

Boy Scouts Hold Redstone Rocket Roundup Saturday

Ten Boy Scouts received special recognition here Saturday for their roles in recruiting new members into the Scouting program.

Camper's tents were awarded to the 10 Scouts during the fifth Annual Boy Scout Rocket Roundup at Redstone Arsenal.

In addition, banners were awarded to 29 Scout units honoring successful membership drives. Leaders of the respective units were presented certificates signed by Col. Thomas W. Cooke, Commander, Army Missile Support Command.

The Scouts, numbering about 2,000, were greeted when they arrived at Redstone Arsenal Saturday by Brig. Gen. H. P. Persons, Deputy Commanding General, Air Defense Systems.

Attending the roundup were Boy Scouts and adult leaders of the Tennessee Valley Council of Boy Scouts of America.

Scouts and Scouters attended from each Council district and division. Scouts qualified to attend the special Roundup program by recruiting one or more new mem-

bers into Scouting.

While visiting here, the Boy Scouts saw a wide variety of technical exhibits presented by the Army Missile Command, the Army Missile Support Command, the Research and Development Directorate, the Ordnance Guided Missile School, and Marshall Space Flight Center.

In addition, Scouts saw a special survival display presented by the 3rd Operational Det., Co. B, 20th Special Forces Group (Airborne) of the Alabama National Guard.

The annual Boy Scout drive for new members was conducted this year from Sept. 1 through Nov. 24. Col. James O. Green, Chief, Technical Operations Office, AMSC, was project officer for the Boy Scout Roundup.

Nike Zeus Scores Hits In Two Successful Tests

A Nike Zeus anti-missile missile successfully intercepted an electronically simulated target over White Sands Missile Range Nov. 28, and the next day another was maneuvered outside the atmosphere with blasts of rocket exhaust over the Pacific Missile Range to score two highly successful tests.

In the first test, characteristics of an ICBM flight were simulated, recorded on magnetic tape and fed into the Zeus system's target intercept computer. The target simulated an ICBM in the terminal dive of its ballistic trajectory.

All three solid fuel rocket motors of the 48-foot long missile fired as planned during the test.

Col. I. O. Drewry, Nike Zeus project manager said test objec-


tives were achieved in both instances.

The first missile was fired from an underground launch cell. Both solid fuel rocket motors of its main propulsion system fired in rapid sequence. The relatively small third stage motor—used to maneuver the missile's warhead either within or outside the earth's atmosphere with controlled blasts of rocket exhaust—was activated on command from the missile's ground guidance center shortly before intercept.

No actual target vehicle was involved in the test.

The target intercept computer and other ground based elements of the Nike Zeus missile defense system functioned properly during the test engagement.

In the Pacific Missile Range test, the missile was launched from Pt. Mugu, Calif. The missile (See NIKE ZEUS on Page 3)

liquid propellant. Prime contractor for Lance is Chance Vought Corporation, a division of Ling-Temco-Vought, Dallas, Texas. The Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., is managing the program.

FIGHTING WEIGHT PERSHING FIRED

The Army trimmed its Pershing ballistic missile closer to fighting weight Nov. 27 at Cape Canaveral in a successful long range firing.

The missile weighed only slightly more than the planned operational version scheduled for use in the field and contained no separate instrumentation and range safety package. The destruct mechanism and other range telemetry equipment normally carried in tests in a separate section was included as part of the missile's guidance and control section.

Col. O. M. Hirsch, Pershing Project Manager at the Army Missile Command said that preliminary data available immediately after the firing indicated that all test objectives had been met as the nose cone plummeted into its pre-selected target area far down the Atlantic Missile Range.

Twenty-First Anniversary

Friday is the anniversary of the day that more than 100 planes and a number of midget submarines made a surprise attack on 86 ships of the U. S. Pacific Fleet at anchor in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Those who remember the events of Dec. 7, 1941, recall the day with a shudder.

An aggressor government struck U. S. territory with considerable force while its diplomats were making peaceful coexistent overtures in Washington.

The United States was stunned and found itself hurtled overnight, against its will, into active participation in the world's most farflung conflict.

The U. S. Navy suffered casualties of 2,117 officers and men killed, 960 missing and 876 wounded. The U. S. Army had 226 officers and men killed, 396 wounded.

Totally lost was the Battleship Arizona; Severely damaged were Battleships Oklahoma, Nevada, California, West Virginia, three destroyers, a mine layer and a target vessel.


Temporarily eliminated from the fleet were Battleships Pennsylvania, Maryland, Tennessee; Cruisers Helena, Honolulu, Raleigh; a seaplane tender, a repair vessel and a dry-dock.

The Navy lost 80 airplanes . . . the Army 97.

All were a vital part of U. S. defense forces and their loss was a crippling blow.

The long, slow recruiting and rebuilding of adequate fighting forces and the ultimate victories of World War II are now a part of World History.

But Pearl Harbor Day is a time to remember and resolve that never again will complacency and wishful thinking be permitted to threaten the security of our nation and the free world.

Cross Field Director at Redstone Arsenal. Hudgins noted that Red Cross headquarters in Birmingham has issued a state-wide appeal for 2,000 additional pints of blood during the holiday season.

The meeting was conducted by Thurman C. Burns, chairman of the Operation Stay Alive executive committee. Burns introduced the executive committee and the six participating committees.

The campaign has been divided into six areas, with a committee responsible in each. They are: vehicular traffic, pedestrian traffic, home medicine, home housekeeping, home fires and home electrical hazards. Agencies of the installation sponsoring the drive are: Army Missile Command, Army Missile Support Command, Ordnance Guided Missile School, Marshall Space Flight Center, Thiokol Chemical Corp. and Rohm & Haas Co.

The campaign actually got underway last week, with the distribution of various safety campaign materials. One of these was a contest entry blank distributed through the Committee on Home Fire Prevention. The contest seeks slogans, limericks or short verses pertaining to the prevention of fires in the home.

Winners will receive pen and pencil sets and cigarette lighters. All civilian and military employes may enter the contest. It closes on Dec. 14.

The Vehicular Safety and Pedestrian Safety committees have also begun their drive with distribution of literature. Three films on highway safety are to be shown throughout the installation during the campaign.

Other activities include a program under which Military Police will stop Arsenal motorists for no apparent reason. Rather than receiving reprimands, these motorists will be presented citations commending them for outstanding

examples of courteous driving. There also will be a program in which Arsenal employes will estimate the distance required for stopping an auto at various speeds.

Cards distributed by the Pedestrian Safety Committee contain numbers. Holders of cards whose numbers appear in the Daily Bulletin will win prizes by contacting the Safety Office, Bldg. 7101.

Additional activities of Operation Stay Alive are scheduled to begin within a week. All Redstone Arsenal personnel are urged to participate in the program and work toward a goal of a perfect safety record during the holiday period.

received and executed control commands at extremely high altitudes issued by ground guidance elements of the system installed near the launch site.

The missile's third stage rocket motor functioned as expected.

The Nike Zeus solid propellant motors are produced by Thiokol Chemical Co., in Huntsville. Western Electric Company is prime contractor for the system. Bell Telephone Laboratories has responsibility for system development. Douglas Aircraft has a sub-contract to build the missile.

fired from its mobile erecter launcher mounted on tracked vehicle in ground mobile mode. The Pershing is scheduled for mating for field operations with the Chinook helicopter being developed by the Vertol Division of the Boeing Co., Morton, Pa.

Brilliant flares were ejected from Pershing's nose cone after separation from the solid fuel second stage to aid in tracking the warhead after powered flight.

The Martin Co., Orlando, Fla., Division, is prime contractor for the Pershing, under the technical management of the Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal.

Test personnel from both organizations conducted last week's firing, one of the continuing development series for the Pershing missile.

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Lt. Col. Earl J. Dotson Heads New Army Missile Technical Division

The Army's Missile Technical Division has a new home and the Research and Development Directorate has gained a new capability. The transfer, which established the Missile Technical Division, provides a central point of contact for technical data available to all elements of the Army Missile Command and other related elements.

The new division is under the organizational structure of the R&D directorate. It assures that new developments and techniques receive as wide an application as possible in order to make use of the most up to date equipment and ideas, Col. R. W. Burkett, R&D Director, explains.

The division is under the direction of Lt. Col. Earl J. Dotson, Chief. It is set up to insure that information regarding technical "break-throughs" reaches all operational units which can apply and have an interest in the new developments.

Col. Burkett explains the function of the Missile Technical Division like this:

"A missile is a complicated piece of hardware. It requires support from all areas of technology.

"The responsibility of the Missile Technical Division is to assure that the best talent in the Army-industry team is available in support of any given job," Col. Burkett points out.

"All equipment and gear must be the very best and the very latest thing available," he explains. "Our job here with the Missile Technical Division is to make certain the equipment and techniques we use are the finest."

"If top-notch equipment or tech-

niques are not available, then it is the job of the Missile Technical Division to assist in determining such requirements," Col. Burkett notes.

"As the state of the art develops, we do our best to stay abreast of the developments," he explains.

"It is essential that we know at all times what other elements,

military and industrial, are doing in all areas of Command interest," Col. Burkett sums up the function.

The Missile Technical Division is made up of the former Signal office, Quartermaster office, and a portion of the Engineer office functions. It is designed to work as a single, operational organization.



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Command To Host Supply Support Conference Here

The Army Missile Command will be host to the first Army Materiel Command Interservice Supply Support Conference Dec. 10-11, Maj. Gen. F. J. McMorro, Commanding General of the Missile Command, announced this week.

Six of the seven Commodity Commands under the Materiel Command will be represented, as will the Department of the Army, the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics and the Defense Supply Agency, Materiel Interservice Directorate.


This is the first Interservice Supply Conference since the reorganization of the Army in August and will be used to outline objectives and principles of the joint Army-Navy-Air Force and Marine Corps agreement on interservice supply support.

Each command will present outlines of organizational functions and include methods used to implement the overall program of supply support.

Missile Command personnel plan to include methods and techniques used to achieve a \$6 million missile equipment and spare parts exchange from January through October, 1962. Use of the equipment was in support of missile research and development programs and in direct support of missile systems in the hands of fighting forces.

Coordinator for the conference is Costa E. (Gus) Apostolakis in the Interservice Supply Support Program, a part of the Directorate for Supply and Maintenance. The Director is Col. R. W. Van Wert.

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SOMETHING TO CROW ABOUT—The Army Missile Command's Directorate of Procurement and Production has something to crow about besides these pretty misses. For six of the past seven quarters the Directorate has led the Missile Command in suggestions by its members on how to improve its operations. So far this year 117 members have won \$4,795 in cash awards for their ideas—and saved the government nearly a third of a million dollars. Here Angie Thomason holds the Missile Command suggestion awards plaque won six times by the directorate, and Johnnie Evans offers a sheaf of suggestion blanks distributed to Command employees.

Traveling Plaque Stays In One Place Five Times

This is the story of a traveling plaque which hardly ever goes any place and a happy colonel who is glad it doesn't. It is also the story of 117 people who have pocketed \$4,795 this year—and needless to say, they're happy too. But the happiest of all is the Army which will save nearly a third of a million dollars this year because of the 117 people. The plaque is the suggestion award trophy which each quarter goes to the element of the Army Missile Command here which submits the most suggestions. It has been awarded seven times so far—and the Directorate of Procurement and Production has won it six. The happy colonel is E. V.

Lau, chief of the Directorate. Right now Col. Lau and his executive officer, Maj. J. R. Marsh, are working hard to promote another win this quarter and make it a clean sweep for the year. And, the 117 members of the Directorate who have seen their ideas adopted this year will probably be trying for more "free" cash. Why has this one Directorate won the plaque so often? Mostly by sheer numbers of suggestions. The first three months of the year, 190 people in the directorate wrote down their ideas. The second quarter 198 filled out suggestion blanks, and this last quarter, 150 ideas were submitted. Col. Lau thinks that somebody

this coming quarter can be another big-time winner like Dewey N. Lester, a P and P employe, who cashed a \$1,000 check for a suggestion concerning transponder and air leakage tests for the Nike Hercules Missile. It was estimated that Lester's idea saved the Army \$190,000 the first year. Frank Holmes, chairman of the Army Missile Support Command Incentive Awards Committee, says about 25 percent of all suggestions result in a reward for their authors.

Maj. Marsh says Procurement and Production works hard to drum up money saving and money making—suggestions. To stay on top, the Directorate has to beat out the Directorates of Supply and Maintenance, Research and Development, Missile Intelligence, and all the project and commodity offices as well as the Missile Command staff offices.

"We do our own advertising," he said. Ben Humphrey, a graphics specialist, shows off some of these "ads," such as three dimensional poster and signs to be posted on the inside of elevator doors because "everyone looks to the front of an elevator."

"Some of our suggestions," laughs Maj. Marsh "are oddballs. Something like parking cars on the third floor of this building (4488) because the parking lot is so crowded.

"But, Marsh adds, "We're happy to get all suggestions because as long as the law of percentage holds, the more suggestions we get means the more that will be adopted—and the more money that will be distributed to our people."

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
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Golf

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

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

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

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Structure Seminar Scheduled Today
