SATURDAY IS OUR DAY



HURRY! HURRY! SANDRA—Pretty Sandra Smith seems to have gotten carried away by her enthusiasm over Armed Forces Day scheduled for this coming Saturday, May 20th. Small wonder. Kicking off the day's activities is a parade through Huntsville's downtown business district beginning at 9:30 in the morning. Then, at 12:30 p.m., the Army is throwing open the gates to Redstone Arsenal where displays and demonstrations of U. S. military power will be on view to the public. Sandra, a Madison resident, works as an accounting clerk in the Army Missile Command's Financing and Accounting Center. Her "canvas" is an Honest John surface-to-surface artillery rocket operational with American troops in the U. S. and overseas. It's one of many rockets and guided missiles in the Army's arsenal to be displayed Saturday by the Army Missile Command.

Dog, Drill Teams, Bands Will Perform At Arsenal

Nine Army missiles and rockets and five heavy artillery pieces will wind their way through Huntsville's downtown business district Saturday, accompanied by more than 1,000 uniformed troops commemorating Armed Forces Day, 1967.

The troops—soldiers from the Army Missile Command, Army and Marine Corps Students from the Army Missile and Munitions Center and School, and the local Navy reserve unit—will march to the music of 21 Army, high school, and college bands.

The parade, estimated to be an hour and a half long, will begin its 16-block-long route promptly at 9:30 Saturday morning.

In the afternoon, starting at 12:30 p.m., the center of activity will switch to Redstone Arsenal. There an array of displays and demonstrations is being assembled to tell the story of what the Army and Redstone are doing in the creation of this country's power for peace arsenal.

The parade units will assemble at the corner of Williams Avenue and Church Street, according to Ray Jones, Parade Marshal. From there the route is east on Williams to Franklin Street, north on Franklin to Holmes Avenue, west on Holmes to Church Street and south on Church to Williams. Troops will leave the parade at Williams and Canal Avenue.

The missiles and rockets in the parade will include the Honest John, Sergeant, TOW, Hercules, Sprint, Zeus, Hawk, Littlejohn and Lance.

Heavy artillery pieces include a 105 mm Howitzer, 155 mm Howitzer, a 90 mm Self-Propelled Anti-tank Gun and 75 mm Pack Howitzer.

The activity at Redstone Arsenal Saturday afternoon will be divided between the Army Missile Display Area off Patton Road and the Redstone Arsenal Air Field located off Rideout Road.

On display at the airfield will be some 15 Army aircraft as well as the artillery pieces. A demonstration of radio controlled model airplanes has been planned for 1:00 and again at 3:00 p.m. Music will be provided by the Florence State College ROTC band. The ROTC Drill Team will perform at 2:00 and at 4:00 p.m.

Maj. Donald E. Kreul, Arsenal Project Officer for Armed Forces Day, said that tentative plans had been made for an antique airplane display also.

At the Display Area, site of the three giant air domes, will be exhibits of the work performed by the Army's men and missiles (See PARADE SET on Page 2)

APPLICATIONS DUE

"Let's get those membership applications and renewals turned in," is the advice to all campaign workers as the membership drive of the Association, U. S. Army draws to a close.

The campaign to increase the membership of the Tennessee Valley Chapter to approximately 6,000 comes to an end on Armed Forces Day.

"This means that we are going to have to find 1,263 memberships during the final week," according to Horace Lowers, executive chairman for the drive on the Arsenal.

It is figured that at least 4,504 of the 6,000 memberships will have to come from among Arsenal personnel and to date only 3,241 applications have been turned in to campaign headquarters.

Vice President Humphrey Schedules Arsenal Visit

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey will visit Army and NASA facilities here Monday and remain overnight before returning to Washington.

Senator John Sparkman and Representative Bob Jones announced the visit last week. Mr. Humphrey was scheduled to make a similar visit here on March 22 and 23. He said at the time that trip was cancelled that he would reschedule it as soon as possible.

The Vice President will make two speeches here, the first shortly after arrival at the Redstone Arsenal Army Airfield at 3 p.m. Monday. The public will be admitted to the airfield ceremonies to see and hear the Vice President. Later that evening he will address the annual meeting of the Huntsville Arts Council in the Carriage Inn.

WHNT-TV will carry the Vice President's evening address live in a telecast beginning at 8 p.m. The Vice President will be met upon arrival by Dr. Werner von Braun, Director of the Marshall Space Flight Center, and Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the Missile Command, who will be his hosts while he is at the installation. An honors ceremony is planned at the airfield including both United States troops and foreign students at the Army Missile and Munitions Center and School.

It is planned that the Vice President will make brief remarks at the airfield after reviewing a line-up of Army missiles.

The official party then will leave the airfield by car and tour MSFC facilities. A captive test of a Saturn booster or rocket engine is planned.

Before departing Tuesday, the

Plans are underway for a farewell community salute to Maj. Gen. John G. Zierdt, Commanding General of the U. S. Army Missile Command who will retire from active service at the end of June.

The Army Advisory Committee and the Redstone Arsenal Committee of the Chamber of Commerce have taken the lead in organizing a unified community recognition. Louis Salmon is chair-

man of the committee planning the event. This will unite all community efforts to honor Gen. and Mrs. Zierdt.

A community dinner is planned June 14. Tickets will be available shortly. Distribution will be through members of organizations sponsoring the dinner and testimonial.

"We have contacted many civic and professional organizations and invited their participation," Salmon said. "We want to make sure, however, that any group that wants to join in this community activity is included. He asked that interested organizations contact A. V. Pilling at 536-9957.

Gen. Zierdt's retirement June 30 will bring to a close his 30 year military career which includes almost ten years at Redstone Arsenal. He has commanded the Army Missile Command since September 1963.

\$3 Million Contract Awarded For Parts On Hercules System

The Army Missile Command has awarded a \$3,027,970 contract to Intercontinental Manufacturing Co., Inc., of Garland, Texas, for motors with cases and adapters for the Nike Hercules air defense guided missile system.

The award was the initial portion of a multi-year contract expected to total more than \$9 million. The work will be performed at Garland.

The Hercules system is managed by the U. S. Army Missile Command under E. L. Smock, Acting Project Manager. Negotiating the contract for the Army was the Missile Command's Procurement and Production Directorate headed by Col. Sterling C. Holmes.

Now deployed around key areas in both the United States and overseas, Nike Hercules has proven successful in tests against high performance aircraft at a variety of altitudes and has successfully intercepted short range ballistic missiles.

Extended Range Lance Development To Begin

A \$2,050,000 U. S. Army letter contract has been awarded to Missiles and Space Division—Michigan LTV Aerospace Corp., to begin development of an Extended Range Lance (XRL) missile.

Announcement of the award was made by the Army Missile Command which directs the Lance program under Col. W. E. Mehlinger Project Manager.

The contract lays the groundwork for greatly extending the range of the Lance missile by

making only minor modifications to the existing weapon system configuration. Both Lance versions will use the same ground support equipment.

Work will be done by Missiles and Space Division—Michigan, Lance prime contractor, at the company's plant at Warren, Mich. Rocketdyne Division of North American Aviation is principal subcontractor for the engine.


UNITED STATES ARMY, CHIEF OF STAFF ARMED FORCES DAY 1967

"WILL THE REAL A. W. REED . . ." Please stand up? He is. Or rather, they are. If all this sounds thoroughly confusing, there's a good reason for it. You see, Col. A. W. Reed (right) and Lt. A. W. Reed are both in the Army. Both are stationed at Redstone Arsenal, Ala. And, as you have already guessed by now, they are father and son. Colonel Reed is Project Manager for the Army's Redeye air defense guided missile system at the Army Missile Command. Lieutenant Reed is assigned to the Environmental Evaluation Section of the Missile Command's Test and Reliability Evaluation Laboratory.

Lance Gives Supplemental Funds For More Hardware

A \$751,000 supplement to an existing contract has been awarded to Missiles and Space Division — Michigan LTV Aerospace Corporation to support the first industrial buy of Lance missile system hardware, the Army announced today.

Under the contract, LTVM will supply additional long lead-time materials and components required to meet deployment schedules of the Lance program.

Lance is the Army's battlefield missile system capable of carrying either nuclear or conventional warheads. The first Army missile to use pre-packaged storable liquid propellants, Lance is a highly mobile system that can be transported easily by plane or air dropped.

The Lance program is managed by the Army Missile Command. Col. W. E. Mehlinger is Project Manager. LTVM is prime contractor.

Negotiating the contract for the Army was Systems Contracts, Division B, of the Missile Command's Procurement and Production Directorate, headed by Col. S. C. Holmes.

Chemist Thwarts Engine Erosion

A "hardcoating" for titanium developed by a chemist at AMC's Watervliet Arsenal, is being investigated by the Army to prevent erosion in helicopter engines flying over Vietnam.

Theodore Pochily created the coating now being tested at the Army Aeronautical Depot Maintenance Center, Corpus Christi, Texas, as a protective binder for the engine of the UH-1 helicopter.

The tests are aimed at thwarting erosion on the engine's titanium components caused by the intake of debris such as salt-laden beach sand. The anodized coating enables the metal to retain its excellent corrosion-resistant qualities. It was developed about two years ago and was used at the arsenal to coat experimental mortars.

Since then it has excited national interest with more than 60 private firms and government agencies expressing interests in the process.

Birmingham Zoo To Be Destination

Enlisted men from Redstone Arsenal will tour the Birmingham Zoo Saturday.

The zoo located in Park Lane Park in Birmingham has some of the finest animals in the country. The zoo has become so popular that it is being considered for a state park.



gineering, Lance is being developed as a highly mobile divisional support weapon which can be transported by plane or air dropped, has maximum ground mobility and a swim capability. Capable of carrying either a nuclear or conventional warhead, Lance will be the Army's first missile system to use pre-packaged storable liquid propellants.

Development flight tests of Lance are continuing at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, Propulsion system development, qualification and environmental tests of Extended Range Lance will be conducted at Redstone Arsenal.






In order to receive their caps as full-fledged JANGOs, the girls attend classes and serve as nurses aides at the Post Hospital, Dental Clinic and the Bloodmobile. Their training is thorough and comprehensive.

JANGO, sometimes referred to as the Junior League of the Armed Forces, is made up of wives and daughters of Armed Forces

commissioned and warrant officers, both active duty and retired. Its purpose is to encourage loyalty in the Services, develop leadership and responsibility in its members, form a link between Service people and the community, and to provide teen-age girls an opportunity for training in community service.

A Board of Directors composed of wives of senior officers of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard governs and guides JANGO. An Executive Board handles the routine business.

JANGO became a national organization with its junior activities when the Surgeon General of the Navy in 1942 requested to have the JANGO program in all Naval hospitals.

Its honorary members includes wives of Presidents of the United States, Defense and Armed Forces Secretaries, and Chiefs of Staff. The JANGO President this year is Mrs. Gordon T. Gould whose husband, Maj. Gen. Gould is Air Force Director of Command Control and Communications.

Horsemen Plan Open House Armed Forces Day

The Redstone Saddle Club celebrates its 5th anniversary on Saturday May 20th with an "Open House" in the stable area from noon until 3 p.m. and a membership dinner at 4 p.m. in the "Clubhouse."

The Saddle Club was started five years ago by Col. R. P. Davidson, Lt. Col. John Bond, U. S. Army and three other charter members. Since then membership has grown to 35 families and the number of mounts has increased to 50.

Current officers of the club are Col. James W. Young, President; LTC (Ret.) John R. F. Bond, Vice-President; Maj. William B. Holbruner, Stable Officer; Maj. (Ret.) Irvin V. Gulbranson, Treasurer; and Mrs. Samuel H. Lowry, Secretary.

The Saddle Club is a "private" type association, under the RSA Joint Activities Council, with the Arsenal providing land and certain basic facilities for club use. Generally speaking, however, the Club is a self-sustaining activity operated and maintained by the members.

The Club has the use of approximately 500 acres of land lying between Goss Road, Bob Wallace

Avenue, Patton Road and Rideout Road. The stables are in the old North Post Area immediately adjacent to the Civilian Personnel offices. An old farm house, that pre-dates the arsenal, has been adapted for a clubhouse for the membership and a riding ring is available. There are approximately 30 corrals, most of them 40 feet by 40 feet in size, each a combined "tack-room" and shelter for the horses.

Membership is open to personnel on active duty and retired military personnel of the Army, Navy, Air Force, U. S. Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Public Health Service, Coast and Geodetic Survey and their adult dependents. Associate membership is open to the members of the Armed Forces of foreign countries and their adult dependents serving at Redstone Arsenal.

Members are responsible for the care and upkeep of their corrals, shelters and mounts. Generally speaking, members exercise, feed, water, curry, wash, and otherwise care for their mounts themselves, often as a family project.

On a typical afternoon, a visitor can observe a horse being shod, a

fence being repaired or painted, practice jumping in the ring, a shelter being constructed and teenagers riding.

Club activities include trail rides which are sometimes com-

bined with mid-day picnics, suppers in honor of members departing for Viet-Nam and other social occasions.

The mounts include pleasure horses, hunters, quarter horses,

western ponies, and other classifications too numerous to mention. Several members ride to the hounds and participate in horse shows but most ride informally for the sheer enjoyment of it.





AATC DEVELOPS TRACKED VEHICLE FOR MARINE USE

The U. S. Army Tank-Automotive Command, is building seven pilot models of an experimental Marine Corps vehicle being developed to operate in the swamps

and rice paddies of Southeast Asia.

Referred to as the Marginal Terrain Vehicle (MTV), its official designation is the XM759, 1 1/2-ton Cargo Carrier (Soft Tire Tracked). It has a gross weight of 11,500 pounds and will carry 3,000 pounds of cargo or a fully equipped Marine squad of 14 and is operated by a two-man crew.

It looks like a tracked vehicle except that instead of conventional tracks it has a set of chains on each side resembling giant bicycle chains and 17 wide-track, low pressure terra-tires strung between the chains.

The chains are driven by two large sprockets located on each side at the front. Two similar sprockets at the rear are adjustable to exert tension on the chain.

The vehicle rolls over the wheels in contrast to the normal wheel-axle arrangement where the rolling of the wheels moves the vehicle.

The vehicle will be controlled

the same as any tracked vehicle with turning achieved by the slow-down or stopping of one side while the wheels on the other side are accelerated.

Repair Parts Management Seminar Conducted Here

The Supply and Maintenance Directorate was the host last week for a two-day Department of Army training session on the use of The Inventory Item Stratification System for intensive management of repair parts.

The classes were conducted at the Rocket Auditorium by Malcolm Stewart of Harbridge House, Inc., a Boston management consultant firm. It was one of two such sessions conducted under a Department of Army contract with Harbridge House.

Some 80 supply specialists of the Missile Command and other AMC commodity commands were in attendance for the session.

Because of the critical nature of repair parts for support of end items and weapons systems, the Commanding General of the Army Materiel Command requested

the establishment of special assistants by Commodity Commanders to insure intensive management of repair parts for selected weapons systems.

Four such managers are located in the Directorate's National Inventory Control Point and two others have been designated to monitor the machine processing aspects of the program.

G. J. Jamieson, Marion Legg, J. B. McFarling and J. D. Stephenson are the NICP managers, while J. C. Clement and Cecil Johnson are the data processing monitors.

In executing their responsibilities, these intensive managers have found the Inventory Item Stratification System most valuable in portraying trends, highlighting problems, defending budgetary requirements, and providing many other important pieces of information required for the effective execution of their mission.

A. A. Stewart, acting Director of Supply and Maintenance, stressed intensive management in his opening remarks to the training session.

He said, "In today's climate of minimum funding, leadtime escalation, fluctuating demands, and never ending requirements for status of items, we must individually and collectively strive for, and use the best tools at our disposal to do more and more with fewer people. In short, we must exploit all means possible to do a better job."

The results of the training session will provide for a system that produces supply management, budgetary studies, inventory analysis, and readiness evaluation reports through an integrated data base and processing system for the selected end items.



Choppers Get New Refueling System

A closed circuit refueling system for the UH-1 Iroquois helicopter has been developed by AMC's U.S. Army Aviation Materiel Laboratories at Fort Eustis, Virginia.

It can be installed on a helicopter in three minutes and provides a continuous, airtight flow of fuel from fuel source to aircraft

fuel tank. The new system automatically shuts off the flow fuel when the tank is full and permits refueling while engines are running.

Extensive tests by the Army Aviation Test Board at Fort Rucker, Alabama, show that the system is trouble free and can probably be applied to other types of aircraft.

Missile Command Representatives Attend Sergeant System Symposium

Department of Defense personnel and representatives of ten major U. S. Army Commands met yesterday at Salt Lake City, Utah, for a technical symposium on the progress of the Sergeant System Phase II Improvement Program — A Project providing for development, testing, and production of new ground support equipment (GSE) electronics for the Army's 25 to 75 nautical mile range, surface-to-surface Sergeant Missile System.

During the one-day Symposium, attendees, including Lt Gen W. B. Bunker, Deputy Commanding General, Army Materiel Command, participated in a technical review,

toured facilities at Sperry Rand Corporation's Sperry Utah Co. Division, inspected displays of the new electronics gear, and witnessed a simulated tactic operation of a Sergeant Phase II prototype system. The Symposium was under the direction of Army Missile Command's Sergeant Project Manager, Lt Col Arthur G. Lang, Jr. Sperry is Prime Contractor.

The Sergeant Phase II Improvement Program, active since late 1965 exploits the benefits of microelectronics developments and makes "SERGEANT" one of the first major Army Missile Systems to adapt to microelectronic techniques.

Phase II state-of-the-art developments significantly simplify support of the system and make possible elimination of three v-sized test stations from each Sergeant battalion now in the field. Use of newly developed throw-away microcircuit subassemblies (printed wiring boards) reduces the number of technicians required and lowers the skill level needed to maintain the GSE electronics. Savings resulting from reductions in maintenance cost are estimated to be in excess of \$7 million each year this system is deployed.

Compared with present equipment, a new digital computer employed in the GSE firing set will substantially reduce Sergeant countdown time and will provide the Commander an alternate of holding in a "ready position" for an indefinite period of time.

Environmental tests are scheduled at White Sands Missile Range, N. M., beginning in August on Sergeant Phase II prototype system.

The Sergeant is a Field Artillery Ballistic System that is reliable, rugged, accurate and highly mobile. A second generation missile, Sergeant utilizes an inertial guidance system and solid propellant motor. One of our first systems to employ automatic checkout and countdown, the Sergeant System is in operation with U. S. troops in the United States and overseas.

University Offers Vibrations Course

Dr. Harold L. Johnson will be in Huntsville the week of June 12-16, 1967 to present a short course on Random Vibrations. Dr. Johnson is currently Associate Professor of Mechanical Engineering at Georgia Institute of Technology. His main interests are kinematics and dynamics, vibrations, and design.

Dr. Johnson will be assisted in presenting this program by the following instructors: Dr. G. M. Rentzepis, Dr. Stephen H. Crandall, Dr. Khushi L. Chandiramani and Dr. Terry Scharton.

This course is designed for the engineer currently engaged in missile development. The student should have a background in mathematics through differential equations. He should possess at least a fundamental knowledge of vibrations equivalent to the undergraduate coverage in most engineering institutions.

Army To Dedicate Airfield To World War II Hero

Twenty-three years ago, during World War II, Army PFC Fred Henry Bucholz was killed while single-handedly attacking an enemy blockhouse on a tiny, shell-torn island in the Pacific. Earlier he had risked his life to drag his wounded platoon leader to safety.

The Army recognized Bucholz's gallantry by awarding him, posthumously, the Distinguished Service Cross.

On Memorial Day this year the Army will remember Bucholz again. The bustling air field of Kwajalein Island where he was killed on February 4, 1944, will be dedicated as a memorial to the courageous Infantryman from Elmhurst, Ill.

The field, which handles more than 100 flights per week including huge cargo planes enroute across the Pacific, will be named the Bucholz Army Air Field.

The dedication was announced by Brig. Gen. I. O. Drewry, Kwajalein Test Site Range Commander, with headquarters at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., and Col. Frank C. Healy, Commanding Officer at Kwajalein Test Site.

Bucholz is survived by Marvin Bucholz, a brother, and Mrs. Harold Miller, a sister, both of Elmhurst. A third brother, Carl, died April 16. The father, Albert, died in 1962 and his mother, Marian, in 1955.

Bucholz was one of two members of the family killed in World War II. A brother, Henry William, died five months later at Normandy following the "D Day" invasion.


Born in October 1907 and reared on the family's 90 acre farm, Bucholz attended schools in Elmhurst and Northwestern University. He entered the Army in September 1942. Kwajalein was his first battle.

In a letter to the survivors notifying them of the dedication, General Drewry noted Bucholz's "valor in the battle of the Marshalls." He added "I am sure our pride in his courage and willingness to perform his duty as he saw it is equal to your own."

In its official citation for the award, the Army described Bucholz's courageous acts: "When his platoon leader was hit by an enemy bullet and fell in an area exposed to enemy fire PFC Bucholz left his own covered position, and with utter disregard for

his own safety, rushed into the exposed area and dragged the officer to the security of a shell hole." It said that when further advancement was blocked by heavy fire from a blockhouse: "He ran over the open ground . . . and threw a grenade into the opening (of the blockhouse). He was killed as he moved away from the opening in an effort to cover it with his rifle fire. His act, however, in diverting the enemy enabled other troops to cross the line of fire and destroy the emplacement. The gallant and fearless actions of PFC Bucholz contributed greatly to the success of the attack and resulted in the capture of the north end of the island before darkness."

Survivors of the bitter five day battle for Kwajalein would hardly recognize the tropical island now. During the battle the two-and-one-half-mile-long island was reduced

to rubble; only a single palm tree was left standing.

Today Kwajalein is headquarters of the 50 mile long string of islands that make up the Test Site. The Test Site is a National Missile Range with facilities valued at more than \$500,000,000 and an

American community of some 3,500 people. The rubble has been replaced with thousands of coconut palms and other types of tropical flora — as well as giant radars, missile launching cells and other facilities for the Test Site's technical mission and the comfort of its residents.

Located in the Marshall Islands, Kwajalein is some 2,100 miles west of Hawaii. It is the principal testing area for the Army's Nike-X missile defense system. General Drewry is also Nike-X Project Manager.

The air field with its mile and a quarter long runway is the transportation hub for the burgeoning Test Site. It handles more than 1,300 passengers, and 37 tons of mail each month. It also literally stretches from ocean to ocean, cutting across the curve of the banana shaped island.

The three-story terminal building, the top of which is one of the highest points in the Marshalls, serves for aircraft operations, as a "city hall" for the Kwajalein community, and as Kwajalein Test Site headquarters.

At the terminal building a plaque will read "Bucholz Army Air

Field, named in honor of PFC Fred Henry Bucholz, Army Serial No. 3 6 3 6 8 6 4 5, posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for Extraordinary Heroism in the Battle of Kwajalein, February 4, 1944.

Bucholz was killed a few thousand yards north of the terminal building in what is now the island's housing area.


