

## Materiel Management Gets New Military Chief

Another step in the reorganization of the Missile Command was completed last week with the assignment of COL Martin J. Burke, Jr., as Director of Materiel Management.

A veteran logistics officer with over 27 years commissioned service, COL Burke is the first chief of the newly activated directorate. He was reassigned to Redstone following a tour of duty at Ft. McClellan where he was Chief of Materiel and Evaluation Division for the Army Combat Developments Command's CBR Agency.

In naming COL Burke to be the director, MG Edwin Donley said A.A. Stewart would be the deputy director and LTC Clarence Oaks would serve as executive officer for the 600-man organization.

The newly assigned officer will have the responsibility of directing the accomplishment of the various inventory management functions in support of the overall Missile Command mission.

The Directorate responsibilities include: international logistics management, customer assistance, transportation and movement control, management of packaging activities, and materiel readiness.

A native Atlantan, COL Burke was commissioned in the Cavalry following his graduation from the University of Georgia in 1942. He saw wartime service as a company commander in the 14th Armored Division and remained in the European Theater for two years occupation duty with the Fourth


# McGinnis Retires At End Of July

COL Eugene J. McGinnis, who has served as Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army Missile Command under three Commanding Generals, has announced plans to retire at the end of July.

MG Edwin I. Donley, Commanding General of the Missile Command, has named COL James C. Miller, Jr. to succeed COL McGinnis. COL Miller has been SAM-D project manager here since December 1967.

A former enlisted man, COL McGinnis completed 30 years of active duty in April. He has had three tours of duty at Redstone Arsenal, most recently since August 1969 as Chief of Staff under MG Charles W. Eifler and continued in that assignment when MG Donley succeeded General Eifler later the same year.

COL McGinnis first came to Redstone in 1958. He served four years at the Ordnance Guided Missile School, as a student, later a staff member and then as Assistant Commandant. In 1962,

the colonel went to Vietnam for a year as Senior Ordnance Advisor to the Chief of Ordnance of the Army of the Republic of Vietnam.

Following 20 months service on the Army staff in the Pentagon, the colonel returned to Redstone in 1964 and served in the Army Missile Command successively as deputy to the Deputy Commanding General, Land Combat Systems Chief of Staff under MG John G. Zierdt, and Director of Procurement and Production.

## MMCS Adopts Self Paced Instruction Plan

Army schools, like all other educational institutions are constantly looking for new ways to teach required subjects. An experiment in the Ammunition Department at the U.S. Army Missile and Munitions Center and School, may be one more answer to the educational problem.

Self paced instruction, a new concept in training ammunition storage and operations specialists is now in a trial phase at MMCS.

Ammunition storage and operations specialists complete a total of 10 weeks storage training prior to the self-paced ammunition records course.

"It's an Army—not a social club," Townsan said.

He said he's seen a few individuals with leadership responsibilities having a hard time adjusting to the new military climate, and a few who seem to want to avoid contributing to the effort.

An officer's or NCO's unwillingness to accept responsibility under a Volunteer Army situation does not mean he can drop his obligations as a leader, according to Townsan.

"Now, it requires more responsiveness on the part of officers and NCO's," Townsan said.

Regarding those who shy away from the situation, Townsan takes a firm stand.

"I won't have men coming to me to beg off from their responsibilities," he said.

"As a commander, I'll be the judge of whether to relieve the man or have him continue in his role as a leader."

Among the soldiers of his command, response to VOLAR changes is varied.

"I've heard a lot of lip service paid to it, but those who were responsible individuals before are responsible soldiers under VOLAR. There's no mass character change brought on by

**QUESTION:** The last cost of living bonus for Civilian Service retirees, effective June 1, was based on a cost of living increase which had been three per cent or more for three months. What was the cost of living cut-off date? Where does the new base start and when does it start for determining when the next bonus is payable?

**ANSWER:** The cutoff date was March 31, 1971, for the cost-of-living index which led to the 4.5 per cent increase for civil Service retirees effective June 1, 1971. The first month used for counting toward the next increase was April 1971. When the cost of living index reaches 122.7 and remains at that level or goes higher for three consecutive months, another increase for retirees will be authorized.





He went to Germany in 1967, spent 18 months there as Chief, War Plans Branch, in the Headquarters, European Command, and another year as Chief, Plans Division, in the same headquarters, before coming back to the Missile Command in 1969.

COL and Mrs. McGinnis, the former Dorothy Lillian Hood, plan to live in Florida. Their son, Walker, is a teacher in the Huntsville School System. Their daughter, Elizabeth Jean, is at home and will move to Florida with her parents.

Military and civilian personnel of the Missile Command and the colonel's friends in the community plan a farewell dinner in the Redstone Arsenal Officers Open Mess on the evening of July 14.

Well known in the Tennessee Valley for his involvement in community programs COL McGinnis has been particularly active in the leadership of the Tennessee Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, and the Redstone Federal Credit Union during his tours at Redstone Arsenal.

A native of Arentzville, Ill., the colonel enlisted in the Army in 1941 and went to Ordnance Officers Candidate School after completing basic training. He served in the South Pacific during World War II. After the war he attended the Ordnance Officers Advanced Course, the Command and General Staff College, the University of Maryland and the University of Alabama in addition to overseas service in Japan and Germany.

Now in his third tour at Redstone, COL Miller, a native of Laurel, Miss., first came here in 1950 as Executive Officer of the Ordnance Research and Development Office, the organization which supervised the work of former German guided missile experts brought to this country after World War II. The group moved here from Ft. Bliss in 1950.

COL Miller served as chief of the Future Missile Systems Division in the Army Missile Command from 1961 to 1964 before going to Thailand, then spent two years in the Office of the Secretary of Defense, as an Army member of the Weapons Systems Evaluation Group before returning to the Missile Command in December 1967.

A 1943 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, COL Miller also holds a master's degree from the University of Southern California. He participated in the Normandy, Rhineland and Central Europe campaigns as an infantry

Self paced instruction is not really new to the education field. High schools, technical schools, and colleges have been using the method for several years. This is one of the first times it has been adapted to military training.

The success or failure of the program in the Ammunition Records branch will depend on the individual initiative of the students.

"The old program of platform instruction seemed to hamper some of the faster students and lose some of the others," said 1LT Stephen Kimbrough, chief of the Ammunition Records branch. "Self paced instruction allows the faster students to move ahead, while the other members of a class can complete the course at their own rate."

The new program of instruction minimizes the formal platform presentations. Instead, the

officer during World War II and also served in Korea in 1953 and 1954.

students peruse 38 programmed texts and seven reference books for the material. Instructors test the students individually as they progress rather than as a group.

There are five course blocks under the new self paced instruction system. A student completes one block of instruction, takes the test and begins another block of training.

Formerly one instructor was needed for every eight students. Now two instructors can handle a class of 24 students, while one instructor is left free to administer the tests.

Student reaction to the self paced has been enthusiastic. "I feel that I understand the course material better because it was up to me to dig the information out of

the books actively rather than passively listen to oral presentations," one student explained. "Self pacing offers a new challenge to records students that previously wasn't there," said Kimbrough.

Accepting the challenge, the soldiers are completing their training and going on the job sooner.

# Airmen Have Excellent Safety Record

What does a soldier trying to get to New York to see his girl have in common with a messenger carrying important documents to Washington or a missile scientist who needs an aerial target?

Chances are that all three want the services of the Flight Operations Division of the Army Missile Command's Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.

Based at Redstone Army Airfield, the second largest airport in Madison County, Flight Operations carried 1,967 passengers, delivered 570,693 lbs. of cargo while traveling 725,643 air miles and totaled 5,225 hours flying time from July 1970 to March 1971.

"We serve the Missile Command and its project offices, the Missile and Munitions Center and School, the Safeguard System Command, the Safeguard Logistics Command and the Huntsville District, Army Corps of Engineers," said MAJ Donald H. Shahan, Chief of the Flight Operations Division.

The planes and the men who fly them are on call 24 hours a day, for any assignment. The division has eight officers, six warrant officers and one civilian who pilot, primarily, light twin engine aircraft although aircraft can range from a small helicopter to a large multi-engined transport plane.

"We fly passengers and cargo to all 48 continental states and we occasionally fly to Alaska and the Caribbean," said MAJ Shahan who is a veteran of 18½ years in the Army.

Redstone pilots average flying 900 hours per year. Their safety record is outstanding. Earlier this year during a trip, an Army VC-6 (King Air) lost a wheel on take off and had to make an emergency landing at McConnell Air Force Base, Kansas. The civilian pilot of the plane, Gordon Griffith, made a landing so gentle that the only damage was the wheelless landing strut that scraped along the runway as the craft slowed to a stop. Griffith received the Army's Broken Wing Award for his outstanding effort.

The division averages five flights a day to places such as Ft. Sill, Okla., Washington, D. C., Salt Lake City, Utah and White Sands, N. M. Civilian employees and military on orders travel to these and other places every day, by-passing day long airline connections and saving valuable time for work.

2186 to see if there is an aircraft heading the same way at the same time. If there is, and if there is a seat available, a soldier can ride as far as the plane goes. Mrs. Maples schedules pilots for regular and training flights.

The Flight Operations Division has three sections, Operations, Air Traffic Control and the Supply and Maintenance sections. Operations is responsible for scheduling daily flights, assigning pilots, checking cargo shipments and attending to other administrative duties.

The Air Traffic Control Section handles the movement of aircraft on the ground and in the air around the Redstone Army Airfield. Army air traffic controllers monitor all flights departing the field. Ninety percent of these flights are flown under

instrument conditions.

The Supply and Maintenance section personnel "keep 'em flying" by maintaining planes in top condition. They repair both fixed wing and rotary wing aircraft.

Airports always seem to have an air of excitement about them. Redstone Army Airfield is no exception, and most people assigned there like it.

"It's an O. K. place to work," said SP4 Michael W. Fox, a flight co-ordinator who wants to study computers when he leaves the Army.

SSG William P. Cross, a flight dispatcher from Belington, W. VA, with over seven years in service, summed up his feelings succinctly:

"I like it fine," he said with a smile.



# 118th Ord Ready To Take To Field

The air defense battery is ready when the warning order reaches it on the battalion communications net. Air defense weapons swing to the quadrant containing enemy aircraft.

A hostile fighter-bomber roars over the first position at low altitude. The ground weapon locks on. The fire control officer hits the red button.

Misfire! What happened?

Finding the malfunction is the job of ordnance repair detachments which train at the U. S. Army Missile and Munitions Center and School.

One unit, the 118th Ordnance Detachment, is a tightly knit band of men brought together from the campus of MMCS and molded into a team under Unit Training Command.

The 118th is its men—men who either trained here in the past six months or men who were instructors in light air defense weapons.

Headed by the company commander, CAPT Edward N. Chase, the 118th is welded together by an esprit de corps that usually typifies only veteran units. There is a friendly internal rivalry between the "missile jocks" and the general support sections that handle the detachment's non-missile functions such as mail clerks, communications specialists, company clerks, generator

repairmen, and transportation specialists.

The soon-to-be deployed outfit is one of many air defense units processed through the Unit Training Command. UTC activates, trains, and tests four new units each year, as well as conducting training for numerous reserve units.

The 118th services two air defense weapons, Vulcan and Chapparral. The Vulcan looks and fires like the old Gatling gun with a rotating barrel assembly and radar to aid in sighting the weapon.

The Chapparral is a low altitude heat-seeking air defense missile that red-dogs enemy aircraft and brings them down in a matter of seconds. The Vulcan compliments the Chapparral by providing a constant anti-aircraft fire on any low flying hostile aircraft.

Men of the 57-member unit work out of mobile shop vans, with the administration and repair shops traveling right along with them. They are the Army's version of the self-sufficient traveling gypsy bands of bygone days in central Europe.


Batteries that the 118th will eventually serve may be spread out over fifty to sixty square miles, depending on the target they are defending.

Three-man contact teams are the prodigal sons of an Ordnance detachment. The 118th has four such teams constantly on the go, shuttling between field batteries and repair shops. The contact teams, the first echelon repair crew, spot check and trouble shoot minor problems at the batteries.

CWO John Arnold, supervisor for the detachment's technical operations, explained the operation.

"The contact teams are called to the malfunctioning firing unit, prepped with all kinds of things to look for", he said. "If they can handle the repair on the spot they do. If they can't, the malfunctioning part is brought back to the shop van where a new part is issued and sent to the broken-down system," he added.

During a recent simulated field test, graders of UTC scored the 118th exceptionally high in technical proficiency and tactical maneuvering. The test, part of

UTC's training schedule, evaluates just how well the unit has learned its classroom lessons.

A detachment like the 118th is one of the Army's more expensively equipped units, because they have to work with some of the Army's most costly weapons, using the latest advances in electronic technology. They have close to \$10 million worth of equipment including everything from jeeps and half-ton trucks to semi-tractor trailers. All together the unit has nearly 30 motor vehicles to maintain, full of air conditioners, generator trailers, calibration com-

puters and assorted test equipment.

The 118th will soon pack up all their belongings and move out to their first permanent duty assignment. Most of the men are recent graduates of MMCS and are untried in actual field situations, but thanks to the extensive training by Unit Training Command, the leaders are confident the men will perform well.

# New Missile Being Tested


An Army tube-launched missile guided by hot rocket exhaust gas released through orifices at the model base has been tested in two winds tunnels at the U.S. Air Force's Arnold Engineering Development Center.

The "fluidic directional control" missile is fin-stabilized and gyro controlled. It was designed, developed and fabricated by the Army Missile Command's Directorate for Research, Development, Engineering and Missile Systems Laboratory.

The AEDC tests were sponsored by the Air Force Systems Command's Air Force Armament Laboratory, Eglin AFB, Florida, in cooperation with the Missile Command.

The tests were conducted on a larger than full-scale model in AEDC's 4-foot transonic wind tunnel and in the 40-inch supersonic tunnel.

High pressure air was released through the orifices near the missile's base during the tests to simulate the hot rocket exhaust gas used to control the missile's trajectory. The tests were to determine the tube-fired missile's trajectory. The tests were to determine the tube-fired missile's drag, control effectiveness and stability characteristics throughout its velocity and angle of attack range.


**THREE BRONZE STARS FOR RVN SERVICE**

First Oak Leaf Cluster was added to the Bronze Star worn by CW3 Willard C. Smith, who's now the School Brigade food ad-




