SFC Beadell was originally a Westerner, born in the State of Washington and growing up in Oakland, Calif. She has 18 years in the WACs and was one of the cadre that helped open Ft. McClellan as the official training center for the Corps.

She has been in Alabama long enough to adopt it as her permanent home. For five years, SFC Beadell was on recruiting duty in the state, with Headquarters at Birmingham and two more years with Headquarters in Montgomery.

Between times, she has been an instructor at the Clerical School at Ft. McClellan, a job she thoroughly enjoys.

SFC Beadell spent three years on duty in Leghorn, Italy.

At one time, she was Third Army Women's Golf champion. SFC Pickering's venture into active sports was on European slopes as a skier. Both of the Sergeants agree that they don't have the time to spend on these things that they had earlier in their enlistments.

## Shillelagh Contract Totals \$9.8 Million For Guidance

The U. S. Army has awarded a \$9,869,400 contract to Philco-Ford Corporation's Aeronutronic Division for the fiscal year 1967 procurement of Shillelagh missile system guidance and control equipment.

Announcement of the "third production buy" of g&c equipment was made last week by the U. S. Army Missile Command. Col. Spencer R. Baen is Project Manager for the Shillelagh program and Aeronutronic is prime contractor.

Work under the contract will be performed at Lawndale, Calif.

The Lawndale facility manufactures both missiles and guidance and control equipment. From there, missile sub-assemblies are shipped to Burlington, Iowa, where propellants and warheads are attached and final assembly is completed.

Shillelagh missile rounds leave the Burlington plant ready for using units.

Shillelagh is a gun-launched anti-tank guided missile system being developed for Army armored vehicles. First application of the weapon system was for the General Sheridan armored reconnaissance airborne assault vehicle. But Shillelagh is also being adapted to the M60 current main battle tank and is planned as main armament for the United States-Federal Republic of Germany Main Battle Tank being developed for the 1970's.

An unusual feature of the Shillelagh is its 152mm gun-launcher—it can fire either missiles or conventional ammunition. The fact that a tank can carry both missiles and conventional rounds—and fire from the same tube the one best suited to the target—is considered

## Student Examination Open Until December 9, 1966

High school graduates and college students have until December 9, 1966 to file application to take the second of three competitive examinations being conducted by the Civil Service Commission to fill Office and Science Assistant positions during the summer of 1967 at Redstone Arsenal and other Federal installations.

The test will be conducted January 7, 1967, at more than 1000 cities and towns across the country, including Huntsville and Decatur. No more applications are being accepted for the first test in the series slated for November 26.

The final examination is scheduled for February 4, 1967 with the deadline for making application set for January 9.

Candidates for the examination may elect either of the two remaining dates and may choose the city where they desire to take the test. The Commission will notify each applicant of the exact time and place.

The examinations are open primarily to college students and high school graduates who are interested in short-term employment. The minimum age is 18 although this limitation can be waived for high school graduates who may be appointed after they reach their 16th birthday.

The Commission, however, indicated that those applicants who passed the examination last year, need not take the written test this year unless they wish to improve their score.

They may compete for summer 1967 appointments based on their

1966 score, and will automatically be notified by the Civil Service Commission as to what steps to take to file for a job. The scores for 1966 will not be considered if the applicant takes the examination this year.

The purpose of the examination is to provide those who are interested in employment an opportunity to compete for jobs that will be available. In the test last year, more than 105,000 applicants, competed nationwide in the written examinations for jobs with salaries ranging from \$69 to \$92 per week.

While the number of summer jobs is small in relation to total Federal employment, there is a wide variety of positions to be filled. Agencies make appointments according to their needs, to positions as assistants in offices and as aides to scientists and engineers.

A number of the appointments are made in office jobs, such as typists, office machine operators, stenographers and clerks. However, the scope of positions covered is much broader.

Positions to be filled by the Missile Command include, clerks, typists, stenographer and aides in the fields of engineering, physical science and mathematics. The jobs are classified as GS-2 through GS-4.

All high school graduates and college students will be given equal opportunity to compete. The names of qualified candidates will be placed on rosters according to scores earned in the examination. Agencies will make the appointments on a merit basis from the

## Chaparral Contract \$1.9 Million

The U. S. Army Missile Command has awarded a \$1,920,000 letter contract to the Aeronutronic Division of Philco-Ford Corp. to cover engineering services for the Chaparral air defense missile system.

The work will be performed at the company's Anaheim, Calif., plant.

The Chaparral system uses the modified Navy developed Sidewinder IC missile mounted on an XM730 self-propelled vehicle. The missiles are launched from a self-contained firing unit which has four launch rails for missiles in ready-to-fire condition.

The missile is an infrared heat seeking weapon which guides on the target's heat source automatically after launch.

Chaparral is one of two weapons selected by the Army for a new



as linemen on a football team. He said, "Our 'blocking' assignments are maintenance, logistics and technical knowledge for proper administration and accountability. It is our responsibility to perform these assignments to enable our 'backfield', the combat arms, to score."

He told the graduates, "Our playing field is not 100 yards long and 40 yards wide, but the entire free world." He also told the men, "your opponents are already on the field, waiting for you—and they don't play fair. He also warned that the playing field would not be smooth. "It (the field) includes the rice paddies and jungles of Vietnam, the mountains of Korea and the wooded mountains, rivers and plains of Europe."

Stressing the grave seriousness of missing a 'blocking' assignment he said, "An enemy plane continues to target because a missile fails to leave the launcher. The opponent continues to advance because our guns can not fire for lack of ammunition." "As a result," he said, "our backfield takes a beating."

In closing he told the men, "Our goal is not the familiar 6 points and loud cheers, but rather world freedom and the dignity of man."

A. A. Stewart, Vice President of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army made a special presentation. He awarded the service school educational achievement plaque to Pvt. Joseph F. Reale, who compiled a 96.6 average in the ammunition re-

## Control Group Of IEEE To Meet Tuesday Night

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineer's Automatic Control Group will meet Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Alabama Research Institute Auditorium to hear a presentation on Ring Laser Attitude Reference Systems.

Guest speaker will be Dr. J. L. Keller, research section head of a group at Sperry Gyroscope.

Dr. Keller's PhD is in applied mechanics. His talk will include a description and comparison of ring laser rate sensor to conventional gyroscopic instruments. A strapdown attitude performance system consisting of three ring lasers and a digital computer will then be defined. The performance and physical characteristics of the reference system will be evaluated relative to manned space flight requirements.

## Duck Season Opens

Alabama's duck season opens one half hour before legal sunrise Thursday with every indication pointing toward a banner year for waterfowl hunters.

State authorities report large numbers of ducks present at all the state public hunting areas within driving distance of Huntsville.

Hunters planning to shoot on the state areas, Swan Creek and Mallard/Fox Creek areas near Decatur and those in Jackson County are reminded that they must have in their possession a state hunting license, federal duck stamp and a special permit issued by the State Department of Conservation for the particular hunting area.

State permits for the Decatur area can be obtained from numerous sporting goods stores in Huntsville. Jackson county permits can be obtained at Carver's Marina on Highway 72 north of Scottsboro.

Shooting ends each day at legal sunset. In accordance with federal regulations, only shotguns may be used. Repeating shotguns must be plugged so that they can not fire more than three times without reloading.

The daily bag limit is four ducks

however there are special limitations on Mallards, Wood Ducks and Canvasbacks. No more than two of each can be killed per day. According to Edward Farrish, Chief Enforcement Officer, Department of Conservation. The daily bag, however, may include two mallards and two wood ducks. For example, so long as the legal limit of four is not exceeded.


