile was fired from its erector-launcher, a wheeled device used to carry, erect the missile to its vertical firing position, and align it to the proper azimuth.

Tested at comparatively short range tonight, Pershing is being developed to replace the Army's operational Redstone missile.

Test objectives included further evaluation of the missile's inertial guidance system, aerobalistics, propulsion system and reheat components.

Missile operation was as planned and the warhead section im-

pacted in a pre-selected target area. Instrumentation transmitted data to ground stations on the functioning of components as the missile sped toward its target in the Atlantic Ocean.

Tracking flares were ejected from the missile's warhead sec-

tion to aid in downrange tracking.

The Martin Co. of Orlando, Fla., is prime contractor for the Pershing, under the technical supervision of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

A crew composed of personnel from the Martin Co. and representatives from the ABMA Test, Evaluation, and Firing Laboratory conducted the firing, one of a continuing series in the development program.

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Interservice Cooperation Is Praised

A unique inter-service missile training program is entering its fourth year here, with both Army and the Air Force officers agreeing that it has set new standards of cooperation.

The program involves the training of about 2,500 U. S. Air Force and North Atlantic Treaty Organization officers and men on the Jupiter ballistic missile. It began in 1958 and extends through 1964.

This Air Force training is being carried out at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School here under an agreement between the Air Force Training Command and Army Ordnance Training Command.

Day-to-day responsibilities for the complex multi-lingual program of instruction rests with Col. William J. Macpherson, commandant of the Missile School here, and Major Jerry Marro, commander of Detachment Five of the Air Training Command's Technical School which has headquarters at Wichita Falls, Texas.

A key figure in the program has been Maj. Ralph Barnard, who heads Field Training Detachment 11 of the Air Training Command. With faculty members of the Army school, he has developed new

mobile training techniques and equipment that will be moved overseas to European bases to facilitate on-the-job training and keep the various NATO Jupiter squadrons at full proficiency and strength.

Noting the three years of work on the Jupiter program, Col. Macpherson stated that "nothing but harmony and effective working relations have existed between the Air Force and Army personnel assigned to the Jupiter training project. We of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School consider it an outstanding example of the potential for closer inter-service cooperation in many fields of national defense."

The Army and Air Force Jupiter training program began in 1958 after the Jupiter missile, which was developed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at the huge Redstone Arsenal missile development center here, was assigned by the Department of Defense to the operational control of the Air Force.

Because the Army had already acquired and prepared all the facilities, equipment and experience needed for conduct of the Jupiter program, a joint agreement was reached to conduct training here.

The unusual program to date has involved the cooperation of the Strategic Air Command, U. S. Air Forces in Europe, Air Materiel Command, Air Research and Development Command and Air Space Systems Command.

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Nike Zeus Undergoes Another Test

Successful Firing Is at White Sands

The U. S. Army successfully test fired its Nike Zeus anti-missile Sept. 21 at White Sands Missile Range, N. M., conducting further evaluation of a high performance rocket motor in the missile's second stage.

All test objectives were met. Brig. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commander of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, said the motor, using an improved solid rocket fuel, increased the already extremely high speed of the Zeus missile.

The missile was controlled in flight to evaluate aerodynamics and thermodynamic reactions at the increased velocity.

Nike Zeus ground electronic equipment controlled the missile throughout the test.

The firing was another in the development test series being conducted under the technical supervision of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency at White Sands and at Pt. Mugu, Cal.

Western Electric Company is prime contractor for the system. Bell Telephone Laboratories is responsible for design and development. Douglas Aircraft Company builds the missile. Thiokol Chemical Corporation's Redstone Division makes the new second stage motor under subcontract to Douglas.

\$1.5 Million Nike Contract Awarded

The U. S. Army Sept. 21 announced award of a \$1.5 million dollar contract for further development of its Nike Hercules air defense missile system.

The award went to the Western Electric Company, system prime contractor. Work will be performed at the company's Winston Salem, N. C., plant.

Nike Hercules is a solid-fuel, surface-to-air guided missile designed to defend against high speed, enemy aircraft. It is already on site in the United States.

Nike Hercules is under the technical supervision of ARGMA.

MILLION DOLLAR PLUS CONTRACTS LET IN SEPTEMBER

U. S. Army contracting for weapons and equipment during September totaled \$403,503,977 in million-dollar plus contracts. Some of the purchases were for the Navy and Air Force requirements.

Army missile contracts under management of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command amounted to \$233,020,562, the largest single category. Ammunition orders ranked second, \$92,088,670 while purchases of clothing and textiles came third in dollar volume, \$29,421,356.

The other military orders included:

Defense construction, \$4,111,317; radar, \$4,710,292; drones, \$1,102,890; trailers, \$1,623,900; shoes, \$2,313,137; research aircraft, \$1,

017,076; medical research, \$1,484,000 gas masks, \$4,785,000; communications satellite, \$2,980,000, classified work, \$4,649,000.

Army engineers awarded \$15,190,000 for construction of SAF-URN launch facilities for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, at Cape Canaveral, Fla., and \$5,006,777 in civil works contracts.

The largest award, of \$171,000,000, went to the Western Electric Company of New York City and a group of sub-contractors for continuation of the Army's Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system.
