## CAMPAIGN KICKOFF SET

The Nike-X chief was promoted to the new rank Thursday. Pinning the star is Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command. The Nike-X Project, which Brig. Gen. Drewry has headed for four years, is the Army's highest funded missile research and development program.

### Nike-X Project Manager Receives Star Thursday

The head of the nation's biggest defensive missile research and development program Thursday was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General at Redstone Arsenal.

He is Brig. Gen. Ivey O. Drewry, Jr., Project Manager for the Army's Nike-X missile defense project for more than four years.

Brig. Gen. Drewry received his star during ceremonies at his office on the Arsenal. It was presented by Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command at Redstone.

Among those present were top military and civilian officials on the Arsenal as well as more than 250 members of the Nike-X Project Office Staff.

The Project Brig. Gen. Drewry heads is a high priority effort to develop a missile system which will engage and destroy intercontinental ballistic missiles and submarine launched ballistic missiles in flight.

In addition to being the Project Manager for the Army's biggest missile research and development project, he also holds the distinction of being one of a limited number of national range commanders.

The Kwajalein Test Site in the mid-Pacific which is operated by the Project is a testing ground for not only the Nike-X system, but also other Department of Defense, Air Force and Navy pro-

jects. The Test Site is located in the Marshall Islands some 2,100 miles west of Hawaii.

Gen. Drewry came to Redstone in 1962 as Project Manager of the Nike Zeus anti-missile Missile system which later became the Nike-X system.

Born in Birmingham and reared in Jasper, Ala., he has been referred to as "one of the few Alabamians who spends more than \$1 million a day." The Nike-X budget which he administers is more than \$450 million this year.

Brig. Gen. Drewry entered the Army in 1939 after graduating with a Bachelor of Science Degree from Georgia Tech.

His first assignment was at Picatinny Arsenal, N. J., where he was involved in quality control for artillery ammunition loading—a task which put him in contact with World War II ammunition loading operations at Redstone.

During the closing years of the War he was in Europe as Operations Officer and later Battalion Commander of the 130th Armored Ordnance Battalion of the 8th Armored Division.

With the entry of the U. S. into the Korean conflict Brig. Gen. Drewry, then studying for his Masters Degree in engineering at the University of Michigan, was assigned to the Office, Chief of Ordnance for the Army.

### Chez Pup II Underway At Redstone

Any minute now Redstone Arsenal may be attacked by simulated nuclear missiles—but you might not know anything about it.

The attack is a part of Operation "Chez-Pup II" which is now underway to determine how Redstone could survive a real attack and bounce back to normal operations.

Among other actions that have been taken as a part of the Chez-Pup (pronounced Shape-Up) exercise are the preparation and stocking of emergency blast and fallout shelters at the arsenal.

The shelters, converted from ammunition "igloos," will be open this weekend to personnel who have specific shelter assignments. These include emergency operating force and reconstitution force personnel as well as military personnel occupying on-post quarters.

Notices giving the numbers and routes to open shelters will be posted in the Daily Bulletin today, Thursday and Friday.

The shelters will be open from 1:30 p.m. until 4 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday.

The Chez-Pup exercise got underway Monday and is scheduled to last about 6 days. Unlike a similar exercise held in July, 1963, however, the Arsenal will not be evacuated as a part of the test.

### Gen. Zierdt Scheduled To Be Keynote Speaker

Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command, will be the keynote speaker for a kickoff rally next Monday at 9 a.m. opening the 1967 Combined Federal Campaign for the Huntsville area at the Rocket Auditorium.

The General will be the main speaker at an assembly of CFC officials and key organizational workers signalling the start of the Redstone effort to duplicate or better the outstanding record of a year ago.

At that time Arsenal personnel responded to the first combined drive in support of all fund raising agencies with the largest percentage of participation and the highest per capita gift in the nation.

The one-drive-per-year concept was inaugurated within the Federal establishment two years ago at six widely scattered localities and expanded last year to an additional 54 areas, one of which was Huntsville.

The success attained here played an important part in a decision by the Civil Service Commission to further expand the program to include well over a hundred areas of the country that are heavily populated with Federally employed personnel.

Leonard Brockman, executive chairman for the CFC within the Army elements, said that the annual drive will officially open on Monday and continue for a period of six weeks. However, he added, it is hopeful that the solicitation can be wrapped up in less time.

The experience gained last year together with the payroll deduction feature of the drive is the reason for aiming at a shorter drive.

Approximately 60 per cent of the total contributions were made through payroll deductions last year, and it is anticipated that the percentage will be even greater this time, according to Brockman.

"We found," he said, "that our people liked the payroll deduction method of contributing and that collectively we were able to turn over a

much larger gift to the various social service agencies."

The Combined Federal Campaign brings together all of the previously individual drives into one short and concerted effort on the part of all Federal employees and military personnel in the area. Their gifts are distributed, according to their wishes, to member agencies of local United Givers Funds, to the eight Nation-

### ARMY AWARDS \$3 MILLION MAW CONTRACT

The U. S. Army has announced the award of a \$3 million contract to McDonnell Aircraft Corporation for continued engineering development of the MAW (Medium Anti-tank/Assault Weapon System).

Work will be performed at the company's plant at St. Louis, Mo., and in their new facilities at Titusville, Fla.

Weighing about 27 pounds, MAW is the Army's first guided missile system light enough to be carried by one man-and shoulder fired—yet, having a warhead big enough to kill most armor and other infantry targets encountered on the battlefield.

The MAW system is managed by the U. S. Army Missile Command, under Lt. Col. John H. Boyes, Project Manager. McDonnell Aircraft Corporation is prime contractor.

Negotiating the contract for the Army was Systems Contracts, Division A, of the Missile Command's Procurement and Production Directorate, headed by Col. E. J. McGinnis.

### Laboratory Dedication Plans Almost Complete

Plans for the dedication of the John M. Cone Laboratories next Thursday are all but complete.

Mrs. Cone, widow of the late Major General for whom the Army Missile Command's newly constructed metrology center will be named; and their son, Lt. John M. Cone Jr., have both accepted Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt's invitation to attend the brief ceremony.

Gen. Cone was commanding general of White Sands Missile Range at the time of his death last spring. At one time during his Army career, he commanded Anniston Ordnance Depot here in Alabama.

Lt. Gen. Frank S. Besson Jr., Commanding General of the U. S. Army Materiel Command, is scheduled to make the dedication address. A bronze plaque is to be unveiled as part of the ceremony. Commanding Generals from all

AMC subcommands or their representatives have been invited. Local municipal and civic leaders and the local Army Advisory committee have also been asked to attend.

The new laboratories are the largest of their type in the Department of Defense with 39,000 square feet of floor space and clean room capabilities in areas where a speck of dust could upset precise measurements.

The building was constructed by Gresham, Williams and Johnson, contractors from Decatur, Ala., at a cost of \$1,456,400.

The site, east of the Francis J. McMorrow Laboratories, was chosen because of the infrequency of seismic shock. The Laboratories have four free isolation tables in areas where the floor could not be isolated, and a four-foot thick

## Your Powerful Vote

As the day draws near when Americans mark their ballots, some persons will inevitably think, "My vote won't make a difference."

True, few elections have been decided by one vote. But this attitude, if shared by many, produces the paradox that Americans, living in perhaps the freest nation in the world, are not exercising their freedom to vote.

With this in mind, Army commanders and voting officers will be making a concerted effort on Armed Forces Voting Day, Sept. 28, to encourage eligible personnel to exercise that right. Focal point will be on the thousands of soldiers who will not be at home for the Nov. 8 elections, and on the absentee ballot allowing them to take part in the most important day in democratic government.

On one such national election day—1960 in California—the state was in John F. Kennedy's column for the Presidential election until the 250,000 absentee ballots were counted. Richard M. Nixon emerged victorious.

More important than the outcome of an election is the ballot's power to show why democracy thrives. Free elections are the fundamental way of participating in government.

Make sure by Armed Forces Voting Day that you have applied for an absentee ballot, checked the voting regulations of your state, and examined the political issues and candidates. On election day, your participation in government will equal that of any local or national nominee on your ballot.

isolated concrete floor which provides 4,820 square feet of space to protect delicate equipment in the area from seismic vibrations.

Laboratories devoted to physical standards, microwave standards, electronic standards and standard engineering and evaluation are all housed in the building.

Temperature is controlled with only five-hundredth of a degree variance allowed in the clean room area. Offices and workshops are arranged along the outer walls on all four sides. An eight foot hall gives air insulation space between the offices and the laboratory areas in the center of the building.

Donald I. Hervig is Chief of the Metrology Center of the Army Missile Support Command. Col. J. N. Jean is the Commander of the Support Command. Hervig has a work force of approximately 150 people who have been on the job long enough to set some of the Department of the Army standards—especially in missile-related fields.

Among the guests, he expects some representatives from the National Bureau of Standards as well as other Department of the Army Agencies.



These include such things as preparation of generators for alternate power, stocking of food, medical supplies and water, increasing security measures for property protection, preparing for



The Missile and Munitions Center and School and the Marshall Space Flight Center as well as various contractor organizations will also participate.

A nine-hole addition to Redstone Arsenal's golf course opened for play Saturday. Brief ceremonies marking the expansion of the military recreational area to a full 18-hole course were held.

Limited use of the newly constructed back nine will be permitted throughout the remainder of the season. It will be open only on weekends and holidays, the periods of heaviest use. Remaining construction and curing will be accomplished on weekdays, when the back nine will be closed.

The golf course is one of the most heavily used recreational facilities available at Redstone Arsenal for military personnel and their families. There has been a substantial increase in the number of Army officers and enlisted men

assigned to the arsenal since the original nine-hole course opened eight years ago.

Army elements at Redstone now have more than 2700 military personnel assigned, while training activities bring an additional 9,000 military personnel to the Arsenal annually for months-long residence as students.

The first foursome to play the addition included Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General, Army Missile Command; Col. Erwin M. Graham, Commandant, Army Missile & Munitions Center and School; Sgt. 



He added that the Council was interested in establishing a league that would represent as many organizations of the Arsenal as possible, and a number of units have already indicated a desire to field a team.





### Policy On Souvenirs

New AR 643-20 outlines Department of the Army policy on war souvenirs, defining them as any item of enemy or private property used as war material, acquired in a combat area or zone within a prescribed period of time. The reg lists the items, such as electronic equipment, gas-expelling weapons, live ammunition, which may not be brought back to the United States. It also describes the procedures for bringing approved souvenirs into the country and warns of the penalties for ignoring these provisions.

There were 1,800 green shirts, 1,800 black shorts, 1,200 pairs of sandals, 6,000 khaki uniforms, 8 sewing machines, and 500 pounds of cloth. Other areas, clearly VC commissaries, yielded 300 chickens, 100 pigs, 175 tons of salt, 1,200 tons of rice, and 200 pounds of grain. (ANF)



## Calhoun College Adds To Faculty


The John C. Calhoun State Junior College is more than doubling the size of its faculty to meet the enrollment expected there this fall.

Dr. Carlton Kelley, president of the college and technical school, today announced the employment of 28 new teachers, which will bring the college's number of instructors to 50.




Michael F. LaBouve, Director of Admissions and Student Affairs said students may now enroll as auditors in undergraduate programs without meeting formal entrance requirements.



# TOW Tests Set At White Sands

TOW, the Army's heavy anti-tank guided missile, has arrived at White Sands Missile Range, N. M., for engineering service testing.

The anti-tank weapon's name, TOW, is an acronym which stands for Tube launched, Optically tracked, Wire guided missile. The system, which weighs about 160 pounds, is made up of six major assemblies—the launch tube, traversing unit, tripod, sightsensor, guidance-electronics and the two-stage solid propellant missile itself.

The tube launched weapon can be carried and fired by three men from the ground, or it can be carried and fired from an M-113 armored personnel carrier, an M-151 jeep, or from the versatile M-274 Army Mule. The highly mobile system also is air transportable by helicopter and can be fired while airborne, officials said.

TOW is designed for infantrymen, to give them the upper hand against attacking enemy armor or reinforced emplacements, it was noted.


TOW's mobility and simplicity of operation are its greatest attributes, the Army said. The gunner doesn't have to worry about the target's speed and range. The missile's guidance-electronics automatically keeps the missile on its target.

In recent tests at Redstone Arsenal, TOW gunners scored direct hits on tanks more than a mile away.

**THE TOW** is transported in an expendable fiberglass container in which it is sealed at the factory. The 40-pound missile is never exposed again until fired.

In loading, a ring is snapped from the end of the case, then both container and missile are slipped into the launching tube. The case serves as a protective cradle for the missile during transport and then becomes a part of the launcher when loaded for firing.

The launching tube, also fiberglass, can be pivoted swiftly to allow a 360 degree field of fire, missiles can be fired in relatively rapid succession, officials said.

Engineering service test series scheduled to begin in early October, will be conducted from three range sites. The other two are Parker Site, on the south range, and North Oscura Peak Range Center.

Some phases of the test program will be performed by White Sands personnel at Yuma Proving Ground, Ariz.; Fort Greely, Alaska; Fort Clayton, Panama Canal Zone; Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and Fort Bragg, N.C.

During the program, the rugged weapon will be pitted against fixed and moving targets from vari-

ous distances. Firings will be made under extreme environmental and meteorological conditions simulating those found in the Arctic, tropics and desert, and including strong winds and heavy rainfall. The TOW also will be fired under simulated tactical

conditions, at night, under multiple attack by tanks and under simulated countermeasures.

Robert P. Whitley is acting Project Manager for TOW at the Army Missile Command. Col. James N. Lothrop has been designated to become Project Manager.







**Not For The Road**

Drinking may be a factor in as many as half of the fatal motor-vehicle accidents, according to studies specifically designed and conducted to identify the blood alcohol content of drivers and pedestrians.

Routine accident reports indicate a lower incidence of drinking, but it is believed that in such reports the importance of drinking is partially obscured by differences in the interpretation of drinking and its contribution as an accident cause, and by differences in the completeness and thoroughness of accident investigation and reporting.

California. Continuing analyses of victims in fatal motor-vehicle accidents show well over half of all fatally injured drivers had been drinking. Among drivers responsible for the accidents, two-thirds had been drinking. In contrast, in those accidents in which drivers were not responsible, only one out of five had been drinking. Among fatally injured pedestrians aged 15 years and older, 45 per cent had been drinking.

The local personnel are enrolled for training at military schools and leading universities located in eight different states. The courses range in length from a week to a full college year.


The advanced training is made available to local personnel through the Command's Career Development Program administered by the Training and Development Division of Civilian Personnel.




