

PARADE SET SATURDAY



ARMED FORCES DAY PARADE—Marching troops and bands, missiles and guns will get Armed Forces Day under way Saturday, with gusto. Beginning at 9:30 a.m. at the corner of Williams Ave. and Church St., the 30-unit parade will travel the route indicated on this map. Honors will be given to military and civilian dignitaries assembled on the reviewing stand located on the corner of Franklin St. and Eustis.

Bands, Tanks, Missiles And Artillery To Pass In Review In Huntsville

Missiles, tanks and artillery will rumble through downtown Huntsville Saturday, May 18, emphasizing a "Forces For Freedom" theme for Armed Forces Day throughout the Nation.

These will be part of the annual Armed Forces Day parade held by the community in honor of the U. S. military forces at

Redstone Arsenal and elsewhere. The parade will get underway at 9:30 a.m.

During the afternoon, an Open House will be held at Redstone Arsenal and also at the Navy Research Training Center near Big Spring Park.

Arsenal activities will mark the opening of the Army's new Missile Display Area, replacing the one destroyed in December by a tornado.

Army elements at Redstone will host the Open House which will feature a special display by the Missile and Munitions Center and School featuring Viet Cong weapons. It will also show a variety of weapons used in Vietnam by U. S. forces.

Following the Armed Forces Day opening, the Display Area will resume its public visiting hours which are from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday; 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday. The Area is closed on Mondays.

The Saturday morning parade will pass the reviewing stand located on the east side of the Courthouse square. Units will include the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Civil Defense, Flotilla 61 and the U. S. Coast Guard.

The parade will consist of 19 units representing the Army, (See PARADE on Page 3)

Small Business Celebrating Week Across The Nation

More than 5,000 small business firms listed to do business with the U. S. Army Missile Command will be among those throughout the nation to be honored during Small Business Week May 12-18.

During the past fiscal year, the Missile Command contracted for \$42.5 million worth of business with many of the 5,000 firms on its bidders list. It is the policy of the Command to place a fair portion of its total purchases and contracts with these companies.

The AMC Headquarters, Information Office, which is conducting the contest, points out that the motto should reflect the AMC team spirit in accomplishing AMC's many vital missions in support of the combat soldier.


In a letter to members of his Command, AMC Commanding General Frank S. Besson said:

"In the less than six years since it was created, the Army Materiel Command has established a record of which we may all be proud. Our accomplishments are directly attributable to the joint efforts of our military and civilian personnel, both the people who joined us from the old Technical Services and those who came aboard in later years.

"Despite our achievements to date, I believe we can do more to enhance our team spirit and individual identification with the over-all mission of AMC.

"We are pursuing many avenues to heighten this identification. One of the most important is a Command-wide contest to select an official motto for AMC. The motto will be incorporated in an official distinctive insignia (metal and enamel) which is being designed for AMC by the

Warm Weather Warning

All of us have plans for a summer vacation. And nine times out of 10 an automobile figures in these plans. For the majority, vacations will be remembered as pleasant ones. But for some, grief, pain and even death beckons.

Warmer weather, bright sun and dry roads all combine to make good drivers relax after the rigors of winter.



The tendency of the average driver is to think summer roads are safe. This is, of course, an inaccurate impression—an impression that often leads to trouble.

Many circumstances contribute to a single traffic accident, but improper driving is involved in nearly every accident.

The National Safety Council says speed too fast for road conditions is most often a factor in fatal accidents. In some accidents speed and failure to yield the right-of-way cause accidents as well as driver error and inattention to conditions.

These factors, along with drinking-and-driving, contribute to nearly three-fourths of all fatal accidents and to half of injury accidents, the Safety Council points out.

Statistics can be boring. But statistics don't lie. So this summer stay with the majority—the living and healthy ones who had a happy vacation—and a safe one—by using their heads for intelligent driving instead of a windshield ramrod.

Sergeant Unit Sets Firing

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M., May 7 — A Fort Sill Sergeant missile unit will begin movement to Oro Grande Range Camp, N.M., on Monday morning, May 27, to test the unit's proficiency with the system.

The 3rd Battalion, 38th Artillery will depart Ft. Sill with an

advance party on May 20 followed by the main body seven days later. They will travel to Oro Grande for bivouac and fire the missiles from a WSMR site to impact on the range.

"A" Battery, 3rd Battalion is scheduled to fire the missiles and Headquarters and "B" Batteries will provide logistical support.

Firing of the missiles will be monitored by White Sands Missile Range flight and ground safety and data gathering personnel.

Sergeant is project managed from the Army Missile Command by Lt. Col. A. G. Lange, Jr.

AUSA WINDS UP CAMPAIGN THIS WEEK

Arsenal members of the Tennessee Valley Chapter, Association of the U. S. Army, stood at 3,079 at the conclusion of the fourth week of a membership campaign scheduled to be concluded this week.

This total includes 642 new members and 694 renewals during the campaign. Reports received by Frank J. Buckley, Missile Command Executive Chairman for the campaign, last Friday revealed that 1,743 chapter members whose renewals are not due have been reported.

The chapter had approximately 3,100 members when the campaign was launched. A goal of 3,600 members was set. Reports from industrial and community campaign solicitors are not included in the Arsenal membership total.

Buckley said he felt there was still a great deal of work to be done by campaign workers during the final week.

He said: "The only MICOM organizational unit reporting 100% membership as of last Friday was the Land Combat Commodity Office.


"A great majority of our reporting units are showing under 50 percent membership in AUSA."

He said some of the major MICOM tallies were as follows:

Procurement and Production Directorate, 46 per cent; Research and Development Directorate 43 per cent; Supply and Maintenance Directorate, 24 per cent; Missile Intelligence Directorate, 13 per cent; and Directorate of Arsenal Support Operations, 12 per cent.



Army Institute of Heraldry. "The motto should represent a thoughtful expression of the people who comprise AMC," General Besson added.

There is no limit on the number of entries which may be submitted by eligible individuals in the motto contest. Each entry, however, should be submitted separately in accordance with the following prescribed format:

Motto entries should be no more than 24 spaces in length, counting spaces between words. Each entry should be submitted on two sheets of bond paper. One sheet should contain only the typed motto. The second sheet should include the motto and the name, position, title, organization and official address of the contestant. Judging will be from sheets having only the motto.

Entries will be submitted by individual contestants through the Information Office, Army Missile Command, no later than June 10, 1968.

In the event the winning motto shall have been received on the same date from more than one entrant, all such entrants will be invited to the Headquarters, AMC Sixth Anniversary celebration. All will receive certificates of appreciation, and \$500 is U. S. Savings Bonds will be divided equitably among all such entrants.





Engineers Receive Licenses

The Commanding Generals of both the U. S. Army Materiel Command and the U. S. Army Missile Command have urged Government engineers to register with

appropriate state licensing boards. General Frank S. Besson, Commanding General of the AMC, said: "Registration gives recognition to the U. S. Government engineer and adds prestige to him as an individual and to the agency he represents. It constitutes a certification of his qualifications to practice.

"A display of his license affords peer recognition among other professional engineers and graphically portrays the AMC engineer image that is so desirable in this era of specialization."

Major General Charles W. Eifler, Commanding General of the U. S. Army Missile Command has said that he fully endorses the position taken by General Besson.

"I am well aware that many Missile Command engineers have already obtained their professional registration. While exact figures are not available, Redstone Arsenal engineers, including those from MSFC, already constitute the largest block of registered Professional Engineers in Alabama," General Eifler added.





Experimental Class Holds Graduation 3 Weeks Early

An unusual academic experiment was culminated by the graduation of eight students from a class of 93 at the Army Missile and Munitions Center and School Friday.

The outgoing group included eight men from the Hawk Fire Control training who successfully responded to what the branch training supervisor, Capt. R. W. Eastman, termed "tailor-made training."

Based on their high scores on pre-enrollment aptitude tests, the eight were split from the incoming class over seven months ago and received their course material at an accelerated pace, resulting in completion three weeks ahead of the usual 33-week schedule.

It marked the first time such a procedure has been tried at MMCS, and Capt. Eastman expressed the hope it could open new channels in instruction programming. "I have nothing but praise for these students," he said. "They showed a high amount of interest, we often found them studying on their own, and there was a lot of esprit de corps."

The men involved in the experimental class were all PFC's assigned to the 8th Enlisted Training Company under Lt. W. M. Blackburn: James Billiams, John Efird, Paul Esser, Randall Siekman, George Stirek, William Wilcox, Stuart Willcox and Lawrence Wolz.

Hawk Missile Division is in the Air Defense Department at MMCS, and the Fire Control Branch offers electronics training to students who learn maintenance of the battery control central, simulator, and assault fire command console of the Hawk missile system.

The accelerated group maintained a scholastic average of 88.9, as compared to the normal average in



Military Community Receives Hospital Care

Over the past three decades, the image of hospitals and doctors has rapidly changed.


Since World War II, more and bigger hospitals have been built and more doctors have entered practice. These improvements in medical services, however, have been faced by problems of the population explosion and the increasing migratory habits of the American public.

With National Hospital Week at hand, perhaps it is appropriate to get an insight into the Army's medical services at Redstone Arsenal.

Contrary to practice in many civilian hospitals, the majority of Redstone patients are treated in out-patient clinics—a great improvement over the civilian hospital emergency rooms substituting for such clinics in many lo-

calities. Although it is difficult to put a monetary figure on the value of the out-patient clinic to the Army medical program, records indicate that more than 14,500 days of patient care were provided the past year at Redstone Army Hospital. Of this total, only 2300 patients received in-patient care, and these average a 7-day stay.

Volunteers play a major role in







medical care at the Arsenal's 56 bed hospital. More than 6,800 hours of labor are volunteered each year with an average of 57 individual volunteers working each month.

With 175 full time employees, including clinic personnel, the hospital is able to maintain an average of 1.5 full time or equiv-

alent personnel for each of its beds.

In addition to providing necessary medical services to active duty and retired military and their dependents, the Redstone Army Hospital also has an economic impact on the community. With a capital investment of more than \$1.5 million in equipment,

buildings and land, the facility has an annual payroll of \$1,250,000.

A major effort on the part of Army doctors is to practice preventive medicine, scheduling regular check-ups for active duty personnel as well as laboratory facilities for those Army civilian employees who take advantage of the annual check-up system.



Margie has lived in Huntsville all her life, and is a 1967 graduate of Huntsville High School where she took college preparatory and business courses.


A. C. Blumenschein, the AUSA coordinator for Margie's Branch, said she "signed up" as soon as he described the AUSA to her and told her of its goals.





fine relationship between the faculty and students" that has prevailed at MMCS.







ture is material and scientific. Western culture is mostly machinery."

Right now there are 17 Korean soldiers studying missile technology at MMCS. There have been Korean students in almost every course at the school.

Missile Command Spends \$21 Million

The Army Missile Command added approximately \$1.5 million to the economy of Alabama during the past month through orders and awards for goods and services. More than \$21 million was spent nationwide.

Huntsville merchants shared about \$800,000 worth of the total.

Another \$350,000 went to firms throughout the Southeast outside of Alabama.

As an example of small orders, one for \$5 covered the purchase of packages of steel wool soap pads. Awards of varying amounts went for laboratory and office supplies, food, clothing, building and road repairs, and library materials.

The Missile Command Procurement and Production Directorate executed the orders and awards.

Gen. Eifler Addresses Alabama Science Group

Top Army officials and the Alabama Academy of Science have asked industry support in promoting a program which encourages young people to seek careers in the scientific and engineering

fields. Maj Gen Charles W. Eifler, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command, told representatives from major industries throughout North Alabama that "the Army heartily endorses the program."

"Both you in industry and we at Redstone Arsenal have a need for scientists and engineers," Gen. Eifler said. "We can encourage more young people at the high school level to go into these fields by supporting the Junior Science and Humanities Program."

The General said the program "helps to foster a scientific environment for young people."

James J. Fagan, Scientific and Engineering Advisor of the Missile Command's Research and Development Directorate, accompanied the General.

Representing the Alabama Academy of Science at the luncheon were Dr. Ruric E. Wheeler, Academy President from Samford University, and Dr. W. B. DeVall, President-elect of the Academy from Auburn University.

Also present was Richard Cutler, National Director of the National Academy of Science program, from Duke University.

Nike Hercules Earmarks \$1.2 Million Overhaul

The Army Missile Command has awarded an additional \$1.2 million to Western Electric Company for continued overhaul of Nike-Hercules missile systems.

Work will be performed at the company's plant at Burlington, N. C.

Nike Hercules is the United States' primary high altitude air defense weapon. Now deployed around key areas in both the United States and overseas, Nike Hercules has proven successful in tests against high performance aircraft at a variety of altitudes and has successfully intercepted short range ballistic missiles.

The system is managed by the Missile Command under Col. M. W. Pettit, project manager.



Simplicity Is The Best Kind Of Invention

To many people, the word invention implies some complicated mechanical or electrical apparatus. But to Willie K. Patterson and Winfred E. Buffington, engineers in the Army Missile Command's Ground Support Equipment Laboratory, invention means simplicity. So they came up with what has to be one of the simplest inventions imaginable.

It is called a "shapable electrical terminal connector." This little device consists of a small loop of flexible wire fit into a metal cylinder 1/8" thick. When the cylinder is crimped onto a wire, the loop, which is easily shaped to fit virtually any type of terminal, is ready to make the connection. The shapable connectors are already in use in Vietnam, connecting firing devices for the XM-158 rocket launcher, which was developed at the GSE Laboratory of the Command's Research & Development Directorate. Troops find the shapable connector a big benefit when performing maintenance on the XM-158, since no special tools are needed.

"It's simple, cheap and does the job," says Patterson, a native of Callison, S. C. He received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Clemson College in 1951, after having served in the Navy during World War II. After college, he returned to the Navy as a civilian employee for a short time before coming to Redstone in 1954. Patterson is now Chief of the Electrical Design Branch of the Ground Support Equipment Laboratory.

Co-inventor for the shapable connector is Winfred Buffington. Now living in Guntersville, Ala., Buffington was born in Fairfax, Ga., and attended Berry College and Georgia Tech, where he received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering. He, too, served in the Navy, from 1946-1948. Shortly after college, he took a position with the Tennessee Valley Authority, and came to Redstone in 1958.

The pair has applied for a patent through the Army Missile Command Patent Center. Under this arrangement no royalties will be paid, since the device was developed in an Army laboratory.






David P. Yorks of Baytown, Pa., ammunition storage.


