



## Army Reveals Chaparral Deployment In Korea

The U.S. Army has announced that a Chaparral-Vulcan system has been deployed to Korea in support of the 2nd Infantry Division. The first overseas deployment of a tactical Chaparral-Vulcan system was to Europe in 1969.

The Chaparral-Vulcan Project Office is at the Army Materiel Command, Washington, D.C. The Army Missile Command's Chaparral Special Items Management Office directs the Chaparral program.

Chaparral-Vulcan battalions are activated and trained at Ft. Bliss,

Korean conflict, he served in those theaters as a logistics officer.

After a series of peacetime assignments in the United States and Europe, LTG Heiser was assigned as Commanding General, 1st Logistical Command, in Vietnam in August 1968.

Texas. Their Direct Support Units, which provide supply and special maintenance support, are trained at the U.S. Army Missile and Munitions Center and School and deployed by the Unit Training Command located there.

The Chaparral M48 guided missile system is a self-propelled weapon which can be operated independently when dismounted from its M730 tracked vehicle, and the Vulcan is a 20mm rapid firing gun. ## Armed Forces Observance Planned Friday

Armed Forces Day will be observed at Redstone Arsenal Friday as leaders from surrounding communities attend a special program.

MG Edwin I. Donley, Commanding General of the Missile Command, and COL Gilbert P. Levy, Commandant of the Missile and Munitions Center and School, will welcome the group in the Bldg. 5250 auditorium.

The community leaders will hear about the Arsenal's Modern Volunteer Army Program carried out by MICOM and MMCS. LTC Robert G. Hill and LTC Frederick C. Kleis will narrate the MVA portion of the program.

With a briefing entitled "This is Redstone" COL John R. Prince, Jr., MICOM Director of Plans and Analysis, will present an overview of the Arsenal, to include a status of funding and manpower.

To see hardware in action, the group will view TOW the missile fired at Test Area No. 1. Presentations and range activities will be by LTC Robert W. Hunzinger, TOW Project Officer, and W.P. Lloyd, Test and Evaluation Director.

During the four hour program beginning at 10:00 a.m., the visitors will have lunch at a Troop Mess. Immediately following lunch they will visit a refurbished day room in one of the barracks.

## JUMPS Offers Army Pay Day Options

A pay day twice a month instead of only once, one of the options offered by the New Joint Uniform Military Pay System (JUMPS), is seen as another step in making the Army more attractive to young soldiers.

"Many soldiers were being paid once a week in their jobs before they came into the Army. They find it's hard to make their money stretch with once-a-month pay days—especially when they're likely to be making less at first than they did in civilian life," LTC Robert Hill, the Army Missile Command Modern Volunteer Army project officer, said.

"The way soldiers are paid has always been a highly individual matter. People have strong opinions about how they get their pay. Some want it all in cash handed directly to them—every

## Laser Guidance Proves Accurate

Army Missile Command scientists scored a direct hit Friday during the first guided firing of a flight test vehicle that utilizes laser guidance.

Ground launched from a tower on an Army range at Redstone Arsenal, the guided round scored a bullseye on a stationary target which was being illuminated by a laser beam.

The Army said tests are

designed to demonstrate accuracy and to prove out a laser guidance technique that would have both direct and indirect fire capabilities and could be launched from the ground or helicopters.

Other firings are planned at Redstone.

Dr. John L. McDaniel, Director of Research, Development, Engineering and Missile Systems Laboratory, accepted delivery several weeks ago of the first flight research vehicles being used in the program.

North American Rockwell delivered equipment during a ceremony at the Army Missile Command.

Participating were Dr. J.F. Reagan, Vice president of the Columbus Division and W.E. Stoney, president of the Autonetics Avionics and Sensors Division, Electronics Group.

**QUESTION:** The agreement between MICOM and AFGE Local 1858 says the location will be given on job announcements. Why is the specific location of the job not given on Merit Promotion Announcements?

**ANSWER:** Section 2b(8), Article XLIV of the Agreement between MICOM, U. S. Army Medical Department Activities at Redstone Arsenal, and AFGE Local 1858, is quoted: "The location and/or specific organizational unit of the vacant position."

The position Vacancy Announcement reveals the different Commands and Activities where vacancies occur and for which the "Referral and Selection Register" will be used. The specific location is not shown since the announcements are used for the purpose of compiling a "Referral and Selection Register" to be used for various vacancies for 180 days regardless of where the position is located. Sometimes an announcement is released when it has been noted that the number of "Best Qualified" employees will be exhausted within a few weeks.



wide choice in the past, JUMPS offers them even more options. The system is really designed for soldiers and should be welcomed by them."

JUMPS provides all Army members choices they didn't have before, such as having their checks sent to their dependents, and being able to get paid in cash if they want to. Some places have had the latter policy, but not Redstone.

Also several options permit either part or all of a soldier's pay to accrue. Officials say this could be an advantage to those overseas in combat zones where their expenses are low, and they prefer to collect all their pay in a lump sum later. However, no interest is paid on money allowed to accrue, or "just ride."

JUMPS will start in August for Army members in the U.S., and the target date for overseas is November. As part of the computer-based pay system, everyone in the Army will be paid from the Army Finance Center in Indianapolis rather than a local installation.

There are seven options under JUMPS. Those who prefer all of their pay at the end of the month, the way it comes now, may continue that method. But it is expected that the most popular options for soldiers will be one of those that provide either half of their pay at mid-month and the remainder at the end of the month, or mid-month pay of a specified amount and the rest at the end of the month.

As part of the form setting forth options, Army members are also to elect where and how they want to be paid. The choices are cash or check, by direct mail to the member's unit, by check to a dependent or to an authorized address, or by check to a banking institution.

The option forms have been distributed by the Finance and Accounting Division at Redstone. LTC Thomas Fitzgerald, urges an early return of the completed

form. "The deadline for transmitting information to the Finance Center is Aug. 18. We are going to have ours ready to go Aug. 5 to avoid a last minute flood of business," he said. "Preparation of the information for transmittal is time-consuming as it must be ready for the computer. That will involve about 40,000 separate cards at Redstone."

COL Fitzgerald strongly recommends that checks be sent to a banking institution. He said that when an individual is transferred, the Finance Center is notified, and there is likely to be a time lag between the time of departure and then arrival at a new station. "In the interim, the pay can be delayed in reaching the member," he pointed out.

The colonel also sees substantial savings by converting to JUMPS because each person's master file will be kept at the Finance Center and it will be much simpler to reconcile pay deductions with allotments issued.

The option elected cannot be changed for at least six months.

The Guidance and Control Directorate of the Missile Systems Laboratory is mating and preparing flight vehicles and seekers for firings and also has technical management of the test program.

Tests are being conducted by the Test and Evaluation Directorate.

Along with seekers, the Army has extensively studied and evaluated techniques of detecting and acquiring difficult ground targets such as tanks, gun emplacements and bunkers.

# Army Offers Educational Upgrading

Want a college degree, but you don't feel you have the time or money to attend college?

The Army may have a solution for you.

The Enlisted Undergraduate Degree Program offers you up to two years full-time college study with the Army paying tuition costs and related fees. You also draw service pay and allowances.

Enlisted men on active duty fulfilling at least a two-year service obligation with a general trainability score of 120 or better, who are high school graduates and who will have completed at least one year active service before the school term begins, are eligible.

One calendar year of schooling or less obligates the soldier to two years of Army service. More than one calendar year, but less than two, obligates him to four years Army service. Schooling and the Army service obligation added by the schooling do not run con-

currently. The college training will take place during the first portion of the enlistment period.

The Degree Completion Program is open to enlisted men and women on active duty with one to fifteen years of active federal service who can complete requirements for a baccalaureate or advanced degree within one calendar year.

The program authorizes individuals a permanent change of station to attend college while receiving full pay and allowances. However, participants must agree to bear all expenses in connection

with the schooling, including tuition, fees, books, and travel. Military students generally qualify for GI Bill assistance.

Participation in this program obligates the scholar to two years of Army services after he completes his schooling.

Anyone interested in either program should apply approximately six months before the school term begins.

## Groundbreaking Set For 200 New Quarters

Army plans to construct 200 new housing units at Redstone Arsenal will move a notch closer to completion Thursday when groundbreaking ceremonies are scheduled by MG Edwin I. Donley.

The Commanding General of the Army Missile Command will break ground at 10:30 that morning to launch the building program. Site of the ceremony will be North of Quarters 431 at the end of Skinner Drive.

Two hundred new units, including 152 for non commissioned officers and 48 for commissioned officers, are scheduled for completion by June 1972.

The Urban Systems Development Corporation of Arlington, Va., is constructing the housing quarters under a \$3,255,026 contract awarded by the Mobile District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

That will bring the number of family housing units at Redstone Arsenal to 1173.

The NCO housing will consist of modern two-bedroom apartments planned in civilian-type complexes with four apartments per building. Officer housing will consist of three and four bedroom units with 30 apartments in 15 buildings and 18 singles in buildings and 18 single units.

NCO units will be located south of the existing NCO quarters bounded on the east by Vincent Drive. Officer housing will be at two locations, one north of Simpson Drive on an extension of Tripp Drive and the other north of Simpson between the extensions of Skinner and Rice Drive.






