

### Gen. Donley Adds Star


WASHINGTON, D. C.—Edwin I. Donley, Commanding General of the Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, received his promotion to Major General Monday.

Lt. Gen. Henry A. Miley, Deputy Commanding General of the U. S. Army Materiel Command, and Mrs. Donley pinned on General Donley's new stars in a brief ceremony at AMC Headquarters.

General Donley took command of the Missile Command on November 17 after a tour in Germany as Commanding General of the U. S. Army Materiel Command, Europe.

A 1940 graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy, Donley was born in Buchanan, Michigan. The Donleys have three sons.

General Donley served previously at Redstone Arsenal from 1963 through 1966 and was promoted to Brigadier General in 1966.

### AMC CG Hosts Logistics Commanders' Conference

Gen. F. J. Chesarek, Commanding General of the Army Materiel Command, will host a meeting with his counterparts from the Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps here next week.

Also scheduled for Redstone and Huntsville the same week are a quarterly conference of all AMC commanders and a national cost reduction awards ceremony. The latter event will bring some 200 individuals here to participate in discussions during a two day program.

The Joint Logistics Commanders Conference is scheduled Tuesday morning at the Army Missile Command. Gen. Chesarek and the other principal conferees are scheduled to arrive at Redstone Airfield Monday evening.

Admiral I. J. Galantin, Chief of Naval Materiel; General Jack G. Merrell, Commander, Air Force Logistics Command; General James Ferguson, Commander, Air Force Systems Command; and Maj. Gen. Wallace H. Robinson, Jr., Quartermaster General of the Marine Corps, all plan to attend the conference.

Following a working session Tuesday morning, the group will visit the McMorrow Laboratories for a look at major missile weapons systems under Missile Command management and later go to the Marshall Space Flight Center to see the Orbital Workshop and Neutral Buoyancy Simulator

before departure.

Gen. Chesarek will remain at Redstone for other events during the week. Tuesday night he has scheduled an address to the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army in the Redstone Arsenal Officers Open Mess.

Also expected to be on hand at that event will be many of the 20 general officers, including the Commanding Generals of all AMC major commodity commands and 16 AMC installation commanders who will begin arriving here Tuesday afternoon for the AMC Commanders Conference.

The working sessions of that conference will also be held in Missile Command Headquarters Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday morning.

Many of the commanders are also scheduled to participate in events of the two day cost reduction conference which will be conducted at the Sheraton Inn on Wednesday and Thursday in conjunction with the Second Annual AMC National Cost Reduction Award Ceremonies.

Highlights of that event will include a banquet at the Sheraton Inn Wednesday night honoring contractor firms and personnel who made significant contributions to the AMC cost reduction program during FY69; a luncheon at the Carriage Inn Thursday honor-

## Stephen Johnston Presents Papers

## Army Food Researchers Develop Astronaut Meals

Nine new meat meal items for use of Apollo 11 and 12 astronauts were developed by Army Materiel Command's Natick Laboratories.

The meat meals were developed in two categories, evolved from principles used in developing combat rations for the Army.

Unlike the tube-encased food items provided for earlier space flights, all of the new items are designed to be eaten with a spoon.

The two categories are "thermostabilized wet" entrees and "freeze-dried dehydrated" entrees.

The "wet" entrees are turkey with gravy, beef with gravy, beef and potatoes, ham and potatoes, and frankfurters. The dehydrated entrees are chicken and rice, chicken stew, beef stew, and pork with scalloped potatoes.

The ready-to-eat "wet" meat items were heat-sterilized in laminated foil pouches and have a normal appearance, flavor, and texture. The dehydrated items are packed in a special package which permits rehydration through a valve, after which the food may be squeezed from the package and eaten in a normal manner with a spoon.

Millions of people who watched the Apollo 11 flight saw the crew demonstrating eating in a weightless environment by means of plastic tubes. Apollo 11 favorites were the frankfurter and compressed bacon squares.

Prototypes of foods recommended for use by the astronauts were developed at AMC's Natick Laboratories as far back as the early Mercury and Gemini flights.

Once the process is developed, actual manufacturing and packaging is contracted to commercial firms.

## Early Discharge Lessens School Entitlements

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Some servicemen who are discharged early may be losing part of their G. I. Bill education benefits, the Veterans Administration warns.

Servicemen who are separated after 17 months of service are entitled to only 25 months of educational assistance, the VA said, while those who are separated a month later are entitled to the full 36 months.

VA has asked each service to insure that a serviceman leaving active duty understands the 18-month qualification for full VA educational benefits.

Education assistance eligibility is spelled out in Subchapter II of Title 38, United States Code, Section 1661, which states:

"... each eligible veteran shall be entitled to educational assistance under this chapter for a period of one and one-half months (or the equivalent thereof in part-time educational assistance) for each month or fraction thereof of his service on active duty after Jan. 31, 1955. If an eligible veteran has served a period of 18 months or more on active duty after Jan. 31, 1955, and has been released from such service under conditions that would satisfy his active duty obligation, he shall be entitled to educational assistance under this chapter for a period of 36 months..."







# DOD Outlines Discharge, Christmas Leave Policies

WASHINGTON (ANF) — The Department of Defense (DOD) has established leave and early discharge policies for armed forces personnel for the Christmas season.

The early release program will permit early separation of those Army personnel whose normal release from active duty otherwise would occur between Dec. 20, 1969 and Jan. 4, 1970. Individual release dates will be timed to permit such personnel to be home for Christmas.

The holiday leave policies will be in effect for the same period indicated above. This extended period will insure that most servicemen have an opportunity for leave over one of the two holidays during the period.

Military commanders have been instructed, when possible, to schedule individual leaves so they coincide with non-peak travel periods on commercial transportation systems.
