Lab Heads Are Named

R&D Directorate Has Talent From Former ARGMA, ABMA Labs

Laboratory directors for the reorganized Army Ordnance Missile Command in-house research and development effort were announced today.

Col. Raymond W. Burkett, Research and Development Directorate chief, named eight scientists to head the streamline lab setup that will direct its major effort toward development of future Army missiles.

Named as laboratory directors were: Delman E. Rowe, Electromagnetics; Holm Hinrichs, Structures and Mechanics; Frank W. James, Propulsion; W. C. Watson, Launch and Ancillary Equipment; Jess B. Huff, Guidance and Control; William P. Lloyd, Test and Evaluation; John P. Hallows, Jr., Research; and Robert E. Lavender, Advanced Systems.

All eight Lab directors live in Huntsville.

Rowe came to Redstone in 1960 as Director of ARGMA's Advanced Components and Techniques Lab. He is a graduate of Whittier College, Calif., and worked in the Radiation Lab of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology during World War II.

Hinrichs, a native of Germany, came to Redstone as a project engineer in 1951 and was appointed director of ABMA's Propulsion Systems Lab in 1960. He holds a degree in chemistry from Siena College in N. Y.

James holds a master's degree from Columbia University. He started here in 1940 as chief chemical engineer of Huntsville Arsenal. He was appointed director of the ARGMA Propulsion Lab in 1949.

Watson was a missile design engineer at Rock Island Arsenal before coming to Redstone in 1941. He holds a civil engineering degree from the University of Illinois.

Huff is one of the recipients of the Army's Research and Development Achievement Awards. He came to Redstone in 1951 and has worked on guidance systems for Redstone, Jupiter, and Pershing missiles. He holds a master's degree in physics from the University of Kentucky.

Lloyd came here in 1952 and was appointed director of ARGMA's Test and Evaluation Lab in 1955. (See LAB HEADS on Page 2)

Engineers Fight High Water Here

Inundation Threatens Patton Road Traffic

Engineers wrestle daily with nature on the ground to support the Army's tussle with missiles in the air here.

Yet Old Man Tennessee River and its tributaries still cause rainy-day headaches.

Patton Road, named for a Sergeant hero of the Chemical Corps instead of the more famous World War II General, threatened to be under water again last week.

Thousands of Arsenal workers can take an occasional wet road in the stride.

They scurry down the back way and get to their jobs of speeding U. S. missile efforts. Sometimes these backroads have to be sandbagged to assure business as usual in spite of high water.

With sharp pencils, engineers have designed one major raise

Patton Road and several minor modifications. Each change raised the road above the previous flood stage.

But the Huntsville Spring Branch bridge can't be raised, and the high cost of building a new one for the few times a higher span is needed, keeps Patton a (See ENGINEERS on Page 2)

Greenhut Co. Receives \$4 Million Contract To Build R&D Facility

A contract for just under \$4 million was awarded on Mar. 1 to the Greenhut Construction Company, Inc. of Pensacola, Fla., for construction of a new Research and Development facility at the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

The first step in building an added in-house capability for the eight R&D laboratories, the proposed building will house three labs and part of a fourth.

The Army District Engineer at Mobile, Ala., awarded the \$3,948,308.94 contract for constructing the consolidated Research and Development facility.

The facility will be built in an area east of Mills Road on Redstone Arsenal directly behind the new Computation Center now under construction on Martin Rd. Work is expected to get underway in two weeks.

The firm will build a three-story concrete and steel structure containing about 187,000 square feet of floor space and equipped with bridge frames, monorail, elevator, several large roll-up doors, a small (See CONTRACT on Page 2)


The move, which involves about 30 persons, is designed to speed intra-Arsenal mail delivery service to the AOMC complex.

U. S. Army's Nike Zeus anti-missile missile, fired and controlled from the Pacific missile range facility at Kwajalein Island in mid-Pacific, successfully intercepted an electronically simulated intercontinental ballistic missile in a test Monday night.

Brig. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Deputy Commanding General for Guided Missiles, AOMC, said the test was one of a series preparing for engagement on the Pacific Missile Range involving a Zeus test installation at Kwajalein and target nose cones launched by actual ICBM boosters.



AO1C MOHAWK was demonstrated Feb. 6 by Capt. Clifford E. Johnson of Ft. Rucker at the Redstone Arsenal Airstrip to an audience of military and civilian employees connected with the Army Ordnance Missile Command. Capt. Johnson gave a briefing about this reconnaissance plane, which has replaced the slower and less powerful L-19, before taking to the air to show the amaz-

ing power of this Army turbo-prop plane. The three Mohawk's made by Grumman are modified for aerial photography, for infrared which penetrates cloud and night cover during reconnaissance, and for communication. It is used as support for tactical ground troops such as Infantry and Armor. The demonstration was arranged by the AOMSA Aviation Section.





Grads Told Extra Zeus Men Needed

The Nike-Zeus anti-missile operates almost entirely by itself, but will require many highly trained men to keep it working around the clock.

Lt. William M. Reid, a project officer for Nike-Zeus, so advised 22 enlisted graduates of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School at a ceremony here on Friday, Mar. 2. Reid is assigned to the research and development division of the Missile Command.

"Nike-Zeus is almost entirely automatic," he said. However, technical people will be required in even greater numbers to keep this defense system working 24 hours a day—with little consideration for overtime or coffee breaks," he said. Reid is a 1960 graduate of Purdue University.

The graduates were completing courses in Nike mechanical repair and ballistic missile propulsion and structural repair.

Robert Mello, Civilian Personnel Director Named to National Post

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announced in Washington Mar. 6 the appointment of Robert F. Mello of Guntersville as Director of College Relations and Recruitment.

Mello has been Director of Civilian Personnel for the Army Ordnance Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal since AOMC was organized in 1958.

Maj. Gen. Francis J. McMorrow, Vice Commanding General of AOMC, named J. N. McConaha, Mello's deputy, to serve as AOMC's acting director of civilian personnel.

Gen. McMorrow, in announcing the change at the top level of personnel management at the Army Ordnance Missile Command, said:

"The Army's missile program depends on top quality people and Mr. Mello's efforts to get the best, in a large measure, have been responsible for the Army missile team at Redstone which enjoys a world-wide reputation."

Mello's new duties in Washington will place him in charge of recruiting for the entire Federal Civil Service, the nation's largest civilian employer with more

than two and one half million employees.

In his new key post, Mello will work with Civil Service Commission officials and other representatives of Federal agencies to improve techniques for attracting high quality applicants to the Federal service.

He will also seek to enhance the government's position as an employer among the nation's college placement offices and other placement officials. Mello also will have the responsibility for developing long-range recruiting programs

keyed to the government's needs. The post to which Mello will go later this month was established in 1958.

Mello achieved national recognition in personnel management circles for his highly successful efforts to recruit top quality personnel for the Army's missile programs beginning in 1956 when he joined the newly activated Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Redstone Arsenal as director of personnel.

In 1958 he became director of personnel for the Army Ordnance Missile Command and civilian personnel advisor to the AOMC commanding general.

Mello began his government service in 1942 with the Los Angeles Signal Depot where he served as chief of the civilian personnel branch and control officer.

After three years of military service, Mello returned to become assistant personnel officer at the Presidio of San Francisco. He left the personnel field in 1952 and became comptroller at Benicia Arsenal, Calif. Then, in 1956 he re-entered personnel work with his assignment to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Mello is a native Californian. He and Mrs. Mello have two children, a daughter, Melinda Sue, and a son, Robert William.

Missile Teachers Sought By School

Applications for employment by 50 experienced civilian instructors who can meet qualifications in electronics are being sought by the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School, it was announced today.

Col. William J. Macpherson, commandant, said the school needs to fill the 50 positions between now and August. The Civil Service positions are graded from GS-7 to 11 and pay from \$5,355 to \$7,550 annually.

Technical teaching experience is emphasized in the job requirements, he said, because some of the assignments call for the training of other instructors as well as students in electronics subjects. Platform manner and the ability to map out detailed programs of instruction in technical fields are

other prerequisites, he said. Several of the positions call for some scientific research and development experience with emphasis on serving as educational and missile equipment specialists in the Missile School's Training Research and Development Division which charts programs of instruction for new missile systems, Col. Macpherson said.

The new positions became available when the Missile School was authorized to convert 116 teaching positions previously filled under contract with missile manufacturers to Civil Service career assignments. To date 66 of the 116 openings have been filled, he said.

Gen. Stilwell Will Speak At Founders Day Dinner

Graduates from the United States Military Academy will hear Brig. Gen. Richard G. Stilwell during the annual Founders Day Banquet scheduled at the Squirrel Hill Officers Club on Mar. 15.

Gen. Stilwell is a 1938 graduate who was awarded his commission in the Corps of Engineers.

As a Lieutenant Colonel in 1943, Gen. Stilwell was a member of the 90th Infantry Division which trained in Texas and moved to England to participate in the Normandy invasion.

The Division fought through the Ardennes campaign. At its conclusion, Gen. Stilwell became G-3 for the XXII Corps. In August, 1945, he joined the G-3 Section of the Theater General Board formed from the 15th Army and under command of Gen. Patton to study the conduct of the war and draw lessons therefrom. He transferred to the Infantry in November.


He was subsequently appointed Assistant Military Advisor to the Secretary of State in the latter's role as U. S. Member of the Council of Foreign Ministers. Later he became Special Military Advisor to the U. S. Ambassador in Italy.

From 1949-1952, he held important posts in the Central Intelligence Agency.

In November, 1952, Gen. Stilwell assumed command of the 15th Infantry Regiment of the 3rd Division, leading it in combat in two Korean campaigns. He then became Senior Advisor, I Republic of Korea Army Corps for the balance of the Korean conflict.

He was a member of the Army War College faculty from 1953-1956 and organized the first National Strategy Seminar. He was also a member of the Advanced Study Group. In 1954, he was temporarily detached to serve as Chief of Staff of a Presidential Mission to the Far East.

In 1956, Gen. Stilwell was assigned to Supreme Headquarters,

Allied Powers Europe and held key posts including a detail to the President's Committee for the Study of Foreign Assistance programs.

He then went to the USMA in January 1959, where he now commands the United States Corps of Cadets.

A mechanical engineer who studied at Texas A and M, and at Schreiner College at Kerville, Tex., Capt. Hinesley—a reserve Major—has served in the Pacific and in

He began his career in 1941 as an enlisted man and was commissioned in 1943 as an Ordnance Officer detailed to the Coast Artillery.


His assignment at the Army Ordnance Missile Command has been as Claims Officer in the Staff Judge Advocate Office.





The Sports Car Buffs

As I indicated last week I am going to take quite a bit of space in covering the Mid-South Region, SCCA Five-States Rally which started from Memphis Saturday, Feb. 24, running through the night to wind up back there the next morning.

The Five-States is generally known as a Press-On-Regardless type of event. It has the distinction of being one of the toughest in the area on cars and drivers. Navigation relegates itself to staying on course with time and distance calculations the smallest. If you succeed in staying on the course, the calculations become necessary. I have yet to hear of anyone not getting lost.

Average speeds are high but with only one speed per section. Route instructions are brief, generally one page in paragraph form. These refer quite often to aerial navigation maps with the course lined in red. These maps are usually the downfall of most for they are very sketchy as far as roads are concerned.

He did it on the '67 VII Jaguar at that point and looked more like he had been taking a mud bath rather than running a rally.

Arriving back at headquarters it was discovered that there had been a number of cars who were told not to try and get through, that they would throw out the last

section of the event. This proved to be the case so the final positions were determined on the basis of the first four sections.

Space prohibits going into more detail. There were five cars from the north Alabama clubs represented. I feel that we did a pretty fair job of representing our clubs for when the final results were in we had placed cars third, Ray Moseling/Ron Darling (Porsche); sixth Jim Baker/A. Lynch (Covette); ninth Web Mayfield/Pat Patterson (Jaguar) and twelfth Pete Walden/Vick Baucom (MGA). The other car, a Pontiac of the Hardiman's had three flats on one section and lost so much time there they were relegated to a low position in the final standings.

The sixth, ninth, and twelfth place cars were running as a team and won this phase of the event against some five other three car units. I feel that we did rather well considering that four of our cars brought home more than one-third of the silver that was passed out at the banquet Sunday afternoon.

First place was taken by the Ewing/Smith Borgward out of Nashville. Our most hearty congratulations on a well deserved win.

Scientific Information Center Is Planned Here

Center Will Contain Space, Missile and Rocket Information

A Redstone Scientific Information Center, ultimately to hold vast accumulations of rocket, missile and space literature, is expected to begin operation in a few months.

The project is a joint effort of the Army Ordnance Missile Command and the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center.

Eventually the Center is expected to contain the largest collection of missile, rocket and space documentation in the Free World.

The Center will consolidate several technical libraries on the Arsenal which formerly supported the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. Those agencies were consolidated recently in an AOMC reorganization.

The new Center will be located for easy access by both AOMC and MSFC personnel. The director of the Center, not yet named, will be

employed by the Army. The Army will operate the facility.

An eight man board of directors, half from AOMC and half from MSFC, will give policy guidance to the Center director. The chairmanship of this board will be rotated each year between AOMC and MSFC.

James Norman an AOMC engineer, will be chairman of the first board. MSFC members are Dr. C. A. Lundquist, the vice chairman; Dr. R. F. Hoelker, V. C. Sorensen and a person yet to be named. Other AOMC representatives are James J. Fagan, Dr. Bernard Steverding and W. J. Millsap.

The idea for the Center was originated by the Joint AOMC-MSFC Graduate Study Steering Committee. Planning in the respective agencies was led by Dr. William W. Carter, AOMC, and Dr. Lundquist, MSFC.

During the summer of 1961, three nationally known consultants were called in to study Arsenal needs for a technical library and make recommendations. The

Center is expected to become a reality in 1962.

The Center will consist of a central repository plus branch libraries at various locations on the installation and perhaps at the University of Alabama Center in Huntsville.

A request has been made by AOMC to locate a branch of the Armed Services Technical Information Agency, run by the Air Force, at Redstone. This agency supports the armed services and other federal activities.

Some 500 current subscriptions to various technical publications will be increased to cover a broader technical scope. Certain technical areas will be covered in greater depth.

The Center will expedite the efforts of both AOMC and MSFC by having background information readily accessible and avoiding potential duplication of work that has been accomplished elsewhere in research and development operations.


Capt. Staggs, 26, is from Gadsden, Ala., a graduate of Jacksonville State College and heads the 510th Detachment (Hawk).





ARMY OKAYS TV IN LIBRARY AT MISSILE SCHOOL

Many modern parents try to keep their children from studying in front of the television set—but the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School is encouraging the habit.

The school's library has installed TV sets so students can dial for special shows and view them in private booths.

The programs come from a file of some 200 audio-visual lessons that show and tell how some of the nation's most powerful weapons are kept in constant combat readiness. They range from a two-hour study of astronaut launchings to a five-minute discourse on keeping dust out of missile parts. The school's mobile TV units recorded them at launching sites, factories and laboratories throughout the nation.

The shows are recorded on video tape in English and several foreign languages and are used every day to teach missile maintenance to students from all branches of the U. S. forces and 14 foreign



A People's Freedom Depends on Its Press

Freedom of the press is a Constitutional guarantee. Our Founding Fathers believed in the worth of an individual and the right of that individual to know what was going on.

The freedom of the press which we enjoy is a necessity to our economic and political freedom. Neither can exist without the other. Our democracy, as our forefathers saw it, is founded on liberty for all.

History tells us, however, that no nation, no people can afford to take freedom for granted. Wherever that has happened, the result has led to bondage. Someone has traced the pattern of human history in 10 steps:

1. From bondage to spiritual faith
2. From spiritual faith to courage
3. From courage to freedom
4. From freedom to some measure of physical abundance
5. From abundance to selfishness
6. From selfishness to complacency
7. From complacency to apathy
8. From apathy to fear
9. From fear to dependency
10. From dependency back to bondage.

Ours is the first form of modern government which has as one of its basic beliefs the right of an in-


dividual to be fully informed. Whose freedom is this freedom of the press? The peoples' — It is every man's to have — and no man's to give away. A free citizen in a free society, however, has obligations. James S. Pope, managing editor of the Louisville, Ky. Courier-Journal spells out what one of these obligations is.

"The primary obligation of a citizen in a free society is to help keep it free. And since this simply cannot be done out of ignorance, his first duty is to be informed—to understand clearly not only his nation's institutions, which are inherited, but also what arises out of them: the critical day-by-day process in all his governments, local, state and federal.

"If he neglects this safeguard for his heritage, his children or grandchildren may wake up in the sort of world children know in the world of communism today—a world in which public knowledge is a state monopoly."

Your newspaper has the right and yes the obligation, to bring you the news.

You as a free citizen have the right and, perhaps you will agree, the obligation to read the news—to know what is going on.




