# Passive Defense Exercise Planned For July

## Netherlands Officers Are Here Today

Three general officers of the Netherlands Army will continue their visit to the Army Missile Command today.

They arrived in Huntsville Tuesday night. Today they will be welcomed by Maj. Gen. F. J. McMorrow, Commanding General.

The general officers making up the group are Maj. Gen. H. Y. van der Giessen, Inspector of Medical Service, Netherlands Army and Air Force; Brig. Gen. T. De Ruig, Inspector of Signal; and Brig. Gen. W. M. Berkhout, Inspector of Transportation. They will be accompanied by Maj. Vernon Curd, U. S. Army tour director.

This morning, the group will receive a general orientation on the Army Missile Command. This afternoon they will visit facilities at the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

## MISSILE EXPERTS WIND UP MEETING

More than 200 missile experts from throughout the Department of Defense and industry Thursday ended a three-day classified Engineering Concept Review of the Army's new Lance missile system.

Highlighting activities during the conference was a demonstration of mockup equipment, illustrating how the weapon system is expected to operate.

It was the first time full-scale operational mockups of all the components of a weapon system have been available at the Army Missile Command for demonstration and inspection at the time of the Engineering Concept Review.

Presenting the demonstration were soldiers from the Army Artillery Board, Ft. Sill, Okla.

Missile experts saw a mockup missile hoisted off its tracked carrier and placed into simulated (See MISSILE on Page 3)

## Civil Defense Experts Plan 'Chez Pup'

The largest passive defense exercise ever conducted in North Alabama is being planned for July by civil defense experts at Redstone Arsenal.

Known as Exercise "Chez-Pup," (pronounced "shape-up"), the mobility maneuver is described as the most realistic arsenal-wide emergency exercise ever conducted at the home of the Army's missiles.

Chez-Pup plans call for more than 20,000 personnel at Redstone Arsenal to leave their offices and evacuate the giant installation. They will follow assigned evacuation routes.

Huntsville and Madison County Civil Defense organizations will coordinate participation of the local civilian population during the Redstone Arsenal exercise.

The general purpose of Exercise Chez-Pup will be to test the effectiveness of Redstone Arsenal's passive defense plans.

The exercise itself will begin with a meeting to be attended by (See PASSIVE on Page 3)

## Pershing Arrives At Ft. Sherman For Tropic Tests

The U. S. Army Thursday said an inert test version of its Pershing ballistic missile and a full set of tactical ground support equipment has arrived at Ft. Sherman, Panama Canal Zone.

The dummy missile and its equipment will be subjected to a series of tropical tests to further prove out the system's capability to operate in virtually any weather condition or over rugged terrain.

The environmental tests are being directed by Col. O. M. Hirsch, Pershing Project Manager at the Army Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama.

## Israelis To Study Hawk

Two members of the Israeli Embassy's military staff in Washington will arrive at the U. S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School here tomorrow to work out administrative details for the training of the first Israeli Hawk Support Detachment.

Col. William J. Macpherson, OGMS commandant, identified the visitors as Lt. Col. Dan Kennyt and Maj. Arie Gur.

The first students from Israel—the 16th foreign nation to be represented at the Missile School—are expected to arrive in July to begin training under the terms of a special contract by which the Israeli government purchased rights to the air defense and anti-tactical missile weapon from the U. S.

Israel is the second nation not directly allied with the U. S. to make a special deal for use of the weapon developed by the U. S. Army and adopted as a standard

weapon by the U. S. Marine Corps and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and Asiatic nations. Sweden negotiated a similar contract in 1960 and sent her first Hawk unit here for training that was concluded last August.

representatives of each primary organization. They will be briefed on a simulated build-up of world tensions.

Following the initial meeting, the organization representatives will receive periodic notification of simulated increasingly serious conditions.

At given points, various increasing readiness postures will be declared.

During the build-up period, the emergency operating force representatives of each primary organization will go to an assigned emergency operating site where they will sign a roster and return to work.

At the height of tension, civil defense experts will declare a condition of readiness which requires evacuation of the installation.

When the warning signals are sounded, Redstone Arsenal will be evacuated. The exercise will officially end following the evacuation of the arsenal.

The majority of Redstone Arsenal personnel will receive their first real knowledge of the exercise when sirens wail warnings sometime during the third week of July.

During the tests, communication warning nets and signals will be tested to assure sirens and horn signals are clearly heard in

remote areas of Redstone Arsenal.

Arsenal units taking part in the exercise will include all Army Missile Command organizations, the Army Missile Support Command, Army Ordnance Guided Missile School, Marshall Space Flight Center, and some contractor personnel.

Individual contractor firms located on Redstone Arsenal will be invited to participate in Exercise Chez-Pup. It will be left up to the individual firm to determine if their personnel will take part.

Officials directing the civil defense exercise, point out that traffic coming into Redstone Arsenal during the evacuation will not be affected by the heavy flow of out-bound vehicles.

During the exercise, fallout shelters located on Redstone Arsenal will be tested on a limited basis. Emergency operating sites will be located in fallout shelters.

Other objectives of Exercise Chez-Pup are to test emergency security measures and emergency communication procedures.

Two other Missile Command scientists, Vernon A. Nieberlein and Bernard J. Alley were nominated for the national R&D awards.

McCorkle is widely known in the technical field as the principal inventor of a new simplified missile guidance technique called the Directional Control Automatic Meteorological Compensation System (DC-AUTOMET).

The AUTOMET portion of the system was proven in "in-house" research programs carried out by the Missile Command during the past several years.

The guidance technique has been adopted for use in the Army's new Lance surface-to-surface missile system.

In addition to AUTOMET, McCorkle is the inventor or co-inventor of several free-rocket accuracy improvement techniques, including the Prespin Automatic Dynamic Alignment System (PADDA) and the prespinning technique used on the Littlejohn mis-

sile. The scientist has been associated for the past 10 years with research analysis and design in missile systems both in universities and at the Army Missile Command.

McCorkle is a graduate of the University of Richmond, Va., and the University of Tennessee, where he received his Ph.D. in 1956. Both degrees are in physics.

In his nomination for the national R&D award, Nieberlein, of the Physical Science Laboratory, was cited for his work in devising a means of vapor plating the blast tube in the hot gas system of the Nike Zeus based on the reduction of tungsten hexafluoride with hydrogen.

Nieberlein is a graduate of the University of Dayton, Ohio, and has done graduate work at the University of Alabama in mathematics and chemistry.

Alley, of the Propulsion Laboratory, was cited for his nomination for the award for his work on X-ray fluorescence analysis of propellants.

Alley received his Bachelor of Science degree from Citadel, Charleston, S. C., and his Master of Arts Degree in chemistry from the University of North Carolina.

The annual Army R&D achievement awards are designed to recognize creative, analytical, advisory and administrative scientific capabilities within the Army research and development in-house laboratories.

The awards program was initiated in 1961 by former Chief of Research and Development, Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau.





Lt. Col. R. A. Robinson Jr., OGM Executive Officer, presided at the ceremony held in the Post Theater. The 55th Army Band played national anthems of the countries represented by the graduates.

## THIRD ARMY SHOOTERS READY THEMSELVES FOR CAMP PERRY

Results of the U. S. Army's test of marksmanship skills conducted June 5-15 at Ft. Benning, Ga., were summarized this week by Col. William J. Macpherson, commandant of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

During the rifle and pistol competition, many standing records fell. All team firing was dominated by Third and Fourth Armies and U. S. Army Pacific.

In the team matches, the Third U. S. Army started off by shoot-

ing past all other major commands with an 884-43V score out of a possible 900-180V. The score was tallied in the Short Range Team Match in defense of the title won last year by the Third Army team.

USARPAC came back in the Long Range Team event to outshoot Third Army for the Long Range crown. Their score was 590-85V out of a 610-120V possible.

Coming on strong again in the Rifle Team Championship match, the USARPAC team blazed a 1475-138V tally out of a 1500-300V possible. This gave them first place and set a new record of 7 V's. A V is scored when the shot strikes the target within the V-ring inside the Bullseye.

Third Army closed the rifle competition by winning the coveted Infantry Trophy. Their score was 1,144.

The Infantry Trophy Match is not fired on bullseye targets, therefore no V's are counted. Teams of six riflemen fire the course on silhouette-type targets from ranges of 600, 500, 300 and 200 yards.

In one team event, Sgt. William Stallings firing for Third Army, rolled up a score of 396-57V against a possible 400-70V. This score was fired from 600 yards. Over 400 championship shooters fired in this match.

The All-Army Matches are a prelude to the World Series of marksmanship, the National Matches, which will be fired in August at Camp Perry, Ohio.

During the nationals, the Army shooters will be pitted against the best rifle and pistol shooters from all over the nation including all branches of the Armed Forces, civilians, and police units.
