## Soldiers Train With Redeye

The first group of U.S. military personnel qualified this week as Redeye weapon system instructors upon completion of a course conducted at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

Redeye is the world's smallest guided missile—a shoulder-fired weapon that gives the infantryman an effective defense against low-flying enemy aircraft.

Fourteen U.S. Marine Corps and Navy personnel made up the initial group of trainees to qualify as Redeye gunners. They will serve as instructors in military classes when the Redeye system becomes fully operational with using units.

A total of about 80 gunner-instructors, including Army, Navy and Marines, as well as some allied troops, will receive training in a series of five classes.

Gunner training includes a familiarization program in handling and operating the 30-pound Redeye. In classroom training, troops will study rules of engagement, ranging, firing sequence, hazards and safety measures and organizational maintenance.

Although actual firings will be made at small target drones, students are getting practical experience in tracking and ranging against a variety of aircraft, including the L-20, F-100, B-57 and helicopters.

Simultaneously with the gunner classes is a three-week program for maintenance personnel which is being conducted by General Dynamics of Pomona, Calif., Redeye prime contractor and Honeywell, prime contractor for an aerial trainer.

The maintenance program offers instruction on a test set designed for the Army by General Dynamics which checks the operational capabilities of the Redeye and the Honeywell trainer which looks

## Redeye's Development Tests End

Almost seven years of research and development on the Army's Redeye, the world's smallest known anti-aircraft missile, have come to a successful end at the U.S. Naval Ordnance Test Station in China Lake, Calif. Developmental testing has been completed there and the weapon will soon go into engineering-service tests at White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

The 30 pound Redeye missile/launcher package is designed to be fired from the shoulder of Army or Marine infantrymen in forward combat areas. Management of the program has been at the U. S. Army Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Ala., where Col. A. W. Reed is Project Manager for the joint Army-Marine program.

Feasibility studies began at General Dynamics/Pomona following a company proposal to the Army in 1958. Since that time Redeye has undergone a long series of successful firings against a variety of targets, including F-9 jet drones and helicopters.

Simplicity and sophistication have been blended into the Redeye to make maximum use of the infantryman as an integral part of the air defense system. Redeye would be carried into the combat zone in a three-weapon carrying case with each missile already packed in its own launcher ready for use. In combat, the launcher, which is of fiberglass, would be discarded after firing.

In actual use, all a soldier must do to fire the Redeye is aim it, engage two switches and press a trigger. Soldiers have fired Redeye and scored direct hits on drone targets after receiving only minimal instruction in the system.

The missile has two stages: the first ejects the missile from the

# Secretary Submits Missile Budget To Congress

## Missile Command Systems Funding Needs Outlined

Funds for production of the Chaparral, Shillelagh, Redeye, Pershing and Lance missiles, and ground support equipment for Hawk as well as advance production engineering for the Hawk Improvement Program are among procurement items listed in Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's recent statement to the Senate on the Defense program and budget.

In the research development area, the budget request provides for continued development of Hawk improvements, SAM-D, MAW and TOW missile systems.

In his statement before a Joint Session of the Senate Armed Services Committee

and the Senate Subcommittee on DOD Appropriations, Secretary McNamara discussed procurement plans for systems managed by the Army Missile Command.

Army missile procurement, including spares, will total \$369 million in Fiscal Year '66 (\$64 million in the Supplemental request) and \$357 million in FY '67.

"The current year's procurement of Pershing missiles will complete the presently planned inventory requirements and provide for training consumption. Funds are included in the FY '67 budget to finance the procurement of improved ground support equipment," according to the

### Defense Secretary's statement.

Also from the statement are comments on Lance, Shillelagh, Redeye and Chaparral:

"For Lance, \$19 million of available funds will be used in FY '66 for production tooling and advance production engineering. In FY '67, we propose to procure a substantial number of missiles and the associated ground support equipment.

"The revised FY '66 program for Shillelagh includes a large purchase of missiles and the FY '67 request includes an even greater quantity. This infrared, command-guided anti-tank missile is the primary weapon for the retrofitted M-60 medium tank and the General Sheridan armored reconnaissance vehicle.

"For Redeye, the man-portable, shoulder-fired air defense missile, the revised FY '66 program provides for a major purchase of mis-

## Nike-X Needs Pointed Out In All-time High Budget

Statements by Defense Secretary Robert McNamara during recent Congressional budget hearings and briefings by other Defense authorities have clearly pointed out the status of the Redstone managed Nike-X missile defense project.

For one thing, the Department of Defense has requested an all-time high budget this year of nearly a half-billion dollars for Nike-X.

This figure includes appropriations for the continued high priority development of the Nike-X system and operations at the Kwajalein Test Site in the Pacific.

A total of \$447 million was included in the Fiscal Year

1967 defense budget for Nike-X research and development, setting a new record for the system which over the past years has become the nation's highest funded defensive missile R&D effort.

The funding request topped last year's budget of \$410 million by \$37 million.

In addition, according to Secretary McNamara, another \$33 million was being requested for operations at the Kwajalein Test Site. These funds are over and above regular Nike-X R&D funds but are administered by the Nike-X Project Office to support all Kwajalein users including the Air Force, Navy and DOD research activities.

siles, and the FY '67 request includes a large additional quantity. These procurements will meet the present tactical inventory objectives and provide for training consumption.

"The FY '67 (budget) request includes \$62 million for the Chaparral system. This amount will provide for the procurement of a large quantity of missiles, the self-propelled and towed fire units, and equipment for training and testing Chaparral."

Further discussion on Chaparral and Hawk included these excerpts from the statement:

"First, as I describe last year, we have initiated a program aimed at reducing the forward area air defense problem in Europe. Funds were provided in the FY '66 budget to procure weapons for a number of new air defense battalions, each containing 32 guns (20mm) and 32 Chaparral missiles. Funds were also provided to procure equipment needed to convert a number of Hawk battalions to a more mobile (self-propelled) configuration.

"In the process of converting to the self-propelled configuration, total firepower will actually be increased, since the self-propelled battalion will have three batteries of three firing platoons each, compared to the four batteries with two platoons each in the fixed-site battalion. We are now in the process of converting the Hawk battalions approved last year, and the FY '67 budget provides for conversion of more.

"Now as a result of extensive studies and tests we propose to ex-

and tests, we propose to expand the program begun last year and increase very substantially the number of Gun/Chaparral batteries."

In the section regarding improved surface-to-air missiles, the Secretary said:

"Our FY '67 budget request provides for the continued development of improvements to the Hawk missile system with a view to decreasing its reaction time, speeding up its target-handling capability and improving its reliability. It also provides for the continued development of an advanced air defense system as a possible replacement for both Hawk and Nike Hercules in the 1970's. This effort, now designated SAM-D, and the Hawk Improvement Program are also oriented to the theater air defense problem."

Other excerpts from the statement are:

"The major change in the surface-to-surface missile force involves our proposal to procure Lance in FY '67. Initially, we plan to use Lance to replace Littlejohn and Honest John. However, Lance also shows promise as a more effective substitute for some tube artillery. Therefore, the currently proposed Lance force structure should be considered a minimum deployment, pending further Army study of this question.

"The increase in the number of composite Gun/Chaparral battalions and the increased effectiveness of the self-propelled Hawk will permit some reduction in our reliance on Redeye. We have revised the Redeye procurement accordingly.

"In addition, two other efforts are now underway to improve our air defenses. The

first, known as the Hawk Improvement Program, is designed to give this missile system increased effectiveness. Such an improved Hawk system would be a hedge against slippage or failure in the development of next generation of air defense weapons . . . Preliminary work on the improved system will be started in FY '67.

"The second effort is the new surface-to-air missile development, SAM-D . . . This system will be oriented principally to the defense of Army forces in the field against aircraft and short-range tactical ballistic missiles. Eventually, it would replace both Nike Hercules and Hawk in the field, complementing low altitude forward area weapons. It might also be used in conjunction with an anti-ballistic missile system for terminal bomber defense in the continental U.S. SAM-D will be designed to meet a high performance aircraft type threat, will have a capability against short range ballistic missiles, and, as presently conceived, would be the principal tactical air defense weapon for the 1970's.

"The FY '67 effort (for SAM-D) is directed toward the start of Engineering Development, assuming that the current contract definition is successfully completed. In addition, investigations are underway to determine the extent to which common subsystems and components could be developed for both SAM-D and the Navy's Advanced Surface-to-Air Missile."

The statement reports that "The \$2 million requested for the (Navy's) 'Landing Force Support Weapon' is to provide for the flight testing of the Army's Lance missile in a sea environment i. e., launching the missile from a ship in support of landing forces."

"Funds included in the FY '67 budget for the 'Heavy Anti-Tank Assault Weapon (TOW) will provide for an expanded test program needed to insure a high level of reliability for this front line weapon system."

"Another major effort is the Medium Anti-tank Weapon (MAW) system. Two competitive systems

have been considered and a final selection has been made. Active development will commence this year.

"With respect to the defense of hard point targets, we have had for some years a multi-pronged effort to develop the concepts and the components for an advancing weapon system. The two major elements of this effort are HIBEX—an extremely high acceleration missile interceptor — and HAPDAR — a complementary phased array radar. These projects have already been funded, a number of interceptor tests have been made and the test radar has just recently begun to operate. Over the next several months we will be studying and evaluating the data from these tests.

"With the exception of the Hercules, the surface to air missile forces are essentially the same as those projected a year ago. In the case of Nike-Hercules, we have decided to phase out 22 batteries deployed in defense of soft SAC bomber bases in the U.S. and Greenland . . . Currently we plan to use the assets of 17 of these Hercules batteries to replenish the maintenance float and the assets of the remaining fire for training. Over the FY 1966-67 period, this change will save about \$179 million in operating costs."

In the section of the report dealing with Value Engineering, the Secretary listed a savings on recent procurement for Lance. The savings were

due to a design change in the injector housing and totaled \$125,000.



launcher; the second drives it to the target. An infrared seeker mounted in the nose of the four foot solid propelled missile guides the Redeye to the heat source of the target. Redeye is roll fin stabilized and aerodynamically controlled in flight.

In engineering evaluation testing by NOTS, targets have included propeller-driven drones, jet drones and drone helicopters. Some missiles have been equipped with warheads and others with telemetry which examined flight actions.

As a joint development of the U.S. Army and U.S. Marine Corps, each has provided a proportionate share of the Redeye development costs. Both services will share in the output of production missiles. Both plan to issue Redeye to combat units as soon as a sufficient quantity of missiles are available. Many NATO countries

have also indicated an interest in the system.

Redeye began several years ago as an unsolicited proposal from the present prime contractor, General Dynamics/Pomona. From company studies, a proposal was evolved and presented to the Army. The concept envisioned a means of meeting the urgent need for protection for ground troops in the forward area from aircraft attack.

The Army initiated the Redeye program with the signing of a development contract with GD/Pomona on June 30, 1959, and limited production of the system began in the spring of 1964.

Thus, if the budget is approved by Congress Nike-X will in the coming Fiscal Year be administering expenditures that average out to more than \$1.3 million dollars per day!

According to the Defense Secretary, the \$447 million in Nike-X R&D funds will "continue on an urgent basis a re-oriented anti-ballistic missile effort emphasizing the development of an austere version of the multi-function array radar (TACMAR), the missile site radar (MSR), high speed data processing equipment, the high acceleration Sprint missile and the new ex-atmospheric (Zeus) missile.

In describing the Nike-X system, the Secretary noted that it might also contain a new radar which would increase the system's surveillance capabilities.

He described the Nike-X system as one of the "major components" in the United States' "Damage Limiting" defense systems.

In describing the Department of Defense's attitude toward Nike-X, another Defense official, Assistant Secretary Paul Ignatius, had this to say during an industry briefing:

"The Chinese Communists have detonated two nuclear devices and could possibly develop and deploy a small force of ICBM's by the mid or latter part of the 1970's. In an effort to undermine the United States deterrent credibility, or to blackmail their neighbors, such a deployment might seem attractive to them.

"For this reason, an effective US defense against such a threat might not only negate the threat, but might possibly weaken the incentive to produce it."

Then, in a compliment to Nike-X, he said "the prospect and feasibility of such a moderately priced defense is now more promising than it was some time ago."

Secretary McNamara said of such a Nike-X defense, "The initial investment and five years operating costs (including R&D) would be about \$8-10½ billion depending on the number of cities defended and the density of the area coverage."

"Once fully deployed, this defense system could be augmented to increase its effectiveness against larger or more sophisticated threats."

He added, however, "on the basis of our present knowledge of Chinese Communist nuclear progress, no deployment decision need be made

be trained initially, the Army said. Development of the Redeye system has been funded jointly by the Army and Marine Corps. Both services will share in the output of production missiles.

Training of gunners and maintenance personnel represents a major milestone in the fielding of the Redeye weapon, the Army said.

Capable of being carried by a single soldier or marine and fired from the shoulder, Redeye gets its name from an infrared heat seeking device it employs to "home" on the heat of an aircraft's engines.

In operation, initial target detection and tracking is done visually by the gunner. When the aircraft is within range of the missile and its infrared seeker has locked on the target, a simple squeeze of the trigger fires the missile. Soldiers firing the Redeye in tests have scored direct hits on a variety of aircraft after only a few hours of instruction.

now. However, the development of essential components should be pressed forward vigorously."

A further word of commendation for Nike-X was voiced by Daniel J. Fink, Deputy Director of Defense Research and Engineering. He said during a recent industry briefing in Boston: "for active defense against ballistic missiles we have the Nike-X, an outgrowth of the Nike Zeus, an extremely successful development program up to now. It has been the greatest contributor to exposing the fallacy of the old cliché that you can't hit a bullet with a bullet."

The headquarters for the Nike-X Project is at Redstone. Some 300 persons are employed in the Project Office which is headed by Col. I. O. Drewry.





# School Receives Flying Boxcar Ammo Trainer

The last of three Air Force planes to become unique, multi-million dollar classrooms, arrived at the Army Missile & Munitions Center & School Friday, Feb. 25.


An Air Force C-119 "Flying Boxcar" landed at the Redstone Arsenal Airfield to join a B-47 bomber and an F-89 jet fighter, all ready part of the growing MMCS facilities. The three will become instruction training aids in the disposal of explosive ordnance items and ammunition loading. The three planes run the assets of MMCS to over \$70 million.

The C-119 is a twin propeller engine cargo plane characterized by two long tail booms instead of the usual fuselage configuration. The podlike, boxy fuselage is suspended under the wings and has a rounded nose and aft section.

The cargo aircraft is to be used by the Ammunition Department of the Directorate of Individual Training for training of ammunition handling and loading in realistic exercises. The other two aircraft are scheduled for use by the Explosive Disposal Division of the Directorate of Unit Training to simulate crash conditions likely to be encountered by disposal personnel, and to train them in correct methods of entering and disposing of explosive items.

The three aircraft now rest on one corner of the Redstone Arsenal Airfield but will be partially dismantled and loaded on large trailers for their ride to training areas. The wings will be removed prior to their journey and replaced at the training site. The path taken by the grounded birds is the same used to transport the giant Saturn boosters from their test stands to barges on the Tennessee River for transport to Cape Kennedy.



## Chemical Society To Hear Address By Dr. Morgan

Dr. Paul W. Morgan, with the Textile Fibers Department of E. I. DuPont Company, will address the North Alabama American Chemical Society tonight, at 8:00 p.m., on "Condensation Polymers Prepared by Low-Temperature Methods."

# Seedlings And Missile Technology Growing

In these days of rapid change it is rare to find things as they were even a few years ago. This is especially true at the Army Missile & Munitions Center & School where progress is as rapid as the space age itself.

For example, the staff at MMCS has grown from fifteen at its inception in 1952 to the present 1900, and the student output has swelled from five in the first graduating class to nearly 7,000 expected to receive diplomas this year.

However, several things at MMCS have changed little. Among them are three of the original staff members, the original headquarters building and some cedar trees planted when the Center began operation.

The first commandant of MMCS was Col. Erwin M. Graham, Jr., then a major, who has returned to assume the same job after many years absence. Two of the original secretaries were Mrs. Martha Hobbs, now coordinator for civilian personnel matters in the Office of the Secretary, and Mrs. Jewell Lemley, a librarian in the MMCS Technical Library. Both have served continuously at MMCS since beginning work on March 10, 1952.

The original headquarters building was a converted ammunition structure and was the first property of the Center. The Redstone Arsenal facility now boasts over \$70 million worth of the most modern teaching facilities and equipment to be found on any Army installation. MMCS with its total graduates numbering 39,000 rates as the largest institute of advanced learning in the state of Alabama.

As for the original cedar trees, well they have prospered as has the Center. From the seedlings planted by Mrs. Hobbs and Mrs. Lemley 14 years ago, they have grown to their present gigantic size. Their progress symbolizes that of the Center with prospects for the future brighter than ever. So while things sometimes change rapidly, a certain stability



## Energy Conversion Lecture Scheduled At Institute

Dr. William J. Levedahl, Manager of the Nuclear Research Department at the Martin Marietta Corporation will lecture at the University of Alabama Research Center Tuesday about recent advances in direct energy conversion. He is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m.

He will cover direct conversion of heat into electricity which became practical during the 1960's and is rapidly finding important uses in space, underwater, and remote-terrestrial applications. The implications of recent research in thermoelectrics, thermionics, magnetohydrodynamics, and heat pipes will be discussed as will radioisotope and nuclear-reactor heat sources.

# Gen. Zierdt Tells Bostonians Where Missile Dollar Goes

The Army's top missileman, Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, outlined to Boston businessmen today what the Army wants in missiles, where missile dollars are being spent and recommended ways that industry might share in development efforts.

"We want multi-purpose missile systems," the Commanding General of the U. S. Army Missile Command noted, "and we're looking for systems featuring simplicity and low cost."

His remarks were directed to industrial leaders assembled in Boston for the National Security Industry Briefing, the first of five such briefings scheduled during March and April throughout the United States.

Gen. Zierdt praised the audience "for what I think is the most heartening recent development in the missile business—the increased interest on your part in helping us find solutions to our problems."

Then the General discussed Army missile expenditures for FY 67, among them:

... about \$447 million for continued development of the Nike-X missile defense system; \$70 million to cover contractor and support operations in the Lance ballistic missile; about \$120 million for missile repair parts; \$150-200 million on critical component work and exploratory and advanced development on a new, forward area air defense system; \$50 million which the Missile Command manages for the Advanced Research Projects Agency which

supports advanced technology in missile defense research."

"In addition, we anticipate initiating engineering development on a medium anti-tank assault weapon and on SAM-D, a new mobile air defense system," said Gen. Zierdt.

Although production of several of the Army's major systems is essentially complete, "We have initiated with the prime contractors development programs to upgrade the capabilities of three: Pershing, Sergeant and Hawk," he added.

To get in on part of the action, Gen. Zierdt advised the industrial leaders:

Do work as a subcontractor or supplier to one of the major firms holding one of the Army's prime contractors; establish competition because "we are reviewing every one of our missile systems to introduce competition wherever possible"; produce missile repair parts; and develop new hardware

# University Offers Geomorphology

The University of Alabama will offer at its Huntsville campus a new geography course beginning this Spring semester. The course is listed as geomorphology (Gy 67) and it is scheduled for Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 8-10 p.m.

Offered for the first time on the Huntsville campus, this course will provide credit toward a major or minor in geology or geography or as an elective in practically any curriculum. The course will be designed for students who may be considering careers in earth science, for public school teachers who are teaching earth science, or for government and contractor personnel who are concerned with

earth-orbital scientific applications.

Geomorphology deals primarily with the classification and understanding of landforms. It involves a detailed description of the natural processes which have acted on the surface of the earth. It enables the student to understand the topography and geology of large areas on the continents and the relationships between regions. In recent years, geomorphology has contributed to a better understanding of the floor of the oceans and the surface of the moon.

The course will include both topographic study and interpretation of aerial photographs. In addition, there will be a field trip to study the physiography of the nearby Cumberland Plateau and

Interior Lowlands in Madison County.

Geomorphology will be taught by John R. Rogers of Chrysler Corporation. Rogers formerly was associated with Brown Engineering Co. and Texaco Inc. and holds an M. S. in geology from the University of Illinois.

Students who have not previously attended the University of Alabama who wish to enroll for geomorphology are urged to apply for admission at once at room 108, Morton Hall. Deadline for applications is March 14.







Col. Snow, a Viet Nam Veteran is well qualified to administer the advice as he has been connected with the missile systems since 1955. He also deals in his daily


job with intricate matters collectively called Foreign Aid.


