AUSA Hopes For Upsurge In Members

With two days remaining in their membership drive, chapter officials of the Association of the United States Army are hopeful for an upsurge in enrollments that will enable them to attain campaign objective.

The drive was opened early this month in an effort to expand the Tennessee Valley Chapter membership to some 4,500 members to regain the honor of being the largest of the 121 worldwide chapters of AUSA.

At the start of the drive the Chapter had a membership of about 1,400, approximately eighty per cent of whom are military and civilian personnel of the Arsenal.

However, after three weeks only about half of the necessary increase has been realized, according to John A. Muller, campaign chairman. Almost the entire increase has been realized in the Army Missile Command.

At the end of last week the membership within the Missile Command, (including the Nike-X Project Office and the Missile Support Command) had risen to 2872, an increase of 65 per cent.

W. P. Burnett, Reports Chairman of the Missile Command drive, said he is confident that the

Gen. Pickett Nominated For 2 Stars

Brig. Gen. George E. Pickett, former Chief Signal Officer of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, was nominated by President Johnson for the rank of major general last week.

The nomination is awaiting action of the U. S. Senate.

General Pickett came to Redstone Arsenal in July, 1959, as Chief of the AOMC Signal Office. In connection with the 1962 reorganization of the Army, he was assigned as Chief of Plans and

Support Command Nudges Bond Goal

Just one little old percentage point stands between the Missile Support Command and the realization of their coveted objective of 90 per cent participation in the payroll deduction plan for buying U. S. Savings Bonds.

By the end of last week 3,375 personnel out of an assigned

strength of 3,798 had authorized deductions from their pay to buy bonds. It will take less than 50 additional authorizations for the Support Command to reach the goal.

All other organizations on the Arsenal are below the objective by varying amounts; however, all but one have shown appreciable in-

creases in participation since the start of the Savings Bond promotion.

The lone organization which has not increased their participation is the Ordnance Guided Missile School where the rapid turnover of military personnel is blamed for

Macy Set For Arrival Here Today

The U. S. Civil Service Commission Chairman, John W. Macy, Jr., is scheduled to arrive at the Huntsville airport tonight as a guest of the Huntsville Chapter of the Society for Personnel Administration.

Tomorrow morning he will meet with Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command, and members of the General's staff at 8:30 a.m. He will be escorted by Jack McConaha, Director of Missile Command Civilian Personnel, and Hammond Smith, director of the Atlanta Region, Civil Service Commission.

Other Personnel men scheduled to accompany Macy are Alfred S. Hodgson, director, Headquarters Operations, NASA; R. Dale Anderson, staff officer of Office of Civilian Personnel, Deputy Chief of Staff, Personnel, and Gordon Kellet, acting chief of Civilian Personnel, Army Materiel Command.

Macy will address key Army executives and talk with Gen. Zierdt before he tours Army missile laboratories.

He is then scheduled to visit the Marshall Space Flight Center. He will meet with Dr. Wernher von Braun, address key Marshall executives, and tour facilities.

In the evening he will address the local Society for Personnel Administration. His topic is "Personnel Management: A Force in Federal Progress."

Macy has been chairman of the Civil Service Commission since 1961. He was nominated by President John F. Kennedy. He entered government service 26 years

Guns Would Have Exciting Tales—If They Could Tell

The man who becomes a gun collector also becomes a gunsmith and ammunition loader.

This is the experience of Hayden W. Warden, a lifetime member of the National Rifle Association who acquired his first gun as a present. The gift had the same effect as a friendly virus: it made him itch for more guns and knowledge about their use and history.

Warden, a photographer in the photo laboratory under the Assistant for Communications at the Army Missile Support Command, associates his guns with historical events and probable situations of the times.

For instance, who but a gun collector would associate Buffalo Bill with the 73 Winchester rifle which Bill reportedly called the "boss," or Mississippi riverboat gamblers with derringers so ineffective they won't penetrate the bark of a tree. Warden tried the latter. He has fired almost every gun in his collection.

The fact that sometimes he has had rifles rebored or has carved a new stock or part for a stock before he could do this merely provided him entertainment in his Tennessee farm workshop.

Mr. and Mrs. Warden are rearing their family on the homeplace where Warden was born near Fayetteville. His two sons, Steve and Larry own their own guns and ammunition, but don't put the two together without their father around to guide them. Cathy Anne is also interested in shooting, but her interest isn't as intense as the boys'. Tracey Lynn at one-year-old is too young to care.

All the repaired guns in the collection have been fired by Warden and his sons. This doesn't include a pair of dueling pistols made around 1770—the date traced by the design of the hardware fashionable on the pistols of that day. But another pistol of about the same vintage has been fired by them.





Another pair of dueling pistols probably were made in the early 1800's. A romantic-minded viewer can conjure a foggy morning, figures in great capes moving about talking in hushed voices that contrast with the heated words that led to the duel. Some of Warden's modern Army items were obtained through the National Rifle Association—one of the services it furnishes to members.

Pistols are not Warden's real pride and joy, however. He prizes his rifle collection above them and leans heavily toward a collection of Winchesters.

Two of the rifles Warden possesses are unmarked percussion rifles without the gunsmith's initials. A .53 caliber Merrill rifle with a handsome inlaid stock has a utility pocket for patches under the ornamentation.

Both the American and the British Enfield are represented in his collection along with a .30 caliber M1 carbine, an Evans repeating carbine dating back to 1868 and a Springfield dated 1873. In addition to the American and Brit-

ish weapons, he has a Russian 7.2, the same gun used to win the 1960 Olympics, an Italian 6.5 rifle and a 7 millimeter Spanish carbine.

Warden didn't carry a gun in the Army. He carried a camera instead, and this is the way he spends eight hours a day now.

But he is a member of the Shooters Club of America, and the Tennessee Gun Collectors Association. These provide a good source for tracing the origin of "junkers" he intends to renovate, and a chance to see what other collectors are prizing.

a slight decrease from 83 per cent to 82 per cent.

Civilian personnel at the School have upped their participation from 92 to 93 per cent while the military percentage dropped from 80 to 77.

The largest unit increases have been accomplished by the Procurement and Production Directorate and the Nike-X Project Office.

P & P has boosted participation from 70 to 91 per cent while Nike-X has gone up from 43 to 63 per cent. The latter organization is about to become the last of the Redstone units to pass the Department of the Army standard of 65 per cent participation.

The Missile Command (less the three large directorates) has 78 per cent participation, an increase of 11 per cent. Supply and Maintenance has risen by 17 per cent, from 64 to 81, and Research & Development has boosted participation from 70 to 82.

membership will reach 3,000 by the end of the week.

"While this is still short of our pre-campaign objective," he said, "it represents a very commendable showing." The membership goal was established as fifty per cent of the military and civilian strength of the Command.

In commenting on the progress of the drive, Muller stated that it is unfortunate that other sub-committees were unable to realize the same degree of success as that attained by the Missile Command. "Possibly we would have had better success," he added, "if the Association's insurance program had been finalized prior to the start of the drive." National headquarters didn't get the program brochures out until the middle of the month.

It is still too early to report on the local acceptance of the group life insurance program. While a great number of members have expressed an interest in the program, there are no figures available as to the number who have applied for the insurance.

Compatriots Hear Israeli Embassy Attache At School

Graduation of the first Israeli students at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School Friday brought to 17 the nations whose pioneer missile technicians have been trained here.

The Israelis began training here last summer after their government purchased the rights to the Hawk system from the U. S. Some 25 Israeli Air Force students, headed by Capt. Seren Uri Dror, received diplomas following completion of Hawk maintenance courses.

The diplomas were presented in a ceremony at the Post Theater by Col. Ram Ron, Military, Naval and Air Attache at the Israeli Embassy, who flew from Washington for the occasion. In a brief address, Col. Ron complimented OGMS on the quality of its training.

Also visiting for the ceremony were Lt. Col. Dan Kenny, Assistant Israeli Attache and Mr. Zeev Z. Dover, Israeli Consul in Atlanta, Ga.

Two Israeli and four U. S. servicemen received the Association of the U. S. Army award for maintaining averages of 96 or better in several courses. Winners included Sfc. Shmuel Rotem and Sfc. David Keren of Israel, and Pvts. Joseph A. McCauley, John W. Owens, Gerald D. Schrag and George E. Shaffer, all of New York.

Included in the graduation class were six U. S. servicemen who participated in an experimental program that may be the forerunner of a new concept of instruction at the Missile School. The four U. S. winners of the AUSA award and Pvts. Charles L. Freeman and John G. Horner, who barely missed the required 96 average, were allowed to set their own pace in the Hawk Missile Repair Helper course when it was discovered midway in the course that they were doing outstanding advanced work. In the final five weeks of work, the students completed not only the basic course, but the equivalent of four

weeks study in the pulse circuits and radar course, it was announced at the graduation ceremony.

John E. Hatch Jr., president of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of AUSA, told the graduates and guests that these students "are doubly outstanding and exemplify the type of men the AUSA wants in the modern Army."

The 67 graduates included four students from Belgium completing Nike courses.



Huntsville Firm To Rehabilitate Arsenal Railroad

A Huntsville construction firm has received a \$239,124 contract for work on Redstone Arsenal's railroad network.

Army Engineers awarded the contract to Ashburn & Gray Inc. for relocation of a railroad scales, moving a "weye" and rehabilitation of the rail system servicing the NASA-Marshall Space Flight Center and the Army Missile Command.

Ashburn & Gray will receive \$158,985 for moving the railroad "weye" now located near MSFC's Astrionics Laboratory Building 4487. The rail intersection will be moved closer to Morris Road to make room for two Marshall Center buildings planned for the area. An Acceleration Test and Calibration Facility is under construction there and a Hazardous Operations building is being planned for the area.

A total of \$41,576 has been allotted for moving a railroad car weighing scales from the Marshall Center to the Army classification yard located near the Missile Command Headquarters in Building 5250.

The contract's remaining \$92,536 will be spent for replacing rails and ties throughout the rail system.

Some 40 to 60 rail cars are moved onto the Arsenal rail system everyday from two lines serving Huntsville.

Ceremony Set For Maj. Gen. O'Connor

HEADQUARTERS, THIRD ARMY—The man who fired the first Nike guided missile in Army operations will retire May 31.

Maj. Gen. Daniel A. O'Connor, a veteran anti-aircraft artillery officer and pioneer in the guided missile field, will be honored at a retreat review May 27 on Fort McPherson's Hedekin Field. He has been the deputy commanding general of the Third Army and commanding general of Ft. McPherson since June, 1963.

Colors of all Third Army regular, National Guard and Reserve major units will be massed at the parade. Nike-Hercules, Nike-Ajax, and Hawk guided missiles will pass-in-review before the man who proposed and drew plans for the first missile regiment in 1948.

A native of Providence, R. I., General O'Connor entered the active military service in 1940 when his National Guard unit was federalized. He commanded Battery K, 243d Coast Artillery Regiment. This Battery was commanded in the Revolutionary War by Nathaniel Green. Symbolically the unit is now known as the 243d Artillery (Nike).

Gen. O'Connor is a graduate of Rhode Island State College. He did graduate work at Brown University, Northeastern University and Rhode Island State University.

In 1961 he was awarded an honorary doctor of science degree by Rhode Island State University for his work in the field of guided missiles.

During World War II he served on the War Department General Staff and the General Staff, Pacific Theater. Following the war, he was an advisor to the China Supreme General Staff until 1948. Between that period and Korea he was stationed at Ft. Bliss, Tex., except for a short time when he was a student in the Armed Forces Staff College. He was assigned to missile units, then to directing the instruction of missile crews and establishing the Red Canyon missile range in the New Mexico mountains.

In Korea he served as a combat intelligence staff officer of the I.U.S. Corps and gained military recognition for his work in evaluating the Chinese Red-North Korean artillery employment.

He returned to Ft. Bliss in 1952 to become commander of the First Guided Missile Group and later served as director of the Guided Missile department of the Anti-Aircraft Artillery School.

Promoted to brigadier general in 1955, he was assigned to the Anti-Aircraft command as deputy commander. A year later, he again returned to Ft. Bliss to become the assistant commandant of the U. S. Army Air Defense School.

From this assignment, he moved to command the 31st Artillery Brigade (Air Defense). Located at McChord Air Force Base, Wash.

his brigade's mission was that of defending Seattle, Tacoma, and the Hanford Atomic Energy Complex.

In June, 1960, he was promoted to Major General and was assigned to the Unified Command Headquarters, Caribbean Command, Quarry Heights, Canal Zone, as chief of staff. From this position he came to Third Army in 1963.

His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf Cluster, Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Special Breast Order of the Cloud and Banner and the Army, Navy, Air Force Medal of the Republic of China.

General and Mrs. O'Connor, the former Mary Farley of Watertown, N. Y., will tour Europe after he retires. Upon their return, they will make their home at El Paso, Texas.







Dental Corps Evaluates Tooth Decay Preventive

Initiation of a U. S. Army Dental Corps study to evaluate a new fluoride compound which gives promise of a major breakthrough in reducing tooth decay among adults, has been announced by Maj. Gen. Joseph L. Bernier.

The chief of the Army Dental Corps said that in the Army's emphasized program of preventing dental problems, rather than correcting them, early investigations of the compound are "very encouraging."

Sufficient data will be available within six months to a year, he believes, to determine effectiveness of the chemical for use by individuals of the young military age group.

The new agent was developed as the result of research headed by Dr. Joseph C. Muhler, professor of biochemistry at the School of Dentistry, Indiana University, and a consultant to the Army on Preventive Dentistry. It is added

to a polishing agent which has potential in itself to also reduce dental calculus (tartar).

The discovery is one result of an extensive program of dental research supported in part by Army Medical research and development grants."

World War II Jeep Goes To Smithsonian Museum

A World War II Jeep, one of the 660,000 produced between 1941 and 1945, was presented by the U. S. Army to the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C., May 4, 1964.

The durable, ubiquitous hero of every theater of operation during World War II will be on display in the Rotunda of the Smithsonian following the presentation ceremony. It will be on display at the Transportation and Travel Pavilion at the New York World's Fair from mid-May to mid-October 1964. Eventually it will be permanently exhibited in the Armed Forces Museum to be built by the Smithsonian at some future date.

Lt. Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., commander of the U. S. Army Materiel Command, presented the Jeep on behalf of the Army; Mr. S. Dillon Ripley, Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, accepted the vehicle.

Known officially as the "Truck, Command, Reconnaissance, 1/4-ton, 4x4," the Jeep was by far the most versatile vehicle used in World War II, as well as the forerunner of many commercial versions in the post-war years. Its wartime uses include service as: a scout car, weapons carrier and firing mount, litterbearer, a carriage of state for visiting dignitaries, pick-up truck, a command post, wire-layer for communications units, and a taxi for air crews. Nurses primed before its rearview mirror and chaplains used its flat hood as an altar. Nazi and Japanese engineers tried unsuccessfully to duplicate it.

The Reverend David Leech judged the affirmative team the winner of the debate by the narrow margin of one point.





Missile School Generates Trade In Huntsville Area

The Army Ordnance Guided Missile School has brought twice as many people into Huntsville as lived in the entire city when the school opened 12 years ago.

The Missile School has graduated more than 32,500 students from all the U. S. forces and 17 Allied nations since 1952. At that time, Huntsville's population was 16,000.

These figures were given to the Huntsville-Madison County Chamber of Commerce by Col. William J. Macpherson, commandant, at a luncheon inaugurating a special committee appointed by the civic organization to deal specifically with Missile School affairs. William H. Cummings, cotton warehouse owner and industrialist, heads the 19-man committee.

More than \$40,000,000 per year is pumped into the local economy by the Missile School, the commandant declared in a special report to the businessmen.

The permanent party of 1,793 includes some 500 civilians and also 110 representatives of various contractors who provide assistance. Their payroll amounts to about \$8,600,000 a year, Macpherson said.

The commandant compared the Missile School's installed plant value of \$63,000.00 with that of the University of Alabama which approximates \$40,000,000.

More than 5,000 students per year go through the school, he said, but many are paid from their home stations. Their pay probably amounts to as much as \$10,000,000 per year, with a substantial portion being spent in Huntsville, he estimated.

All the Missile School figures probably "snowball" as they circulate through the community, he pointed out, since the school graduates classes every Friday and enrolls new students every Monday throughout the year.


The school pays other agencies at Redstone Arsenal \$7,000,000 a year for goods and services and buys more than \$890,000 worth of goods annually through the local Army purchasing and contracting office.

Col. Macpherson closed the report by pointing out that in addition to the U. S. servicemen in training there are currently 600 foreign students—a number that will rise to a record 900 later this year. Many will be accompanied by wives and children.

He asked the Chamber of Commerce to join in an expanded pro-

gram of hospitality for the foreign visitors, stating that the overseas visitors "should go home with a fair picture of the U. S. way of life."

The aid of Chambers of Commerce throughout the Tennessee Valley area is also solicited in entertaining the foreign students. Maj. Monroe Webb, the school's Foreign Liaison Officer, can be reached by telephone at 876-1704 at Redstone Arsenal.



Safety Says:

Cut Grass With Rubber

For those who heard the ping of projectiles from under the rotary lawn mower, the suggestion of the Arsenal Safety Office representatives is right on target. They advocate a rubber cutting blade.

The need for the use of a rubber blade is based upon the fact that approximately 75 thousand power mower accidents occur each year. The Georgia Department of Public Health conducted a survey revealing that 66.2% of injuries made by direct contact of the mower are to the toes and feet. Also, 62.5% of the total mower accidents are caused during the use of the rotary type mower.

The rubber blade will not cut through common shoe material. It may bruise the foot, but will not cut it. However, it will cut grass comparable to a steel blade. Though rubber blades may reduce some hazards, the Safety Director said that persons should practice a few habits which can further protect himself and others.

Prior to mowing, the lawn should be inspected for items which can become deadly projectiles. Small children should not start or operate mowers, or even be in the mowing area.

Shoes should be worn while mowing. A forward and unhurried operation is best, backing is dangerous. Electric mowers should be

frame grounded and should not be used in rain.

When the mower is unattended, or when moving to different levels, it should be shut off. When clearing or cleaning the blade, the spark plug wire should be disconnected.

Fuel should be in a metal, approved container and stored in a well ventilated area.





Seigenthaler, Tennessean Editor, Scheduled To Talk

The editor of one of the South's leading newspapers will address graduates of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School here next Thursday (May 28).

John L. Seigenthaler, editor of the Nashville Tennessean, will speak to 93 graduates from the U. S., China and Norway at a ceremony in the Post Theater at 10 a.m. Thursday. The exercises are being held a day earlier than usual because of the Memorial Day holiday.

Seigenthaler took the helm of The Tennessean in 1962, and at 35 became the youngest editor of a major newspaper in the South. Born in Nashville, he was graduated from Peabody College there and received a top journalistic award, a Nieman Fellowship at Harvard University, in 1958.

As a reporter for The Tennessean from 1949 to 1960, he visited Redstone Arsenal many times

while it was building toward its present position in the development of missiles, rockets and space vehicles.

Seigenthaler took leave from The Tennessean in 1960 to work in the presidential campaign headquarters of John F. Kennedy. After the election, he was named administrative assistant to Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy in the Department of Justice, leaving this post to return to The Tennessean as editor.

He served on the Pulitzer Prize awards jury in 1964 and is a trustee of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library Corporation.

As a secretary at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School here, Betty Hutchison handles full load typing assignments, takes dictation and up-dates files—without the use of one of her arms.

Mrs. Hutchison, who does everyday secretarial work at the supply branch of the Missile School, was hired to fill a temporary position after she took a typing test on her own "special" typewriter. The business machine was designed for a one-handed operator, its keys varying from the standard keyboard.

With her "have own typewriter, will travel" philosophy, the Huntsville mother has been doing temporary office work since graduating from a local business school.

"I lost the use of my left arm when I was two years old after a case of polio," she explained. "Yet, I feel that perseverance has allowed me to do anything anyone else can do. I have never considered myself handicapped. I do general office work as if I have the use of both hands."

She supports her contention by revealing that she bowls a "mean game." Mrs. Hutchison and her husband, Raymond, reside at 423

Karter St., and have one child, Mark, 2.


