

Joint Army-MSFC Lecture Series Opens Friday

Second Tour

Brockman Directs Fund Raising

A veteran team of campaigners will direct the Missile Command effort in the 1967 Combined Federal Campaign to be conducted here in the fall.

Most of the committee members and key organizational workers in the highly successful drive of a year ago, will be back in harness this year.

Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, General Chairman of the Huntsville-Madison County area Combined Federal Campaign, tapped Leonard Brockman, of the Missile Support Command, to head the Command's executive committee and

is the lone newcomer named to the executive committee and he is scheduled to be elevated to the chairmanship for the 1968 campaign.

Robert Starnes, Al LaGrone and Marietta Graves, all of the Support Command, and Howard Crumrine, of Supply and Maintenance, complete the Executive Committee. All played a prominent role in the drive last year.

At that time the Huntsville-Madison County area was one of 66 scattered areas of the country selected by the Civil Service Commission to test the feasibility of the single drive concept of fund raising.

The new idea, featuring payroll deductions, met with instant acceptance at Redstone and the local area gained national prominence with the largest percentage of participation and the highest per capita gift in the entire country.

HEROIC ACTION CITED IN AWARD

Colonel John T. O'Keefe, who went to Vietnam last year after serving four years here with the Missile Command, has been awarded the Air Medal for heroism while flying as gunner on a helicopter.

His valorous actions came last February in an operation to capture a Viet Cong casualty for determining effectiveness of an experimental rocket being used by the American fighting forces. Two helicopters were flying into an area which had been blasted by the rockets to make the pickup. Colonel O'Keefe was serving voluntarily as door gunner on the escort helicopter.

As the pickup helicopter landed (See HEROIC on Page 3)

the drive in support of local, national and international fund raising agencies.

They are the Marshall Space Flight Center, the Missile and Munitions Center and School, Social Security Administration, General Accounting Office, Army Audit Agency, Civil Service Commission, Economic Development Administration and the Federal Housing Administration.

Zierdt, Commanding General, Army Missile Command, will speak to the summer employees at the last session of the series on August 26.

Flares Aid In Tracking Of Pershing

A brilliant flash of white light appearing in the southwestern sky for a split-second in mid-July will signal a tactical-type night firing of the Army's Pershing ballistic missile.

As the missile's warhead section reenters the atmosphere after traveling more than 300 miles from a Blanding, Utah, launch site, a 60-million candle-power spotting charge will be ignited in the section's aft end. Three "poppy" flares, each with 30-million candle-power, will be ejected in sequence from the warhead before the brighter flash illuminates the sky.

Two such night tests, by troops of the 2nd Battalion, 44th Artillery from Ft. Sill, Okla., will be made during summer annual service practice firings of the Army's longest range missile. The missiles have been equipped with pyrotechnics so that ballistic cameras on the ground can optically track the warheads for more precise verification of their trajectories.

The flares and spotting charges which contain photoflash powder, will be set off automatically just before the non-explosive warheads (See FLARES on Page 3)

on Space Power Sources by Dr. Lawrence H. Wood of the Nuclear and Plasma Physics Branch of the Research Projects Laboratory at Marshall.

Also on Monday, Frank L. Williams, Director of the MSFC Advanced Systems Office will talk about future designs.

Friday, July 22, William B. Newby, Chief of the Preliminary Design Branch, Ground Support and Equipment Laboratory for the Army's Research and Development Directorate, will discuss Aircraft Weaponization.

David A. Mendel, Chief of Systems Engineering Branch in the Advanced Systems Laboratory, Army, will describe "Systems Engineering," July 22. All of the Army lecturers will be from the R&D Directorate.

The following Monday, two lecturers from MSFC are programmed: George H. Fichtl and Robert E. Smith, both of the Aero-Astrodynamics Laboratory. Fichtl is scheduled to lecture on the Atmosphere—Surface to 100 KM, and Smith on Space and Planetary Environments.

Fagan Discusses Laser

The sixth lecture will be given that same day by James J. Fagan who will discuss theory and applications on Lasers. Fagan is Science and Engineering Assistant in the Office of the Director of R&D.

July 29 lecturers are George D. Hopson on Zero-G Facility and Experiments and Walter Wiesman on Management: Job Scope of Tomorrow's Professional. Hopson is in the Marshall Fluid Mechanics and Thermodynamics Branch of the Propulsion and Vehicle Engineering Laboratory, and Wiesman the Internal Communications Laboratory for MSFC.

Lecturers on August 1 are Charleton H. Cash, Chief of the Electromagnetics Laboratory's Radar Branch who will discuss radar, and Edmund J. Wheelahan, Chief of Materials Engineering and Development Branch of the Structures and Mechanics Laboratory, who will talk about Materials.

Army and MSFC will both be represented August 5. Dr. John D. Stettler of the Physical Science Laboratory in R&D will discuss Solid State Physics. He will be followed by Dr. Alvis M. Holladay of the Applied Research Branch in the Astrionics Laboratory who will describe Microcircuits.

Flight Mechanics

The schedule for August 8 is still incomplete, but on August 12 Mario H. Rheinfurth Chief of MSFC's Control Theory Branch in the Aero-Astrodynamics Labora-

tory will present a lecture on Flight Mechanics.

The following Friday, Plasma Physics will be the topic of Charles M. Cason of the R&D Physical Science Laboratory. Schedules for the week of August 15-19 are to be completed.

Lunar Geology and Solid Propulsion will both be discussed on August 22. The former by MSFC's John Bensko, Jr., of the Research Projects Laboratory and the latter by Dr. Henry M. Shuey, Director of Technical Services at Rohm and Haas.

Two missilemen will talk August 26: Gerald E. Scheiman of the Army Inertial Guidance and Control Laboratory and Thomas G. Wetheral from the same laboratory. The former will lecture on Strapped-Down Inertial Guidance, the latter about Fluorics Controls.

Coordinating the Summer Lecture Series is the Training and Development Division, Civilian Personnel Office, Army Missile Support Command.

Each year, the Army and MSFC alternate opening and closing speakers and coordination and direction of this program designed to acquaint students and faculty members on engineering science functions seen on the job and learned in the classroom.

with a ground party to make the capture, Colonel O'Keefe strafed the hostile position with a barrage of suppressive fire. He continued to provide close-in fire support through two landings and takeoffs even though his aircraft received several hits from ground fire.

The citation accompanying the Air Medal with "V" Device reads: "As a result of his coolness under fire, two Viet Cong prisoners, several weapons, grenades, documents, uniforms, a Communist flag, and a Viet Cong flag were captured. The heroic actions of Colonel O'Keefe were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army."

Colonel O'Keefe, a native of St. Louis and 1940 West Point graduate, served at Redstone Arsenal from 1957 to 1965 except for a two-and-a-half year tour of duty with the Army in Europe.

He also has been decorated with the Bronze Star Medal and French Croix de Guerre for gallantry during World War II.

Mrs. O'Keefe and children are making their home in Huntsville while Col. O'Keefe is overseas.

impact in the south central part of the White Sands Missile Range. Army officials predict the light flashes may be seen by people as far away as 100 miles, in such cities as Alamogordo, Socorro and Las Cruces, N.M., and El Paso, Texas. The 60-million candlepower fireball will be as bright as 16,000 150 watt floodlamps.

The missile flights will be monitored by White Sands Missile Range safety and data collection personnel.





7th Training Company Is Activated

The Missile and Munitions Center and School last Wednesday activated its Seventh Enlisted Training Company to accommodate greatly increased numbers of ammunition and missile maintenance specialists.

Major Donald F. Knapp, commanding officer of the School Troop Command, presided over formal ceremonies at which the new company received its guidon and unit identification insignia.

Commanded by Captain Victor E.

Stamey, 24, of Houston, Tex., a recent ROTC graduate of Southern Mississippi, the new company will be used for administrative and billeting purposes for more students scheduled to attend the \$75 million dollar school at Redstone Arsenal.

The additional company was required because the number of students trained annually at MMCS has more than doubled to 7,000 since last July. They include

military personnel from 25 foreign countries.

This rise is due to the concentration here beginning last January, of all ammunition maintenance training for the Continental Army Command. At the same time, Army requirements for missile maintenance technicians also increased.

The new enlisted training company is the fourth such unit to be activated in the past year.



Veteran Officer Takes Command At Kwajalein

A change of Commanding Officers of the Nike-X Project's Kwajalein Test Site took place July 2, the same date the island missile range in the Pacific marked the beginning of its third year under Army management.

Col. Frank C. Healy, formerly with the Division of Military Applications of the Atomic Energy Commission in Washington, is the new Test Site Commanding Officer. He succeeds Col. Melvin Clark who has been assigned to the staff of the Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Pa.

Col. Clark became Commanding Officer at Kwajalein in December, 1964, six months after operations and control at the test site was transferred from Navy to Army responsibility.

Col. Healy, a native of Buckland, Conn., has 25 years of military service. During the past 15 he has been closely connected with special weapons projects.

He holds a B.S. Degree in chemistry from Massachusetts State University and an M.S. in electrical engineering from the University of Illinois.

In addition to his military duties, Col. Healy has taught mathematics at the University of Louisville, the University of New Mexico and Frederick Community College near Washington.

Col. Healy reports to Col. I. O. Drewry, Nike-X Project Manager and National Range Commander for the Test Site thru Col. James W. Walters, Assistant Manager for National Range and Test Operations.

The Kwajalein Test Site, as a national range, is engaged not only in Nike-X research and development but also in other projects sponsored by the Department of Defense, the Air Force and the Navy.

The Command includes some \$500,000,000 in technical and community facilities as well as a community of some 3,000 Americans living at the Test Site.

The Test Site is made up of several islands in the Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands, 2,100 miles southwest of Hawaii.

The new Kwajalein Command-

ing Officer entered service in 1939 as a 2nd Lieutenant. One of his first assignments was as an instructor at the Cavalry School at Fort Riley, Kansas.

He later took part in the invasion of France, was captured and remained as a prisoner of war until May, 1945.

Col. Healy transferred to the Ordnance Corps in 1950 and was assigned to the Ordnance Board at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md. In later assignments he was: Commander of the first Army Special Weapons Unit at Sandia Base, N.M.; Commander of the 14th Ordnance Battalion (Special Weapons Depot) at Sandia and White Sands Missile Range and attended the Armed Forces Staff College. In 1961 he was Director for Supply Operations at Letterkenny Army Depot, Pa.


He and Mrs. Healy, the former Mary R. Moynihan of Holyoke, Mass., have three children.



McAdams Solves Energy Intrusion Problems

Jim McAdams was thinking about his job while buying his wife a scrubber for the pots and pans. Because of his thoughts, he came up with two ideas for which he recently received patents and a third possible patentable idea being investigated by the Army Patent Center at the Support Command.

James McAdams was an electronics engineer in the Test and Evaluation Laboratory of the Research and Development Directorate at the U. S. Army Missile Command. He is now acting chief of the Microwave Standards Laboratory at the Metrology Center.

McAdams' problems at work concerned the leakage of electromagnetic energy through a door crack that was watertight, and through microscopic holes around welding and rivets in an otherwise energy opaque wall.

The scrubber he found for his wife was composed of shredded copper. Using some of these scrubbers he lined a door to shut out the radio frequency and transfer of electromagnetic energy between the hatch cover and the door jamb. Increasing success with his experimentation led McAdams through a number of refinements as he con-

tinued working on the problem. Finally he found his solution by creating a baffle layered with metal and rubber.

McAdams is the licensed owner of Amateur Radio Station K4GJW and a member of the MARS network. In addition he has acquired

a teletype which his ninth grade son also operates. The McAdams' hobbies are not considered all play. He wanted to keep his touch with electronic equipment when he

moves into the field of management. Now, he maintains his own equipment and is studying management by extension from the University of Iowa.

Nine Firms Win Awards Valued At \$62 Million

A year-ending flurry of procurement action resulted in the award of some 18 contracts with a total value in excess of \$62 million.

The awards were made in support of almost all of missile systems managed by the Missile Command and were negotiated by the Procurement and Production Directorate.

Over a third of the total amount was let to the Raytheon Company of Lexington, Mass., in six contracts for work on the Hawk system. The prime contractor for the system will perform the work in Andover and Waltham, Mass., and at the Plant in Oxnard, Cal.

Other contractual negotiations completed by the end of Fiscal Year 1966 included:

Two contracts with a total value of \$5.8 million to the Sperry Utah Co., for work on the Sergeant system. One contract for \$4.7 million covers the procurement of body sections and control surface assemblies. The remaining amount will fund engineering services supplied by the prime contractor.

The Aeronutronic Division of Philco Corp., was awarded two contracts for equipment and support of the Shillelagh missile. One contract, for \$1,015,560, will fund initial equipment maintenance and the other, for \$1,627,738, provides for spare parts to be used in equipment maintenance for guidance and control sets.

A \$3,098,000 contract went to Hughes Aircraft for continued advanced production engineering on the TOW missile system.

General Dynamics, Pomona Division was awarded \$1,247,000 for work on the Redeye missile rebuild capability.

The Emerson Electric Co., of St. Louis, was awarded a contract for \$1,230,381 to fund procurement of equipment for the Honest John rocket.

An award for \$965,742 was let with the Systems Development Corporation of Santa Monica, Cal., for a Systems Training Program for the ANTSQ/51, and AN/FSG-1 and the AN/GSG-5. The equipment is a fire coordination van and its support equipment used to direct artillery and missile fire.

Hughes Aircraft also received an award for \$15.3 million for continued research and development on the helicopter version of the TOW. Called the XM-26, the proposed heavy armored killer will replace the M-22 now deployed by the Army.

Western Electric Company will provide support equipment for the Nike Hercules system under a contract calling for \$1,893,260.



Broadway Came To Play Ball, Stayed As Fire Man

C. A. Broadway is a member of the Redstone Arsenal Fire Department because he was a good softball player. He took a long way 'round to get there.

Broadway is a native of this North Alabama area who set out to find his fortune in the office of the Secretary of War where he met such notables as Lord Beaverbrook, New York's Mayor LaGuardia, and Sergeant York. He even had the honor of escorting the Duke and Duchess of Windsor

into the secretary's presence. From there, he moved to Louisville, Ky., and circled back to Huntsville to become a radio operator for the newly-established Redstone Arsenal in 1942. The radio was located in the telephone exchange, most of the time but it also was in the fire station and in the fire tower.

Col. Carroll D. Hudson promoted intramural sports among the employees and played on the officers softball team at third base. Broadway was a good outfielder and the firemen needed one to round out their strength. They encouraged Broadway to switch jobs and he succumbed.

Since first signing on, he had a break to serve a Navy hitch. When he came back, he joined the Fire Department again but not as a ball player.

Others still in the Department who were on the original team are Howard McGinnis and Lester Westbrook.

The funniest fire Broadway went to was in Redstone Park. He remembers a few gruesome ones, but he likes to recall answering a neighbor's alarm when a woman in the area put on a pot of beans to cook. The cook left to visit a neighbor, and when the beans burned and smoked enough to alarm a neighbor, the bean cook was so chagrined she wouldn't come home.

Grain Alcohol Evaporated Despite All Precautions

"I got around all over the place," Dillard Broadway said, "as I was an inspector at Huntsville Arsenal."

One of his duties was to inspect the tank cars of 100 percent grain alcohol used in chemical work. He says a guard was always on the scene to assure that none of the alcohol was consumed on the spot or stolen.

In spite of such precautions, alcohol mysteriously disappeared in noticeable quantities. After considerable time and effort, it

was found that an ingenious plumber had tapped the line under a tank and had installed a faucet. Since it looked like water, those seeing it didn't realize it was alcohol for some time.

Broadway, who now works in the Supply and Maintenance Directorate, says there was a structure on Hansen Road that used to cause a lot of questions. It appeared to be a board platform with a boarded ditch beside it. This was the place for testing smoke pots — they were dropped into the ditch.

He also recalls that when someone came to apply for a job, he was sent to a room where a typist would complete his application for him, then hand it over to be taken to another person in Civilian Personnel. The next day the new employee went to work, and that was all there was to "coming to work at the Arsenal."

Transportation Was Problem: Miss Hodges

Woman's fashions, tire rations, and transportation have all been hurdles that Dorothy Hodges has encountered in her 25 years at Redstone Arsenal.

Miss Hodges has spent almost the entire, 25 years in Redstone's Personnel Office. When she came to work here in the early 40's the Army Engineers had not paved parking lots and highways as the present crop of employees know them. In the early 40's women were wearing open-toed sling-back shoes. The fashion made walking in mud miserable and so Miss Hodges was strong-minded enough to dump the trend for more solid footwear.

Rationing hit in another way on tires and gas. She thought she might save herself some trouble with a government driver's license, but that was a lost cause. She got the license with a good grade. Her problem was that the seat was so far away from the gas pedal she couldn't reach it. The license was allowed to lapse and Miss Hodges took to hitching rides with everyone from the Provost Marshal to visitors going in the same direction.

If the driver had a two-and-a-half ton truck, Miss Hodges sometimes felt she needed a ladder to crawl into the cab. Hitching had its compensations. She rode with the red light flashing in a police car, and in every type of automobile from a Ford to a Cadillac. When kind drivers going in the same direction were not to be found, Miss Hodges climbed into her own car and took off for whatever area her assignment covered.

Thanks To Stutts For Furnishing Historical Items

The anniversary issue of the Rocket owes much of its front page make-up to a man who had the foresight to keep the front page of the July 3, 1941 Huntsville Times. He not only had the original page but could pull out a photo negative of it from his desk.

Jesse Stutts of the Civilian Personnel Office had saved also The Times page with the ad "Redstone Needs Laborers at Once."

When the extra edition of the now historic Times hit the streets in 1941, Stutts was working in an employment office in Huntsville. He was soon very busy helping officials find people to fill the many available jobs on the Arsenals.

Before long he joined the Redstone Civilian Personnel Office, and the Army Missile Support Command Civilian Personnel Office is where he works today.

Begins Work In Lee Home

Florence S. Palmerlee, now employed by Consolidated Supply in AMSC as Inventory Manager, Office Supplies, recalls coming to work here in 1943.

Mrs. Palmerlee was first employed by the Chemical Warfare Depot and her office was on the second floor of the old Lee Mansion, a well known Arsenal landmark on Buxton Road.

Among the circumstances of the early days which she remembers is that the Depot frequently sent for employees to bring them to work because of transportation problems during the war years.

She also recalls that a great many of her fellow workers were brand new second lieutenants and WACs and that there was never a dull moment working with them.

Whitaker Reminiscences

Today's Highways Follow Pattern Of Early Roads

Albert Z. Whitaker, Post Engineer, first came to the Arsenal in 1941 with a contractor, making 87½¢ an hour as an apprentice carpenter. He shifted over to Civil Service in August 1942.

"People don't realize it, but most of the roads now being used on the Arsenal were here before the Government took over the land," says Whitaker. "They just weren't paved then."

He mentioned Goss, Neal, Redstone, Rideout, Buxton and Hale Roads, for a few that existed before the Arsenal was formed. "The people who lived in the area had a good road network and the Government just took advantage of it."

Whitaker, a native of New Hope in Madison County, said he once dated a girl who lived in what is now the Igloo Area. It was known as Pond Beat then.

Mentioning that some Arsenal

employees now complain if it takes them an hour to get home after work, Whitaker said they really would fuss back in the early 40's.

"It wasn't uncommon to get home at 9 o'clock at night on days when MP's would search cars at the gates. I can recall many a night, even in the summer, when it was dark and I was still on the Arsenal."

Air conditioners were rare when the Arsenal had its beginning, but Whitaker says someone "boot-legged" one for the officers' quarters. During inspection, he says, the air conditioner was removed, and later reinstalled until the next inspection came around.

calls include a pay rate of \$3.64 per day for plant operators, the category of about 90 per cent of the work force.

He said employees were paid in cash and that when payday came two pay lines were formed. This was to separate those who could read and write from those who could not. Those who were illiterate (nicknamed "illies") slowed the line because they had to be accompanied by an officer who could identify them as they made their "X's."

Frank Neely Remembers Phosjaw Fear

Back in the early days employees working on the white phosphorus lines of Huntsville Arsenal where periodically loaded on buses and taken to the Army Hospital at Camp Forest, Tullahoma, Tenn., for x-ray examination for "phosjaw."

"Phosjaw," was the popular name for a condition brought on when white phosphorus lodged in tooth cavities. The examination was part of a rigid health enforcement program necessary because of the inherent dangers in working with poisonous gases.

These are among recollections of Frank Neely, an employee of the Procurement and Production Directorate of the Army Missile Command.

Frank came to Huntsville in 1942 as an Army officer. He liked and stayed.

LIAISON OFFICER SUGGESTS TRADE OF INSTRUCTORS

More than 140 graduating students at the U.S. Army Missile and Munitions Center and School, were told by a departing British liaison officer Friday, that missile instructors may in the near future be exchanged between the school and REME — the British Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers School, near London.

Lieutenant Colonel William E.

Although he praised the new automatic test equipment with its time-saving devices on mechanical


routine he said, "None of this equipment is endowed with the power to think and it is just in this area that you as maintenance men have a great part to play."

Nine students who had at-



Using a new concept of cargo handling developed by the Air Force Systems Command C-130 Hercules crews in the RVN have been able to load 36,000 pounds of cargo in five minutes and unload the same cargo in three minutes.




25 YEARS AGO AT REDSTONE
