## Employee Development, Training Experts To Meet

Employee Development and Training experts in Government and education will be featured Sept. 27, in Atlanta during the annual meeting of the Atlanta Region Federal Training Council.

Hammond B. Smith, Director of the Atlanta Region, Civil Service Commission, will be keynote speaker when the meeting opens at the Georgian Terrace Hotel.

Dr. David J. Schwartz, Professor of Marketing at Georgia State College, will be guest speaker at the banquet to be held that night.

Washington Level Policies on Federal Training Programs will be discussed by Fred T. Wooten, Chief of Training and Development, Office of Civilian Personnel, Department of the Army, and Kenneth Mulligan, Director of the Office of Career Development, U.S. Civil Service Commission.

Wooten will speak on "Training and Career Development Program Administration," and Mulligan will speak on "New Trends and Future Demands of Employee and Career Development Programs."

In addition to Dr. Schwartz,

there will be three other Georgia educators taking part on the program. They will be discussing the general topic "Organization and Objectives of Supervisory and Management Training Programs."

Dr. Elbert T. Eggers, Professor of Management at Georgia State College will speak on training programs for personnel on the supervisory level; Management and Executive programs will be the topic of discussion by George E. Maddox, Professor of Management at Georgia Institute of Technology; while William A. Egerton, Professor of Management at Oglethorpe College will speak on providing continuity in supervisory and management development.

During the afternoon session, the meeting will be broken into four groups to discuss different phases of training programs. Group subjects and leaders will be: "Use of Non-Government Training," James Dowdy, Chief, Training Branch, Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Ala.; "Re-Training of Displaced Employees,"

## Gen. Zierdt Gives Key Address To Coordinators

"The team at Redstone can do anything—if it knows what is to be done and is given the proper leadership," Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt told the kickoff rally for the Combined Federal Campaign at the Rocket Auditorium Monday morning.

The Commanding General of the Army Missile Command was the keynote speaker officially opening the first fund-raising campaign ever staged at Redstone under the Federal Government's new 'one-drive a year concept.'

The six-weeks drive combines the United Givers' Fund that was conducted annually in the fall, with the Joint Fund that was previously held each spring. The drive supports over 50 local, national and international fund-raising agencies.

Other speakers on the kickoff

program were Col. Thomas Cooke, Commander of the Army Missile Support Command, Col. I. O. Drewry, Nike X Project Manager, Col. Erwin Graham, Commandant, Ordnance Guided Missile School, and Dennis Garrison, national vice-president of the American Federation of Government Employees.

Arthur Douyard, Chairman of the Huntsville - Madison County UGF, spoke briefly as did Mrs. Lillian Meade, representing the eight National Health Agencies and Mrs.

## Pershing Practice Firings Scheduled At Green River

Two Pershing missiles are scheduled to be fired from a desert site near Green River, Utah, one day the first of October as part of a new series of annual practice firings by troops which operate the U. S. Army's longest range missile system.

One round of the surface-to-surface missile will be fired by a West German Air Force missile group, and the other by the 2nd Battalion, 44th Artillery, a Pershing unit stationed at Ft. Sill, Okla. Both will impact in a pre-determined target area of White Sands Missile Range, N. M., approximately 400 miles away.

Although German Pershing un-

its have fired at White Sands before as part of their initial organization training, this will be the first time a group has returned for additional training. The firings are conducted in the United States because there are no range facilities in Europe which will provide desired flight data.

The two-stage, solid-propellant Pershing is managed at the Army Missile Command. Col. Edwin I. Donley is Pershing Project Manager.

Pershing is operational with U. S. Army Artillery battalions in the United States and Europe, as well as with units of the Federal Republic of Germany.

## Officer Candidate Training Opens

FORT MONROE VA.—The Continental Army Command will expand its Officer Candidate Training Program from an annual input of 3400 to an input of 11,700, beginning in October.

The U.S. Army Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, where some 2000 candidates were trained in FY 1965 will receive a total of 3600 candidates in FY 1966. At Fort Sill, Okla. the U.S. Army Artillery School will receive 2,700 candidates as compared to the 1200 trained in 1965.

Three Officer Candidate Schools will be established at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, Fort Knox, Kentucky, and Fort Gordon. At Fort Belvoir, 1900 Engineer candidates will be trained during FY 1965. Fort Gordon will begin Signal training for 900 candidates.

At the U.S. Armor School, Fort Knox, a total of 2600 candidates for Quartermaster, Transportation, Ordnance and Armor branches will be trained in FY 1966. All candidates will receive 13 weeks of Branch Immaterial training at Fort Knox. During the following nine weeks, Armor candidates will remain at Fort Knox and the others will attend appropriate Branch schools.

Officer candidates in Military Police, Intelligence, Chemical, Medical Service Corps and Finance Branches will attend Infantry OCS at Fort Benning, Georgia. Following commissioning the new lieutenants will attend appropriate Branch Basic Officer courses as required.

Expanded OCS classes will be continued as long as necessary to meet the additional requirements of the Army for junior officers.

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
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

Ruth Ferrari, speaking on behalf of the four International Welfare Agencies.

Speaking to an assemblage of area chairmen who will carry the program to the people, Gen. Zierdt said, "The team spirit is there—it is now your job to marshal it and to provide the leadership to make it go."

He told them that he knew that Redstone personnel can do anything, because, "they have proven so a thousand times." As proof for his statement, Gen. Zierdt made reference to the response of the Redstone team to the Savings Bond campaign, to the way they have answered the call for blood donations, and to the outstanding success that has become a tradition at the Arsenal in UGF and Joint Fund drives of the past.

He called on the campaign workers to carry on an educational type solicitation in such a way that all contributions are made voluntarily. "Education and effective persuasion are more productive than pressure," the General said, and then added, "I don't want a pressure campaign, I want a successful one."

The team spirit which Gen. Zierdt mentioned in his remarks, was exemplified further by the Commanders of the Support Command, Nike X and OGMS. Each called on the personnel of their organization to get behind the campaign and make it another in the long line of successful Redstone drives.

Col. Cooke pointed out that his organization had already made strides toward a successful drive. He stated that six of the Support Command organizations had already attained 100 per cent.

Leonard Brockman, Executive Chairman for the 1966 drive, served as Master of Ceremonies for the kick off rally. Chaplain (Maj.) John Kirkland gave the convocation.

Also appearing on the program were the 55th Army Band and Woodrow Waesche, of the Rohm and Haas Co., who closed the program by singing "God Bless America."





## Guard Works Year 'Round

WASHINGTON (ANF) — Army and Air National Guardsmen were on emergency State duty somewhere in the United States on all but 49 days during the first half of 1965.

A total of 24,034 Army Guardsmen and 1,384 Air Guardsmen responded to local, State and regional emergencies. The periods

of active duty ranged from one day to several weeks, totaling 132 of the 181 days, January through June.

Missions included flying reconnaissance over flooded areas in Minnesota, riot control, provision of emergency power to tornado-stricken communities, evacuation of families threatened by floods and blizzards and the cordoning off of an entire section of Wichita, Kan., following a major air disaster.

## Heavy Equipment

Army and Air National Guard aircraft and the bulldozers, road graders and scoop loaders of Army National Guard Engineer battalions were among the major items of equipment employed.

Except for Federal service by Alabama Guardsmen protecting the Selma marchers, the emergency duty was performed either by State expense or as non-paid contributed service by individual Guardsmen and entire units.



# Third Army ROTC Riflemen Take Top Honors In Ohio

HEADQUARTERS, THIRD U.S. ARMY, Fort McPherson, Ga.—The Third Army ROTC Rifle Team defeated all other participating teams in the ROTC-Service Academy Category, including West Point, by winning the National Trophy Team Match and the National Trophy Infantry Team Match, last month at Camp Perry, Ohio.

The team, awarded the Minuteman Trophy for their achievement, represents all Junior and Senior ROTC personnel in Third Army. The Minuteman Trophy was established in 1925 and is awarded each year to the high team.

Consisting of six men, the team competed against seven other ROTC teams of all the US Army area, West Point and the Air Force Academy.

The Distinguished Marksmanship Badge was won by Cadet Terry T. Turner, a high school senior from the Georgia Military College in Barnsville. The Badge is the highest individual award obtainable at the matches.

Staff Sergeant Troy Turner, father of the young cadet, has been a shooter and coach for over 16 years at various Marksmanship

units and now in the Panama Canal Zone. Ironically, SSgt. Turner, with all his shooting know-how, has never won the medal that his 18-year-old son won.

Selection of the cadets for the team is made when the best shooters from all the colleges and high schools are nominated by Professors of Military Science to the ROTC Branch, Third Army. The Cadre personnel who instruct and take the team to the matches then select the best men on the basis of their shooting ability, small bore shooting averages and the future potential of the cadets.

A ten man team is taken to the matches and six shooters are chosen to represent the team in individual matches.





The foreign student information program is conducted by all Continental Army Command service schools as a means of acquainting the visitors with U.S. customs and institutions.




