Congressmen See TOW, Shillelagh Hit On Targets

Both TOW and Shillelagh were "... right on target."

That word comes from Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., where the two Army Missile Command weapon systems were fired last week in a command performance.

Among observers were Sen. Strom Thurmond, of the Senate Armed Services Committee, Army Secretary, Stanley R. Resor, and several members of the House Appropriations Committee.

What they saw was a Shillelagh missile, fired from an MBT-70 vehicle, strike a moving target traveling at more than 25 miles per hour and a TOW missile, fired from a ground emplacement, score a bullseye on a target moving at the same speed.

Both anti-tank missile systems hit targets more than a mile away.

To complete the demonstration, the MBT-70 vehicle was put through its paces showing mobility and stabilization.

Observers said both systems "performed flawlessly."

TOW and Shillelagh are managed by the Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, under Lt. Col. Robert W. Huntzinger, TOW Project Manager and Col. Robert J. Proudfoot, Shillelagh Project Manager.

Col. Samuel C. Skemp Is Lance Project Manager


An Alabamian who is a West Point graduate has been named Lance Project Manager at the Army Missile Command.

He is Col. Samuel C. Skemp, Jr., of Prattville, who is returning to Redstone Arsenal for the second time in his Army career. Col. Skemp was assigned here in 1956 in the Development Operations Division of what was then the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Now as boss of the Army's newest battlefield missile system, Lance, he succeeds Col. A. F. Pottle, Jr., who is leaving for a new assignment in Germany.

Col. Skemp came to Redstone from Vietnam where he was Commanding Officer of the Army Depot at Cam Ranh Bay.

The colonel, who noted that "... there have been a few changes since I was here before—", assumed his new duties last week. As Lance Project Manager, he directs a highly mobile weapon system that is being developed to replace Honest John, Little John and Sergeant.

Milner Sounds 'Keynote' For 1970 CFC Campaign

Calling for a "straight forward drive that will do the most good for the most people," Ruth Milner sounded the keynote for the 1971 Combined Federal Campaign in the Huntsville Area here Monday.

The Deputy CFC Chairman for the Missile Command was speaking to a gathering of agency heads who met at the Arsenal to finalize plans for the annual fund raising effort.

The 22 agency representatives heard Maj. Gen. Edwin I. Donley outline the program and announce the schedule for the drive that will be conducted over a five-week

period starting with the traditional kickoff on Sept. 28.

The Commanding General of the Missile Command reported that the ground work for the appeal in support of local, national and international social service causes, had been completed and that the campaign materials are being printed.

He said that the campaign expenses were being reduced to the very minimum with the elimination of contributor pins, which annually constitutes the largest single expense.

Pershing Practice Firings A Success

Two Army Pershing missiles streaked nearly 400 miles in a successful finale as the Army concluded its spring and summer firing scheduled recently at Black Mesa, near Blanding, Utah.

Both missiles, only minutes apart, landed on target at White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

Shooting final rounds were soldiers from the 7th U. S. Army stationed in Europe. Twelve missiles were fired since the firing series (See PERSHING on Page 3)

Land Combat Support Has In-Process Review Here

A successful In-Process Review on the Land Combat Support System (LCSS) was held recently at the Army Missile Command to give representatives from Army agencies a close look at the system as a basis for standardization of the system by the Army.

A survey was made, during the review, of the requirements, demonstrated performance and status of the LCSS program, and a look was taken at the LCSS development plan and several proposed changes to the basic requirement document.

LCSS, developed under direction of the Missile Command was primarily designed to provide automatic test, measurement and diagnostic maintenance support for major assemblies and subassemblies

of the Shillelagh, Lance, Dragon and TOW missile systems.

Although its primary purpose is for support missions in the field, LCSS is suitable for use at depots in conjunction with acceptance and inspection equipment. The feasibility of using LCSS to support other major end items and repair parts of new weapons systems is also under investigation.

LTC Frank A. Matthews, the Missile Command Product Manager for LCSS, was chairman for the In-Process Review.

Representatives came from agencies throughout the Department of the Army, the Combat Developments Command, the Army Logistical Doctrine Systems and Readiness Agency, and using units from the U.S. and overseas.

LCSS is an outgrowth of a long-term development effort by the Army on automatic test equipment. The concept of utilizing equipment for testing, troubleshooting, and repairing missile systems is being fundamentally revised

In the past, special test equipment used in direct support and general support units was designed specifically to support one weapon system. Equipment was designed and arranged around the physical and technical parameters of a particular weapon system.

That approach, however, resulted in undesirable duplication of equipment with common test capabilities, lack of standardization, and increased burdens on the military logistical system. Studies revealed that, although the configurations and specific test methods were different, approximately 85 percent of the basic functions of each peculiar missile system test equipment were common to all systems.

Future concepts prescribe a basic set of multipurpose test equipment (See IN PROCESS on Page 3)


Huntsville Firms Net \$2.8 Million

Annual rental and maintenance for business machines ran the total of Army Missile Command awards to Huntsville firms to more than \$2.8 million last month. Nationwide, the command placed some \$12.7 million in orders for supplies that support missile programs, and for material and services for maintenance of grounds and buildings.

Included were purchases of grass seed, building repairs, office and laboratory equipment, food products and missile repair parts. These orders do not cover the contracts for a million dollars or more issued in procuring missile systems and related equipment.

The value of the individual orders runs from a few dollars to several hundred thousand.

The Missile Command Procurement and Production Directorate executes the orders and awards.

Getting Involved



Easier Way Is Also Most Efficient Supply System

An easier way of doing arithmetic at Redstone Arsenal is saving valuable hours for more intensive management of the supply system for Army missile repair parts going to worldwide locations.

By using computer techniques to assist in preparing supply control studies, the National Inventory Control Point of the Army Missile Command's Supply and Maintenance Directorate has cut the time required in preparation from 40 hours, when done manually, to 22.76 hours when the machine does the repetitive mathematics. Also, the machine is consistently accurate and eliminates the possibility of mathematical errors.

According to Billie N. Tippins of the S&M Directorate, "Supply control studies are simply a means of measuring requirements for repair parts against those on hand to determine what is needed to support Army missiles.

"Information fed into the study automatically says what stock these places have, what replacements they will need, how many items they expect to have returned for repairs, what the demands have been, and also, why the parts are needed."

This new program which has been automated to prepare supply control studies is known as SIMS, Secondary Item Management System. It is an Army-wide program which was put into operation at the Missile Command just last month, and its purpose is to give ready visibility to what is in stock and what is needed worldwide.

With this clear picture of worldwide inventory and requirements, this process is expected to extend savings to the expenditure of funds at the National Inventory Control Point.

"We can see we needn't order parts when we know through SIMS that they are available from another installation," Tippins said.

"The Missile Command has put 1256 items into the SIMS program, items selected on the basis of high unit cost, high usage and criticality.

"By using computers—the Missile Command is the only command to automate the program—we estimate that \$646,110 worth of time

is saved that can be spent by item managers for thorough review of their supply control studies.

"Had we not mechanized SIMS we would have had to spend 66 percent of the item managers' time preparing SIMS studies.



We've cut that to 38 percent with computers to do the dirty work.

"Reports under SIMS will come from depot level as well as Direct and General Support Units, and posts, camps and stations that have the automated equipment to do the reporting.

"Today we're getting reports from Alaska, Panama, Okinawa, Korea, Vietnam and Hawaii plus the Sixth Army area in the U.S. By the first of November we expect to come off of the computer with almost completely mechanized supply control studies for all of the high dollar value items.

"Right now with 1033 calculations on a study, the computer is doing 997 of them leaving only 36 for the item managers. The 36 are portions that require personal attention and can't be left to the machine.

"SIMS will automatically utilize reports from users as well as data processing programs established here such as—when new procurements is due in, when items are to be returned for repair, assets on hand, requirements on back orders, and substitute items.

"The item manager has very little manual input prior to obtaining this comprehensive mechanized study. Then too, auxiliary programs that are available because we have the mechanized program are most important. For instance, after we get the mechanized study we can automatically provide locally designed work sheets to each of the commands and sub-commands reflecting requisitioning ob-

jectives. "We will be trying to support the same thing they're trying to order."

SIMS is not the Missile Command's first effort to automate supply control studies. Studies for low dollar value items have been mechanized for years.

The Missile Command also participated in another automated program called OASIS, Overseas Accountability Secondary Item Supply, starting in late 1967 and continuing until the end of June this year. OASIS was a test program for the entire Army. Under it, the Missile Command owned the stocks and pushed requisitions.

The program came off the computer with a depot distribution plan that actually showed who was in the most need of assets, put the Missile Command in a position to supply everyone and reduced the zero balances—the places where they were entirely out of some repair parts.

With 15 percent of the Missile Command managed items accounting for 85 percent of the dollar value, refinement of supply management will continue to be the goal.

agency heads to start their planning early and he volunteered Missile Command personnel for any assistance they may desire.




Royal Netherlands Army Representatives Visit



MMCS began training on the TOW system last week. Twelve students reported for training in the common block subjects that includes basic electronics and other theories of electricity.

The TOW, a Tube launched, Optical tracked, Wire command linked guided missile, is a new anti-tank missile designed to kill heavy armor and can be easily transported by troops in the field. Already in production, the weapon combines a lethal warhead with high accuracy at both close and long range against stationary and moving targets.

The RNL tour is just one of many NATO countries who visit MICOM and MMCS on missile research and training.



Civil Service Proposes Salary Adjustment System

The Civil Service Commission has submitted to Congress an Administration proposal for an improved, permanent system for adjusting the salaries of Federal white-collar employees.

The proposal vests in the President the responsibility for making annual adjustments in pay in conformity with policies approved by Congress and based on surveys conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).

The proposal places upon the President's agent the responsibility to consult with employee organizations on specific matters relating to salary adjustments. Further, it provides for review of these actions by an impartial body which will resolve any remaining issues or which will recommend to the President the means for resolving such issues.

As submitted to Congress the proposal would:

1. Afford an appropriate role to the President, the Congress, and Federal employee organizations in the setting of pay.

2. Extend the comparability concept embodied in the 1962 and 1967 pay laws and thereby keep Federal workers' pay comparable with salaries paid by employers outside of Government.

3. Reduce to a maximum of 6 months the time lag between a pay survey and the effective date of a Federal salary adjustment.

4. Create an Advisory Committee on Federal Salaries, an impartial body of three non-government members appointed by the President to serve 6 year terms.

Responsibilities

The Office of Management and Budget and the Civil Service Commission would continue to serve jointly as the President's agent. They would consult fully with

employee organizations on BLS salary survey coverage, comparability methods, and results, and would recommend salary adjustments to the President.

The Advisory Committee would review annual recommendations of the Civil Service Commission and the Office of Management and Budget, consider the views of employee organizations, Federal officials, and other experts on the analysis and pay proposals in the CSC/OMB report, and recommend to the President the action he should take on the schedules recommended.

The President would adjust schedules and report his action to the Congress before October 1 each year. He would furnish to Congress reports and recommendations of CSC/OMB and the Advisory Committee.

Congress would monitor the policies and practices embodied in the proposed law, and would enact changes in the law as members deem necessary. If in any year the President determines that the adjustment required by the law is not appropriate because of a national emergency or economic conditions affecting the general welfare, he must notify Congress of the alternative action he proposes to take. Congress would then have the opportunity to approve or disapprove his proposed action. Should the Congress disapprove, the President would have to make the adjustment called for under the permanent law.

Federal employee organizations would be consulted fully on survey coverage, the salary compari-

son process, and the adjustments required to achieve comparability with private enterprise salaries.

Time Frame and Effective Dates

At present, surveys of salaries in the private sector are conducted by BLS as of the end of June each year. Following this time frame for the present the proposal provides that Federal salary adjustments would be made in January of 1971 and 1972.

Beginning in 1972, the BLS survey would be moved up to the Spring, and adjustments would be made in October, six months after the survey.

Federal salary rates derived under the proposal would apply to all categories of Federal employees paid at statutory rates except postal workers.



Logistics Group Simplifies Training Supply Support

Since its inception in January 1969 the Missile and Munitions Center Team has made many outstanding contributions to the logistical support and training of missile and ammunition unit in the field.

The Team consists of representatives from each of the primary missile and munitions agencies at Redstone plus one activity from Ft. Lee, Va., and one from Joliet, Ill.

From Redstone, the agencies are the Missile and Munitions Center and School, Army Missile Command, Safeguard Logistics Command and the Missile and Munitions Division of Combat Development Command's Maintenance Agency. From Ft. Lee, the Supply Agency of Combat Development Command and from Joliet, Ill., the Army Munitions Command also make up the Team membership.

Meeting once quarterly, the Team also extends invitations to nonmember organizations in the field of missiles and munitions service support, such as the Army Air Defense School at Ft. Bliss, Tex., and the Army Maintenance Board at Ft. Knox, Ky. At the last meeting of the Team, two representatives from the Department of the Army Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics was on hand to give a briefing on Department of the Army Logistics Program (DALOP).


According to the Team agreement, agenda items are selected on the basis of their significance,

widespread application and urgency. Topics could deal with doctrine (CDC), materiel (AMC) or training (CONARC). One of the agenda items at a recent conference was Project MAME-71 which has become a reality.

MAME-71, an acronym for Missile and Munitions Evaluation, was organized to conduct field evaluations of missile and munitions units throughout the world. Prior to MAME-71, each command independently conducted field evaluations at different times of the year. Under the Center Team concept, each agency pools its resources to form one united team to conduct the evaluations at one time.

The Missile and Munitions Center Team is one of approximately 20 such teams in operation throughout the Army. The Center Team concept was fostered by the former Army Chief of Staff, General Harold K. Johnson. He recognized the merit of taking maximum advantage of talent concentrated at installations with co-located CONARC service schools and CDC and AMC activities.

All echelons of command have expressed "high praise" for the work of the Center Team. When Lt. Gen. Charles Eifler commanded MICOM, he referred to the Arsenal Center Team "as an appropriate forum for discussion of key issues."

Six German Missilemen Attain 98 Grade Average

Missile and munitions technicians were told Friday that there were six lamps of education that "should shed their light into men's minds and throw it far out over the world."

ceremonies stated that the six lamps were truth, memory, sacrifice, obedience, beauty and life.

Earlier in the week 19 officers were graduated from the ammunition officer course at Toftoy Hall auditorium.

Friday's graduation had six German students who completed the air defense missile maintenance technician (Nike) course and compiled what would be an academic record at the \$100 million global training center.

The students, all noncommissioned officers, had a class average of 98. The honor graduate of the course, and of the entire class, was Sgt. Maj. Karl Gutsmedl of Delmenhorst, Germany, who compiled the near perfect average of 99.

He and Staff Sgt. Miyoshi Sato of Japan received the Association of the United States Army (AUSA) plaque, which is awarded only to those students who achieve an average of 96 or higher. Sato had a 97.1 average in the HAWK continuous wave radar repair course.

Certificates of recognition were presented to outstanding students in their respective courses. Those receiving the certificates were SFC Bobby R. Thomas of Springtown, Tex., a 92 in the Pershing guidance and control repair course; Spec. 5 Michael C. Buffalo, Lodi, N. J., with a 94.1 in the Pershing digital equipment repairman course, and Pfc Larry J. Cavanaugh of Bartlett, Tex., having an 86.4 in the Nike test equipment test repair course.

Leading the Tuesday graduation was Capt. James R. Thompson Jr. of Winston-Salem, N. C., who compiled a 94.3.

Capt. Everett continued his remarks on the lamps of education by saying that "each is a facet of education, an end product that sheds a special light." In explaining each lamp, Everett said that

"truth leads the student to the right path; memory casts upon present knowledge the light of the past; and obedience provides order and instills in the student a feeling of discipline."

He went on to say that a sense of beauty shapes the mind and personality into symmetry and proportion, and the awareness of sacrifice creates a sensitivity to the importance of things. The final lamp, Everett concluded, is life — education's gift to the community. "The educated mind falls as a seed into the community and springs up in other minds made better by its presence."

Out of 153 missiles tested, thus far, under "fly before buy," four have failed to hit the target.

By accepting missiles only after the contractor has demonstrated they work, the Shillelagh Project Office at the Army Missile Command is seeking the best possible product at the lowest possible cost.

It began nearly two years ago when the Shillelagh Project Office told the contractor: "Prove to us the missile works before we buy it. If missiles don't meet requirements, the Army is not obligated to buy."

So Aeronutronic Division of Philco Ford Corporation began furnishing missiles coming off its production line for testing. Those missiles were exposed to shock and vibration tests, low and high temperature extremes, altitude and humidity storage. Those torture tests were conducted to simulate

conditions that Shillelagh missiles might encounter in a tactical environment.

As final proof, missiles were fired by government personnel at White Sands Missile Range, N.M., and only missiles hitting targets were declared successful. (All missiles are selected by the government, environmentally tested under government supervision and fired by government personnel).


Performance tests show that Shillelagh missiles being delivered to the Army are meeting all quality requirements.

Shillelagh is a gun-launched guided missile system for Army combat vehicles which is effective against moving or stationary targets.

The program is managed by the Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., under Col. Robert J. Proudfoot, Project Manager.




