Our TOW Missile Goes To U.S. Troops

TOW is in the hands of U.S. soldiers.

The Army's newest tank killer, which can fire a missile more than a mile to destroy any known enemy armor, has gone to infantry units at Fort Benning, Ga., and Fort Knox, Ky.

In announcing first deployment of TOW equipment, Army Missile Command officials at Redstone Arsenal, said training on the new weapon system is already in progress at both Army in-

stallations.

Key instructors have already been trained at the U.S. Army Infantry School at Fort Benning and have returned to their respective Army units to train other gunners and crews.

Other TOW training, meanwhile, has been underway since early September at the Army Training Center at Fort Jackson, South Carolina. Gunners are being trained there for eventual (See TOW on Page 3)

Pershings Land On Target

Four Army Pershing missiles fired from Black Mesa, near Blanding, Utah, landed on White Sands Missile Range, N.M., last week although one round was destroyed in flight.

One missile flight was terminated prematurely, the Army said, when a malfunction occurred after launch.

Fired by Seventh U.S. Army troops, missiles were operational test rounds which are designed to evaluate unit proficiency and reaction time under simulated combat conditions.

Pershing is the Army's most powerful land combat missile. The program is managed by the Army Missile Command under Col. R.P. Hazzard, Project Manager.

A New Holiday And More Long Weekends In 1971

Beginning in Calendar Year '71, Civil Service employees of the Federal Government will have an additional Holiday, bringing the yearly total to nine.

And as a bonus, three holidays already being observed have been legislated to fall on Mondays assuring at least four long weekends regardless of the calendar.

These changes came about because of Federal Legislation enacted by the Congress and approved by The President last year.

The new holiday is Columbus Day, October 14, but designated as a holiday for the second Monday in October. Other holidays redesignated for Mondays are George Washington's Birthday (February 22), Memorial Day (May 30) and Veterans Day (November 11).

Thus, beginning with 1971, the following will be observed as legal public holidays:

- New Year's Day, January 1;
- Washington's Birthday, third Monday in February;
- Memorial Day, last Monday in May;
- Independence Day, July 4;
- Labor Day, first Monday in September;
- Columbus Day, second Monday in October;
- Veterans Day, fourth Monday in October;
- Thanksgiving Day, fourth Thursday in November;
- Christmas Day, December 25.

LCSS Uses Data Retrieval Bank

Missile information which becomes available in seconds rather than hours or even days after the need arises is saving money and effort for decision-makers in the Army Missile Command's Land Combat Support Systems (LCSS) Product Office.

A recently initiated program called the Product Assurance Information System gives missilemen almost instant information on all operational phases of LCSS, the multi-purpose system which provides automatic test and fault isolation in electronic components of the Shillelagh, TOW, Dragon and Lance missile systems.

This is the way it works. Missile data collected at LCSS sites includes statistics on every test function, time consumed, failures recorded and maintenance required. The collected data is analyzed and put on magnetic tape, then sent to the Missile Command for inclusion in a data bank.

When the LCSS Product Manager and his staff have questions about logistic support, system reliability, time expended, or personnel at the sites, the already-assembled facts are quickly available. If the answers aren't in the data bank, that is



indicated also.

This is a substantial time savings over the hours of effort it once took to develop the necessary information by manual research and tabulation.

With such facts in hand, decisions can be made quickly, such as how many repair parts are needed, where they should be stored, which route should be taken for increased reliability, what causes failures, where soldiers should be deployed, what changes should be made and how much they would cost.

Data is reported on a monthly basis with a three month average also available.

"It's the best system we've had for controlling reliability and maintainability, and for use in making qualified management decision," Freeman Lee, chief of the LCSS Reliability and Test Division, said.

RCA furnishes personnel for

data collection, and the competence for reducing, correlating, analyzing and summarizing the information, then putting it on tape at their Burlington, Mass. plant.



Shillelagh Teams With M60 Tanks Compatibility Tests Held

Shillelagh and the M60 tank make a good pair.

That was demonstrated at Fort Knox, Ky., recently where the Army's guided missile system and the tank were put through their paces in compatibility tests.

To evaluate the "marriage," three vehicles and 23 missiles were used in a firing test program which included shooting at both moving and stationary targets.

Army observers said test results demonstrated exceptional accuracy and reliability.

On hand for the test program were representatives from the Shillelagh Project Manager's

Office, the U.S. Army Command Engineer Board, White Sands Missile Range, M-60 Project Manager's office and the Chrysler Corporation.

Shillelagh is the Army's gun-launched guided missile system which can fire either missiles or conventional ammunition from the same tube.

The Shillelagh program is managed by the Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Ala., under Col. Robert J. Proudfoot, Project Manager. Aeronutronic Division of Philco-Ford Corporation is prime contractor.

Chrysler Corporation is prime contractor for the M60 vehicle.

California Firm Gets TOW Contract

A \$4 million Army Missile Command contract has been awarded to Hughes Aircraft Company for fy 71 procurement of TOW ground support equipment.

TOW is the Army's newest tank killer that can destroy any known enemy armor and knock out field fortifications.

Most of the work under the contract will be performed at

Hughes facilities at El Segundo, and Culver City, Calif.

TOW just recently was deployed for the first time with infantry units at Fort Benning, Ga., and Fort Knox, Ky.

The TOW program is managed by the Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Ala., under Lt. Col. Robert W. Huntzinger, Project Manager. Hughes Aircraft is prime contractor.

Capable of being fired from a ground emplacement or mounted on helicopters and a variety of vehicles, TOW is replacing the 106 mm recoilless rifle as well as Entac and SS-11 missiles.





School Athletes Score Unit Level Sweep

Student Officers Make Winner's Circle Again

The Missile and Munitions Center and School made it three in a row Friday night when the combined team of Headquarters Company, School Brigade and Student Officer Company (HHC/SOC) defeated another MMCS entry, Company B 26-6 for the Arsenal Flag football championship.

MMCS teams also won the basketball and softball championships earlier this year when the SOC team pulverized 291st MP Co. in basketball while the 6th ETC whipped Army Missile Command for the softball crown.

The finalists in the football tournament had the distinction of being the only teams in the 1970 football campaign to defeat the 291st MP Co., the American League champions. The policemen ended the season with a perfect 8-0 slate. HHC/SOC won the National League crown with a 7-1 record while Co. B was the NFL runner up with a 6-2 showing.

SOC upset the policemen 19-18 in the third round of the tournament while Co. B, after being beaten in opening round play, dumped the 191st MP Co. in the semifinal round.

SPEED vs. HEFT

The championship game pitted the speed of HHC/SOC against the big bruisers from Co. B with

the speed gaining the edge.

Fleet-footed John Norris and Ray Dorsey each scored touchdowns on extended runs. Norris scampered 52 yards early in the second quarter that gave SOC a 14-0 bulge at half-time. Dorsey added two other TDs early in the third quarter. His first came midway the period when he took a Co. B punt on his own 15 yard line and did not stop until he had crossed the goal line.

HALF THE FIELD

Later in the same period Dorsey took a pitch out from SOC field general Don Hostettler and weaved his way 50 yards through would be flag snatchers for another score.

Prior to that SOC quickly lit the score board in the first quarter when Hostettler hit Joe Patterson on the receiving end of a 10-yard scoring pass play.

The defensive unit of HHC/SOC played just as superbly. Led by Hezekiah Richardson the de-

fense kept Co. B deep in their own territory most of the night. Before pushing across a lone TD late in the fourth period, the farthest penetration the runners-up were able to muster was with 1:30 left in the first half when Co. B drove to the SOC four yard line.

SOC ended the 1970 campaign with an overall record of 11-1. The team was undefeated in the tournament registering wins over the Medics, MICOM and the 291st MP Co. prior to the championship game.

Co. B ended the season with a 12-4 record and came through the championships in the losers bracket. The team registered wins over Co. D, 249th Ord Det., Medics, and 291st MP Co. while losing only to MICOM prior to being defeated in the championship game.

those 276 pins too to get the Bandits a 3-1 win over the Rejectors who went down fighting with a 1063 to 1035 loss.






What can you say when someone tells you that they are going to accomplish an athletic feat and a few hours later "does his thing?"



regulation time.

Roster Lists AMC Cost Experts

A list of 350 names of people who are skilled in cost estimating techniques is available at the Army Missile Command as a source of talent to perform studies and reviews on buying Army hardware.

Reading like a "Who's Who in financial expertise," the roster was established by reviewing

Missile Command's Procurement and Production Directorate, and is the task director.

"It's a part of the Army's effort to improve the weapon system acquisition process. It provides people Army Materiel Command-

wide who have the expertise to conduct these studies.

"If a command has cause to do a study, the roster should be considered as the source for the study group under AMC regulation 715-90, "Roster of Cost Estimators."

"In the past when we had to assemble a study group, we had to shop around among various elements of the Missile Command to find people who could serve. Now we have this established list that makes team selection much simpler."

One example of such a group was the team which earlier this year performed an in-depth study and analysis of what it should cost one Missile Command contractor to

produce missile hardware.

"We consider the roster an excellent management tool which enhances AMC's ability in the weapons system acquisition process," Holden said.

The list, known formally as the Source Selection Cost Estimating Roster, is on file at the Missile Command Procurement and Production Directorate, complete with the qualification record on each person named.

PROMAP 70

qualifications of cost estimators, cost and price analysts and industrial engineers nominated from subcommands throughout the Army Materiel Command.

To be nominated, persons must be GS-11's or above, have college degrees with a major in the field related to their assignment (a price analyst with a major in accounting, for example) and three years of experience.

Criteria for selection, however, is flexible enough to include cases where a person is highly qualified through experience regardless of whether or not he holds a degree.

Those who appear on the roster are available for assignment to cost study teams at their home bases or other Army Materiel Command agencies as needed. There are 50 people from the Army Missile Command on the list.

"This is a new concept which was implemented under PROMAP-70 as one of the specific assigned tasks," Gene Holden said. Holden is on the staff of the Policy and Management Office in the


