Safeguard Command Awards Contract For Support Services On Kwajalein

A contract to perform extensive logistics support services at the U. S. Army-operated Kwajalein Missile Range in the Marshall Islands was awarded May 21 by the U. S. Army Safeguard System Command.

The \$60,195,595.00, 3-year contract was awarded to Global Associates of Oakland, Calif., following competitive bidding among five major firms. The Safeguard Command is responsible for overall operation of the Pacific Ocean base, which supports Army, U. S. Air Force and U. S. Navy missile development and testing.

The award specifies that Global Associates provide logistical support for all structures, facilities and other matters that will contribute to the accomplishment of the mission of the Kwajalein Missile Range.

The contract was signed in the

offices of Brig. Gen. I. O. Drewry, Commanding General of the Safeguard Command. R. Stanley Morketter represented Global Associates.

W. O. Turney, Chief of the Safeguard Command Contracts Office, signed the contract for the Government.

Welfare Council Announces Civilian Recreation Plans

An ambitious year-around program with benefits for all Department of Army civilians in the Huntsville area has been inaugurated by the Civilian Welfare Fund Council.


The Council, meeting for the first time since the recent employee elections, adopted a \$17,700 budget for the fiscal year and earmarked well over half of the total amount for the purchase of additional facilities for the Tennessee River Recreation Area.

The program for the coming year was announced by Council Chairman, Leonard Twinem, following the meeting last Thursday.

"Our primary objective," Twinem said, "will be directed at developing our recreation area into the finest park of its kind in this part of the country. We intend to keep pressing forward, making improvements and adding new facilities according to the expressed desires of the people for

Gen. Gates Receives New Assignment In Washington

Brig. Gen. Mahlon E. Gates, the officer who organized and then was named to command the U.S. Army Safeguard Logistics Command, has been reassigned to the Headquarters of the U.S. Army Materiel Command in Washington, D.C.

Gen. Gates will report to AMC headquarters July 1.

Col. Cecil W. Hospelhorn, presently the deputy commander, will become the Commanding Officer upon Gen. Gates departure.

In speaking of his transfer, the General said, "I will always remember the personnel of this Command with respect and affection for their tremendous pioneering spirit and great abilities. I regret leaving Huntsville where we found such a friendly reception, and the Army community which has been so cooperative."

Gen. Gates headed the planning task force which in early 1968 developed and refined the Army concepts for logistic support of the then Sentinel system in Washington. In mid April, 1968, the Command was activated as the U.S. Army Sentinel Logistics Command, a major subordinate command of the Army Materiel Command.

It moved to Huntsville in August with headquarters in the Huntsville Industrial Center. Recently (See GEN. GATES on Page 2)

Besson Gets Honor Degree

Tuscaloosa, Ala. — Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., Chairman, Joint Logistics Review Board, Department of Defense, was one of three recipients of an honorary Doctor of Law degree Sunday at the University of Alabama.


Others receiving the award were Mervyn H. Sterne and Frank P. Samford, both from Birmingham and prominent in Alabama religious, civic and business activities.

Prior to his present assignment in February, Gen. Besson was Commanding General of the U.S. Army Materiel Command from its activation in 1962.

In making the award, the University praised General Besson for his leadership in organizing the Army Materiel Command and for his ability as a logistician in directing the materiel support of U.S. Troops in Vietnam.

Activities of the Army Materiel Command located in Alabama include the Army Aviation Test Board at Fort Rucker, the Anniston Army Depot, the Safeguard

Redstone Men Recall Invasion Of Normandy

It's been 25 years since allied troops went ashore on the fire-swept beaches of Normandy, but D-Day, June 6th, is a day of special memories for all those who participated and survived.

Leo H. Searcy walked one of those beaches that morning and today works in the Supply and Maintenance Directorate. He prefaces his recollections by saying: "I felt that God was with me every step of the way."

Searcy, Bob Finney of the Information Office, Joe Justin of the Protocol Office, James McCune of the S&M Directorate, Harold Peterson of Procurement and Production and C. F. Towery, of the Ground Support Equipment Laboratory share a common bond. All played a part in the historic events and there are undoubtedly others here at Redstone who share that bond.

Finney, then an Ensign aboard the LST 501 recalls the waiting.

"We were tired and edgy aboard the 501. Our ship with a normal complement of 120 officers and men, and loaded with between 600

and 700 assault troops had been under quarantine at anchor in Brighton Harbor, England, for two weeks. We had to load early because of limited loading facilities. The ship was under quarantine because the troops had already been issued invasion plans," he said.

"We were worried about the weather—if the weather was unfavorable we had to keep the troops on board the ship even longer. If we went ahead in the face of bad weather we had little chance for a successful landing."

"The channel crossing was a beautiful sight," Finney related, "Sea-going vessels in every direction as far as you could see. We could almost have conversation with our neighbors in the convoy because we were keeping such close station . . . I believe 500 yards was quite close for ships that size steaming at seven to eight knots."

"We discharged our troops into six smaller landing craft for their landing on Omaha Beach. We never found out what happened to the many friends we made during that

hectic two weeks.

"Our ship hit the beach that afternoon at high tide—we were to leave every drop of fresh water we could spare on the beach for the troops and take any wounded or prisoners back to England at the

next high tide."

"It's funny how little things stand out in your mind," Finney said, "My principal responsibility was to see that the stern anchor was dropped at the proper time, that it caught and kept the ship from turning sideways onto the beach. I remember looking over the stern and seeing a beautiful raspberry colored jellyfish just aft of the ship as we grounded on Omaha Beach."

Searcy was on Omaha Beach ahead of the main invasion forces.

As a combat engineer, Searcy was a demolition technician trained to handle mines, roadblocks, bridges and anything that had to be blown up or rebuilt. He found himself a member of one of the special combat teams picked to blow up obstacles that were expected to be encountered on the beach during the landing.

Early on D-Day Searcy's team went in to Omaha Beach and started attaching demolition charges to the barriers and barricades erected by the Germans to prevent the landing. Once this mission

had been accomplished his unit was to dig in on the beach and await the invasion troops.

"We were subjected to intense fire from 88's and heavy and light machine guns," Searcy said. "There was a particular pill box on the left that really gave us a fit."

"We had been told that once we attached our explosives and made the beach there would be plenty of bomb craters for us to get out of the heavy crossfire. Somebody was sure wrong there . . . we didn't find any bomb craters, but we dug in just the same and waited for the assault troops.

"That 20 to 30 minute wait was one of the longest periods of my life. Some of our demolition charges wiped out barriers, but some charges just didn't knock enough of them to clear a hole. I saw one landing craft explode from a direct hit, another hit the barricades and the skipper just backed up and rammed the craft right on through. He was lucky. He made it on in."

Searcy feels his team was lucky. They lost only two men out of 17 in (See MEN RECALL on Page 8)





AUSA Membership Drive Reaches 10-Year High

Final reports of Army organizations for the 1969 membership campaign of the Tennessee Valley Chapter, Association of the U. S. Army, show membership to be the highest on record in the 10 year history of the chapter.

Membership of the chapter is now 4,482.

"A great deal of the credit for the success of this unprecedented campaign goes to women employees of the Missile Command," William P. Burnett, campaign coordinator, said.

"The membership drive was running along about as usual for the past few years until the women decided they wanted to be more active in chapter activities.

"Then, the luncheon idea started and the next thing we knew they had a camp meeting going. The results gave the chapter more women members than it has ever had before, and we think the largest women membership of any chapter in the world.

"We actually do not know what the women membership of the chapter is," he continued, "because at the beginning of the campaign it was not planned to tabulate women members separately. Then the MICOM girls got interested and conducted their own head count. They are currently claiming in excess of 750 members."

Burnett said he thought the increased interest of the women would enliven chapter activities and give it recognition on a national level.

He explained that the total membership figure of 4482 was for military and Department of the Army civilian employees only, since an intensive membership campaign was not conducted in the Huntsville community nor among aerospace contractors.

"I am sure these two categories would raise chapter membership by two to three hundred," he said.

Burnett explained that chapter membership fluctuates throughout the year. "In this year's campaign

we tabulated new members, renewals and current valid members. Current valid members are those individuals whose membership is not expired at the time of the campaign. They are notified by AUSA National Headquarters when their membership expires and many of them renew directly to National," he said.

The current total chapter membership among local Army elements as tabulated in the campaign is as follows:

New members, 1508; renewals, 971; current valid members, 2003.

By organizations, the total breaks down like this:

MICOM, 3345; SAFCOM, 493; MMCS, 431; SAFLOG, 134; and Huntsville Division, Corps of Engineers, 87.

At the conclusion of last year's campaign, membership of the Tennessee Valley Chapter among local Army elements was approximately 3600.







Robert got the lead back with a homer in the fifth with a mate aboard and Arszman put CC ahead by three with another two-run shot in the sixth. DPO wasn't through







Yet another phase of D-Day was revealed by Justin.

He was a member of the Civil Affairs Division stationed in England on D-Day. He recalled that prior to the invasion they had been outside watching wave after wave of bombers sweeping overhead on their way to bomb the continent.

"Once the invasion started," Justin said, "I was sitting at a map plotting the towns that were liberated by allied troops where Civil Affairs teams were left to set up government and take care of administration and civic actions. These CA teams moved in with the combat troops and were left behind as the troops moved on into a different sector. It was our job to keep in radio contact with these teams and to help eliminate problems."

When the invasion was well underway Justin's unit moved to a new headquarters at Roquefort-en-Yvelines, France.

"It was such a huge operation that it staggered the imagination. The fact that so many things had to work successfully together to make the operation function smoothly was even more astounding to me," he said.

"I was proud to have been a part of the largest and most massive military operation ever conceived. Even now, 25 years later, the size


and complexity of it all still amazes me."

These are some of the experiences related by members of the Missile Command who were there on D-Day and "told it as it was."

Hopper's reason for being interested in the 13- to 16-year-old age group is very close to home. His

son Billy, now 15, was among those who was not selected for the school basketball team because he was considered too heavy for the game. Under Hopper's coaching, however, he was one of the two boys selected for the YMCA All-Star team.





The weapon system is in operation with Army and Marine Corps units in the United States and overseas.


Technical supervision of Hawk is from the Army Missile Command where Col. John G. Redmon is project manager.







Classes Call! Professionals Answer

People from the Army Missile Command who register for evening courses at local and nearby colleges and universities are likely to get a surprise the first time they go to class.

They may find that the occupant of their professor's chair is the man just down the hall from their own offices at Redstone!

There are around 20 well qualified Missile Command engineers, scientists, administrators, a psychologist and an attorney on the part-time faculty of Alabama A&M, the University of Alabama in Huntsville, Athens College, John C. Calhoun State Technical and Junior College and Oakwood College.

All of them do not teach every quarter or semester, but are retained on the part-time faculty list to be called when needed.

On their part it takes time, toil and the right temperament as well as interest and ability in teaching.

Some like Garth Churchill of the Chief Counsel's Office have had previous experience in college teaching and wanted to continue. Others like Kelly Grider from the Army Inertial Guidance and Control Laboratory and Center were approached and asked to join the faculty. Then there is still another, Miles Hardenburgh, Product Assurance and Test Management Office, who volunteered to teach a morning class in speech on his own time at A&M.

There is general agreement among all that having to lead a class regularly keeps them on their toes. "We must go into our subjects in depth, and keep current in our fields," is the way they express it.

For those who are teaching subjects directly related to their work at the Missile Command — and many of them are, naturally—they feel teaching prevents a tendency to get away from the basic details of a subject while working in the field.

The subjects taught by the Missile Command part-time professors cover such a wide variety as earth sciences, physics, math, business law, engineering statistics, electronics, general engineering, speech, political science, history, automatic control, industrial relations, psychology, and business administration.

The University of Alabama in Huntsville claims the greatest number of faculty from the Missile Command. Among those teaching there are Col. N. M. Bengtson, Churchill, Dr. Alfred Daniel, J. R. Duke, Fred S. Eiland, Dr. Oscar Essenwanger, Grider, Truman Howard, Dr. Seigfried H. Lehnigk, William Millen, James R. Miller, Nixon Powell, Dr. John Stettler and Dr. Arthur Werkheiser.

In addition to Hardenburgh, Dr. Charles M. Bowden teaches at A&M.

Over at Athens College, faculty members from the Missile Command are Robert J. Chynoweth, Dr. James Murfree and Dr. Thomas Roberts.

Then there's Robert C. Webb who teaches at both the University and at John C. Calhoun, and Dr. Bartley Bess who is on the part-time faculty at both the University and Oakwood.

For some the attraction is a liking for an academic environment, aside from the enjoyment—they feel it complements their work at the Missile Command.




