GRAHAM COMMANDS OGMS

Gen. Besson To Address AUSA Meeting Tonight

New officers will be installed tonight for the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the United States Army. The installation will be part of a program which will be climaxed by an address by Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., Commanding General of the U.S. Army Materiel Command, Washington.

Balloting for the new officers was completed the past week based on a slate submitted by William T. Weissinger, III, chairman of the Nominating Committee.

Those nominated were: president, Dr. Frederick S. Schultz; first vice-president, William T. Weissinger, III; second vice-president, Vance Thornton; secretary and treasurer, Jack Altherr.

Nominees for board of directors are: three year term, J. O. Johnson, Carl Leary, and Reavis O'Neal, Jr.; two year, Donald Voorhees; one year, Dan C. Boone.

Speaking on the subject of "Missions Unlimited—U.S. Army," Gen. Besson will discuss some of the current activities of his organization of which the Army Missile Command is a major element and which includes the Nike-X Project Office.

The meeting, which is an annual affair for all members, their wives and guests, will be held at the Redstone Officers Open Mess.

The meeting will start at 6:30 p.m.

This will be Gen. Besson's first public appearance in the Huntsville area. Invited to the meeting will be Army commanders of key installations in the southeast.

Project Defender Contract Goes To General Electric

The Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Department of Defense has announced the award of a \$550,669 contract to the General Electric Company, Philadelphia, Pa., for development work as part of PROJECT DEFENDER.

The award was negotiated and executed by the Procurement and Production Directorate of the Army Missile Command and will be monitored by the Missile Command Research and Development Directorate.

Work authorized by the contract will be performed at General Electric's Valley Forge Space Technology Center near Philadelphia.

Colonel Back For Second Tour

Col. Erwin M. Graham, new commandant of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School, is expected to arrive at Redstone Arsenal this week and to assume command of the activity on Tuesday, July 6.

He and his family are to occupy quarters at 51 Bomford Drive at Redstone Arsenal.

A feature of his assumption of command is that Col. Graham once served as a principal organizer and operating head of the Missile School while it was being established back in 1952. At that time, it was under the jurisdiction of the commanding general of Redstone Arsenal, with the assistant commandant directly in charge. At that time, the school had only two or three instructors and a handful of students.

Col. Graham brings wide experience in Ordnance and missile work and an extensive educational background to his new post.

Born in Pensacola, Fla., he earned a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering at Mississippi State University (See COL. GRAHAM on Page 3)

Highway Products Receives Contract

The Army has announced the award of a \$1.8 million contract for manufacture of launchers for the Hawk ground-to-air missile.

The contract went to Highway Products, Inc., Kent, Ohio.

Hawk, in operation with American and NATO troops, provides defense against low altitude, high

performance aircraft. Headquarters for management of the missile system is at the Army Missile Command on Redstone Arsenal. Col. George McBride is Project Manager.

The launcher is a mobile firing platform mounted on two rubber-tired wheels. It will accommodate three missiles at a time.

Capt. Carlton moves to his new job from the Missile Intelligence Directorate where he has been working since he came to Redstone last September.

A native of Groveton, Texas, he has a bachelor's degree in Physics from San Houston State College, and a masters degree in Nuclear Physics from the University of Alabama. He is a member of Delta Tau Delta social fraternity, and Sigma Xi honorary. He has earned the Army Parachutist Badge.

The captain entered the Army in 1960 and has been stationed at Ft. Sill, Okla., Ft. Bragg, N.C., and at Tuscaloosa, Ala., while he attended the University. He came to the Missile Command on completion of his studies there.

We need look no further than the nearest depressed, strife-torn nation under Communist domination for the answer.




It is pledges such as these which have kept America a free and independent country.

At the Marshall Space Flight Center, another 1500 wage board employees will receive the pay raise, a spokesman said.

The pay increase averages from about 4 cents to about 6 cents an hour, depending on the employee's position, and will be effective June 27 for Army employees and in the near future for MSFC. The new pay rates resulted from a recent wage survey of the Huntsville locality under the direction of the Army-Air Force Wage Board and NASA.

dren, Diane, Elizabeth, Janet L., David E. and Mary D., ranging in age from 21 to two years of age.


Col. Graham's father is the mayor of Monticello, Miss.







ARPA Awards \$1.3 Million To Chrysler

A \$1,310,346 contract has been awarded to Chrysler Corporation in support of a missile firing program for the Advanced Research Projects Agency, the Army Missile Command announced Friday.


The award to Chrysler's Missile and Space Division calls for refurbishment, checkout and launch services of Redstone missiles and ground support equipment in connection with Project Defender.

Modifications to the missile and ground equipment will be performed at the Michigan Army Missile Plant located north of Detroit where Chrysler served as prime contractor for the Redstone and Jupiter Weapons Systems. The missile will be launched at the Pacific Missile Range. The Redstone was selected because of its proven reliability, mobility, and flexibility which makes it adaptable to this program with a minimum cost and reaction time.

As a weapons system and space booster Redstone has an overall performance record of 95% successful flights in over 80 launchings. In its final 6 years of operation, the Redstone tactical system ran up a string of 25 successful flights in a row, the last 6 of which were conducted from the White Sands Missile Range during 1963.

The Army's Redstone missile has been used for several important missions including placing the free world's first satellite (Explorer) in orbit and placing the United State's first astronauts in a sub-orbital flight. Several other programs utilizing Redstone for new missions are being considered.

ARPA is an agency of the Department of Defense and is conducting a series of investigations on techniques and concepts for ballistic missile defense. The U. S. Army Missile Command at Red-




will be done in the company's Andover and Waltham, Mass., plant.

A \$2,102,733 award is for engineering services for the Hawk, the work to be performed in the Raytheon plant, Andover, Mass.


The contracts were executed and negotiated by the Army Missile

University Center Lowers Fees For Undergraduates

UNIVERSITY, Ala. — Fees for full-time undergraduate students at the University of Alabama in Huntsville have been reduced to \$100 per quarter including a \$5.00 student activity fee, effective Sept. 1, 1965.

In making this announcement, Dr. Frank A. Rose, President, U. of A. pointed out that this brings this fee at Huntsville in line with the fee charged in Tuscaloosa and has been made possible by an executive amendment recommended by Gov. George C. Wallace and approved by the 1965 Legislature at the Special Education Session.

Dr. Rose said: "This amendment made a conditional appropriation for the program in Huntsville. On the assurance of Gov. Wallace that the appropriation would be granted, we are announcing the reduction in fees now in order that students planning to enroll in the program at Huntsville this fall may know their financial obligations.

In commenting on this announce-

ment, Mr. Clyde Reeves, vice president of Huntsville affairs, expressed gratification that fees for full-time undergraduate students would now be the same at Huntsville and Tuscaloosa.

He pointed out that fees at the Undergraduate level for part-time students would continue at \$15 per credit hour as heretofore. This he indicated is comparable to the fees charged at the University Center in Birmingham.



The NDTA promotes the national transportation policy in the United States and provides coordinated efforts between the civilian transportation industry and local and federal government agencies to make full use of all transportation capabilities in times of defense.

It also coordinates in times of disaster by creating a central point through which the capabilities of industry and government may be used to the fullest advantage.

MATS To Be MAC

Scott AFB, Ill. (AFPS)—Beginning Jan. 1, 1966, the Military Air Transport Service (MATS) will officially be known as the Military Air Command (MAC), according to a MATS news release.

Representative L. Mendel Rivers D-S.C., Chairman of the House Armed Service Committee, who introduced the bill calling for the name change, said it is more descriptive of the true function performed by MATS and provides recognition of its vital mission.




Following the Air Show, which ends June 21, the CHINOOK will tour other military installations in Europe.

Reduction Announced

The U. S. Army Missile Command Monday announced a 49 man reduction of its approximately 9,500 civilian employee work force.

This action is the result of recent Army manpower surveys of the Command and improved management practices. These actions require a minor realignment of the Command's work force so that employees now in jobs which have been eliminated can be placed in vacancies in other organizations within the Command to the extent possible. In some areas, however, it is impossible to reassign certain skills and therefore it will be necessary to effect a minor reduction.

Letters to employees affected by the realignment will be sent about July 15. Each employee affected by the realignment will be given at least a 60 day notice prior to final action.

The reduction amounts to less than one percent of the Command's total civilian work force.

The reductions do not indicate any change in importance of the Missile Command's missions in managing the Army's high priority missile weapons programs. As a matter of fact, during the past year the Command has been given additional responsibilities and missions.

Maximum efforts will be made to place personnel in vacant positions during this period of realignment.

Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command, said everything possible will be done to assist personnel affected to find other jobs.

Other Government agencies, U. S. persons being separated. Civil Service Employment Service and private vice regulations governing a re-industries will be contacted in an effort to assist in placement of the ed.

EMPLOYMENT







Spanish Graduates Hear Military Attache To U. S.

The Spanish military attache to the U. S. credits the U. S. Army with helping to end his country's "isolation" in defense.

"Spain is like an aircraft that has been grounded for a long time and now it begins to take off. The United States has put fuel in its tanks," Brig. Gen. Francisco Coloma told graduates at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School Friday.

Coloma thanked the U. S. Army for training his countrymen in missile maintenance. Eighty graduated from the missile school Fri-

day. The United States helped Spain by agreeing to sell the country the Hawk Air Defense Missile System, already a standard weapon of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Coloma said.

The official said Spain had been fighting communism successfully since 1936. He said it was the enemy, communism, that maneuvered the isolation of Spain in 1945.

Coloma described Spain as "a soft dictatorship" in a new conference prior to his speech. He


