Soldiers Will Spend 48 Hours In Fallout Shelter.

Redstone Arsenal is on the alert this week for its first large scale passive defense exercise which is to involve mass movement of personnel.

Exact time of the exercise was not to be announced so as to retain the element of surprise, but personnel were told that the alert would be sounded at any time during the period of September 17-21.

Col. Thomas W. Cooke, Commander of the Army Missile Support Command, said the exercise is putting into practice a plan for moving some 1,600 soldiers a distance of about seven miles into the Arsenal's "igloo area," where ammunition was once stored.

The ammunition bunkers—called "igloos"—are being considered as possible fallout shelter in the event of nuclear attack.

As part of the exercise, 50 soldiers—25 from the Army Missile Support Command and 25 from the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School—are to enter an igloo and occupy it for 48 hours. During this period, the men will subsist on survival rations and provide their own air supply through hand-operated blowers. Commander of the shelter during the 48 hour stay will be Second Lt. R. A. Kelly of the Troop Command, U. S. Army Missile Support Command.

Civilian Defense officials from throughout the area have been invited to observe the evacuation exercise.

The exercise will begin with Arsenal sirens scounding an alert—a steady blast of 3-5 minutes duration. Troops will move to their assigned areas and then to the igloo area by bus as the sirens sound an attack signal—a rising and falling blast for a period of about three minutes. All participating troops will receive familiarization training upon arrival at the igloo area.

Col. Cooke said no military dependents or civilians are involved in the exercise. Participants are troops living in barracks and air raid wardens and shelter commanders—already designated—who live in family housing on the Arsenal or in Redstone Park.

The 50 man test team who will spend two full days in the igloo will undergo physical examinations before they enter the 80 by 26-

Immunization Plans Halted

Plans have been halted for mass-administration of Sabin oral polio vaccine in Madison County. Personnel at Redstone Arsenal were to have been included in the county-wide program that was to have started October 7. About 126,000 people were to have been included.

The decision to call off the project was made Sunday by the Madison County Medical Society on the basis of a recommendation by The U. S. Public Health Service. The Federal agency asked a temporary halt to use of Type III vaccine for adults after several polio cases were reported among persons who had been administered the drug.

While calling off the mass program, the county medical group said that its decision "... does not imply a discontinuance by individual physicians or oral polio immunization ..."

There was no question involved in use of Types I and II of the Sabine vaccine for adults, nor in use of any of the vaccine for children. Decision to call off the Madison County mass immunization effort was based on the fact that without use of Type III vaccine, there cannot be the complete immunization of all age groups as was originally desired by the Madison County Medical Society.

COL. REGISTER IS NAMED TO NEW COMMAND POST

Col. William F. Register, Jr., has been named the Deputy Commander for the U. S. Army Missile Support Command.

Announcement of the appointment was made by Col. Thomas W. Cooke, Commander of the Support Command.

Col. Register returned to the United States in July, following an assignment as the senior Ordnance Advisor in the Military Advisory Assistance Group, to the Republic of China.

He received an ROTC commission at Georgia Tech in 1935 where he earned a bachelor of science degree in engineering chemistry. He has served on active duty since November, 1939, in the United States and the Pacific including

Goal Is 100 Per Cent Participation Here

More than 600 persons Monday heard Maj. Gen. Francis J. McMorrow urge United Givers Fund contributors to "follow the golden rule" in fulfilling this year's drive goal of almost \$500,000 for the Huntsville-Madison County area.

Speaking at Rocket Auditorium before a standing-room-only crowd, Gen. McMorrow emphasized that this is the time of year when Redstone Arsenal employes have the opportunity to "do unto others as we would have them do unto us."

The General's remarks highlighted this year's kickoff meeting of the annual Redstone Arsenal UGF campaign, for which he is general chairman.

Also on hand were representatives of the Huntsville-Madison County UGF, as well as children representing seven of the organization's 30 agencies.

Joe Moquin, general chairman of the Huntsville-Madison County campaign also spoke, stressing the number of persons who receive the benefits from contributions.

Other guests from Huntsville included Oscar Mason, president of the UGF; and Huntsville Mayor R. B. Searcy, a member of the UGF Executive Board.

Drive chairmen, monitors and solicitors attending the session greeted this year's kickoff with rounds of applause as campaign officials stressed the importance of this year's fair share goal—80 per cent of one day's pay. Facing campaign officials this year is an increased need of about \$50,000.

Moquin emphasized the growth of the United Givers Fund in Madison County which has added seven more agencies than last year. He cited this growth as the reason for the heightened goal.

The meeting opened when H. R. Lovers, Executive Chairman of the Redstone Arsenal campaign, introduced Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Wilmer R. Bottoms, who gave the invocation.

Hal Bronfin, executive secretary of the Huntsville-Madison County UGF, introduced the representatives of the agencies which included the Harris Home for Children; the Boys Club; the Council Day Nursery; the Girl Scouts; the Boy Scouts; the YMCA; and the Society (See UGF on Page 2)

Student Develops Electronic Yardstick On Radar Beams

New electronic yardsticks that count and measure radar beams have been developed at the Army Missile Command by a student from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Richard T. Troutner, who worked in the Electromagnetics Laboratory at the Missile Command during the summer, is a junior at MIT majoring in electrical engineering.

While working for the Missile Command he developed a device to measure radar pulse shifts and a second piece of equipment to count electrical impulses.

The energy in a radar wave travels like the waves in the ocean. When they strike the shore or the phased array antenna, the waves hit different points at different times.


The listening horns of the radar are like bathers standing on the shore, yelling each time the wave hits them. If the bathers stay in

the same spot it is easy to determine the direction of the wave by listening to the sequence of shouts as the breaker moves down the shore.

However, the listening frequency or intervals the radar horns hears the wave is unlike the shouts of bathers. This is because the frequency is constantly moving back and forth due to humidity radiation and or other factors. Where the wave was coming from or the location of the target could not be determined unless scientists knew the movement of the listening frequency and could correct for it.

Measuring and correcting for the constant shift is important in locating radar targets. Troutner, with preliminary diagrams provided by his supervisor, Lloyd Root, went to work with a handful of electronic equipment and developed an electronic tape mea-

A New Record

Wednesday of the past week was September's Bloodmobile Day for Redstone Arsenal. For An Accident-Free Year

With school now under way throughout the Army Missile Command's employment area, personnel are being reminded to use extreme caution when near school bus stops, when approaching a school bus or around housing areas where children are walking to catch their buses.

Post Regulation No. 1-306 Reads:

"Every person operating a motor vehicle within the limits of this installation upon approaching a bus, or any other motor vehicle transporting children to or from school, and while such bus or motor vehicle is stopped and engaged in taking or discharging such school children therefrom, shall bring such motor vehicle to a full stop and shall remain stopped until the school bus or other such vehicle shall have completed at that place the discharging or taking on of school children, and vehicle has resumed motion or until signalled by the driver to proceed."

for Crippled Children and Adults. In his remarks, Moquin pointed out that of the 42 million families residing in the United States, over half of that number are expected to be served in some way by the 34,550 services supported by the United Givers Fund.

Moquin noted that locally, the national averages would mean 17,000 families—or 68,000 individuals—would be aided in the immediate Huntsville-Madison County area.

Giving a detailed breakdown on the manpower involved in this year's campaign, Moquin noted that about 2,500 volunteers actively serve in UGF Fund raising in Madison County.

He also pointed out that the national average cost of conducting a United Fund campaign is about 5 per cent of the total goal. In Madison County, costs total only 2 per cent.

In closing, drive chairmen were introduced by Executive Chairman Lowers.

Throughout the campaign, drive officials are expected to stress that thousands of youngsters in this area develop their physical strength, resourcefulness and character through services provided by the UGF contributions.

UGF drive solicitors have been issued information brochures on the operation of the UGF and its agencies. Questions about the use of funds donated to the campaign should be directed to solicitors, officials point out.

gram, vaccine was to have been administered to all persons over six months of age. Dr. Otis F. Gay, Madison County Health Officer, said the Medical association hoped to provide 100 per cent coverage of the county. He said that Madison County set a record for immunization four years ago under a similar program but with use of Salk vaccine. He pointed out that there have been no cases of crippling polio here since the Salk immunizations.



GEN. GEORGE H. DECKER, Army Chief of Staff, was the principal speaker on the opening day of the Conference of the American Armies recently held at Ft. Amador, Canal Zone. Speaking to the 80 conferees from 19 American nations present, Gen. Decker said:

"You will recall that counterinsurgency was a primary subject of this conference last year. Nothing has transpired since that time to lessen the importance, nor can any change in this pattern be foreseen at this time.

"In response to communist acts of subversion and insurgency, the United States Army has greatly expanded its own capabilities in counterinsurgency as well as its capabilities for assisting the forces of other nations in counterinsurgency training."

foot structure. Qualified medical personnel will accompany them as will CBR (Chemical, Biological, Radiological) experts.

The concrete igloo is earth covered and has a concave ceiling 12 feet, nine inches high at its highest point. The interior will be illuminated and the men will be provided cots for sleeping.

There are more than 300 similar igloos on Redstone Arsenal. Although they are not blast proof in terms of thermonuclear devastation, they could be suitable fallout shelters with certain modifications.

Purpose of the 48-hour residence of the test team in the igloo is to test the structure's suitability as a survival shelter and to obtain data upon which to base subsequent decisions and recommendations on modification and possible use of the igloos for that purpose.

Men inside the igloo will be in telephone contact with AMSC Headquarters and will be able to summon aid if required.

Col. Cooke described the exercise as a "bare-boned" passive defense plan since the team will be testing an igloo with minimum facilities. Should the igloos be used as fallout shelters, they would be renovated and made more liveable.

In the event of an actual attack, the Arsenal's passive defense plan currently encompasses both evacuation and shelter.

EMERGENCY VEHICLE HAS RIGHT-OF-WAY

Motorists at Redstone Arsenal are reminded that when an emergency vehicle approaches from the front or rear, using its emergency equipment, all other vehicles are required to pull to the right side of the highway and stop.

An emergency vehicle at Redstone Arsenal is designated as an ambulance, fire apparatus, or Military Police vehicle. Post Regulation No. 1-308, which regulates duties of the motorists upon approach of an emergency vehicle, reads:

"When advised by siren, whistle, or bell of the approach of any emergency vehicle, motorists shall pull to the right-hand curb and stop, clear of any intersection, and remain in such position until the emergency vehicle has passed, except when otherwise directed."


Emergency equipment is used to further the safety of an emergency vehicle and the driving public. A breach of the stated regulation could result in serious injury or even death.



Major Research Is Going Full Blast on Roi Namur

ROI NAMUR ISLAND — The Army Missile Command is involved in a major research program going full blast on this island some 45 miles northwest of Kwajalein. Pacific home for the Army's Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system.

The program is TRADEX (Target Resolution and Discrimination Experiments) instrumentation radar, under the technical supervi-

sion of the Missile Command for the Advanced Research Projects Agency. The Missile Command directed design, development, fabrication and installation of the TRADEX radar for ARPA.

TRADEX has been designated as the primary radar for Project PRESS (Pacific Range Electromagnetic Signature Study), under whose auspices observations will be made of missiles fired over the Pacific Missile Range from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, almost 5,000 miles away, as targets for the Zeus test installation on Kwajalein, as well as other targets of opportunity. ARPA has assigned overall responsibility for scientific direction of Project PRESS to Lincoln Laboratory of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The Missile Command also provides logistic support to Project PRESS and provides technical liaison between Nike Zeus and PRESS. The Navy and Air Force also support the project logistically.

TRADEX is located on Roi Namur, a brief airplane flight from Kwajalein. Roi Namur actually is two islands connected by a causeway built by the Japanese prior to World War II.

On Roi Namur, surrounded by remnants of bitter fighting here during World War II, is a 35 foot high, windowless building 180 feet long, 160 feet wide. This is the home of TRADEX, a maze of elec-

(Continued From Page 1) sure that will work with large radar antenna and small electronic equipment.

The second invention produced by Troutner during his summer work has commercial as well as missile applications. The device is essentially an electronic counter that can tally electrical impulses with fewer components than on present counters.

This digital system performs counting operations that give information on missile performance. Troutner's counter is lighter and less complicated than electronic counters now in missiles.

In commercial use, the counter acts as an automatic starter for large motors such as those used in sawmill operations or in heavy duty industry moving jobs.

During the school season, Troutner is president of the Electrical Engineer Student-Faculty Committee at MIT. The committee eval-

uates and improves the electrical engineer curriculum at MIT, and deals with faculty-student relationships.

A native of Alabama, Troutner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest T. Troutner, Trinity, Ala. tronic equipment, interlaced with miles of pipe, wire and cables.

Atop the building is the parabolic antenna for TRADEX, a giant honey-combed dish 84 feet in diameter. From this dish signals are transmitted into the sky where they seek out missiles, and relay information back to Roi Namur where it is recorded for study.

Also located on Roi Namur are facilities from which small target rockets are launched as part of the Zeus testing. About 300 persons are working on Project PRESS, amid grim reminders of World War II, making studies which give scientists of today a glimpse of tomorrow.


Judge Advocate General's School at Charlottesville, Va.



"Prospect for America: the Rockefeller Panel Reports," (1961) presents enlightening studies which were the result of more than one hundred American citizens thinking and working together over a period of four years. Those citizens who participated in the project did so with the conviction that the United States has come to a crucial point in its history. Patrons

who missed this work when first published will find provocation statements such as "while strength alone will not guard or secure our future, strength is essential to assure that there will be a future to defend;" . . . "our society . . . demands ever more urgently not only the development of talent which is skilled and dedicated but the nature of free, reasoning, and responsible individuals." Part 4 of Report I deals with the Communist Threat in relation to U. S. foreign policy. Part 8 of Report II discusses the special case of NATO and Part 4 of Report 5 presents the Use and Misuse of Hu-

man Abilities as well as Better Use of the Talents of Women and Older Workers in the panel on The Pursuit of Excellence: Education and the Future of America. Other excellent information on American education may be found in John Gardner's "Can We Be Equal and Excellent Too."

On the lighter side of the literary menu this week are Alistair MacLean's "The Golden Rendezvous," a new novel of adventure and suspense; Ogden Nash's "New Nutcracker Suite and Other Innocent Verses;" Max Fenster's "I Couldn't Care Less," the portrait of a seventeen year old European girl who attempts to rise from the nightmare of her environment; Emma Bailey's "Sold to the Lady in the Green Hat," a humorous account of a country auction; Ellen

Douglas's "A Family's Affairs," winner of the Houghton Mifflin-Esquire Fellowship Award; Lefebure's "Murder with a Difference;" Peter Chambers "Murder is for Keeps;" and George Mandel's "The Wax Boom," described by Joseph Heller, author of "Catch-22," as exceptional in every significant way and which Heller compares to West's "Miss Lonelyhearts," and Albert Camus's "The Stranger."

Passive Defense Tests Set At Arsenal This Week

A passive defense measures test will be conducted at Redstone Arsenal next week, the first large scale exercise in this area involving the mass movement of personnel.

Col. Thomas W. Cooke, Commander of the Army Missile Support Command, said the exercise will put into practice a plan for moving some 1,600 soldiers a distance of about seven miles into the Arsenal's "igloo area," where ammunition was once stored.

The ammunition bunkers—called "igloos"—are being considered as possible fallout shelter in the event of nuclear attack.

Exact time of the exercise will not be announced to retain the element of surprise but it will be held this week.

As part of the exercise, 50 soldiers—25 from the Army Missile Support Command and 25 from the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School—will enter an igloo and occupy it for 48 hours. During this period, the men will subsist on survival rations and provide their own air supply through hand-operated blowers. Commander of the shelter during the 48 hour stay will be Second Lt. R. A. Kelly of the Troop Command, U. S. Army Missile Support Command.

Civilian Defense officials from throughout the area have been invited to observe the evacuation exercise.

The exercise will begin with Arsenal sirens sounding an alert—a steady blast of 3-5 minutes duration. Troops will move to their assigned areas and then to the igloo area by bus as the sirens sound an attack signal—a rising and falling blast for a period of about three minutes. All participating troops will receive familiarization training upon arrival at the igloo area.

Col. Cooke said no military de-

pendents or civilians will be involved in the exercise. Participants will be troops living in barracks and air raid wardens and shelter commanders—already designated—who live in family housing on the Arsenal or in Redstone Park.

The 50 man test team who will spend two full days in the igloo will undergo physical examinations before they enter the 80 by 26-foot structure. Qualified medical personnel will accompany them as will CBR (Chemical, Biological, Radiological) experts.

The concrete igloo is earth covered and has a concave ceiling 12 feet, nine inches high at its highest point. The interior will be illuminated and the men will be provided cots for sleeping.

There are more than 300 similar igloos on Redstone Arsenal. Although they are not blast proof in terms of thermonuclear devastation, they could be suitable fallout shelters with certain modifications.

Purpose of the 48-hour residence of the test team in the igloo is to test the structure's suitability as a survival shelter and to obtain data upon which to base subsequent decisions and recommendations on modification and possible use of the igloos for that purpose.

Men inside the igloo will be in telephone contact with AMSC Headquarters and will be able to summon aid if required.

Col Cooke described the exercise as a "bare-boned" passive defense plan since the team will be testing an igloo with minimum facilities. Should the igloos be used as fallout shelters, they would be renovated and made more livable.

In the event of an actual attack, the Arsenal's passive defense plan currently encompasses both evacuation and shelter.

The Judge Advocate Advises



LOST PROPERTY

Title 10, United States Code, Section 2732, as implemented by Army Regulations 25-100, prescribes the rules applicable to the administrative settlement of claims by civilian employees of the Department of Defense, the Department of the Army, or of the Army, and members of the Army, for damage or loss of property occasioned in transportation or storage pursuant to orders.

In order to recover for such loss or damage, the claimant must follow the rules and procedures of the applicable Army Regulations.

INSPECT ON DELIVERY

Household effects should be inspected carefully upon delivery and a notation of all loss and damage as a result of shipment should be made on the inventory. The inventory must be signed acknowledging the receipt and the condition of such goods.

As soon as it is discovered that property has been lost, damaged, or destroyed, the Transportation Division of the U. S. Army Missile Support Command, located in Building 3684 of Redstone Arsenal should be contacted. The personnel of the personal property section of this division will assist the shipper in determining the necessity for making a demand on the last known carrier.

DEMAND FOR REIMBURSEMENT

Demand for reimbursement for loss or damage to personal prop-

erty must be made, in writing, upon the last carrier known or believed to have handled the shipment. Such demand should be made within ninety (90) days of delivery. Failure to make this demand on the last known carrier within nine (9) months after delivery of household effects may reduce the amount of recovery allowable.

A demand on the carrier is not required when it appears conclusively that the damage or loss resulted from improper packaging, storage, or some other cause not within the control of the carrier, or when such demand is clearly impracticable.

DISCRETION OF TRANSPORTATION

However, this is a matter for the determination of the Transportation Officer and not discretionary

with each individual.

Should the Transportation Officer determine that a demand on the carrier is not required, he will prepare a written statement or report setting forth the reasons for his determination.

CLAIMANT SUBMITS STATEMENT

The claimant will then submit this statement or report along with his claim under AR 25-100. This will serve to justify the omission of a demand on the carrier.

When a demand on the carrier is made prior to the filing of a claim against the Government, the Transportation Division will supply the forms and assist the claimant in preparing his demand. The demand on the carrier will be made in writing on DA Form 1819 (Demand on Carrier for Damage to or Loss of Property).

A claim against the Government may be filed concurrently with or after the demand on the carrier; however, should an attempt be made to file a claim prior to such demand, the claims officer will assist and advise the claimant concerning such demand.

INSURED PROPERTY

If the property is insured, de-

mand must be made upon the insurer within the time limit provided by the policy and prior to or concurrently with filing a claim against the Government. All copies of demands and the originals of replies, as in the case of the demand on a carrier, should be submitted with the claim.

Anyone having his goods ship-

ped at Government expense should remember that the demand on the carrier or insurer is an essential element of a claim against the Government for damage or loss of household effects. Such demand should be made as soon as practicable, or recovery may be precluded or reduced in amount.
