

Maj. Gen. Britton To Speak Here On Armed Forces Day

Major General Frank H. Britton, Director of Research and Development, U. S. Army Materiel Command, will be guest speaker at Huntsville's Armed Forces Day Banquet. The annual event will be held Friday evening, May 17, at the Holiday Inn Motel to kick off the City's observance of Armed Forces Day.

General Britton, a veteran of both the European and Pacific Theatres of Operations during World War II, will speak to more than 250 local civic leaders and military and civilian personnel of Redstone Arsenal. The Shreveport, La., native will view Huntsville's Armed Forces Day parade with other city and area military officials from the downtown reviewing stand Saturday.



Project Managers Are Success

The "satisfactory introduction" of the project manager system in the U. S. Army Materiel Command was singled out by Lt. Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., Commanding General, Army Materiel Command, at a recent press conference in the Pentagon.

He told the nation's top reporters, "I took complete responsibility for the Army materiel function last Aug. 1. This was about nine months ahead of schedule, and was a complete assumption of authority and responsibility at that time.

"We have introduced our system of project managers. They are operating, and I will say that this system of vertical management has proven very satisfactory from my standpoint. In my operations I have had no serious problems. I do have a responsive and authoritative group."

The U. S. Army Materiel Command consists of Headquarters, at Washington, D. C., seven major subordinate commands, including (See MANAGERS on Page 3)

Savings Bond Participation Goal Here Is 90 Per Cent

A WHOLE HOST of unit awards and individual citations await the outcome of the 1963 Freedom Bond Drive now underway on the Arsenal.

The drive was launched with a rousing send off at the Rocket Auditorium last Wednesday.

Brig. Gen. H. P. Persons, Deputy Commanding General, Air Defense Systems, delivered the keynote speech and called on the key workers in attendance to exert every effort to reach the goal of 90 per cent participation among all Arsenal personnel.

Should this goal be attained, Redstone will be entitled to fly the coveted U. S. Treasury Department Maintenance Flag. It would also earn the Secretary of the Army award.

THE INDIVIDUAL key workers will be working for the Commander's Savings Bond citation, which will be awarded to each of the workers who attain a 65 per cent rate of participation within their unit.

The Ordnance Guided Missile

Each week this month a \$25 U. S. Freedom Bond will be awarded to a soldier and a civilian by the Civilian Welfare Fund Council and the Central Post Fund Council for the best U. S. Freedom Bond slogan sent to the chairman of the Savings Bond Committee, Lt. Col. D. A. Marcelle, Finance and Accounting Officer, Bldg. 8527. The slogans will be used on the individual earnings record cards.

School and the Missile Support Command civilian employees started the campaign with the highest organizational rates of participation. OGMS civilians had a 72 per cent rate, one per cent higher than those in the Support Command.

Procurement and Production had the highest rating among Missile Command organizations with 60 per cent. Headquarters units had 58 per cent, Supply and Maintenance (See BONDS on Page 3)

Heavy Workload Predicted

Lt. Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., the Commanding General of the U. S. Army Materiel Command, predicts a sizeable increase in workload will call for increased efficiency. He told this to reporters recently in an interview at the Pentagon.

Gen. Besson said, "I have a 26 per cent increase in major procurement and a 14 per cent increase in the research and development dollars that I am going to spend next year."

He added, "Frankly, I am concerned about the future because these are increased workloads. Furthermore, we are supposed to handle these increased workloads with a degree of sophistication. It is going to call for an all-out effort and a maximum utilization of our resources in order to be able to do it."

Army Awards Cost Plus Incentive Fee Contract

The Army has announced the award of a \$2,850,000 cost plus incentive fee contract to Hughes Aircraft Company, Culver City, California, for research and development of a new missile system designed for use by the combat infantryman.

The new heavy assault weapon known as TOW (Tube launched Optically tracked Wire guided missile), will be developed for use against heavily armored tanks and similar targets. As envisioned in its definition period, TOW normally will be carried by light vehicles such as tracked carriers and trucks. It also can be transported by combat infantrymen.

The TOW contract announced is on a yearly basis. It is among the first Army contracts to use incentive contracting provisions for the development of the weapon system with the incentive fee based on the contractor meeting targets in the areas of performance, cost and time.

The TOW project is under the direction of the Anti-Tank and Aircraft Weapon Commodity Manager at the U. S. Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Ala.

The TOW missile system, as envisioned in system definition, will be similar to other anti-tank missile systems, however, it will

use somewhat different guidance principles.

The missile is optically tracked and automatically guided in flight

by commands transmitted by means of a two-wire link between the gunner and the missile.

Feasibility studies on the new system began in January, 1962. Hughes Aircraft was successful competitor in the feasibility concept competition. The firm was awarded a contract for further system definition in August, 1962, and was awarded the development contract in January, 1963.

His awards include the Legion of Merit and the Army Commendation Ribbon with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

"It is not necessary to be anti-American to be pro-Canadian."

Capt. Lester N. Bydal, Canadian Liaison Officer at Redstone Arsenal, thus summarized the results of the recent Dominion elections in a talk before the Huntsville Kiwanis Club last week.

He and Canadian Warrant Officer Glenn Schleihauf, a member of the U. S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School, were guests of the civic club during a special observance of Canada-U.S. Good Will Week.


Capt. Bydal emphasized that Canadian voters paid little attention to efforts to inject anti-Americanism into the recent voting that resulted in the selection of a new Canadian Prime Minister, Lester Pearson.

Pointing out that Canada is the

best customer of the United States for goods of all kinds, he said the Dominion is concentrating on regaining control of many of its industries and natural resources from American-owned firms.

He said closer cooperation is called for by the two neighbors on the North American continent and cited the St. Lawrence Seaway and the Columbia River hydro-electric project as examples.

ance stood at 54 per cent and Research and Development had 43 per cent. The Nike Zeus Project Office has a participation rate of 43 per cent.

MILITARY PERSONNEL of the Missile Command and Missile Support Command have a combined total of 52 per cent participation while those assigned to OAMS have a 54 per cent.

In calling on the key workers to sell the payroll deduction program to all Redstone personnel, Gen. Persons said, "The purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds stimulates good citizenship.

"The widespread ownership," he added, "helps to distribute the national debt to the local level."

The 1963 Freedom Bond campaign will continue through the end of June.



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
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Disassembly Makes Spare Parts For Missiles

WHAT DOES the Army do to disassemble its firecrackers when they become outmoded?

Like the oriental reputation for saving odds and ends of this and that, the Army uses the same principle.

Miscellaneous items from missiles and missiles systems like Redstone, Corporal, and the elements of the Jupiter still under Army management, are channelled into areas where they can be used.

CANNIBALIZATION of equipment becoming excess through inactivation of a tactical unit provides repair parts and other support for similar units still in active status—thereby saving taxpayer dollars.

The management is handled by a Commodity Manager of the Army Missile Command. Maj. Charles Birdsall, Lt. Frank Pizzano, and

Prince Danley are old hands who have helped guide the Redstone,

Corporal, and Jupiter programs through development, fielding and now phase-out.

The men were inherited with the systems—Danley with Jupiter in its first stages of development; Maj. Birdsall with the Redstone, and Lt. Pizzano with the Corporal.

MAJ. BIRDSALL, who has been chief of the office twice, began his missile career as a Nike man in Germany where both he and his wife were stationed. He was with a Nike battalion and she was assigned at an Army hospital in Muenchweiller. Now, she is one of the Army nurses at the U. S. Army Hospital at Redstone.

Missileman Birdsall was assigned to the Redstone system when he came here in 1960.

DANLEY WAS IN the training section of Manpower in the Office of the Chief of Ordnance when a training management man was needed at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. He and his family transferred to Redstone Arsenal

and Huntsville in 1958. His daughter, Judy, is a sophomore at Florence State College. The family lives in Lakewood.

The Jupiter program was in the early stages of development and all stops were out on a crash program. In Detroit the government-owned plant where Chrysler, under contract, was building the missile was going full tilt.

Even after the Secretary of Defense ruled that Jupiter was a long-range missile that should be controlled by the Air Force, the Army wasn't out of the Jupiter business.

THERE WERE MEN to be trained. All phases of handling, building and maintenance education and contract obligations were still Army responsibility. The contracts are still not completely dissolved—but nearly.

About the only common denominator in phase-out of missiles systems with different support concepts is liaison work—liaison between supply and maintenance and production and procurement activ-



development program, or another system. This concept is aimed at





The Sheridan-Shillelagh is a weapon system featuring an armored vehicle of improved armament utilizing a guided missile for effectiveness against armor at extended ranges.

Development of the Shillelagh was previously directly under the technical supervision of the Army Missile Command.

The vehicle portion of the system is the General Sheridan tank, and will be under the technical supervision of a Project Engineering Division located at Detroit Arsenal, Michigan.

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

Two Scientists Tell Students About Technological World

GADSDEN, Ala. — Two Army Missile Command scientists Wednesday gave Carver High School students and faculty members a challenge of self-development and existence in a technological world. The high ranking missilemen presented awards to Science Fair winners at the school.

Dr. David C. Sayles and Claud E. Martin presented the awards to winners in the physical and biological sciences and mathematics divisions before an assembly of nearly one thousand students and faculty.

Sayles, deputy chief, Propulsion Systems Engineering Branch of the Propulsion Laboratory, Directorate of Research and Development, told the assembly that students and schools must adopt new educational innovations to meet the need for increased scientific training.

"Schools must adopt such educational innovations as streamlined courses, inspired teaching, television, and scholarship programs for less financially-able students," Sayles said.

"Even after a scientist is trained, which means increased likelihood for success, it is no guarantee of success," he said.

Martin, a physical scientist with the Technical Information System, Defense Documentation Center at Redstone Arsenal, advised

students in the assembly to adopt a positive state of mind and press toward realizing early goals in education and planned careers.


"The most compelling reason to me for recommending a career in science is the satisfaction that one gets when he contributes information and knowledge that helps man kind progress," Martin said.

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

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

Missile School Reorganized To Conform To CONARC Pattern; Gets New Asst.

The management structure of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School was reorganized last week to conform with an overall pattern established by the Continental Army Command for 28 service schools under its jurisdiction.


Col. William J. Macpherson, commandant, said the reorganization consolidates staff and operating functions of the school and involves no reduction of civilian and military personnel.

He listed the principal changes as: consolidation of the former Department of Administration and Services into the existing Office of Logistics for more functional supply and maintenance operations; consolidation of the former Department of Training Research and Development with the Department of Individual Training; and creation within the latter department of a new Academic Operations Division.

He also announced that a new Assistant Commandant will report to the school next month. He is Col. George H. McBride, who formerly served at the Missile School and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. He is currently complet-

ing a course at the Air University in Montgomery. Under the new organization, Col. McBride will be responsible for supervising the training of individual students as well as missile maintenance units.

The Commandant's immediate staff will consist of eleven individuals, he said. They will include, in addition to Col. McBride, Lt. Col. Robert A. Robinson Jr., Executive Officer; Michael J. Deegan, Comptroller; Dr. Charles M. Hersch, Executive Assistant for Education; Lt. Col. Mildred M. Ferguson, Secretary; Maj. Verne C. Wolfe, chief of Operations; Lt. Col. Robert C. Leech, chief of Logistics; Lt. Col. Ward T. Gilbert, Director of Individual Training; Maj. Bruce E. Dairling, commander of School Troop Command; Maj. James M. MacDonnell, commander of unit Training Command; and Reavis O'Neal Jr., chief of Information.
