Phasedown On Schedule, Early Release Suspended

Redstone's Military Personnel Division is in the process of identifying enlisted men and officers affected by the Army's announcement of suspension of Early Release Programs.

Effective tomorrow a 90 day suspension of adjusted release dates established by qualitative early release policies under the Army's Phasedown Early Release program is being implemented at Redstone.

Strength reductions imposed by Congress have been met and the retention of personnel covered by the 90 day suspension gives the Army the necessary manpower to maintain combat readiness status.

This suspension period is applicable only to those personnel whose adjusted release dates are currently scheduled to occur on or after May 18, 1972 and prior to July 1, 1972.

In certain cases personnel involved in this temporary suspension may, if they desire, voluntarily elect to extend their service beyond the new release date established and serve until their normal estimated time of separation date.

Career Noncommissioned Officers affected by this suspension, if otherwise acceptable, may elect to continue to serve as originally programmed prior to the initiation of the Army's Phasedown early release programs.

The suspension does not apply to personnel whose normal ETS occurs during the specified period.

In the case of officer personnel, the four months early release of obligated volunteers is suspended for 90 days, and officers with original release dates between September 15 and October 31, 1972 will be extended a minimum of 90 days.

If otherwise acceptable, these officers may volunteer to remain on active duty until the completion of their original obligated tour.

The early release of warrant officer aviators program is terminated. (See PHASEDOWN page 3)

A panel of Army missile experts has recommended that major components of the Lance battlefield missile system be type classified Standard A.

This decision to award Lance the Army's 'seal of approval' was the conclusion of the Lance Development Acceptance-Production Validation In-Process-Review held at the Missile Command last week.

The panel's recommendation has been sent to higher headquarters for further action.

Standard A means that a weapon system has been thoroughly tested and is judged to be suitable for Army use.

Meeting with representatives from all Army agencies concerned with Lance development, the voting panel, which included three general officers, determined that the Lance missile (minus nuclear warhead) and Ground Support Equipment have met major Army requirements and should be type classified Standard A.

The decision to extend limited production of the warhead until additional engineering-service tests are completed was made.

The panel also recommended that the Lance Guided Missile System Test Set (GMSTS) undergo modifications before getting Standard A.

Members of the voting panel were Maj. Gen. Roderick Wetherill, Commanding General of the Army Field Artillery Center and School; Brig. Gen. Albert G. Hume, Commanding General of the Army Combat Systems Group, Combat Developments Command, Brig. Gen. Robert J. Proudfoot, Lance project manager, and Col. R.L. Branch, Army Logistics, Doctrine, Systems and Readiness Agency, Office of Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics.

—DA Approves EM Policy Revisions—

WASHINGTON (ANF)—The Department of the Army has approved and put into effect six policy revisions concerning enlisted men.

The six changes are from an original list of 48 recommendations submitted to the chief of staff from a Major Command Sergeants Major conference, sponsored last fall by Sergeant Major of the Army Silas L. Copeland.

The approved revisions come from suggestions recommending DA to:

—liberalize the policy whereby an individual who is promoted to an eligible grade also receives space required travel for his dependent wife;

—update and republish AR 600-200, the Enlisted Personnel System. This is now estimated to be accomplished about Oct. 1, 1972;

—send Enlisted Record Briefs to each enlisted man who updates information in his field 201 file on an annual basis;

—insure that enlisted men will have military occupational specialty (MOS) study guides in sufficient time to properly prepare for MOS qualification tests;

—enable individuals retiring from an oversea area to be assigned to the Continental United States area and post of their choice, providing they meet certain criteria as specified in AR 635-200;

—change AR 672-5-1 to shorten the length of time required to qualify for the Armed Forces Reserve Medal, awarded after 10 and 20 years of service. The recommendation was fulfilled by the

newly established Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, awarded after March 3, 1972, for four-year periods of service in the Reserve Components.

Many of the conference's suggestions actually originated with enlisted men in the field and were echoed by command sergeants major.

Three other recommendations have been approved but have subsequent approval pending by other agencies.

Eight have been partially approved.

Eighteen are under research or consideration by the Army Staff, other headquarters or civilian research firms.

Only thirteen of the suggestions were disapproved.

A funeral service for two sisters who were employed by the Missile Command was held Saturday at Victory Baptist Church in Guntersville. Burial followed in Marshall Memory Gardens.

Miss Emma Stewart and Mrs. Margaret Madden, both of Guntersville, were killed in a two-car collision last Thursday morning while enroute to work. The accident occurred on South Parkway near Gate 3.

Driver of the other car escaped serious injury.

Miss Stewart, who had worked at Redstone nearly eight years, was a

minated May 18, 1972 instead of June 30, 1972, as previously announced.

Personnel who have applied for the six month early release program for school, teaching or employment, are affected by the suspension. Those persons with release dates of May 17, 1972, or earlier, will be separated as scheduled. Applications of personnel who have been approved for release on or after May 18, 1972, must be resubmitted with justification to support a request for a 90 day early release.

might lead to leaning on drugs and alcohol.

Carolyn Kennedy, a social services assistant at the Rap Center, said that when she counsels people it doesn't take a special knowledge of one or two subjects to talk to them.

She happens to have had experience in varied forms of counselling, and feels one kind of problem isn't that different from another when people want to talk about whatever is on their minds.

"We welcome both military and civilian personnel, and we prefer that the military come out of uniform. We want this to be a relaxed atmosphere. Our bag isn't law enforcement. If it were we'd be on the police force. No one is going to get hassled in here," she said.

"Once the guys come to talk to us they'll recognize why we're here. Some who have dropped in aren't sure they have a problem, and that's all right too.

"We want the guys to shake it out of their minds that this place has some kind of a stigma because it's connected with the Army. The Army has a good approach to drug and alcohol problems. Guys who need treatment, for instance, can get it and stay on their jobs. It would be hard to find a civilian community where a person could stay on the job and take time off for treatment like that.

"The Army recognizes that drug and alcohol problems are a cultural thing as well as a medical thing or a legal thing."

There is a staff member at the Center every night and others of the staff take turns being on hand. They've all had experience and education in social work.

"We could use volunteers," Mrs. Kennedy said. "It's a great opportunity for anyone who likes to





Arsenal's History Lives With Street Names

Many of the thousands of people who drive on it believe that one of Redstone Arsenal's main Roads commemorates the name of General George S. Patton.

They're wrong. Patton Road is named for a soldier all right, Sergeant Gerald S. Patton.

A member of the First Gas Regiment, Sgt. Patton was killed in action during World War I. The use of his name was the result of a decision made in 1941 when names were chosen for major roads on



what was then the new Huntsville Arsenal of the Army Chemical Corps.

The names of 12 other members of his regiment endure at Redstone:

First Lieutenant Paul L. Goss, First Lieutenant Percy E. Rideout, Corporal Vernon C. Buxton, Privates First Class Joseph C. Digney, Hans Hansen, Herbert B. Martin, William K. Neal and Bert W. Shields; Privates Herbert B. Martin, E.J. McAlpine, E.R. Mills and William K. Neal.

which in 1941 opened neighboring, and much smaller, Redstone Arsenal, named its thoroughfares to indicate the major function or mission activity located on them. Line and Magazine Roads, for example, still carry the names given them then and Redstone Rd., the main street of the old Arsenal, was named for the installation, not the missile.


When the missile and rocket program came to the installation in the late 40's and Huntsville and Redstone Arsenals were combined as an Ordnance Corps installation, the first commanding general, Brigadier General Thomas K. Vincent, suggested using the names of former chiefs of Ordnance to name new streets then being opened for new post housing.

Brigadier General S.V. Benet, the eighth chief of Ordnance; Samuel Hof, thirteenth; D.W. Flagler, ninth; A.R. Buffington, tenth, and William Crozier, eleventh; all were commemorated in street names in the housing area.

Other former chiefs of Ordnance whose names have been used include: Decius Wadsworth, first; George Bomford, second; James W. Ripley, fifth; A.B. Dyer, seventh; Charles W. Wesson, fifteenth and Everett S. Hughes, seventeenth.

Crowell Circle carries the name of Brigadier General Benedict Crowell, director of munitions during World War I and first president of the American Ordnance Association.


As the missile and rocket



program grew and additional roads were opened, many were named for the products of the new era in technology. Lacrosse, Titan, Hercules, Jupiter, ENTAC, Mauler and Shillelagh, for example, were all named for missile programs. Kingfisher, Snooper and Cajun for targets or sounding rockets.

In the area now occupied by the Marshall Space Flight Center, many of the names resulted from early achievements in space. Able Avenue is named for a Rhesus monkey, one of two primates that survived the first flight outside the earth's atmosphere. There's a Pioneer Street, named for the Army's successful lunar probe. Echo Street commemorates an early satellite.

Many of the streets and roads named in the past 15 years have



honored deceased individuals who made important contributions to Army Ordnance or, more recently, to the activities carried on at Redstone itself.

Brigadier General Urban Niblo was an Ordnance officer in Italy in World War II. Brigadier General John H. Rice was the chief Ordnance officer of the American Expeditionary Force in France in 1918. Brigadier General Samuel McRoberts also was an Ordnance officer with the AEF.

His name endures in abbreviated fashion, the original sign painters dropped the letters "MC" from his name and the road became, Roberts Road.

Brigadier General Bethel W. Simpson was a leader in Ordnance


personnel and training during World War II.

The inventor of the Army's famed Bazooka, Colonel Leslie A. Skinner, has been honored; so has General Vincent, Redstone's first commanding general.


Major General Holger N. Toftoy, the man who brought missiles and rockets to Redstone and also commanded the installation, has been remembered in Toftoy Thoroughway.

Marshall Road commemorates General George S. Marshall, former Chief of Staff, but Pershing Road is named for the missile, not for General John J. Pershing, perhaps a fine point since the missile is named for the man.

Edwin K. Fowler was resident engineer for the Mobile District of the Corps of Engineers before his death. James R. Dearman, a



civilian employee of MICOM, did pioneering work in lasers. Other deceased civilians commemorated include: Walter Burose and Kurt Lindner of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency; Edward E. Jungerman, also of MICOM; Angelo LaBathe and Delmar Morris of the Marshall Space



Flight Center.

Only two, possibly three, roads on the 38,000 acre installation still perpetuate names from an era before the Army came to the Tennessee Valley.

Anderson and Gray Roads can be positively identified as portions of thoroughfares serving farms and homes once located within the Arsenal perimeter. No one has been able to pin down for sure the origin of the name for Dodd Rd. Best guess is that is, too, lingers from the days when Redstone grew cotton and corn rather than missiles and rockets.







The Huntsville Division, Army Corps of Engineers, has joined the NASA Space Shuttle Team, according to Brigadier General Bates C. Brunnell, Division Engineer.

With a primary mission of the design and construction of facilities for the Safeguard ballistic missile defense system, the Division has accepted an additional mission of providing design and construction of facilities support for the Marshall Space Flight Center's portion of the forthcoming NASA Program.

The Space Shuttle is being de-

veloped by NASA as a manned reusable space vehicle which will carry out various missions in earth orbit. MSFC is responsible for the development, production, and delivery of the Shuttle's orbiter main engines, the solid fueled booster, and the hydrogen-oxygen propellant tank used by the orbiter.

The support of the NASA/MSFC Space Shuttle Program is the second additional mission the Huntsville Division has assumed. In October 1971, the Division was selected to assist in the mechanization and modernization

Home Away From Home

Foreign students and liaison representatives at the Missile and Munitions Center and School number approximately 275 men, representing some 14 nations. These figures constantly vary with departing graduating classes and arrivals for new classes.

At the present time, the German Luftwaffe—their Air Force—is the largest contingent attending classes. With the German Army students and permanent liaison staff, they constitute the majority of foreign service personnel at MMCS.

The Italian armed forces have the second largest number of students with the Koreans in third place. Some nations have but one student attending classes.

One of the primary requirements for all students is that they must know the English language and especially the technical terms used in missile maintenance and repair.

Prior to coming to the States to study, the German students attended a basic course in their particular field for three months and an English language course of varying lengths. In addition, all must attend and pass a sergeants course as all must be at least Sergeant (E-5). All this prepares them for the main courses at MMCS.

During off duty hours and long holiday weekends, many students are, as one liaison representative stated, "taking advantage of seeing your beautiful country."


And for those students whose wives and families accompanied them, they are taking full advantage of the recreational and religious activities in the Huntsville and MMCS community.

They are especially grateful to the Huntsville-Madison County Council for International Visitors whose director, Mrs. Harriet Leech, supervises a well-organized "host family" program from her office in the county court house. Dozens of local families "adopt" foreign students and invite them to take part in social activities.

Foreign wives and children also attend weekly courses in conversational English conducted by members of the First Baptist Church on a non-denominational basis.




REPUBLIC OF KOREA — NIKE and Computer Radar

High Priority—

Minority Volunteers Sought

A vigorous recruiting program to attract more officers from minority groups into Army service is being given high priority by the Third U. S. Army.

Col. Gilbert P. Levy, commandant of the Army Missile and Munitions Center and School, said personnel and facilities of his local Third Army element are working out a cooperative effort to im-

plement the minority officer procurement program (MOP) in this area.

MMCS will work closely with Third Army's newly appointed Minority Officer Procurement chief to interest black, Spanish-speaking, American Indian and U. S. Orientals in Army officer careers.

Heading the Third Army drive is Major James A. Harris, a black officer with a degree in psychology from Xavier University, former commander of a helicopter company in Vietnam and until recently Third Army Aviation Operations Officer. In the MOP drive, he is responsible for activities in seven southeastern states - Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North and South Carolina and Tennessee.

Col. Levy said the MOP goal is to increase the number of qualified minority group volunteers for the officers corps to percentages approximating or above those of the current civilian population of the nation.

These he listed as 11 percent blacks, two or three percent

Spanish-speaking, two percent American Indians and one percent American Orientals.

Both MMCS and the Army Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal are already cooperating on the MOP drive with Lt. Col. John H. Redd, Jr., who heads the only Army Senior (college) Reserve Officer Training Corps unit in this area at Alabama A&M University. MMCS is also working with three local junior Army ROTC units at Grissom, Lee and Sparkman High Schools.

Col. Levy said an immediate goal in this area will be to stimulate interest in ROTC in predominantly black colleges and universities. He noted that out of 154 predominantly black colleges in America, only 23 are currently hosting ROTC training. Alabama A&M is one of these and is in only its first year of the program.

Col. Levy said he and his Information Officer, Reavis O'Neal, Jr., will welcome inquiries from interested persons and put them in touch with the proper authorities. The Information Office telephone at MMCS is 876-3244.

Flying Club Seeks Members

Military personnel interested in flying as a hobby will be happy to know that the Redstone Arsenal Flying Club has moved onto Redstone Airfield. The Club is conducting a membership drive and any young soldiers interested in learning to fly can contact the club for additional information.

In an effort to interest young soldiers on post, the Club has established a deal whereby they can become associated with the club on a temporary basis for \$1 for 60 days. General membership consists of a \$25 initiation fee and dues of \$5. per month.

Fulltime qualified flight instructors are available for \$5. per hour and Club aircraft are kept in tip-top mechanical condition by certified aircraft mechanics.

Ground school classes are scheduled on Monday and Thursday nights dependent on the number of students enrolled for lessons.

The Club has two Cessna 150 trainers that rent for \$9.00 per hour; two Cessna L-19's that rent for \$6. per hour; and one four-plane aircraft that rents for \$10. per hour.

New members will be given a free demonstration flight in club aircraft, if they so desire.

TOW Saves Dollars

When the final list of top money savers for FY 72 is compiled at the Missile Command, look for the familiar name of TOW.

One of the cost reduction champs at MICOM for the past three years, TOW already has validated a \$7.5 million savings this year which will increase to \$17.7 million through FY 74.

And it is anticipated to save \$10 million during FY 75.

Jim Sanford, TOW cost reduction coordinator, said the savings was earned by competitive procurement of TOW launch equipment.

"From FY 69 through FY 71, we procured primary components of the TOW launcher from Hughes Aircraft Company," Sanford said. "But this year, we went out on a competitive basis and awarded a multi-year contract to Emerson Electric Company which saved us \$7.5 million."

Sanford has recorded approximately \$70 million dollars during the three and a half years he has worked as TOW cost reduction coordinator.

This year's TOW savings is more than one-third of the better than \$20 million total recorded at the Missile Command.

Does your unit day room have that tired, worn out, unused look? Is it being utilized by the troops?

If the answer is "yes" to the first question and "no" to the second, then maybe you should take a quick look at the day room of the 1st ETC, School Brigade, Building 3202.

When First Sergeant Cletus A. Roberts and Staff Sergeant Royce Kamman, supply sergeant, 1st ETC reported in to the unit one of the first things they noticed was the way in which the day room had fallen into disuse and disrepair.

Holes had literally been punched into the walls and ceilings, floor tiling had been torn up and even the green felt on the pool tables was missing.

It didn't take them long to make an estimate of the situation and what material would be needed to completely renovate the interior and again make it a suitable place where the troops could spend their leisure time.

Through the normal supply channels Sgt. Kamman was able to requisition wall paneling, tile and paint. Through the unit fund new felt and cue sticks were purchased and old ones repaired. Even curtains were ordered for the windows.

What has apparently seemed to be an insurmountable task of remodeling was now taking shape. Only one major obstacle remained — labor.

Through discreet inquiries Sergeant Kamman found that several of the men in the unit had

carpentry experience. It didn't take him long to solicit these mens help and after presenting his plans to them and painting a rosy picture of what he was attempting to do for them, the men quickly volunteered their services along with those of their buddies. An artist was also found who offered to paint various pictures for the walls.

Working in their spare time the men quickly completed the renovations and a recent visit to the day room revealed what a little self help and initiative could accomplish.

The day room consists of four separate rooms. The TV room with its comfortable stuffed chairs and soft drink dispensers normally caters to standing room only if you don't arrive early enough to watch your favorite TV program.

There is a well-lit and most enjoyable reading and writing room with an additional room which features the Chaplains Corner. Available here are religious reading material for all denominations.

The largest of the rooms is the pool room which, even during lunch hour, is seldom without a waiting line. All pool equipment in the day room can be obtained from the supply sergeant simply by signing a hand receipt.

The men of the 1st ETC take immeasurable pride in their day room especially since these beautifully decorated and comfortable rooms are the direct results of their own personal efforts.
