## Zero Defects Conference Conducted At Arsenal

### Gen. Besson Scheduled Here Today

Gen. Frank S. Besson, Commanding General of the Army Materiel Command, today will pay his first visit to the Army Missile Command since being promoted to the rank of four-star General.

He is scheduled to arrive this morning at the Redstone Arsenal Airstrip.

Gen. Besson will pay his day-long visit to the Missile Command during a flurry of activity at the home of the Army's missiles, ranging from a Value Engineering seminar to the Lance Army-Industry Conference.

On hand to greet the Materiel Command chief will be Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Missile Command. Gen. Besson is scheduled to leave Redstone for Washington, D. C. this afternoon.

### DR. STEVERDING WILL PRESENT PAPER IN PARIS

Dr. Bernard Steverding, a scientist in the Physical Sciences Laboratory at the Army Missile Command, has been selected to deliver technical papers in Paris and London.

He will be the only representative of the Army Missile Command to attend the sessions.

Dr. Steverding is scheduled to speak in Paris to the First International Congress on Space and Vacuum Research meeting from June 29, to July 4. His paper will be entitled "Fatigue of Metals under Space Conditions."

Following the meeting in Paris, the scientist will go to London where he will deliver two technical reports at the Tri-Partite Conference in London on July 13.

The papers will be entitled "Rocket Nozzle Materials," and "New Developments for Ablation Materials."

A veteran of 24 years Army service has been named Project Manager for the Army's Nike Hercules air defense missile system at the Army Missile Command.

He is Col. Rawlins M. Colquitt Jr., a native of Houston, Tex., and a graduate of Texas A&M College.

As manager of the Nike Hercules, Col. Colquitt will head one of the Missile Command's biggest programs. The Hercules is the Army's primary defense against high altitude aircraft.

The Project Office which Col. Colquitt now heads has the responsibility for development of improvements to the system as well as supporting Nike sites located throughout the United States and a number of Allied countries.

The Colonel came to Redstone Arsenal from Second Army Headquarters in Fort George G. Meade, Md. At Fort Meade he was Chief of Staff, Logistics.

For his service in that capacity he received a Second Army Certificate of Achievement.

Born in Houston in 1915, he entered active duty with the Army as a Second Lieutenant in July, 1940. Following assignments with the coast artillery and anti-aircraft units he was transferred to the European Theater of Operations where he served with the 51st Anti-Aircraft Artillery Brigade during World War II.

Subsequently he served with AAA units in both the United States, Europe and Korea.

The new Nike Hercules Project Manager is a graduate of both the Armed Forces Staff College and the Army War College.

The Colonel has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal, Army Commendation Medal and the French Croix de Guerre.

Prior to Col. Colquitt's assignment the Nike Hercules project was headed by Leo E. Smock as acting Project Manager. Mr. Smock became acting head of the project when Col. B. R. Luczak, the Project Manager, was assigned to the (See COL. COLQUITT on Page 4)

### Value Engineering Conference Meets At Arsenal Today

Top managers at the Army Missile Command today will hear how the Department of Defense wants them to put more stretch in the taxpayer's dollars.

The lessons in how to get more miles out of missile money will be given by George E. Fouch, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Equipment Maintenance and Readiness.

Sec. Fouch will deliver his talk on Value Engineering at a special meeting today at Rocket Auditorium for missile system managers.

The Secretary is at Redstone in connection with a seminar on "Zero Defects," another project designed to make sure every dollar spent on missiles hits its target.

In his talk today, Fouch is expected to tell the managers that recent studies showed that certain tight fisted techniques lumped together under the name Value Engineering can make it easier to produce an item, reduce the time required to make it, improve its reliability and step up its performance.

In a memorandum to some 65 Army officers at Redstone, Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Missile Command, said he had invited Sec. Fouch "to stress the need for obtaining reliable missile systems at the lowest possible cost."

### Honor Graduates At OGMS Named

A soldier, a Marine, a Belgian and three German students were named honor students Friday at an Ordnance Guided Missile School graduation ceremony.

Receiving honor diplomas were Pvt. Robert J. Brophy of Rochester, N. Y.; Marine Pfc. Thomas E. Shakelford of New Berlin, Wis.; Sgt. Julien F. Vantorre of Panestraat, Belgium; and Horst J. Bathe, Han-Heinrich Macke, and Frank Kutzsche of Germany.

"Zero Defects is an employee motivation program," G. T. Willey, a leader of one of the nation's top defense industries, told a near capacity crowd yesterday at Rocket Auditorium.

"It rests on the assumption that the individual worker can achieve perfection in what he does . . . if he wants to!"

Speaking to more than 350 key officials from industry and the Department of Defense, Willey was explaining the Defense Department's new Zero Defects Program which is aimed at improving quality consciousness throughout the defense complex.

With an ultimate goal to raise performance standards to a "no defect" level, the seminar is one of two high level meetings sponsored by the U. S. Army Missile Command this week. The other, on Value Engineering, was presented to the Missile Command's top managers today.

"Most people are conditioned to accept the fact they are not perfect — that they will make mistakes," Willey, vice president and general manager of the Orlando Division, Martin Company, said. "But is it ordained that people must make mistakes? Do they always make the same percentage of errors in everything they do? The answer is . . . No!"

"A man may make an error in five percent of the parts he processes on his job. But — he will not get short-changed on his paycheck five percent of the time . . . he will not go home to the wrong house at night five percent of the time . . . he will not put on one brown shoe and one black shoe five percent of the time. And he will not forget to pay his taxes five percent of the time."

What is the reason for this, Willey asked. Do people have two standards of performance — one for the job and another for important personal matters? Does a person vary his standard of performance according to the importance he attaches to the particular thing he is doing?

"We find that, under certain conditions, the answer to both questions is . . . yes!" Willey said. This is where Zero Defects enters the picture.

"Zero Defects is designed to attack this problem," he continued.

"It convinces the worker that his job is every bit as important as anything he does—not only to him but to the defense of the nation and the success of the space effort as well."

Actually, the Zero Defects Program attacks the problem from another direction, Willey pointed out.

"We do not penalize workers for making mistakes," he said. "We praise them for doing the job properly. We do not harass people for poor performance. We extend them public recognition for outstanding performance. In short, we take an objective stand, rather than defensive, and get the people in the program."

Other industrial speakers who joined Willey in the presentation were Edward Woll and H. L. Brown. Woll is general manager, Flight Propulsion Division of General Electric and Brown is vice president and director of operations, guidance and control systems, division, Litton Industries.

These leaders have been instrumental in developing this type of program in their own operations and they pointed out the benefits they have obtained.

"Since starting our program, over 4,500 potential causes for error have been identified and all but 600 have been resolved," Woll noted.

A native of Lynn, Mass., Col. Tyler came to Redstone Arsenal earlier this year from Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, where he was logistics advisor to the Imperial Ethiopian Ground Forces.

In other assignments, he has worked in the Office of the Inspector General, Department of the Army, in Washington, Boston and New York, and as Chief of the Pitman Dunn Laboratories Group at Frankford Arsenal in Philadelphia.

Col. Tyler is a graduate of the University of Massachusetts where he received his BS Degree in chemistry. After studying briefly at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, he entered Staley College where he earned both his BA and Master of Arts Degrees and was

## Army's Chief Of Chaplains Visits Arsenal


The chief of Army Chaplains, Maj. Gen. Charles E. Brown, Jr., spent Monday visiting the Army Missile Command.

The second announcement is numbered AT-35-13(64) and announces positions as library assistant at GS-4.

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
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**LASER DEMONSTRATED**—The use of lasers in treating cancer in mice was demonstrated to Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command, at Redstone Arsenal recently. The experiments, involving the bombardment of the cancers with a powerful Missile Command developed laser were conducted by Missile Command researchers and Dr. John Peter Minton, a surgical investigator of the National Cancer Institute, National Institutes of Health. A laser (Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation) emits powerful, high energy beams of coherent light. The laser used in the experiments was designed and developed by the Applied Physics Branch of the Command's Electromagnetics Laboratory. Observing part of the experiment are William McKnight, branch chief; Maj. Gen. Zierdt; and Dr. Minton.

## 'Cut Costs,' Col. Macpherson Says

Special emphasis on cost cutting and savings through the Incentive Award Program at the Ordnance Guided Missile School is the goal for this fiscal year, according to Col. William J. Macpherson, commandant, in order that the school keep pace with the 10th anniversary program being carried out throughout Defense and government agencies throughout the United States.

The program which was begun in 1954 with the Incentive Awards Act, has resulted in awards of thousands of dollars to civilian and military personnel, Col. Macpherson said, and it is hoped that

more progress will be made this year.

The goal for the fiscal year is the awarding of 2-4 per cent of personnel, based on civilian strength, with cash for suggestions improving efficiency and safety at the School, he said. This special emphasis is being carried out in accordance with special memoranda from President Lyndon B. Johnson, Assistant Secretary of Defense Cyrus R. Vance and Army Secretary Stephen Ailes.

In the past, cost saving suggestions have resulted in more than \$61 million in savings to the U. S.

government. More than 105,000 suggestions have been adopted from more than 382,000 proposed.

Col. Macpherson urged that supervisory personnel at the School place special emphasis on the program, offering help in drawing up suggestions and pointing out problem areas which might be improved.

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



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# Dolly Flowers Practices What She Preaches

There's a familiar quotation about the hand that rocks the cradle being the one that rules the world, but according to the Army Missile Command's Dolly Flowers, those hands aren't doing all they could about the ruling part.

Dolly, a lady with neatly coiffed gray hair and a trim figure, is a management analyst in the Missile Command's Management Office. She recently received two honors. She was elected state president of the Business and Professional Women's Club, and appointed to the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women.

She points out "Women must assume the responsibilities if they enjoy the privileges," and that "if women would all cooperate and do something about it, they could do anything — elect a woman president, for instance."

Currently the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women is conducting a statewide study in various fields looking for inequalities in the work status of women.

With her strong beliefs in what women can do, and should do, Dolly exemplifies the aims of B&PW—to elevate the standards for business and professional women, promote their interests, bring about a spirit of cooperation among them, and extend their opportunities through education along lines of scientific, vocational and industrial activities. Dolly has been a member 15 years and has held numerous offices in the

Huntsville club. B&PW membership is made up of 170,000 women from all professions and occupations except locomotive engineering! Alabama has 3,500 members.

Dolly is on the Board of Directors of the Huntsville Altrusa Club and has run the gamut of all the club's major chairmanships. Before becoming state president of B&PW, she held the first and second vice presidencies and was state program chairman and World Affairs chairman.

If Dolly were starting her career all over again, she says she would study medicine because she feels that is one way to be of real assistance to people. Her medical interest would turn to the field of psychiatry as she thinks there are many people who need help in straightening their thinking processes.

When she graduated from Madison County High School in Gurley, her father thought the only honorable profession for women was school teaching. This didn't appeal to her, so she persuaded her parents to send her to the North Alabama College of Commerce in Huntsville.

Her first taste of government service came after her marriage to Tom Flowers. They lived in Scottsboro where her husband was the distributor for an oil company, and Dolly was the office manager of the Department of Agriculture office there.

In 1951, her husband and daughter, Juanita, came to work at Red-

stone Arsenal, and persuaded Dolly they should move to Huntsville. They bought eight acres of land west of Huntsville with the thought that they'd raise a few cattle and build a new home on the highway which bordered their property. There was a small house back from the road into which they moved initially.

Before the new home could be built, Dolly's husband died, so she revised her house plans and built a "one person" house rather a family type. She lives there now with Mr. Sandman, a four-year-old Welsh Corgi which is a first cousin of the Queen of England's Corgi.

The land Dolly didn't need for her house was sold when Huntsville started growing. What was to be the Flowers' little ranch is now a Huntsville subdivision.

Juanita is married and lives in California. Dolly has three grandsons, ages six, eight and 10.

Another interest of Dolly's which isn't getting as much attention as she would like to give it just now, is the First Baptist Church where the whole family was formerly very active. Dolly says there was a time when the Flowers family could always keep the choir supplied as she is an alto, Jaunita is a soprano, and Tom was a bass. When her civic club duties lessen she plans to do more church work.

With a responsible position at the Missile Command, her state activities, and part of herself given to Huntsville clubs and her church, she is fully occupied every minute.



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
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## Two Become Eagle Scouts

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# Lance Missile Conference Scheduled To Begin Today

Top management officials of industrial firms working on the Army's new Lance missile system will meet today at the Army Missile Command to discuss progress on the weapon.

Headlining the conference will be such top industry officials as James J. Ling, President of Ling-Temco-Vought, prime contractor for the Lance system, and J. L. Atwood, President and Chairman of the Board at North American Aviation, Inc, a major sub-contractor.

Also expected to be on hand when sessions get underway at 8:30 a.m. today are Willis M. Hawkins, Assistant Secretary of the Army for Research and Development and Maj. Gen. W. B. Bunker, Deputy Commanding General of the Army Materiel Command in Washington, D. C.

Called an Army-Industry conference, the meeting will be the second one of its type to be conducted at the Missile Command. It calls for high level industrial officials to meet over-the-table with military missile experts responsible for the development of new weapons.

Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General, Brig. Gen. Charles W. Eifler, Deputy Commanding General for Land Combat Systems, and Lt. Col. Walter E.

Mehlinger, Lance Project Manager, will be on hand to welcome participants.

In scheduling the meeting, Gen. Zierdt pointed out that he plans to meet periodically in the future with top management officials of major industrial firms working on the Army's missile systems.

"These meetings have a specific purpose," Gen. Zierdt said. "We are looking for new ways by which we in the Army can assist the contractors, and vice versa."

The Lance missile system, around which today's meeting will revolve, is being designed as a surface-to-surface missile system. It is being developed to replace the Lacrosse, Honest John and possibly the Littlejohn.

Lance would complement division tube artillery and would extend the division commander's capability for nuclear and non-nuclear supporting fire.

Now in research and development, Lance will be the first Army missile to use pre-packaged storable liquid propellant. It will be self-contained and self-sustaining on two highly mobile tracked vehicles.

Development of the Lance is under the direction of Col. Mehlinger's Lance Project Office at the Missile Command. Ling-Temco-Vought, prime contractor for

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
Science Conference.

The Conference was sponsored by the Chief of Research and Development. It was designed to disseminate information on significant Army R&D progress.



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
