Calibration Technicians Learning New Standards

Yesterday marked the beginning of the first world-wide training conference on new equipment for calibration specialists. It is hosted by the Army Missile Command Metrology and Calibration Center.

The Missile and Munitions Center and School's Toftoy Hall classrooms are being used by the trainees and contractor representatives who instruct the technicians on

new calibration test standards, covering new equipment, some of it already in the field. This type of instruction has been conducted at contractor plants in the past.

In the class are representatives from the Far East, Europe, and seven Army depots in the United States, as well as members of the 95th Calibration Company stationed here and people in the local laboratories.

Coordinators at the U.S. Army Metrology and Calibration Center which is directed by Lt. Col. Dean J. McCarron, are Thomas Wolf and Larry Turnipseed. Bobby Little of the Engineering Division is coordinating with the contractor representatives and Kelly Corpening of the Field Operations Division is coordinating equipment. Wolf and Turnipseed are also members of the Field Operations Division.

In the past, after calibration technicians completed school at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., they received supplemental training at contractor plants where new equipment test standards were developed or by roving teams of specialists. The coordinators hope to show a cost savings by assembling representatives for a two-weeks course instead of sending a team of instructors to visit each site where instruction was needed, a matter of six months temporary duty average for a team to cover the worldwide needs.

PERSHING'S LAND ON WSMR TARGET

Two Pershing missiles, launched this morning from Black Mesa near Blanding, Utah, impacted right on target on White Sands Missile Range, N.M., completing the spring series of off-range firings.

Units of the 7th U.S. Army in Europe and the Federal Republic of Germany Air Force conducted the eight firings as annual service practice. The two-stage Pershing is operational in Europe with both U.S. and FRG forces.

This spring's firings from Black Mesa were the first from that area since the fall of 1967. The 400 mile range missile is also fired from Gilson Butte near Green River, Utah.

Pershing is the Army's most powerful land combat missile. The program is managed by the U.S. Army Missile Command under Col. Edwin A. Rudd, Project Manager.

MICOM WOMEN SEEK NEW AUSA MEMBERS

The 1969 membership campaign of the Tennessee Valley Chapter, Association of the U.S. Army, has been extended two weeks according to an announcement by William P. Burnett, second vice president of the chapter and campaign coordinator.

Spontaneous interest in the membership campaign on the part of women employees of the Missile Command and the opportunity this year to top all previous chapter memberships are the reasons for extending the campaign until June 1, he said.

Last week Missile Command women took matters in their own hands to increase their representation in the organization and set a dutch treat luncheon for Thursday, inviting all AUSA women members and prospective members in the Missile Command.

When it was obvious that requests for reservations would run beyond the 650 seating capacity of the Redstone Officers Open Mess, the luncheon was postponed one week until tomorrow and moved to the Redstone Non-commissioned officers Open Mess.

As of Monday 1,037 reservations

for the luncheon had been made and they were still coming in.

This unprecedented luncheon is being arranged by a voluntary committee of Missile Command women with Cleo Cason of the Research and Engineering Directorate chairman.

German Air Force To Buy Pershing 1-A Support Items

Pershing missile units of the Federal Republic of Germany Air Force will soon be getting a new look.

A \$17,737,000 contract was awarded Friday by the U.S. Army Missile Command to Martin Marietta Corp. for additional production of Pershing 1-A ground support equipment destined for West German troops. This contract is the first step toward conversion of the West German units to second generation Pershing support equipment.

Elements of the FRG Air Force are currently equipped with the original Pershing system. The P 1-

A ground support equipment features faster erecting launchers and solid state electronics. There is no change to the basic 35-foot inertial-guided missile.

Conversion of U.S. Army Pershing units to the new system is already under way. Col. Edwin A. Rudd is Pershing Project Manager for the Army Missile Command, Martin Marietta's Orlando (Fla.) Division is prime contractor.

Pershing is a 400 mile range two-stage surface-to-surface system which has been deployed in Europe since 1964. It is currently assigned a major role as a deterrent in support of NATO.

Safety Records Rocket Wrong Way

Army Missile Command safety records suffered a severe blow during the early days of May. March and April accomplishments raised high hopes that the Command would be able to mark a major improvement over the FY '68 record and possibly establish a new safety record. But within the first weeks of May, enough reports had been received to provide the worst 11 day period ever experienced by this Command. There were 11 reported accidents during these 11 days, resulting in one fatality, disabling injuries to four military, two Army civilian and two other personnel, three fires, damage to one aircraft and damage to one building.

Four of the eight injuries occurred during off-duty hours and off-the-job, while the death and one injury resulted from an airplane accident overseas.

Point is, accidents can happen at any time and at any place and to any one. When the Commanding General says that "it is imperative that there be no further accidents," he's not asking that you concentrate on safety just for the Command's sake; but for your own welfare.

Sam-D Motor Passes Test

Thiokol Chemical Corporation, Huntsville Division, has completed successful static tests of two full-scale SAM-D solid propellant rocket motors at the hot (130 degrees F.) and cold (-65 degrees F.) motor temperature requirements.

These tests demonstrate the ability of the rocket motor design to meet the requirements of the SAM-D missile under severe environmental conditions.

The SAM-D surface-to-air missile, driven by a single-stage solid-propellant propulsion system, travels at supersonic speeds carrying either nuclear or conventional warheads. It is controlled by a command and semi-active homing guidance system.

SAM-D, now under advanced development, is the Army's newest and most advanced surface-to-air missile system providing defense against high performance aircraft and short-range missiles.

Thiokol is under contract for the development of the propulsion system for the SAM-D missile being developed by the Martin Marietta Corporation, Orlando, Florida. Raytheon Company's Missile System Division, Bedford, Massachusetts, is the weapon system prime contractor under contract to the SAM-D Project Office of the U.S. Army Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama.



Four Receive Scholarships



MMCS Graduates Hear AMC Sergeant Major

Command Sergeant Major Raymond M. Garrity flew here from Washington, D. C., Friday for a "soldier to soldier talk" with graduates of the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

Uchitel tripled and Joe Rizo pitched 'A' past 'C', 9-3.





THIOKOL, ROHM AND HAAS TO PARTICIPATE IN PROPELLANT MEET

Four engineers and scientists from Rohm and Haas Company's Redstone Research Laboratories, Huntsville, Alabama, will participate in the Fourth Interchemical Rocket Propellant Group/American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Solid Propulsion Conference to be held in Chicago May 20 to 22.

Richard L. Matthews, an engineer in the Redstone Laboratories' Chemical Engineering Section, will present a paper entitled "NF Propellant Based on Ethyl Acrylate Polymer" which was co-authored at the laboratories by Stanley E. Anderson and David W. Booth. A graduate of Vanderbilt University, Matthews is a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers.

A presentation entitled "High Burning Rate Composite Propellants" will be given by James L. Chaille, head of Pilot Plant Operations in the Chemical Engineering Section of the laboratories. Other authors of this paper are Stanley E. Anderson, Lew R. Beason, and David W. Booth. Chaille attended Mercer University and graduated from Georgia Institute of Technology with a degree in chemical engineering. He holds two patents and has another application on file. He is a member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers.

Samuel F. Reed, Jr., a scientist in the Chemistry Section of the Redstone Laboratories, will present a paper on "New Polymers for High-Rate Propellants." Ronald L. Harville is co-author of that paper. Dr. Reed holds a B.S. and Ph.D. degrees in chemistry from the University of Louisville. He is the author of a number of technical papers and holds seven patents. Eight patent applications are pending.

Henry M. Shuey, director of technical liaison for the Redstone Laboratories, will serve as chairman of the conference session entitled "Propulsion Systems Status." Dr. Shuey is an Associate Fellow in the AIAA and served as past president of the Alabama Section. In 1964 he received the AIAA Research Award for individual research in the application of aluminum to the stabilization of solid propellant combustion. Dr. Shuey is also a member of the American Ordnance Association, serving as Chairman of the Propulsion Section of the Guided Missiles & Astronautics Division, and of the American Chemical Society. He received a B.S. degree from Centenary College in Shreveport, Louisiana, and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin. He has served as consultant on propulsion on a number of missile systems, including the Sprint, Spartan, Polaris, Poseidon, and Lance systems. He is co-inventor of cast double-base propellant.





MISSILE COMMAND NOMINEES—William Duncan and Dr. James Murfree are two of the four Missile Command nominees for 1969 Army Research and Engineering Achievement Awards. The two chemists were awarded MICOM Achievements Awards last week along with Dr. Richard Hartman and William Dobbins. Drs. Murfree and Duncan were nominated for the Army award in recognition of their research and development of an inexpensive and reliable liquid monopropellant gas generator.

Nominees In Scientific Achievement Announced

Two chemists, a physicist and an aerospace engineer have been nominated by the U.S. Army Missile Command for Army Scientific and Engineering Achievement awards in recognition of their significant contributions to the advancement of missile technology.

The four Research and Engineering Directorate scientists are Dr. James Murfree and William Duncan of the Propulsion Laboratory; Dr. Richard Hartman, a physicist in the Physical Sciences Laboratory; and Edward B. Dobbins of the Future Missile Systems Division.

Their nominations were announced by Maj. Gen. Charles W. Eifler, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command, at a ceremony during which he presented each with a special commendation plaque. Gen. Eifler said that the

nominations were made from an impressive list of recommendations.

The chemists, Dr. Murfree and Duncan, won their nomination for the key roles that they played in a research effort in the field of liquid monopropellant gas generators. Their work resulted in the development of an inexpensive and practical generator that meets the Army's environmental requirements for missiles.

Dr. Hartman was recognized for his advanced research in solid state physics including experimental and theoretical studies of electron spin-lattice interactions, making use of novel experimental techniques first introduced in the Physical Sciences Laboratory.

Dobbins was recommended for the award in recognition of his

conceptual studies incorporating innovations in technological planning that virtually insures the availability of future missile systems to meet Army requirements.

As Chief of his Division's Technology Planning Office, Dobbins successfully managed several programs for the Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Department of Defense, developed concepts for demonstrating an air-turbo rocket-boosted ballistic missile, and devised a program plan for frangible meteorological rockets.

The Missile Command nominations have gone to Army Materiel Command for preliminary review and acceptance. They then go to Department of the Army where final selection will be made and announced later this year.
