Executive chairmen of major local Army elements for the cam-



### Survey Underway To Determine Wage Comparison

How do salaries paid to government wage board employees at Redstone Arsenal compare with those paid to their industrial counterparts?

That's what a combined Federal Wage Board Survey which started Tuesday is seeking to determine.

Purpose of the survey is to assure that salaries paid to Army and Marshall Space Flight Center employees are comparable to salaries paid similar employees by industries throughout the Tennessee Valley.

Some 2,000 wage board employees—about 1,300 employed by the Army and 700 by Marshall Space Flight Center—could be affected.

### Marvin Carroll Develops TOW Training Device

Marvin Carroll, an Army Missile Command engineer in the TOW Project Office, has developed a training device that enables gunners to gain firing experience with the Army's new tank killer at considerably less expense than before.

The device is a missile simulation round that duplicates the firing of a live TOW missile.

Carroll's round has been tested successfully on a Redstone Arsenal range by the Test and Reliability Evaluation Laboratory.

Using expended TOW missile containers, the 33-year-old native of Atlanta, Ga., has developed a round that creates a realistic firing environment but is simpler, safer and substantially less expensive than the simulation round now

being used with the TOW XM-70 training set.

Carroll's design is being adopted by the Department of Army.

Carroll is a graduate of Howard University in Washington with a degree in electrical engineering. He came to Redstone in 1963, starting in the Advanced Sensors Laboratory of the Missile Command's Research and Engineering Directorate.

For the past two and a half years, he has worked with the TOW Project Office.

TOW is being developed for the infantryman for use against armor or field fortifications. The weapon system is managed by the Missile Command, under Lt. Col. Robert W. Huntzinger, Project Manager.

## Gen. Underwood To Be Guest Speaker At AUSA Spring Meeting Here Tuesday

Advanced tickets are being sold this week for the spring meeting of the Tennessee Valley Chapter, Association of the U. S. Army, next Tuesday, April 22, beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Redstone Officers Open Mess.

The speaker will be Lt. Gen. George V. Underwood, Jr., Commanding General, U. S. Army Air Defense Command. His subject will be "The Unknown Army—Defender Against Bomber and Missile Attack."

The address is in connection with an official visit to Army elements at Redstone Arsenal and in Huntsville.

In his present assignment Gen. Underwood directs activities of the organization responsible for deployment of the Nike Hercules and Hawk air defense missile systems in the first 48 states. His command will be the user of the Safeguard Ballistic Missile Defense System.

Prior to his present assignment, the general served three years as Chief of Information for the Department of the Army, moved from there to command the 32d Army Air Defense Command in Europe—a 15,000 man force composed of all the U. S. Nike Hercules and Hawk units in Europe—and then became commanding general of the U. S. Army Air Defense Center, Fort Bliss, Texas, and the commandant of the U. S. Army Air Defense School.


The survey will not affect pay of Classification Act (GS) employees, since their pay rates are established by Congress.


The Service Club will sponsor a tour to the Holiday On Ice Show in Birmingham on Saturday, April 26.

## Decatur Company Receives Instrumentation Contract

The Bryson Construction Co., Inc., of Decatur has been awarded a \$337,639 contract by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers at Mobile for improving instrumentation at Redstone Arsenal Test Area No. 1, to update the data acquisition system.

The work, which is scheduled for completion in January 1970, includes construction of a concrete firing pad and 17 camera pads; instrumentation work to interconnect the new and existing camera pads to control panels and the timing system; resurfacing the access road to the camera pads; construction of a reinforced concrete tunnel, 218 feet long, for instru-

mentation cables, with an attached room at each end for data acquisition equipment; considerable electrical work; and related construction.

The Corps of Engineers sent advance notices soliciting bids to 1,244 contractors and material suppliers, furnished plans and specifications on request to 15 prime contractors and 32 subcontractors and material suppliers, and received 4 bids. This contract was set aside for award to a small business firm as a part of the Government's program to assure such firms a fair share of Federal business.

## Premium Rate Decreases For Under-40 Employees

A reduction in the life insurance premium rate for members under the age of 40 has been announced by the Redstone Benefit Association.

The Home Life Insurance Company, carrier of the group life insurance, indicated that the premium rate in each of three age groups would be reduced \$.80 per thousand dollars of coverage per year. There will be no change in the yearly premium for those members over 40 years of age.

A company spokesman said that over 3,000 Redstone civilians are now members of the group plan which has been offered to local personnel for the last six years. During that time claims totaling \$1,600,000 have either been paid or are laid aside due to the total disability of a member.

Home Life representatives will be located at various buildings with large concentrations of personnel during the next few days for the purpose of answering questions on the overall program and to provide assistance to those non-

members who may wish to take out the additional coverage.

They were in Buildings 4505 and 4488 yesterday for a two-hour period, 1 to 3 p.m., and will be in Buildings 5250 and 8027 during the same time frame today.

On Thursday the representatives will be located in the main lobby of Building 7101 and in the Library of Building 3222. On Friday they will spend the two-hour period in Building 5681 in addition to the Huntsville Industrial Center and the Safeguard System Command Building in Research Park.



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


