

RCA Gets SAM-D Contract

A \$1,805,337 contract for continued work on a new concept of air defense for the field Army was announced Monday by the Department of the Army.

Called SAM-D (Surface-to-Air Missile—Development), the cost plus fixed fee contract was made to Radio Corporation of America, Moorestown, N. J.

Planned for use primarily against high performance aircraft but having some defensive capability against short range tactical missiles, SAM-D is a new look at what field commanders can expect in the 1970's.

This program is expected to provide an advanced air defense system which will eventually replace the Nike Hercules and Hawk systems.

SAM-D is monitored by the Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, where Col. B. R. Luczak is SAM-D Project Manager.

The missile system will be highly mobile with units mounted on standard tracked or wheeled vehicles, but also could be employed in semi-fixed installations. It will include advanced radars, com-

puters, data processing techniques and missile components applicable to a wide range of possible future air defense systems.

The Missile Command's Procurement and Production Directorate negotiated the contract.

Army Band Concert Set At Lee High

The U.S. Army Field Band will present a concert at Lee High School Auditorium Oct. 22, at 8 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Association of the United States Army.

Tickets for the event have been distributed.

The Soldiers' Chorus is an integral part of the 100 piece band and includes instrumentalists as well as vocalists.

The Band's motto is also its musical signature, "We are the Kings of the Highway," an old Infantry song. The repertoire includes all-time Broadway favorites as well as the marching tunes that have become classics, popular and semi-classical compositions.

The Band plays all over the United States and has given concerts in 15 countries of Europe.

Blood Donations Still Exceed Redstone's Quota

Redstone personnel answered the monthly call for blood donors last Wednesday with another quota-shattering response. A total of 540 pints of whole blood were contributed to regional blood bank by the 573 volunteers who answered the call.

The turnout marked the 23rd consecutive month in which the monthly quota has been exceeded. Personnel of Missile Command, (See BLOOD on Page 3)

Campaign Gifts Near Record High

The addition of over \$27,000 during the past week has boosted the total amount collected in support of the 1966 Combined Federal Campaign at the Arsenal to \$224,788.94. This is just a little over \$10,000 less than was collected last year in a six-weeks drive.

Making up the total amount collected to date is \$145,466.28 in payroll deduction authorizations and \$79,322.66 in cash donations. The contributions have been made by 10,291 participants, or 81 per cent of the personnel included.

The fourth weekly report submitted last Friday showed that the Missile Intelligence Directorate is the fourth organization element to reach 100 per cent in participation.

Jim Williams, the Directorate's area chairman, reported that all 91 persons assigned to Missile Intelligence are now listed as participants. Their total donation is \$1,393.30.

Other organizations that boast 100 per cent participation are, the Comptroller and Director of Programs, Abner McNaron, chairman, the Office of the Commanding General, Robert Lowery, chairman, and the Quality and Reliability Management Office, where Ed Michaels is the area chairman.

Bob Lowery also has the chairman responsibility for the General Support and Personal Staff Offices, a consolidated group of small offices. They are just four percentage points short of reaching perfection.

Another organization that has turned in an outstanding record in this year's drive is the Thiokol Company which has completed its drive with 88 per cent participation.

H. L. Speake, chairman for the Thiokol drive said that 588 of the 669 employees had made a contribution to the campaign. Their total donation of \$20,912.17 was 97 per cent of the pre-drive goal and the highest amount ever donated.

The significant part of the success was in the average contribution of \$31.26 which is more than \$9 higher than last year when there were almost 300 more workers on the Thiokol payroll.

PFC Plaisted Graduates With 98.1

A soldier from New Hampshire last Friday won the Army's highest academic award at the Ordnance Guided Missile School with an average of 98.1 in a difficult air defense radar course.


PFC Norman A. Plaisted, 21, son of Mrs. Barbara C. Wolfe of New Hampton, N. H., received a special plaque from the Association of the U. S. Army for his accomplishment. Only 165 of the school's 37,000 graduates have qualified for the award.

A graduate of Franklin High School, Franklin, N.H., PFC Plaisted was associated with Station WMUR-TV in Manchester prior to joining the Army last year.

Plaisted was graduated along with the first group of students to be trained in conventional ammunition at the Missile School. The mixture of missile and ammunition training was ordered earlier this year by the Continental Army Command which now regards missiles as part of its munitions inventory.

While the world's leaders search for solutions, the American soldier continues to express, with the courage and enthusiasm that only he can know, his belief in our struggle for tomorrow. (ANF)

Management Officials Discuss Lance System

Top management officials of industrial firms working on the Army's new Lance missile system met with the military at the Army Missile Command Thursday to discuss progress on the battlefield weapon.

Headlining the one-day conference were industrial officials from LTV's Michigan Aerospace Division, prime contractor for Lance and North American Aviation, Inc., a major sub-contractor.

From the Army and the Department of Defense, came officials from the Assistant Secretary of the Army, Director of Defense Research and Engineering and the Office of the Chief of Research and Development.

Called an Army-Industrial conference, this was the second for Lance and the third meeting of its type hosted by the Missile Command. It calls for industry to

meet with military missile experts "to strengthen the ties and maintain effective communication between members of the development team."

Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Missile Command, greeted conferees, and Brig. Gen. C. W. Eifler, Deputy Commander for Land Combat Systems, participated in discussions during the day. Col. W. E. Mehlinger, Project Manager, gave a presentation on Lance, along with John Robins, Deputy Project Manager.

The group looked at Lance hardware during the day, including the system's self-propelled launcher, lightweight launcher and transporter loader.

Now in engineering development, Lance will provide fire support, both nuclear and conventional, to infantry, armored, me-

chanized, and airborne divisions. It is the Army's answer for a hard-hitting weapon that is rugged, reliable, simple, mobile and accurate.

The first Army missile to use pre-packaged storable liquid propellant, Lance will have substantially greater range and accuracy than the Honest John which it will replace.

Several Lance missiles already have been fired successfully in development tests at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico.

The Lance program is managed by the Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., under Col. W. E. Mehlinger, Project Manager.

Munitions Expert Talks To 64 OGMS Graduates

An Army munitions expert last Friday estimated that requirements for conventional ammunition due to the Viet Nam situation may approach two billion dollars worth during the next 18 months.

Col. Lee S. Kaufman, director of materiel readiness for Army Munitions Command at Dover, N.J., told 64 graduates of the Ordnance Guided Missile School that this quantity of non-nuclear bullets and shells will be needed to insure that "every fighting soldier has what he needs to defend himself in the front lines against the Communist Viet Cong." He said last year's requirements approxi-

mated \$400 millions.

Col. Kaufman addressed the first class of ammunition officers to be trained at the Missile School since the Continental Army Command decided earlier this year to combine schooling in conventional ammunition with missiles.

Col. Kaufman said missiles and bullets are "munitions" and told the graduates they should be ready to supply a front-line commander whatever he needs whenever he wants it.

Capt. Henry C. Englehardt III, 30, whose parents live at 890 Evergreen Ave., Mount Carmel, Conn., won top honors in the ammunition course with a 93 average.





Elkins Retires From Federal Service

Blair S. Elkins, pioneer in casting metals for U.S. Army missiles, retired from Federal service recently capping a career that spans 50 years in foundry work that ended with castings of prototypes and models in the space program.

He has been a foundryman for the Post Engineer Division of the U.S. Army Missile Support Command for the past fifteen years. Missiles, when he began working on them, were still in the infancy

of experimentation. The WAC Corporal had flown 250 miles above White Sands Missile Range and the Redstone was yet to prove itself as the workhorse of the missile arsenal.

Elkins worked on projects in temperatures that only a forge produces when the weather outside is hovering at 100 degrees and air conditioning is a dream of luxury. Elkins took pride in his work, casting models of missiles

such as the Jupiter, the Littlejohn and working straight through into the man-carrying space projects of the Saturn system.

Born in New Brunswick, Canada, Elkins learned the foundry trade at Bangor, Maine. During World War II, he worked at the Naval Gun Factory near Washington, D.C., until he transferred to Huntsville in November, 1950.

He and his wife reside at 617 Vance Road S.W. They have a married daughter, Mrs. Robert Merrill whose husband is employed at the Marshall Space Flight Center, and a son, Robert Elkins who earned his degree in Aero-Space Engineering from Florence, also employed by Marshall. The latter lives with his parents.

Claims Act Increases Damage Or Loss Payment

The statutory limitation imposed on payments of claims by military and civilian personnel of the military departments for damage to, or loss of personal property incident to service has been increased from \$6,500.00 to \$10,000.00 by P.L. 89-185 dated Sept. 15, 1965. Furthermore, all claims approved and paid since July 2, 1952 in the amount of \$6,500.00 solely by reason that said amount was the limitation in effect at the date of settlement may, upon written request of the claimant made on or before 15 September 1966 be reconsidered in light of the \$10,000.00 limitation.

Therefore, all claimants who have received a settlement totaling \$6,500.00 under the Military Personnel Claims Act, and the pay-

ment would have been in a greater amount but for the statutory limitation, are eligible for a reconsideration upon written request to the respective military departments made on or before 15 September 1966.

The increased payment authority under this law does not relieve the individual of the responsibility to continue to insure certain items of property for which payment is limited by law. The basic statute provides that possession of the property must be reasonable, useful, or proper under the attendant circumstances, which limits the payment for items of extraordinary value and large quantities.

Foreign Students Learning About Life In United States

Riehm, Chief of the School's Foreign Liaison Division, said that they will continue the policy of honoring requests for tours from the foreign students and that OGMS always tries to let the missilemen and ammunition students see Southeast points of interest of their own choosing.

A New Orleans trip was scheduled for a Korean group in September but had to be cancelled because of Hurricane Betsy; however, it is tentatively planned that the ROK missileers can see the "American Paris" sometime in December.



FIVE VEHICLES WHERE THERE WERE 30—The Army's Nike Hercules air defense missile is being given greater effectiveness against enemy aircraft and missiles by adding mobility to its High Power Acquisition Radar (HIPAR). Five semi-trailers pulled by truck tractors can transport the radar, which in the past has been found only at fixed Nike Hercules sites. A few years ago it would have taken more than 30 vehicles to move HIPAR. The three vans in the center house electronic equipment, and two diesel powered generators are mounted on the semi-trailer on the left. On the semi-trailer to the right is the 43-foot-wide antenna, which searches the sky in a 360-degree sweep for targets.



Army Seeks Officers Via Voluntary Recall

WASHINGTON (ANF)—In another measure to add company and some field grade rank to the officer's corps, the Department of the Army has announced that more lieutenants and captains and some majors in the Army Reserve will be eligible for voluntary recall to active duty under liberal new criteria.

The extended company - grade officer eligibility is based on a waiver which may be used when maximum age regulations prevent a lieutenant or captain from returning to active duty.

The new regulations permit a waiver of one year for first lieutenants and two years for captains.


Previously, an application could not be honored if the officer's age

plus his prior commissioned active service time would total more than 28 years at the date of his re-entry on active duty.

In other liberalizing modifications, Reserve majors and captains with an adjusted date of rank earlier than December 31, 1962, may apply for voluntary recall.

The requirement that applicants be able to complete ten years active commissioned service by the time they complete 20 years of overall active service for retirement purposes has not been changed.

Department of the Army is encouraging Reserve officers who meet the new criteria to apply for voluntary recall to active duty. Selection of applicants for recall will be made by DA.
