## Army Contracts \$220 Million for Pershing

### B'ham Ordnance To Administer This, AOMC Is Manager

The U. S. Army announced last week the award of contracts totaling approximately \$220,765,000 for continued development and production of its Pershing ballistic missile system.

Two of the contracts went to the Martin-Marietta Corporation, Orlando, Fla., prime contractor for the missile system on which development started in 1958.

These awards, approximately \$209,595,000 cover 1962 Fiscal Year business and include previously announced awards of contracts totalling approximately \$90,000,000.

One of the contracts, approximately \$128,726,000, is for services and production of the Pershing weapons system including the missile and related ground support equipment for delivery to Army combat units.

The other award, approximately \$80,869,000, funds continued development of the Pershing which is designed to replace the Army's operational Redstone, an American pioneer in missilery.

Work on both contracts will continue to be performed at the Martin plant near Orlando, Fla.

The third Pershing award announced today went to the Bendix Corporation, Eclipse Pioneer Division, Teterboro, N. J., for \$11,170,000. It is for Pershing guidance components and engineering services.

The contracts announced today bring to a total of approximately \$650,000,000 work the Army has contracted for the Pershing missile system to date.

### Contract Is Awarded To Western Electric

The U. S. Army Jan. 4 announced award of a \$12,376,800 contract funding continued development of an advanced radar for possible incorporation into its Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system, now in development.

Work on the Zeus Multi-Function Array Radar (ZMAR) began last June. The device is a phased array radar. A phased array scans electronically by beam switching eliminating the need for a heavy rotating antenna and other moving parts used in conventional radars.

Awarded to the Western Electric Company, Nike Zeus prime contractor, the contract includes funds for the fabrication and testing of hardware which will be accomplished principally by Sylva Electronics Products of Waltham, Mass.

Sharing in the award will be the Bell Telephone Laboratories at Whippany, N. J., responsible for Nike Zeus system design and development, and General Electric at Schenectady, N. Y., a system subcontractor along with Sylva.

The radar development is being carried on as part of the basic Nike Zeus system effort and as part of the Army's plan to incorporate advances in technology in the Nike Zeus system on a continuing basis.

The Army Ordnance Missile Command, is Army system manager for the Zeus program, the only missile defense system in advanced development in the Free World. The New York Ordnance District administers the contract.

## 'The Twist' Is Used to Prove Durability of Missiles, Men

"The Twist" is nothing new to Army missilemen; they have been devising methods to prevent similar gyrations in missiles for years. Like human dancers, missile components also shake more violently at different noise levels.

Engineers at the Army Ordnance Missile Command, are constantly looking for better ways and means of keeping vital parts of the missile stable during periods of increased gravity loading, either during ground transport or free flight.

Your body has a resonant frequency, a peak of response to vibration. If that certain frequency is reached and maintained, you can be literally shaken to pieces. It's the same with missiles.

Vibration can damage a missile while it's being transported on the ground as well as while the missile is moving under its

own power.

A missile component may react more violently to a low rate of vibration than to a high one.

Testing to determine what it can take is done in two major ways: either by vibrating the part at resonant frequencies or by using magnetic tape recordings to simulate the whole range of vibration. Most of the AOMC testing is done by the first method.

One of the AOMC test laboratories at Redstone Arsenal contains a variety of "shakers" to give missile components a rough ride. With the formal title of electrodynamic vibrator, these machines can produce a vibrating force from anywhere from five lbs. to 25,000 lbs. of force.

There are eleven shakers in the lab, varying in size from a table (See THE TWIST on Page 2)

### Business Goes on 'As Usual' As New Office Sites Are Occupied by Staff

Like a master chessman, Maj. Gen. August Schomburg began shifting several thousand personnel of the Army Ordnance Missile Command in the biggest inter-office move ever staged in Huntsville.

Most of the moving, part of an AOMC consolidation plan aimed at peak efficiency, will take place on weekends to keep work interruptions at a minimum.

The Consolidated Supply Division is performing the task.

A minimum of furniture will be moved. Telephone numbers remain undisturbed, except for key personnel. A temporary directory will be issued.

Biggest portion of the move will be the weekend of Jan. 13 and 14 and some 2,000 persons will arrive for work the following Monday morning in new buildings and offices.



CWO Francis J. Cape Canaveral, its flight record has clearly demonstrated its potential capabilities and reliability to deliver a highly destructive warhead on the desired target.

A two-stage, solid propellant ground mobile and air transportable ballistic guided missile, Pershing was designed for general support of the field Army. Its selective range makes it possible for an Army commander to destroy nearby or faraway targets.

Pershing can be transported over any type of terrain and can be launched quickly from unprepared sites.

The U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, is responsible for managing the development of the Pershing missile system.

model to rail-mounted machine. Most of the tests run from 10-15 hours in sub-zero temperatures for solid fuel rocket motors.

Since the missile components are mounted in steel supports like a cradle, the shaking machine is a figurative "hand that rocks the cradle." Most of the motion produced by the vibration machine doesn't move more than one inch but the gravity forces can range hundreds of times the normal gravity load.

AOMC scientists also evaluate the shock mounts for the missile in transit. Because each missile in the Army arsenal has its own dangerous vibrations, the shock mounts must be designed to muf-

file that particular vibration.

Vibration gets a continuing close look by Army scientists. It may not help them learn a new dance step but it is keeping Army missiles ready to fire when they reach the field after a long trip.

## EDITORIAL—

# The FSJC for 1962 Deserves Our Help

We've just been through another season of giving—a time that each year seems to bring out the best in us, when we realize all over again that bringing happiness to others is a tonic for our own spirits. And now, as the New Year begins, the Federal Service Joint Crusade gives us the opportunity to sustain that glow long after the Christmas ornaments have been put away and the tree has withered.

Three agencies of vital usefulness to the free world benefit from the FSJC which runs from now through April 30. They are Cooperative American Relief Everywhere, Inc. (CARE), Radio Free Europe and the American-Korean Foundation. By supporting them, each of us can—in President Kennedy's words—"voluntarily contribute to our nation's fight against the fear, poverty and hopefulness which are still the daily expectations of so much of humanity."

Let's look at the record of these agencies. CARE, a non-profit organization originally set up to help European victims of WWII, is now more than 15 years old. Today it has expanded its mission to a global scale, reaching needy peoples of 27 countries with gifts that range from food packages and school kits to agricultural equipment. CARE is a practical expression of American goodwill to the world.

As for Radio Free Europe, its influence on the peoples of countries behind the Iron Curtain is known to be enormous—it is estimated that more than 10 million radios in Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania are tuned in to RFE broadcasts which bring the voice of truth and hope to upwards of 80 million captives of Red imperialism.

The need for the continued work of the American-Korean Foundation is known to all of us who have served in South Korea during the war or its aftermath. Without its rehabilitation projects, technical assistance and diverse humanitarian activities the courageous Korean people could not have come as far as they have in healing the scars left by four years of savage fighting. To cite only one of many examples, there are more than 55,000 orphans in the country today, and the AKF is giving aid to 100 orphan homes.

Secretary of the Air Force Eugene M. Zukert, serving as FSJC National Campaign Chairman for the second year, has said that "One of the continuing challenges of our time is our responsibility to those in need overseas." 

her items used in connection with the Army missile program went with each person moved.

There is an average of a filing cabinet for each person and some 1,500 office appliances—typewriters, adding machines and calculators are being moved.

Some departments have already been moved in wholesale lots. The Civilian Personnel Office and Support Operations Sections moved to new locations.

They made up a portion of the 450 employees who will be shifted from former Headquarters building 4505. Most of the 4505 occupants will move into Bldg. 5250, which has been serving as Head-

quarters of the former Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

In a simultaneous shift, about 450 employees are coming into the former Headquarters building from building 5250 and building 4488. In addition, the 600 people who have been working in building 5250, are going to either buildings 4505 or 4488.

Building 4488, which previously housed the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, held some 300 people who are being relocated in the other two buildings.

The move started about two weeks ago and has been proceeding smoothly, according to Mack Jennings, moving coordinator for the new Command headquarters.

He said Gen. Schomburg and most of his staff began conduct-

ing the Headquarters operation from building 5250 Tuesday.

Hundreds of employees will remain in their previously assigned buildings, but move to different office spaces.

### Dependents Will Not Receive Support As 'Tourists' Overseas

WASHINGTON (ANS) — Dependents who departed from the United States on or after Nov. 27 to join their sponsors in Western Europe as "tourists" will not be authorized support from military facilities.

The Secretary of Defense suspended the authority contained in paragraph 5. 1 (3) of AR 55-46 which permits overseas commanders to provide housing, station allowance for dependents and return transportation to CONUS.

The suspension applies in Belgium, Denmark, France, Federal Republic of Germany, Greece, Italy, Luxemburg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Turkey and the United Kingdom. West Berlin is not included in the suspension.

Commanders both overseas and in the CONUS have been directed to disseminate this information to preclude undue hardship to military members through "tourist" travel.

### Army's Dependent Schools Administer Youth Fitness Test

Washington (AFPS) — A world-wide pilot study of 48,000 Army school children in grades four through 12 found 76 per cent successfully passing three tests which measured strength, flexibility and agility, the Pentagon said recently.

The tests were administered as part of a tri-service program to test and implement the President's School Youth Physical Fitness Program, which was developed by a council headed by "Bud" Wilson, football coach at the University of Oklahoma and consultant to the President on youth fitness.

In order to assist the President in urging schools throughout the nation to participate in the Physical Fitness Program, the Armed Forces were asked to undertake the pilot study to test the program. The Army was first to put the program in effect in its dependent school system and first to complete a study.

The President's program is aimed at identifying those pupils who are underdeveloped physically, to provide a minimum fifteen minutes of vigorous activity for all pupils daily, the use of valid fitness tests to determine individual physical abilities, and to evaluate progress.

## Classified Files, Materiel Receive Careful Handling

Despite the transfer of voluminous classified files as a result of the reorganization of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, no reports of careless handling have been received by the AOMSA Intelligence and Security Division.

Personnel of the Intelligence and Security Division have been monitoring the physical transfer of classified files during the reorganization period and will continue to do so until the movement has been completed.

"Movement coordinators have been urged to insure that adequate protection for classified material is provided during transfer," advises Colonel Robert M. Allgeier, AOMSA, Assistant for Intelligence, Operations, and Security. "Particular attention should be given to classified charts, drawings or hardware which are too large for movement in locked containers. Such material should be shrouded or otherwise concealed and accompanied by authorized personnel. Although many or all of the people doing the actual moving may have adequate security clearance for access to the material, they will not have the other essential requirement, the need to know."

Security monitoring of moves will continue. Anyone desiring advice or assistance in conjunc-

# Minus 50 Degree Missile Motor Test Is Success

Thiokol Chemical Corporation - Redstone Division last month successfully static fired at minus 50 degrees Fahrenheit (-50 F.) two large forty-inch diameter solid propellant motors that had been fully road tested and temperature cycled. The motors had been subjected repeatedly to temperature variations between minus fifty degrees Fahrenheit and one hundred thirty-five degrees Fahrenheit.

The motors used only flight type components including the and the nozzle. They were with a high energy Thiokol HC propellant. Burning time for the motors was in excess of thirty seconds and Thiokol spokesmen said both test firings met all objectives.

The motor was developed by Thiokol Chemical Corporation - Redstone Division under the Corporate Independent Research and Development Program Principles successfully demonstrated in the December tests can be applied to a wide range of missiles which require high performance powerplants that must operate under extreme temperature variations.



## Lincoln Did Draft Of His Gettysburg Address in Capital

Despite the popular belief that Abraham Lincoln composed the Gettysburg Address aboard the train from Washington to Gettysburg, he seems to have devoted considerable time and thought to the speech even before leaving the capital.

In fact, the first draft of the address — one of two Lincoln is known to have worked on — was done on paper "Executive Mansion" letterhead.

Sometime after the address was delivered, Lincoln was asked by various individuals to write out other long hand copies for publication and display. Three of these are still in existence.

The wartime President was given a somewhat subordinate role in the plans surrounding the dedication of the National Soldier's Cemetery at Gettysburg. While Lincoln had agreed to attend the ceremony on Nov. 19, 1863, "orator of the day" was Edward Everett, one of the fore-most speakers of his time.

Not until Nov. 2 was the President informed by letter that "it is the desire after the oration, you as Chief Executive of the nation, formally set apart these grounds to their sacred use by a few appropriate remarks."

Lincoln arrived at Gettysburg on Nov. 17, and that evening revised some of the passages in the first draft of the speech. The next day he wrote out the second draft—the one he actually used at the ceremony.

On the 19th, Lincoln rose to speak before thousands of spectators after Everett had completed his two-hour oration. Glancing only occasionally at his manuscript, Lincoln finished the speech almost before the crowd realized it.

The short, simple yet noble address, which contains only 267 words in 10 sentences, is considered one of the clearest, most eloquent compositions ever delivered by an American speaker.

### Army Develops Method Which Measures Rain

Washington (AFPS) — A group of Army scientists have developed a new electronic device that counts and measures raindrops automatically.

The device was developed to meet the technical requirements of the U. S. Army Signal Corps.

It measures raindrops in 13 sizes, ranging from drops less than one-hundredth of an inch wide to those more than an eighth of an inch in diameter. It can count as many as 10,000 drops a minute of each size.

Designed to be placed outdoors, in a drizzle or a downpour, the raindrop sizer and counter device collects information on all the raindrops that fall through an area about one-and-one-quarter in-

ches square.

The collected information is sorted out by electronic circuits and stored in a memory unit, which can be placed in a shelter some distance away.

Data gathered in the memory unit is recorded on punched tape and fed directly into a computer for analysis.

Knowing the size and number of raindrops in various situations is increasingly necessary. Weather researchers need the information to understand how rain forms and to perfect radar measurements of water particles in the atmosphere.

Safety engineers and aircraft designers must know the size and number of raindrops to determine the effects of rain on jet engines





## 15 Member Nations The Formation of NATO Has Helped Keep Peace

The countries of the Atlantic Community signed an alliance in Washington, D. C. on April 4, 1949, forming the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and pooling their resources for collective defense before aggression starts, in the hope and conviction that in this way they would preserve peace.

To safeguard their security, the member nations agreed that an attack against one of them shall be considered an attack against

them all.

The members also pledged to work together to increase their ability to defend themselves by self-help and mutual aid. They have no intentions of launching an attack upon anyone anywhere, at any time.

When the United States signed the treaty in 1949, it broke its tradition of peacetime isolation and joined in company with 11 other free nations: Great Britain, Canada, France, Belgium, The

Netherlands, Denmark, Portugal, Italy, Iceland, Luxemburg and Norway. Greece and Turkey became members of the alliance in 1952, and in 1955 the Republic of Germany joined.

The creation of the alliance did not violate any of the principles of the United Nations, whose constitution expressly provided for such defensive agreements among its members.

Nor did it mean that the United States was sacrificing any of its national sovereignty, as NATO is not a "superstate" and its members retain all their individual freedoms.

NATO was created to halt the piecemeal country-by-country subjugation of the Atlantic community by international communism. Since the 15 nations pooled their efforts in common defense, not one of them has surrendered any of its political independence or a square inch of territory to the threats or blandishments of the U. S. S. R.

This was accomplished primarily by the development, through the co-operative efforts of the Alliance, of sufficient armed strength to provide an effective deterrent to Communist ambitions and threats.

In 1949 when NATO began, the pattern of Soviet expansion was



## Nationwide Survey Of Fallout Shelters Organized by DOD

New York (AFPS) — The Department of Defense has initiated the first national fallout shelter survey.

Physical surveys of all buildings, mines, tunnels and any other structures that may be used as shelters against fallout for 50 or more people will be carried out by architect-engineer firms in

internal subversion coupled with the menace of intervention by external, that is by Soviet, armed force.

But by establishing armed forces of sufficient strength to negate the Soviet threat of force, the freedom of the 15 organization nations has been preserved.

all 50 states.

Steuart L. Pittman, Assistant Secretary of Defense for Civil Defense, is directing the program. He is also responsible for direct supervision of surveys placed with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Navy Bureau of Yards and Docks.

Survey teams will go to cities all over the country within a few weeks. By year's end all 700 contracts will have been awarded with participating survey teams carrying out the program's first phase.

Phase two will consist of marking acceptable shelters and determining the feasibility and estimated costs of modifying present facilities.

DOD officials believe enough shelters will be identified to protect 50 million people—one quarter of the population—from radioactive fallout.

# Rockets for Armament Of Helicopters Tested

## Firings at Redstone Begin Test Program

The Army has begun testing rocket armament as part of the overall helicopter armament program with successful ground firings of rockets from pods mounted on a turbine powered helicopter at Redstone Arsenal.

Starting the first rocket development program specifically for helicopter armament, Army Ordnance Missile Command test personnel fired the rockets from the HU1-B helicopter.

The aircraft armament program is under the overall management of the Army Transportation Corps. The Ordnance Weapons Command, Rock Island, Ill. has responsibility to produce the weapon package. AOMC is Ordnance Corps project director for the rocket weapon system.

The system undergoing tests uses two pods, one mounted on each side of the helicopter body. Each pod holds four rows of six modified Navy 2.75 inch folding fin aircraft rockets.

The rockets can be fired in pairs. The pilot would have 24 shots available.

Tests being conducted at Redstone are to determine the effect of rocket firing on the helicopter. Upon completion, the test team will move to Ft. Rucker, Ala., for flight tests of the new weapon.

An Army test pilot from the Army Transportation Materiel Command — which provided the helicopter to AOMC for the tests — will fly it and fire the rockets in the airborne development tests under the direction of the Transportation and Ordnance Corps development team.

The project is aimed at development of a helicopter-mounted area weapon to provide aid mobile, bat-

tlefield support for ground troops.

Development and fabrication of the pods was accomplished by AOMC Research and Development personnel. A simple and economical system, the pods that consist of modified Air Force F 86 D jet fighter rocket tubes operated from a single electrical firing system in the helicopter.

Fire control equipment is being developed by the Army's Frankford Arsenal and the General Electric Company under the direction of AOMC's Research and Development Directorate.

Other armament under consideration for rotary-wing aircraft includes anti-tank guided missiles, grenade launchers and machine guns being developed under Joint Transportation and Ordnance effort. Feasibility of such armaments has been demonstrated in successful firings.
