Community Gets Ready For Armed Forces Day

AUSA Membership Drive Lags, Chairman States

With the enrollment progress lagging behind pre-campaign expectations, leaders of the membership campaign presently being waged by the Association of the United States Army are looking for an accelerated push during the remainder of this week to enable them to attain the objective of the drive.

The campaign was opened two weeks ago with an objective of 4,431 members on the Arsenal. However, by last Friday organizational representatives were only able to report 1,376 members, less than a third of the goal.

While it is known that this figure is somewhat erroneous due to a misinterpretation in reporting of renewals, it is still considerably below expectations, according to John Muller, campaign chairman.

A number of organizational representatives were not listing present members in making their report. As a result the overall membership was listed below the actual figures.

Muller indicated that this discrepancy in reporting would not by any means make up for the (See DRIVE LAGS on Page 3)

Arsenal Will Open Gates At 12:30 p.m.

There won't be any mounted knights in shining armor or any light cavalry but there will be a Lance weapon in downtown Huntsville Saturday.

One of the U. S. Army Missile Command's newest weapon systems now under development, a full sized engineering prototype of the Lance will make its first public showing Saturday on Armed Forces Day.

The Lance, a surface-to-surface ballistic missile being designed to provide greater firepower for Army troops, will be one of the features of a giant downtown parade which begins at 9:30 a.m.

Actually, the weapon will be one of about 16 missiles and drones which the Missile Command will display during the day in support of the Armed Forces Day theme, "Power for Peace." Lance will be the first Army missile to use pre-packaged storable liquid propellant.

Following the morning parade, visitors will be permitted to pour through Redstone Arsenal gates for the once-a-year open house. The huge installation, nerve center (See OPEN HOUSE on Page 2)

Alabama Honors Military At Armed Forces Banquet

Army personnel at Redstone Arsenal received special recognition as Alabama honored military commands throughout the state at an Armed Forces Day luncheon Monday in Montgomery.

Lt. Gov. James B. Allen, repre-

sented Gov. George C. Wallace, presented a citation to Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command. Col. Thomas W. Cooke, Commander of the Army Missile Support Command, and Col. William J. Macpherson, Commandant of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School, attended the luncheon with General Zierdt.

Approximately 175 representatives of all the services, including commanding officers or their representatives, from every military installation in the state, attended the luncheon which inaugurated Armed Forces Week in the state.

Raymond Weeks of Birmingham, state chairman for the observance, called the event honoring all the state's military units the first of its kind in the nation.

Lt. Gov. Allen drew chuckles from the uniformed audience when he pointed out that a century ago Alabama was trying to get federal forces out of the state and "now Alabama and every state vies to get federal installations located in the state."

Discussing the high regard Alabamians hold for the military services, the governor said: "We respect you for the job you do, the cause you stand for and the principles you uphold."

ter for the Army's rocket and guided missile development programs, will swing open its doors at 12:30 p.m.

Exhibits which will show many of the Army's modern, missile-age muscles will be on display at three different sites—the newly-completed Francis J. McMorro Missle Laboratories, the Ordnance Guided Missile School and at Redstone Army Air Field.

Signs will guide visitors to the display areas. To facilitate the flow of traffic to these sites, gates 1 and 9, as well as the Main Gate, will be open.

Maj. R. H. Vereen, Operations Officer of the Army Missile Support Command, who is Armed Forces Day Project Officer, says many activities will highlight the afternoon proceedings.

One event which should prove popular is a mass parachute jump with nearly 100 men "hitting the silk" in three separate drops.

Members of Company B, 20th Special Forces Group of the Alabama National Guard will jump at Redstone Field at 1 o'clock, 2:15 and 3:30 p.m.

Bleachers which will seat more than 1,000 people will be erected at the airfield, Maj. Vereen said, and a huge tent complete with picnic tables will accommodate hundreds more.

Several types of aircraft will be on display, among them an Air Force T-33 trainer, helicopters, and L-20 Caribou, Beechcraft, Otter and the possibility of a Mohawk, C-54 and C-47.

In addition, many of the Missile Command's Directorates will have exhibits in the airfield hangar as well as other groups.

At the Ordnance Guided Missile School, visitors will see at least four of the Army's missile systems, including the Hawk, Sergeant, Pershing and Nike Hercules.

The Francis J. McMorro Missle Laboratories will display such missiles as the Redstone, Sergeant and possibly the Nike Zeus, as well as helicopters and such things as scale wind tunnels and water tables.

Open house will end at 4:30 p.m.

In support of Armed Forces Day, many artists' concepts and art displays depicting missiles and Army hardware are on display this week in many of the downtown area and shopping center windows.

The downtown parade will be complete with bands, missile displays and reviewing stand, according to Alvin Blackwell, Chairman of the Huntsville Armed Forces Day Committee.

At least 12 North Alabama area bands will march in the parade along with troops from Redstone Arsenal, Army and National Guard Units, Marines and Naval Reserve units as well as veteran's organi-

zations.

Blackwell said the usual parade route will be followed which will be down Franklin Street to Holmes Avenue, back down Madison Street to Gates, around Fountain Row to Big Spring Park.

A reviewing stand, located just

opposite the court house, will contain representatives from all branches of the military and congressional dignitaries and City of Huntsville and county officials.

During Open House on the Arsenal, mobile snack facilities will be available at all three sites.

a member in good standing at the beginning of the annual savings bond promotion.

Largest of the new members is the Troop Command unit with 270, all but two of whom are military. Other Support Command units listed as 100 per centers are the Calibration Center, with an assigned strength of 123, the Patent Center and the Support Command Control Office.

The Missile Command organizations in the elite company are, Installations and Services Office, the Judge Advocate and the Inspector General. The former function is composed of 46 personnel and the latter two have eleven apiece.

A complete report of Arsenal participation will be reported in the Rocket next week.

The Savings Bond promotion was opened two weeks ago aimed at increasing the personnel participation in the payroll deduction plan to 90 per cent.

At the start of the promotion the civilian participation was 71.1 per cent with 67.5 per cent of the military personnel included.

bership representative in their work area.

Introduced by the national headquarters of the AUSA, the plan offers up to \$10,000 worth of additional life insurance with a number of benefits not available under other plans.

Available exclusively to AUSA members up to age 60, the plan offers world-wide coverage with an all-risk protection provision. The benefits are always payable in full and do not decrease with advancing age.

The all-new plan has been designated "AUSA Members Life Insurance Plan" and the insurer is the Minnesota Life Insurance Company.

Administration of the program will be supervised by National Headquarters in order to guarantee that the rights of members receive top priority in its operation.

Sample rates cited by national headquarters include for AUSA members in age bracket 30-34 an annual premium of \$40. New members have up to 90 days to join the insurance plan.



Versatile Special Forces Parachute Here Saturday

Most people who wear berets are generally thought of as artists, beatniks or foreigners.

But members of the 20th Special Forces Group, who wear distinctive green berets, are neither. They are a rugged new breed of Army fighters who are unusually tough—and versatile.

These soldiers, members of the Alabama National Guard, are special warfare experts who are skilled in techniques of guerilla and anti-guerilla fighting. They can perform their deadly skills under all climatic and geographic conditions.

Company B of the Special Forces Group—made up of soldiers from Huntsville, Florence and Decatur—will make a mass parachute jump on Armed Forces Day next Saturday in one of the main attractions of the day at Redstone Arsenal's open house.

Parachute jumps are only one of the specialties of Company B which is commanded by Maj. Charles Sullins, a Huntsville attorney. Maj. Sullins presently has 137 men under his command.

In addition to their ability to drop on enemy soil, these men are skilled in engineering and demolitions, weaponry, communications and medicine.

Executive Officer Maj. Tom Sharp, says there are 16 teams in the company. Each team, he said, is capable of organizing, training and supporting as many as 1,500 guerilla fighters.

Heading the various teams are Capt. Curry Turner of Huntsville, Maj. Charles Quarles of Decatur and Capt. Flint Gillespie of Florence.



Lady Chemist Works In Propulsion Laboratory

Girl architects are rare but so are girl chemists.

Marjorie Cucksee, chemist in the Propulsion Laboratory of the Research and Development Directorate graduated from high school with architectural ambitions and switched to chemistry when she entered the University of Chattanooga.

Her funds were limited but her ambitions were big. She supported herself and a car with a part-time, (sometimes fulltime), job at the telephone company. At the same time she took a full scholastic load—carrying between 15 and 17 hours at a time. That wasn't enough work. She also worked part-time in the library to supplement the partial scholarship that she was awarded.

Scholastic honorary groups drafted her as an officer, and the Independents on campus elected her "Sweetheart of the Year" in 1959. But she never qualified for "Who's Who" or Mortar Board. You have to be a senior and she completed her undergraduate studies in three years with the maximum scholastic average until her final term: 3.0. After she was awarded her A. B. degree at Chattanooga, she enrolled in the graduate school at the University of Tennessee.

There she met her husband, Calvin, although neither of them can remember exactly when or where. They both moved in the same group of people, and when one visited a particular couple the other was almost invariably called to make a fourth for bridge.

The foursome broke up when he moved and so did she, but they carried on a correspondence which resulted in marriage. She worked in applied and developmental chemistry for a large laboratory. She learned they did not discriminate against women as much as the resistance she encountered in a Virginia shipyard's wet laboratory later. Her husband was satisfied with the conditions in the area where he worked in the shipyard, but the lack of safety measures in the laboratory were so hazardous that Marjorie's health suffered.

Her safety problems at Redstone are quite different. The authorities are willing to buy her safety shoes, laboratory coats and masks as needed. The problems encountered are size. The Production and Procurement Directorate's clerk who received the request for size five and one-half women's safety shoes called the Propulsion Laboratory and asked who they were for. The secretary who answered looked up the work order and said, "Chester Huskins." (He's a group leader in the laboratory).

The lab coat Marjorie ordered arrived. When she put it on, the sleeves hung to her knees and she couldn't reach the bottom of the pockets.

While at the shipyard, she taught herself analytical chemistry. The wet laboratory personnel acted as trouble shooters, and analyzed all the metals that went into shipbuilding. If trouble developed, the chemists would try to find the reason. Now, she analyzes polymers that bind the solid propellants in a rocket motor.


Marjorie enjoys swimming, but she likes bridge best and has developed a smile to let her partner know what she thinks of a fluff. Another form of relaxation is the piano; but since she now lives in a trailer, she has little room for pianos.

In the Fall, Calvin plans to return to the University of Chattanooga. That means that Marjorie will be commuting. Her grand-

mother, Mrs. Lela Harrell, lives at 3111 10th Avenue; and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. David S. Tate, at 4113 14th Avenue in Chattanooga.

Marjorie has three patent applications which she applied for while working for industry. To avoid red tape and complications, she turned them over to someone else when she left the laboratory.

With three months of missile propellant work behind her, she feels safer washing her beakers here than when she was breathing cyanide fumes in her wet laboratory. Missile research demands common sense and caution among its chemists. One mishap could place the careless among celestial harpists instead of terrestrial pianists, and Marjorie learned the lesson first hand.
