## Calibration Center Bid Goes To Pearce & Gresham

A Decatur, Ala., firm is evident low bidder for construction of a new Calibration Center for the U. S. Army Missile Command.

Pearce and Gresham Co., entered a bid of \$1,332,544, for the facility which will be more than twice as large as the present Calibration Center where precision measurements traceable to the National Bureau of Standards are made.

Contract bids were opened Thursday by the Mobile District, Army Corps of Engineers, construction agent for the Missile Command. The appropriation for the building was approved by Congress and signed by President Johnson last year.

Ground will be broken for the construction project Monday, April 19, at 10 a.m. The Commanding General of the Missile Command, Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, will take part in the ceremony.

The 150-by-200 feet concrete masonry building will have offices, restrooms and storage rooms located around the perimeter. The three main laboratories will be in the center, separated from the rest of the building by a continuous hallway, which will act as a buffer zone of dead air space.

Because of the accuracy of measurements—some to within one-millionth of an inch—made at the Calibration Center, it has been designed with features unique to the average building. The critical areas where outside vibrations would affect the sensitive instruments will be built on a four-foot thick concrete slab. The floor of the Microwave Standards Laboratory will be detached from the walls so that outside forces, such as ground tremors, will not throw off delicate operations.

# Pentadomes Ready For Armed Forces Day

## Col. Harvey Will Head Air Defense

The Army has announced the reassignment of Col. Clarence C. Harvey, Jr., to the U. S. Army Missile Command as Deputy Commanding General, Air Defense Systems.

His nomination for promotion to the rank of brigadier general has been confirmed by the U. S. Senate.

He will succeed Brig. Gen. Howard P. Persons, Jr., for the second time when he assumes his new duties. In 1961 he followed Gen. Persons as Deputy Chief of Staff, Headquarters, 7th Army, in Europe.

In commenting of the fact that he had been assigned Gen. Persons' job before, he said:

"I told him to keep on picking good assignments as it appeared I was destined to follow in his tracks."

Col. Harvey has been assigned to the Defense Intelligence Agency in the Pentagon since August 1962. He is expected at Redstone in June.

On duty at Redstone Arsenal since August, 1963, Gen. Persons has been reassigned as Assistant Chief of Staff for Operations, Training, Plans and Combat Development, Headquarters, U. S. Army Air Defense Command, Ent Air Force Base, Colorado Springs, Colorado.

At the Missile Command the Deputy Commanding General, Air Defense Systems has responsibility for development and management of missile systems designed for defense of Army field units and American cities against the threat of aerial attack.

Born in Emporia, Kan., 50 years ago, Col. Harvey was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point in the Class of 1938.

An artilleryman, he had various Artillery assignments in the European Theatre of Operations during World War II.

In 1949 he was graduated from the University of Southern California. (See COL. HARVEY on Page 3)

## AOA Meeting Cadets, Teachers Will Start Next Monday Schedule Tours At Missile School

More than 100 industry and Government representatives from all over the United States will be at the Missile Command next Monday for the annual technical meeting of the Bomb and Warhead Section of the American Ordnance Association.

A highlight of the two-day classified meeting will be a panel discussion on, "What Sort of War- (See AOA on Page 3)

The Ordnance Guided Missile School will be visited by two groups of nearly 200 persons this week.

A group of 25 cadets in the Sewanee, Tenn., Military Academy Reserve Officer Training Course will be here Thursday and Friday for an orientation tour as part of the Missile School's effort to support the new ROTC program. The (See CADETS, on Page 3)

Three inflated domes, which have risen on the Redstone Arsenal horizon like giant mushrooms, are signs that Armed Forces Day at the Army's missile center is only a month away.

The air domes will house a majority of the exhibits displayed

during the annual observance. Two are 100 feet in diameter and 50 feet high in the center, and the other 150 by 85 feet.

The 1965 Armed Forces Day activity at Redstone will differ from those in the past two ways. There will be no open house for tours of the Arsenal. But the public will have two days instead of one to see the numerous displays connected with the Army's family of missiles which stand ready to be fired in defense of freedom.

The site of the domes is an area known as the old Jupiter Test Stand, located just west of Patton Road on the northern boundary of the 40,000 acre military reservation. It will be open Saturday, May 15, from 12:30 to 4 p.m., and Sunday, from 2 to 5 p.m., according to Major R. H. Vereen, Armed Forces Day Project Officer.

The two days of activities will be launched Saturday morning with a parade of missiles and brass bands through downtown Huntsville. More than 1,500 troops from the Army, Marines, National Guard and Naval Reserve will march in the parade.

The Armed Forces Day observance at Redstone will be centered around many of the Army's missiles and rockets, ranging from the 20-pound heat-seeking plane killer named Redeye, to the Pershing, which can carry a nuclear warhead to a target 400 miles away. Among them will be one of the newest members of the growing missile family, Lance, a supersonic surface-to-surface missile.

Skydiving and paratroops are on schedule of events for both Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Plans are for a mock striking force from Company B, 20th Special Forces, Alabama National Guard, to parachute from a helicopter and carry out an attack on a nearby "enemy" fortress. Bleachers will be erected so that 1,000 people can sit and watch the war demonstration in fields and woods just west of the airdomes.

Snack facilities will be set up by the Army-Air Force Exchange Service. In a nearby grove of pines will be tables and benches for picnicking.

Redstone units which will have displays at the Armed Forces Day Exhibition will be the Army Missile Command, Missile Support Command, Ordnance Guided Missile School and Nike-X Project Office. Several Army contractors will (See PENTADOMES on Page 3)

Maundy Thursday Communion services are scheduled at 1 p.m. On Good Friday all of the Chaplains are scheduled to speak between 1 and 3 p.m. about the seven last words.

Maundy Thursday, the Catholics will hold Mass and observance of the Last Supper at 5 p.m. Friday Holy Communion will be distributed at 7:30 p.m. Confessions will be heard immediately afterward.

Saturday an Easter Vigil will begin at 11 p.m. and Mass will be celebrated. Confessions are scheduled from 6-8 p.m.

## Sparks Expects 'Strong Rush' To Close Drive

"It is going to take a strong closing rush," said Enoch Sparks early this week, "but I am confident that we will turn in the greatest effort ever in the Joint Fund drive."

The Executive Chairman for the 1965 drive was referring to the fact that participation through the first four weeks of the drive stood at 62 per cent in the National Health Agencies drive and 57 per cent in support of the Federal Service Joint Crusade.

Over 88 per cent of the Arsenal personnel made a voluntary contribution to the National Health Agencies last year while 84 per cent participated in the appeal for funds to support the Joint Crusade.

The sealed envelope drive will officially close on Friday of this week with the final report due into the reports chairman by Monday, April 19. All envelopes should also be turned in at this time and will be forwarded to the state headquarters for the two drives where they will be opened and tabulated.

A report of the amount of contributions made by Arsenal personnel will be printed in the REDSTONE as soon as it is received.

The four-week report indicated that the large directorates and organizations have done exceptionally well while many of the smaller units have fallen behind. Thirteen of the agencies had not even submitted a report.

The Supply & Maintenance Directorate surged into the lead among the large organizations by boosting participation to 84 per cent in each of the drives.

Procurement & Production has reached 80 per cent in the National Health Agency drive and 71 per cent in support of the Joint Crusade. Last week's leader, Research & Development, has 77 per cent for each.

The Missile Support Command jumped up to 73 and 61 per cent

respectively while the Ordnance Guided Missile School shows 60 per cent in each drive.





An elaborate air conditioning system will control temperature, humidity and dust in the laboratories. There will be a complete turnover of air every eight minutes. In the Physical Standards Laboratory, where length measurements are made, the temperature must be maintained to within one-twentieth of a degree of 68 degrees Fahrenheit.

The Electronic and Microwave Standards Laboratories will be enclosed in a 'box' of 28-gauge sheet metal to keep out vibrations. All water, electricity and telephone lines running into the building will be filtered to cut out any interference.

As a worker enters the Physical Standards Laboratory, his shoes will be vacuumed free of dust, and dirt will be removed from the soles as he walks on 'fly-paper-type' material. Then, he will take an air shower. "Ultra-clear room" conditions will be maintained in some parts of the laboratories and

a person entering must change from his street clothes.

The mission of the Calibration Center is to provide calibration services in inspecting, testing and adjusting components of missile and rocket weapon systems. The new facility is being erected because of the steady increase in demand for precision measurements and the lack of desired environmental control in Building 4500, where the Center has been located since it was established in 1961, according to Don I. Hervig, Chief, Calibration Center.

The new Center will be built on a site northeast of the Missile Command's Francis J. McMorrow Missile Laboratories. The building, with 39,280 square feet of floor space, will face Martin Road from the south.

Col. Harvey is married to the former Frances Ford of San Fran-







# Hospitality, Tours, Studies Mixed At School

Take an active program of hospitality, add a generous amount of pre-planned tours, blend in an ultra-modern language lab, sprinkle with co-operation of civic and social clubs, and mix thoroughly with a large dose of traditional Huntsville friendliness. Serves 600 per year.

The result is an effective foreign liaison program, a product of the Foreign Liaison Office at the Guided Missile School.

More than 600 missile students from Belgium, China, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Israel, Italy, Japan, Korea, The Netherlands, Turkey, Spain, Sweden and the United Kingdom are now training in the maintenance of the Pershing, Hawk and Nike Missiles. With them are some wives and children.

Since the foreign missile training program began in 1957, more than 5,000 overseas students and members of their families have come to this Northern Alabama city for courses running as long as a year and a half.

Making certain that they learn more about the U.S.A. than is found in technical missile manuals is the prime goal of the Foreign Liaison Division of the school, headed by Major A. Q. Woodward Jr.

In addition to serving as the official contact for the foreign students and officers at OGMS, the division conducts "Operation Welcome" which ranges from the setting up of local and state-wide tours to giving advice to dependent wives on the location of super markets and on U.S. weights and measures.

"But friendliness does not stop at the liaison office," Capt. Estel Hobbs, Deputy Chief, said. "Civic clubs, 'adopt' countries as group projects and introduce the foreign visitors to the American way of life. Church groups have welcomed our visitors and have staged picnics and other social events on their behalf. Through our sponsorship program, area citizens and the military have become friends of the missilemen and have done everything possible to make them welcome."

The voluntary policy of friendliness adopted by Huntsville has led to a free exchange of views between the visitors and local citizens, Hobbs said.

About 95 per cent of foreign students at the Missile School have been "adopted" by church, civic and social organizations in Huntsville.



## Reserves Install Officers For 1965

# Army Must Be Flexible

Any Army that doesn't allow for the individualism of its men becomes a dismal piece of machinery with no flexibility and no room for change.

This was the view of Col. Thomas J. Cleary Jr., information officer of the Continental Army Command who spoke to 45 U.S. and overseas students Friday at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

Cleary said he believes the reason that so many young men who come into the Army enter with resistance and are anxious to get out is mainly because the services are not always calibrated to allow for individual idiosyncracies and weaknesses.

"These factors must be taken into account in today's Army," he said.

He told the graduates from the United States, Belgium, France, Greece, Italy and Norway that the knowledge they have gained in military has enhanced their individual importance considerably.

William Weissinger, (USA Ret), representing the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army, presented academic achievement plaques to M/Sgt. Andrew Andreopoulos of Greece and Sgt. Francesco Casta of Italy. The two were high men in their Nike Hipar and Simulator Repair course, both having earned grade point averages of over 97 per cent.

"The Association of the U. S. Army has many goals," Weissinger said. "One of its main goals is to award and recognize students in Army schools who have achieved academic excellence."

Weissinger said the coveted award must really be earned, stating that of the some 2,171 stu-

dents who have graduated at the Missile School since last July, only 34 students have received the AUSA plaque.

## AMC Units Relocate Offices

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Physical relocation of some elements of Headquarters, Army Materiel Command and Headquarters, Supply and Maintenance Command were announced Monday.

Spokesmen emphasized that the move was not a merger and that the two organizations would continue to function as separate entities.

The relocations are to be accomplished between 24 April and 5 May. Three sites in the Washing-

ton area are involved, Headquarters AMC in Bldg. T-7; the NASAIF Bldg. near Bailey's Crossroads in Arlington, Va., and the Naval Weapons Plant in the District of Columbia.

Units of AMC Headquarters being relocated to the NASAIF building include: Director of Personnel and Training, Safety Division of the AMC Administrative Office, Director of Installations and Services; Patent Division of the General Counsel's Office and the Finance and Accounting Division of the Comptroller and Director of Programs office.

Units of SMC Headquarters which will remain at the NASAIF building include: Procurement and Services Division; Facilities Division, selected elements of the Plans and Programs Office which support those two divisions; Director of Transportation and Installations, Security Office, Safety Office, Finance and Accounting Division of the Comptroller and Director of Programs; Directorate of Administration, Personnel and Training Division less the Administrative Services Division.

The Mutual Security Agency and Data Center of AMC will move to

the Naval Weapons Plant. All remaining elements of Headquarters, AMC, and Headquarters, SMC, not identified for location in the NASAIF Building and the Weapons Plant will be located in Building T-7 after 5 May.


