## New Radar To Be Installed By ARPA On Roi Namur Isle

The Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Department of Defense has selected Sylvania Electric Products Co., Waltham, Mass. to design, fabricate, and install a new experimental radar on Roi Namur Island of the Kwajalein Atoll.

Designated Project ALTAIR (ARPA Long Range Tracking and Instrumentation Radar) the experimental radar will be used in conjunction with already operating instrumentation in the area.

It is anticipated that the project will further increase the capability of Project PRESS to conduct studies of the physics of vehicles reentering the earth's atmosphere.

Project ALTAIR will be more sensitive and will operate at different frequencies than radars now in use in ARPA's ballistic missile defense research program.

The total funding of the project will approximate \$20 million exclusive of military construction funds. Of this amount Sylvania

will receive initial funding of approximately \$12 million for the fabrication of hardware. Some portion of these funds will be utilized for subcontracting for the design and fabrication of certain components.

The project will be monitored for ARPA by the U. S. Army Missile Command at Huntsville, Ala. The Lincoln Laboratory of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, technical director of Project PRESS, will act as ARPA's technical consultant.

The ALTAIR Project will be operated closely in conjunction with the Army Materiel Command's Nike-X Project. Information will be exchanged between the two projects.

At the Missile Command, the ALTAIR office of the ARPA Division in the Research and Development Directorate is monitoring the program. William Lindberg heads the ARPA Division, and A. Y. Harper the ALTAIR office.

## Research And Development Chief Promoted To Colonel

Lt. Col. Stanton W. Josephson, Director of the U.S. Army Missile Command's Research and Development Directorate, Friday was promoted to the rank of full colonel.

Pinning the new insignia on Col. Josephson was the "boss" of the Missile Command himself, Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt.

As Director of R&D, Col. Josephson heads a vast network of highly skilled scientists and engineers. Their job is to keep the Missile Command abreast of technology in missilery as well as to take part in many of the missile advancements.

His shop works on the Army's missiles of tomorrow.

Col. Josephson was assigned to R&D almost a year ago, coming to Redstone Arsenal from Washington where he completed studies at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

Prior to that, he served as Assistant Operations Officer to the Field Command of the Armed Forces Special Weapons Project at Sandia Base, N.M., and with the Atomic Energy Commission as Chief of the Overseas Test Branch.

A graduate of the United States Military Academy, Col. Josephson received his M.S. Degree in Meteorology from the University of California.

During World War II, he saw duty with the Sixth Army Group in Europe. In the Korean War, he was

Executive Officer there for the 1st Ordnance Battalion.

Among other assignments, he served a second tour in Europe as Chief of the Material Division of the Advanced Weapons Support Command in Germany. In 1963, he was named to the Operations Group, Staff and Faculty, of the Army War College, remaining there until selected to attend the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

## Speed Reduced On Rideout Road

A reduction in speed limit for vehicles traveling on Redstone Arsenal's Rideout Road has been announced by the Army.

Effective since Monday, May 17, the new speed limit is 50 miles per hour, reduced from 60 miles per hour allowed previously. Signs indicating the new speed limit have been placed along Rideout Road.

Purpose of the change is to establish a safer speed limit for the amount of traffic using Rideout, according to Col. R. M. Allegier, Assisting for Operations and Security, Army Missile Support Command.

## British Visitors Due Today

A high-ranking British Army officer and one of England's top Civil Service scientists will arrive at Redstone Arsenal today for a two-day visit as guests of the Army Missile Command.

They are Maj. Gen. David Boswell Egerton, United Kingdom Director General of Artillery, Ministry of Defense, and Edgar Warren Chivers, Director of the Royal Armament Research and Development Establishment. Gen. Egerton last visited Redstone Arsenal in July 1963.

Missile Command officials will discuss with the visitors the present status of Redeye, Mauler, TOW, and Shillelagh projects, future missile concepts and supporting research on propellants and guidance. A tour of the Army Inertial Guidance and Control Laboratory also is on the schedule.

Gen. Egerton was commissioned in the Royal Artillery in 1934 and served in India with the Field and Mountain Artillery. He was promoted to Captain at the outbreak of World War II, and served in France and the Middle East, where he commanded a Horse Artillery Battery. He is an Officer of the Order of the British Empire and has been decorated with the Military Cross.

## Exhibit At Airdome May Become Permanent

Army officials at Redstone Arsenal today expressed pleasure over public reception of a new display area centered around three air inflated domes just off Patton Road near the Bob Wallace Avenue intersection.

An estimated 45,000 persons visited the exhibit center Saturday and Sunday afternoons as a part of the local observation of Armed Forces Week.

An announcement concerning opening of the area to the public on a permanent basis is expected within a few days. Prior to the Armed Forces Week observance Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the U. S. Army Missile Command, told local civic leaders that the Army would make plans for keeping the display open on a permanent basis if public reception warranted.

Exhibits on display over the weekend were set up especially for the Armed Forces event and many of them are committed elsewhere. Others are built around equipment used daily for research in Army laboratories at Redstone. A permanent orientation center would contain displays of historical as well as current interest which would remain as exhibits for an indefinite period.



# Redhead/Roadrunner Goes At McGregor Range N. M.

First firing of a production model of the U.S. Army's Roadrunner target missile was completed at McGregor Range, N.M., the Army announced today.

In the firing, the first in a series of evaluation missions, the missile flew faster than Mach 1—the speed of sound—and at a programmed altitude of 6,200 feet above sea level.

At completion of its prescribed mission, the target missile was returned to the ground by its self-contained parachute recovery system for probable re-flight.

The Roadrunner is the low-level version of the versatile Redhead/Roadrunner target missile system, designed and built by North American Aviation's Columbus (Ohio) Division, under the technical supervision of the U.S. Army Missile Command.

The Roadrunner can fly as slow as 700 mph and only 300 feet off the ground to simulate ground-hugging aircraft and missiles. At the other end of its performance spectrum, it is designed to attain Mach 2 speeds of about 1,300 mph at an altitude of 60,000 feet.

Primary use of the Redhead/Roadrunner is as a target for missile batteries of the U.S. Army Air Defense Command. The series of evaluation firings is in preparation for operational deployment of the Roadrunner missile later this year.

The Redhead/Roadrunner is ground-launched by a solid propellant booster rocket manufactured by NAA's Rocketdyne Solid Rocket Division, McGregor, Texas. The booster is attached to the underside of the missile body and drops away after burnout.

The missile is sustained in flight by a ramjet engine produced by the Marquardt Corporation, Van Nuys, Calif., and Ogden, Utah. The ramjet engine, which burns standard JP-4 fuel, is mounted on a pylon atop the missile.

Development testing of the target missile system was performed at the Army's White Sands, N. M., Missile Range.



Col. Harvey arrived Monday evening and has been receiving briefings on Missile Command missions and activities.


He is a 1938 graduate of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, and in 1949 received a Master of Science degree in Guided Missiles and Aeronutronics from



trees where tables and benches had been placed. Mobile units from the Post Exchange did a "land office" business selling cold drinks, hot dogs, hamburgers, ice cream and candy.

From cities and towns and cross-roads all over Tennessee Valley and beyond they came—nearly 1,000 in all—to Redstone Arsenal Saturday and Sunday to see the Army flex its "Power for Peace" muscles on Armed Forces Day.

The weather was hot, with the mercury threatening to go into the 90s, but young and old alike saved it to see the Army's missiles and rockets, and the men and equipment that are ready to defend them in defense of freedom. The Provost Marshal estimated that 45,000 people saw the exhibits set up on the old Jupiter Test land off Patton Road. It was one of the biggest crowds to come to Redstone on the holiday set aside to honor the men and women who march in uniform under the Stars and Stripes.

For the first time in recent years, the Armed Forces Day exhibits were open two days instead of one and people within easy morning distance of Huntsville took advantage of the double opportunity. On Sunday afternoon, 8,000 vehicles brought more than 30,000 to the display area. Approximately half that number came Saturday.

The center of activities was three giant inflated air domes kept erect by a battery of electric blowers, which alone was fascinating to many of the visitors. In the big dome, 150 feet in diameter and 85 feet high in the center, were displays of the Army Missile Command and Nike-X Project Office. The Army Ordnance Guided Missile School and Army Missile Support Command each had their exhibits in smaller domes—100 by 60 feet.

The weekend of activities got off to a start Saturday morning with a parade through downtown Huntsville. For 37 minutes, the parade of school brass bands, Army missiles and troops wound through streets lined with thousands of onlookers. Marching troops of the Army, Marines, Naval Reserve and National Guard.

On the reviewing stand for the parade were various military and civilian dignitaries. Among them were Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General, Army Missile Command; Col. I. O. Drewry, Nike-X Project Manager; and Col. W. J. Macpherson, Commandant, Ordnance Guided Missile School. Also on the stand were Mayor Glenn Hearn of Huntsville and James R. Record, Chairman, Madison County Board of Commissioners.

The missiles in the parade—Hawk, Pershing, Corporal, Nike Zeus, Lance—were on display at the air domes Saturday and Sunday afternoons. With them were several of the Army's smaller missiles like Shillelagh, TOW, and Redeye, as well as some target missiles.

Popular with almost everyone who came to Redstone on Armed Forces Day were the parachute jumps and skydiving. Troops of Company B, 20th Special Forces, Alabama National Guard, made several paradrops from a helicopter flown up from Ft. Rucker, Ala. Three members of the Huntsville Skydiving Club gave a thrill to those on the ground by leaping out of a helicopter at 12,500 feet, and soaring 10,000 feet before opening their colorful parachutes.

The tanks displayed outside the domes seemed to hold a special appeal for youngsters. At any time when the area was open either way, a covey of kids could be seen clambering over the armored giants. Children also stood in line to fire a mockup of the LAW anti-tank missile, which people anywhere in the area had no difficulty hearing.

"I think everyone really enjoyed the show," said Maj. R. H. Vereen, Armed Forces Day Project Officer. "The turnout was excellent. Had we had any more people I don't know how we would have handled them." Some people came early and stayed late at the exhibit site. A few families even brought picnics and ate under the pine

# Wetheral Is Secretary For Aerospace Meeting

Thomas G. Wetheral of the Army Missile Command's Directorate of Research and Development at Redstone Arsenal will serve as secretary for the Pneumatic Systems portion of the program at the Aerospace Fluid Power Systems and Equipment Conference on May 19 in Los Angeles, Calif. The Conference is sponsored by the Society of Automotive Engineers.

An aerospace research engineer in the Control Systems Branch of the Army Inertial Guidance and Control Laboratory at the Missile Command, Wetheral first started work at Redstone in 1957 in the Guidance and Control Laboratory of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. 



He began his government service in 1941, only a few months before the war broke out, enlisted during the early part of the war, and has served since the war with the Veteran's Administration as well as at the School.

His work has been noted by Col. William J. Macpherson, Missile School commandant, as an outstanding example of faithful attendance to duties and his services.

Jones was appointed to the staff of the Missile School in May 1953, thereby qualifying as one of the real pioneers in the field. His job at the school is to evaluate courses of instruction and teach methods of instruction to newly appointed teachers on the faculty.

Scroggins regained breathing but was still unconscious when taken to Limestone Hospital. Hospital authorities said the youth was in "good condition and resting comfortably."



## Mrs. U. S. Savings Bonds Appreciates Efforts Here

It was this report, relayed to Mrs. Lieberg by Col. David Marcelle, Redstone Arsenal Finance and Accounting Officer, that prompted her opening comment. She added, "This is about the best possible endorsement for my work during the past year, and assures me that my time has been well spent."

Col. Marcelle told Mrs. Lieberg that her last visit had been the start of a year around program of emphasizing the Savings Bond program throughout the year, rather than for a short campaign each summer.

Graduates Friday will include representatives from Greece, Germany, Italy, Japan, Nationalist China, The Netherlands and Turkey, as well as the U.S. Army.




