

Looking Into Soldiers' Finances

When soldiers come to Redstone, many of them are new to the Army. They're young with little experience in living on their own.

Alabama laws may differ widely from those they've known in their home states, or they may encounter experiences they've never faced before. To avoid many legal pitfalls created by ignorance of the local laws, attorneys in the Military Law Division of the MICOM Legal Office are preparing a comprehensive pamphlet entitled "Legal Assistance Handbook" to give to all incoming military personnel.

"It's not a course in law," Captain Jim Wilson of the Legal Assistance Office, one of the pamphlet's authors, said. "Its purpose is to acquaint soldiers with potential problems."

Subjects included are: marriage, divorce, adoption, laws regarding minors, drivers license and vehicle registration, interest rate in Alabama, state income taxes, support of dependents, worthless checks and bad debts, powers of attorney, wills, naturalization, tips on buying and selling autos and real estate, leases and bills of sale.

The need for the pamphlet became evident to Wilson and Captain Frank Faraci, who run the Legal Assistance Office, because of the many soldiers who come to them with legal problems.

The captains said that if people knew some things to watch for that were potential problems they could save themselves a lot of trouble.

One of the most common pitfalls, one that occurs in so many kinds of sales for goods and services, is the contract a soldier or his wife is required to sign.

"People just don't read contracts before they sign them, then find they're obligated in ways they hadn't suspected," Wilson said. "If they'd bring them in here for us to look over before they sign, we could help them more than we can after they've already signed on the dotted line."

In the cases where contracts are signed for used cars and other fairly expensive items, people often fail to realize that the contract is immediately sold to a finance company. When that happens, the purchaser of the contract is entitled to many protections by the law.

Used car transactions are nagging problems. Soldiers have to be ready to leave the area, but in their sales contracts there's likely to be a clause that says cars are not to be taken out of the state until they're paid for. What do soldiers do? They either sell the car, pay up the total amount, or the car is repossessed.

A lot of dissatisfaction comes from cases where soldiers take their cars in for repair and are promised them back by certain times. "If they'd have that agreement in writing, and the garage fails to fulfill the terms, then we can effectively talk to the garage owner," Wilson said.

Some other kinds of contracts that soldiers and their wives sign that result in problems are for correspondence courses, health spas, books, magazines and encyclopedias. Unfortunately many of these sales are not exactly what they were represented to be, the attorneys said.

"If soldiers would only realize that their assignment is temporary, it would help too," Faraci said. "They sign up for magazines, for instance, with a couple for the wife and a couple for the husband. Then the husband goes to Vietnam or someplace where his magazines should be sent to him and there's a mix-up about two addresses. The possibility of a change of assignment should be discussed with the salesman.

"If a soldier leases a place to live, he must be sure there is a clause in the contract that releases him from obligation when he gets orders to leave."

Granted, this is an unusual soldier.

Black History



Surgeon

The first successful open-heart surgery was performed by a black man—Dr. Daniel Hale Williams. Not surprisingly, he had to work his way through school, and in

1883 he graduated from Chicago Medical College.

Young Dr. Williams began to practice medicine, but no hospital in Chicago allowed black doctors to operate; so he founded Provident Hospital in 1891. He also founded the first training school for black nurses.

One day in 1893 a man dying of a stab wound in the chest was rushed into Provident Hospital. Dr. Williams, with six assistants, opened up the man's chest and sewed up a hole in a main artery leading from the exposed beating heart. It created a sensation and this great black man, Dr. Daniel Hale Williams, made history.

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
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


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CAPTAIN FARACI, (left), CAPTAIN WILSON

Both attorneys said that local merchants have been very cooperative and are not out to mistreat soldiers. They see the Huntsville community as one where there is an unusually good relationship between the military and civilian populace.

They also said that when they make calls in the soldiers' interest, they often find that there were two sides to the story and the soldiers are at fault.

The attorneys advice is, "Watch out. Be wary. If there is any question, don't sign the contract until an attorney has examined it. It's a form of preventive law that can save a lot of trouble.

"Don't get the idea that a contract can't be revised before it is signed. It can. Just because the seller says such things as 'This is just a formality' shouldn't throw you off. Contracts are written for the advantage of the seller and are perfectly legal, but the buyer doesn't have to accept them the way they are," the attorneys warned.

Faraci said that people sometimes fail to realize that, unfortunately an Army legal officer can't go into civilian court with their cases. This makes it all the more important to look before you leap into situations that may become legal headaches.

On the other end of the stick is the man who has to go to the commander's office every month to explain how he is going to pay all his creditors who have complained to the CO about delinquent bills.

What people do with their money is strictly personal business. Trouble is, too many don't know how to manage, through no fault of their own. Young soldiers are particularly vulnerable. Even at a low rate of pay, it may be the first pay checks they've ever received. It looks like an opportunity to get that fancy car or cycle, buy jewelry and other expensive items.

No down payment, easy terms, all the rest.

First thing they know they're in too deep to make their pay check stretch far enough to cover the bills.

It's time to back up and take another look at the financial situation.

Some tips from soldiers who've tried include:

—Pay all your bills so you're stable.

—Establish an account in a good bank. It's excellent credit reference if you need it.

—Try some systematic savings plan.

—Five dollars, for instance, will buy a share in the Redstone Federal Credit Union where one is always a member so long as he owns a share.

—All banks have organized savings plans and are happy to explain them.

—Set up a budget geared to your income.

—Drive a car you can easily afford.

—If you loan money, charge interest on it.

—Get advice from a recognized authority or your superior officer before making any large investment if you've had no previous experience in the area.

—Don't get wrapped in a security blanket because you're in the Army. The Army does take care of its own up to a point, but don't lean back and think you have no responsibility for how you manage your money, no matter how small the amount.

—There's an Army program that pays 10 percent interest on savings of military personnel while they're overseas. It's easy to enter the plan. All it takes is a specified allotment from your pay.

—Or try any kind of an allotment to a savings institution wherever you're stationed. You never see the money, so don't miss it as much as you would if you had to pull it out of your pocket and send it somewhere.

—U. S. Savings bonds can be bought the same way — the payroll deduction plan.

—Look over the field and select the saving or investment course that appeals to you. It's each individual's own choice, but do something to keep your head above water financially.

You might build up enough equity to diversify and your money will make money.

POV Travel Reg Changes

Civilian employees who travel to TDY locations in privately owned vehicles are no longer required to file speedometer readings on reimbursement travel vouchers.

They are, however, required to file the number of miles traveled. And they should be accurate. When the miles traveled exceed the distance shown in the Official Table of Distances (AR 55-60) by three per cent, an explanation of the exceeded distance is required in the remarks section of the voucher.

The travel approving official must administratively approve the additional mileage—if the explanation is acceptable to him.

Something else to keep in mind is that when the time of departure is within 30 minutes prior to the end of a quarter day or the time of departure is within 30 minutes prior to the end of a quarter day or the time of return is within 30 minutes after the beginning of a quarter day, per diem allowance for either such quarter will not be allowed unless a statement is on the voucher explaining the official necessity for the time of departure or return.



Tailoring Not New

Military tailoring was not something new for Mrs. Marrs when she arrived on the Arsenal in 1946. When her husband Robert was in the Navy during World War II, she worked in Navy tailor shops in Maryland, New York, Massachusetts, and on the West Coast.

After the war the Fayetteville, Tennessee native and her husband settled in Huntsville. And she soon won her first tailor shop contract and opened her own shop here.



"I also had the laundry and cleaning contract for 17 years," she added, "and at one time I had three locations on post. But I just got tired of lifting fatigues."

Mrs. Marrs came here with the Chemical Corps and remembers vividly the days during the late 1940's when the total troop strength of the Arsenal was down to less than 200 men. But her shop remained open even then.

New Management

Soon though, for the first time in over 26 years, the shop will be under new management.

"I love my work," said Mrs. Marrs, "but I promised my husband that I would stop working when he retired—and I'm already five years late. He retired from his job as a yard foreman down at Property Disposal in 1967."

Retirement will mean several changes for Mrs. Marrs.

"My husband and I are going to take a lot of short trips," she said. "And I suppose I will have to re-learn how to keep house."

"But since I'm just a Tennessee hillbilly," she concluded, "the best thing about retirement is that it will give me the chance to be home so I can cook plenty of cornbread and black-eyed peas."

Vick, Chief of the ABMDA-H Data Processing Division, was recognized for implementing a series of programs directed toward identifying and solving problems associated with software for large scale real-time digital computers that could be used in advanced ballistic missile defense systems.

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

He has served overseas in Okinawa and Vietnam, and has been assigned to Redstone twice previously, both times at MMCS.

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

Army Changes Education

We are all witness to a new revolution in training within the Army, according to Colonel George E. Handley, Jr., who recently addressed a group of 65 graduating students at the Missile and Munitions Center and School.

In a graduation that included three Non-commissioned Officer Education System (NCOES) classes, Colonel Handley praised the NCOES program as the beginning of this new era in training.

Colonel Handley is currently serving as director of schools, Headquarters CONARC, Fort Monroe, Va.

Reflecting that the Army once assumed that Basic Combat Training and Advance Individual Training were the only training necessary, Handley states that an increase in technology created a "training gap," and made the old system archaic.

Specialties Increased

Then in 1967, a commission on evaluation of programs suggested multi-level courses which would broaden an individual's knowledge and increase the number of Military Occupation Specialties for which he was qualified.

The result was the development of NCOES. A Basic NCOES was designed to instruct career soldiers of grades E-4 to E-6 in the matters of supervision, which was called the "greatest problem for NCOs" by Handley. In addition, an advanced NCOES course was introduced to train men of grade E-7 and E-8 in management techniques.

In conclusion, Handley told the students that they could be confident that training received at MMCS "is at the best level in the world. Take what you've learned with confidence and pride, because you have had the best."

Among the honor graduates recognized at the graduation was Sergeant First Class Erich F. W. Hanke, of Germany, who finished the Nike Missile and Launcher Control repair course with a perfect 100.00 average. It marked the first time that the maximum score had ever been attained in the course.
