Commanding General Dies

West Point Burial Rites Set Today

Maj. Gen. Francis J. McMorrow, first commanding general of the U. S. Army Missile Command, was buried this morning at the U. S. Military Academy with the full military honors the Army accords its distinguished soldiers.

The sad notes of "Taps" echoing across the plain at West Point closed his Army career which had begun there in the Long Grey Line more than 30 years ago.

Lt. Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., Commanding General of the Army Materiel Command; Lt. Gen. August Schomburg, CG of the Supply and Maintenance Command, and a host of other friends were present at the ceremony to render a last salute.

MESSAGES ARRIVE

At Redstone Arsenal meantime, messages of sympathy continued to arrive from the General's professional colleagues throughout the world.

Yesterday hundreds of people had attended a Solemn Requiem Mass in the Redstone Arsenal Post Chapel. On Monday hundreds of others, from all parts of the Arsenal, general officers and privates, missile engineers and truck drivers, had filed slowly by the casket flanked by honor guards to say a last goodbye to the man who had successfully led them through the potential hazards of two major reorganizations within two years.

There was no interruption in work at the Arsenal because, as the General himself said often, the work being done was important work, important to the Army, important to the nation, and he would have wanted it to continue.

Gen. McMorrow had been admitted to the Post Hospital on Aug. 14 for medical observation of gastro-intestinal distress. He suffered a heart attack last Monday just before he was scheduled to be discharged.

Death came early Saturday morning, just three days before his 53rd birthday.

SURVIVORS

He is survived by his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Anglin of Ft. Rucker, Ala., and Mrs. Mary Ruud, who is in France with her husband; and a son, Captain Thomas McMorrow with the Army in Okinawa.

Gen. McMorrow came to Redstone in July, 1961, as Deputy CG of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command. In December he was assigned as Vice CG, and took command of AOMC in May, 1962.

When the Army reorganized last year and AOMC became the Army Missile Command, one of the major commodity commands of the U. S. Army Materiel Command, Gen. McMorrow was named Commanding General.

He set the theme for his team of military and civilian missile experts in two major reorganizations when he called for "business as usual" and then supervised sweeping modifications which changed the face of the organization. (See GENERAL DIES on Page 2)

General McMorrow Dedicated 30 Years To Army

More than 30 years of dedicated service to his country is the legacy left by Maj. Gen. F. J. McMorrow. From his graduation at the U. S. Military Academy in June, 1933, until his death Saturday, he had an unbroken chain of service that took him to posts throughout the world.

A native of New York City, Gen. McMorrow was born on August 27, 1910. He attended Manhattan College for one year and then entered the U.

S. Military Academy in 1928. He graduated from West Point in June, 1933, and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Coast Artillery Corps. He attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology and received a Master of Science Degree in 1938.

From 1933 to 1937, Gen. McMorrow served as an anti-aircraft unit commander and as instructor in the West Point Preparatory School. The time included a tour in the Philip-

pine Islands. In 1937 he was detailed in the Ordnance Department and attended the Ordnance School. He was transferred to the Ordnance Department in June, 1941.

During World War II Gen. McMorrow was an Ordnance Staff Officer with the Army-Air Force Materiel Command, and Chief of the Ordnance Special Staff Section at Headquarters, 7th Air Force, and Headquarters, Far East Air Forces. He became the Seventh

Air Force Ordnance Officer in September, 1944. Shortly after the close of the war, he was detailed to duty with the Department of State Foreign Liquidation Commission in the Far East.

On return from the Far East in late 1946, Gen. McMorrow was assigned as Chief of the Research and Development Department at Springfield Armory and shortly thereafter was also put in charge of all manu- (See DEDICATED on Page 2)

Many words of praise could be written about the professional qualifications of Francis J. McMorrow, an outstanding Soldier of the United States Army.

His accomplishments during two years at Redstone Arsenal would constitute an impressive list.

Certainly to be included would be his contribution to two successful major reorganizations of Army activities at Redstone.

High on the list would be his wise direction of the successful and smooth transition to the Army's new policy of Project Management for certain weapons systems.

Not to be forgotten would be his keen perception into problems of procurement and his quick grasp of workable, practical solutions.

These and many other accomplishments attest to his ability to lead men and women to victory in a variety of battles—all a part of the job he performed well.

But, we prefer to remember Francis J. McMorrow as a person who was extremely kindhearted in a warm, personal way where problems of his fellowman were concerned.

We recall the cold night his driver was involved in a serious hunting accident. He personally took over the details of arranging for his immediate transfer to a hospital on another military post, being present at the airfield to say "good luck."

Also remembered is the genuine interest he took in assuring that Redstone Arsenal's only Congressional Medal of Honor recipient was able to receive the honor accorded him and his wife when the President invited them to the White House. He personally arranged for the trip.

These things he could have ordered; he seemed to enjoy doing them himself.

Well recalled are his instructions concerning The Redstone Rocket.

He said simply: "Write about the people at Redstone and what they are accomplishing, not about me. They are the ones who are doing things."

Yes, we think of Francis J. McMorrow, the Commanding General, with respect but we will remember Francis J. McMorrow, the man, with real fondness.

facturing operations. From July, 1951, to February, 1954, he was assigned to the Office, Chief of Ordnance, serving as Executive to the Chief, Industrial Division, and Assistant Executive Officer and Executive Officer to the Chief of Ordnance. He then attended the 1954-55 class at the National War College in Washington.

During 1955-56, he was assigned to G-4, Headquarters, U. S. Army in Europe. He was recalled to the U. S. from this assignment in December, 1956, and became the Commanding Officer and later the Commanding General of the Ordnance Training Command, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland. On July 15, 1957, he became Assistant Chief of Ordnance and Chief of the Industrial Division, Office, Chief of Ordnance. Prior to Gen. McMorrow's assuming duties at the Army Ordnance Missile Command, he served as Director of Procurement, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics, Department of the Army, Washington, D. C.

His military honors, citations and decorations included the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, American Campaign Medal, World War II Service Bars, Army of Occupation in Japan and Asia-Pacific Campaign Medal.

Through his years of military service, Gen. McMorrow had developed deep interest in bowling and golf. Until his heart attack in the spring, he was a member of a bowling team and held a number of team and individual trophies.

M. Hirsch and Col. W. W. Holmes.

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
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


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Defense Announces 8th Bullseye

The U. S. Army has made another successful interception of a target vehicle launched on a 5,000 mile trajectory at intercontinental ballistic missile speed in the continuing test program to further development of its Nike X anti-missile missile system, the Department of Defense announced.

The interceptor missile, a three stage Nike Zeus, was fired and controlled from the Army test installation on Kwajalein Island in the mid-Pacific.

Fired west over the Pacific Missile Range, the target vehicle was boosted by a Titan I ICBM launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, in a training exercise carried out by the Strategic Air Command.

The intercept was the eighth announced by the Defense Department.

Components, concepts and techniques evaluated and proven in the test engagements are being applied to the Nike X system development, an advanced anti-missile missile system with greatly improved capability.

The Nike Zeus missile will be used in the Nike X system, as will other equipment developed in the earlier program. A high acceleration Sprint missile and a multi-function array radar (MAR) are also being developed for the Nike X system.

Ground distance from Kwajalein and the altitude of the intercept were not revealed. The Army said precise tracking equipment proved the Zeus missile got within killing distance of its target.


Neither missile carried a live warhead.

The capability of intercepting a single target vehicle launched by an ICBM under research and development conditions is a valuable aid to our understanding of the basic factors involved in problems in this field.

Components of the Nike X system are being developed and tested at a number of sites. Firings are carried out at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, and the Pacific Missile Range Facility on Kwajalein.

Western Electric Co. is the prime contractor for the Nike X system and Bell Telephone Laboratories has responsibility for system design and development.

Douglas Aircraft Co. builds the Zeus missile. The Sprint missile is being developed by Martin Company's Orlando, Fla. division.

New Missions Earn Spaces For Command

The U. S. Army Missile Command announced plans to begin hiring immediately to fill about 575 new jobs in the next 11 months.

Brig. Gen. H. P. Persons, Jr., Commanding General, said more than 500 permanent government civilian employees will be added to the Command's rosters at Redstone Arsenal during the current fiscal year which ends next June 30.

The remainder of the personnel hired to fill the new job spaces will be serving at missile test sites and operational missile units at widely scattered locations throughout the United States and overseas.

It is anticipated that some of the new positions will be filled through normal Army in-service merit promotion and career development programs. To the extent outside recruitment is required, priority consideration will be given to employees of other Army and Defense installations undergoing reduction in force, including Air Force employees at the Mobile Air Materiel Area, Mobile, Ala.

Civilian personnel officials stressed that although many additional engineers, specialists and technicians will be hired, jobs are also open in other professional as well as non-professional categories. Gen. Persons said, "We hope to fill these jobs as soon as possible."

Government civilian personnel strength of the Missile Command organizations at Redstone is currently about 8,400. The Army Materiel Command recently authorized the Missile Command to increase this figure to 8,986 during the fiscal year. The Missile Command is a major sub-command of the Materiel Command.

Finance and Accounting officials estimate the average salary of an Army civilian employee at Redstone to be \$7,480. Using that figure, an estimated \$4.3 million dollars annually will be added to the Army payroll at Redstone which now exceeds \$81 million per year.

Military personnel strength of the Missile Command organizations at Redstone—currently approximately 1,100, is expected to decrease slightly during the same period.

Gen. Persons said the primary reason for the increase in government civilian personnel is to provide additional manpower to accomplish high priority missions and tasks assigned the Missile Command in the past year.

Mrs. M. Perkins delivered an autobiography. Guests were Miss Mary Haire, Mrs. Sybil Anderson and Mrs. George Shivas.



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

Since becoming a part of the Materiel Command during the Army-wide reorganization accomplished one year ago, the Missile Command has been realigning its military and civilian manpower resources. 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

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

SUGGESTIONS

Homer L. Nobles, Jr., Army Missile Support Command, \$15 award—this suggestion concerning Research & Development truck 307 IH 5481 being modified to eliminate damage to test cables. This suggestion has been partially adopted in that a stanchion of sufficient height to prevent cable damage due to the truck running over them has been installed.

Glenn R. Puckett, Army Missile Command, \$50 award—this suggestion resulted in a method of saving paper used by the 24C Xerox on the Micro-Reproduction Project. The estimated first year savings is \$944.

Earl L. Davis, Army Missile Command, \$15 award—this suggestion resulted in a portable ammonia pump being fabricated and used in the IEDD section of building 5678. This pump is to be used to fill the small tanks on reproduction equipment and should eliminate waste, decrease the time taken to fill the tanks, improve safety by eliminating skin contact and breathing of the vapors.


Charles M. Keyserling, Army Missile Command, \$45 award—this suggestion resulted in building 3 portable electrical benches, with electrical distribution boxes, that are large enough to hold the equipment used to test a sample in the various environmental chambers. The estimated first year savings is \$822.

Jones and Jim Fleener, Army Missile Command, \$45 award each—this suggestion resulted in using Automatic Decisions Optimizing Predicted Estimates that will provide output data based on actual contractor records which will keep management apprised of probable "before-the-fact" situations as well as current situations for purposes of negotiations, realistic budget preparations, etc.

Zuccarello, Army Missile Command, \$15 award—this suggestion resulted in all third and fourth class or "junk" mail received in the Directorate of Procurement & Production Mail Room which is not properly addressed being marked "return to the sender" or "insufficient address." This unwanted mail rotates from one mail room to another and takes up considerable time in locating the addressee.

Christine Fairley, Army Missile Command, \$25 award—this suggestion resulted in one or more FIA Status Codes being added to the ones presently being used.







Exclusive Recognition Given 23,000 Groups

Federal agencies throughout the country granted exclusive recognition to Government employee organizations in more than 23,000 cases, up to May 1. For the most

part this was local recognition. Most of the grants of recognition—22,892—were by the Post Office Department. The remaining 232 cases were spread among 16 agencies. Exclusive recognition under the Employee-Management Cooperation program granted by non-postal agencies was as follows: Ag-

riculture 3, Navy 41, Labor 2, Interior 7, Commerce 1, Office of Secretary of Defense 1, General Services Administration 12, Treasury 111, Veterans Administration 10, Air Force 6, Health, Education, and Welfare 8, National Labor Relations Board 1, Small Business Administration 2, and St. Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation 1.

Under Executive Order 10988, which governs the program, an employee organization chosen by a majority of the employees in a unit or activity may qualify for exclusive recognition, becoming the exclusive representative for employees in the unit in negotiations with management. Groups with a membership of 10 percent or more of the employees in a unit may be granted formal recognition; those with less than 10 percent, informal recognition.

There is no sympathy due the man who charged that today's abundance of acronyms causes confusion.

"Acronyms make for too much SNAFU," he said bewilderedly.
