It's Working . . .

Paper Recycling At Redstone

It got off to a shaky start, but now Redstone's paper recycling program is, in a word, working.

And working pretty well: In March, for example, the amount recycled was 20 tons—two-and-a-half times or 12 tons more than was recycled the month before.

Judging from the program's success so far, a lot of Redstone people are pitching in and going about their work a little differently

nowadays.

Early in February the paper recycling program was begun with the foreknowledge that it wouldn't work unless people here were willing to "think recycling", and thereby pattern their work habits to keeping waste paper clean, and thus, recyclable. This eliminates the big—and prohibitive—expense of having to pay people to separate recyclable paper from other waste.

The program is working because people have taken to it and are cooperating—both the workforce and the refuse contractor—says Facilities Engineer's Marvin C. Salmon, who runs the program.

Redstone workers are cooperating by keeping the waste paper clean and depositing it in the "Recycling Paper Only" containers at various locations on post.

The refuse contractor is cooperating by hauling the paper from nine locations—he's contract-bound to service only four—and by making special pickups, which have been added to the program. They're for those activities that want to recycle their paper but don't get regular pickup service.



Here's How To Recycle Your Paper

The MICOM Information Office has received several calls from activities wanting to participate in Redstone's paper recycling program. Here's how:

At nine locations there are special blue dumpsters for recyclable paper, with new locations being added all the time. Blue dumpsters are presently at Buildings 3651, 3710, 4488, 4500, 5201, 5250, 5681, 5888 and 8027. People at these buildings need only deposit their paper in special "Recycling Paper Only" containers spotted throughout the buildings; janitors take care of emptying the

containers into the blue dumpsters.

Activities apart from these nine buildings may recycle their paper in either of two ways. First, they may haul it on their own to the nearest blue dumpster, or—the alternative—let it pile up until the accumulation is in the 500 to 1,000 pound range, and then call 876-1477 for a special pickup.

Any paper or cardboard can be recycled, so long as it is "clean"; that is free of carbon paper, staples, paper clips, etc., and not intermingled with non-paper trash.

ANSWERS

QUESTION: Is the Cosmopolitan Spa International which had an ad in last week's Rocket, one of the massage parlors presently under fire by local law enforcement agencies?

ANSWER: No. It is an exercise health center for men. This particular ad was slanted toward arsenal military personnel because the arsenal gymnasium was destroyed in the recent tornado. The Cosmopolitan Spa International is not a target of Huntsville's recently enacted "massage parlor" law, according to the Huntsville Police Department.

QUESTION: What are the rights of bicyclists on arsenal roads?

ANSWER: A bicycle has the same rights and responsibilities as any other vehicle operating on arsenal roads. MICOM Reg. 210-2 is the governing authority and also contains requirements for lights, reflectors, audible signals, etc.

QUESTION: How many retired military personnel are employed by the Missile Command?

ANSWER: At the present time there are 232.

SAM-D Response Is 100 Per Cent

The Army successfully launched another SAM-D missile at White Sands Missile Range last week, reaching the halfway mark in a series of ten scheduled firings to verify the control system and structural design of the new air defense missile.

Brigadier General Charles F. Means, SAM-D Project Manager said the control test missile flew a low-to-medium-altitude trajectory and responded successfully to 100 percent command maneuvers.

The flight was the fourth straight success demonstrating SAM-D

structural design and control system performance utilizing an on-board programmer.

These flights, along with radar and computer tests also being conducted at White Sands Missile Range, are prerequisites to follow-on, fully guided missile firings scheduled to begin later this year.

Raytheon Company is the SAM-D prime contractor and Martin-Marietta Aerospace is the principal subcontractor. Thiokol Chemical Corporation is subcontractor for the propulsion system.

Young America Leads Way

In keeping with this year's "Young America Lead the Way" theme, most local Law Day activity will be aimed at youth in the community, according to Major Robert M. Nutt.

Nutt, a Safeguard attorney, is Law Day chairman for the North Alabama Chapter of the Federal Bar Association, which is sponsoring the activities in coordination with the Huntsville-Madison County Bar Association. He said activities will include a speakers bureau to take the youth

theme into schools, news media coverage, a Law Day banquet and presentation of the American Bar Association's Liberty Bell Award to an individual in the community. The award will be in recognition of meritorious service in youth-related work.

The thrust of the activities, Nutt said, will be to dramatize the values of living under a system of laws and independent courts that protect individual freedom and make possible a free society.

Loyalty includes a sense of deep patriotism. It is patriotism which calls upon all of us to make personal sacrifices when our Nation is challenged from within or without.

I call also upon appropriate officials of the Government to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on that day as an expression of our loyalty to the Nation symbolized by that flag.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-fifth day of March, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy-four and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred Ninety-eight.

Report Heard On System's Progress

MAY 1, 1974 IS NOT JUST ANOTHER SPRING DAY


On May 1st, from coast to coast, the young of all ages will be reminding themselves — and their elders — that to love life is to seek justice.

EEO Second Among AMC Goals

Commitment Through Involvement

Calling for total commitment through personal involvement and leadership, General Henry A. Miley, Jr., AMC Commander, has thrown his full support behind an aggressive EEO program and dispatched AMC's 1974 EEO Plan of Action to subordinate commanders for implementation AMC-wide.

Now listed as No. 2 among AMC's ten major goals, the importance of the EEO program is exceeded only by AMC's effort to improve Army combat readiness.

By emphasizing the specific affirmative actions which are required to resolve recurring EEO problems, this plan is intended to be the primary vehicle through which AMC will reach the goal of providing genuine equality and opportunity in employment for all employees in all pay categories at all grade levels.

Key points of emphasis in the 1974 plan include:

AMC-wide goals are set, where required, to correct out-of-balance situations.

AMC will obtain a commitment from labor unions to actively support the EEO effort and to include such a commitment in negotiated agreements.

AMC employees paid from non-appropriated funds have not been excluded. Installations will now assure that the services and program of the EEO are available to all personnel.

All non-supervisory employees will receive training in EEO awareness.

Maximum use will be made of the Upward Mobility Program to give lower grade employees, and those in deadend jobs, the opportunity to improve their skills and perform at their highest level of

potential.

AMC will develop a standard performance rating form for all supervisors showing their support and leadership in relation to EEO. Performance in this area will be one of the factors at the time supervisors are rated.

AMC's ACTION Committee on equality and Opportunity in Employment reviewed the Plan of Action at its first committee meeting and endorsed it wholeheartedly. The committee, chaired by LTG W. W. Vaughan, consists of members of the command group plus selected commanders and staff members of major subcommands and installations. It meets quarterly to assess the overall effectiveness of and to up-date the program where and when necessary.

McDaniel, Oswell Speak At Confab

Dr. John L. McDaniel, director of the Research, Development, Engineering and Missile Systems Laboratory and Herman R. Oswell, of the Laboratory's Advanced Systems Concept Office, will speak at a Tactical Missile Conference beginning today at San Diego, Cal.

The conference is co-sponsored by the American Defense Preparedness Association and the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics.

Topics covered at the conference concern the impact of recent advances in technology on tactical missile design, development and operation.

Dr. McDaniel is co-chairman of the Surface Launched Missile session, on the Thursday agenda, and will lead the summary discussion. Oswell will lead a discussion on "Some Considerations for an Artillery Rocket System."

Congress OKs Physician Bonus

WASHINGTON—The Congress last week enacted a bill which, if signed by The President, would revise the pay status for medical officers of the Armed Forces.

Physicians would receive up to \$13,500 as a bonus for each year's

extension of active Duty.

Before enactment the measure contained provisions for medical officers other than physicians (that is, dental officers, etc.) for active duty extensions but the final version excluded all but physicians from the bonus.

Gross Retroactive Salary By Grade & Step During Oct. 1, 1972 - Jan. 6, 1973

The advice is still "Don't spend it yet" but eventually white collar government workers are due retroactive pay for the period from October 1 through December 31, 1972 when President Nixon ordered the effective date of a raise set back 90 days as an anti-inflation measure. An

unofficial table has been prepared showing the gross amount of the increases. It does not cover all cases, of course. For instance, if you changed grade or step, were not paid for the full time, or were paid for overtime during the period covered, you can make your own adjustments.

Recycling: Profit's Not Impossible

However unprofitable solid waste recycling may be in some instances, in others it makes as much sense economically as it does environmentally.

Case in point: Used IBM cards, which Redstone recycles at a rate of 50 tons a year. Worth about \$90 a ton, they're of an exceptionally high quality stock.

Each year DOD recycles a couple-thousand troy ounces of silver gleaned from photographic

processing wastes here. This silver is recovered by routing the processing waste through a filter. Until recent years it went down the drain, where it not only corroded plumbing but also, because of bactericidal properties, wasn't good for the aquatic environment.


Another threat to the aquatic environment was eliminated when Redstone began recycling its waste oil, about 10,000 gallons yearly. Until last year it was used as a dust collector on roads in the range area

where rains washed it into adjacent waterways.


Redstone's biggest business from a recycling standpoint is metal salvage, with a turnover averaging about 1,000 tons a year.

Bones and fat from the commissary—some 600,000 pounds yearly—are also recycled.

Scrap wood is sold at weekly sales. Unsalable wood is used as kindling when hazardous material is disposed of by burning.





Show time is scheduled to kick-off promptly at eight.


Bill Pales Chosen For War College


The Army sort of runs in the family of LTC J. L. Lorder Jr., MICOM's Equal Opportunity Employment officer.



Seventh Army Testing

Seventh Army soldiers from Europe have landed in Florida to prepare for operational tests with the Army's Pershing ballistic missile.

They don't know when but one day soon—it could be anytime—they'll get a coded message to launch the 35-foot-long missiles under simulated tactical conditions.

"We want to make the tests as realistic as possible," said Lieutenant Colonel Donald Opel, Chief of the Pershing Operational Test Unit, who flew to Cape Canaveral with his men and equipment from bases in Germany.

"Soldiers don't know when they are to fire. They must be ready to go at any time."

CAPE LAUNCH

Missiles will be launched from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station and impact in the ocean approximately 400 miles away.

The Army this year will be testing under tactical conditions, for the first time, new and improved Pershing missiles and ground support equipment. Improvements include a new solid-state guidance section and a re-packaged power station.

The first unit to arrive at the cape is an element of Battery A, 1st Battalion, 81st Field Artillery, commanded by Major Donald Lyman. Approximately 100 strong, they are quartered at Patrick Air Force Base.

They'll return to duty stations in Germany after firing but they'll be replaced by other units during the coming weeks for additional missile tests.

OPERATIONAL 11 YEARS

The 400-mile-range Pershing has been operational for almost 11 years with battalions in the United States and Europe, including the Federal Republic of Germany Air Force, and is a major part of the NATO nuclear shield.

Operational tests, like these at the cape, help to evaluate the efficiency of both men and equipment.

Pershing returned to the cape last year after a 10-year absence. From 1963 to 1973, all training and development firings were conducted at White Sands Missile Range, N.M. The Army will continue some launches there.

Dudney Praises Stinger

Stinger can go anywhere a man can go, be fired from the shoulder, and kill maneuvering targets — even in a heavy countermeasures environment.

That's a capsule summary of what Dick Dudney, an engineer in Stinger Project Office told a national gathering just recently about MICOM's new air defense weapon now under development.

Dudney presented a paper at the National Infrared Sym-

posium on Countermeasures, hosted by Fort Monmouth. Speaking to approximately 350 attendees, he enumerated advantage of stinger, including an all aspect engagement capability; ability to counter faster, more maneuverable targets; a device to identify friendly aircraft, and an infrared counter-countermeasure capability.

"All of this is packaged in a weapon system weighing approximately 35 pounds," Dudney said. Stinger will be an all arms weapon and will give combat forces immediate air defense wherever they have to fight.

Colonel David Souser is Stinger Project Manager and directs development of the plane killer for both the Army and Marine Corps.

Army Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Ala., and James F. Conner is onsite technical supervisor for firing operations.

Colonel Edward L. Ramsey, Chief, Department of the Army Field Office, Air Force Eastern Test Range, will coordinate firing activities for the Army.

Soldiers of the Third Battalion, Ninth Field Artillery, stationed at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, have moved to the Eastern Test Range on temporary duty to support the firings.



Reid, who has been assigned at the motor pool for the past year was designated to drive General


Miley, but of course had other passengers in the course of his assignment.

Laser Guided

Hornet Launch

The Army Missile Command has successfully launched a laser-guided, seven-inch Hornet air-to-surface missile during a precision designated night firing at Redstone Arsenal.

Launched by an Army crew from an AH-1G Cobra helicopter, the missile impacted directly on the laser spot illuminated on the tank more than a mile away. The laser illuminator was ground-based.

Designation was accomplished manually during the firing run by an operator using a proto-

type Army night vision device under development by Texas Instruments.

The Missile Systems Division of Rockwell International Corporation provided the Hornet missile used in the nighttime test and the Army Laser Seeker, developed at MSD's Anaheim, California, facility under Army contract.

This most recent test was part of MICOM's continuing program to investigate and accumulate technology in missile terminal homing guidance.
