

# Trash Pickup Moves Out Front

Soldiers and their families living on Redstone Arsenal will soon share an onerous but necessary chore twice a week with those who live in town.

They'll be carrying their garbage to the street for curb pickup.

That will be a change for 830 military families. Until now, their garbage has been picked up twice each week at the rear of their homes.

The remainder of Redstone's 1171 military housing units have their refuse containers in curb side enclosures or on service roads. No change is planned in collection for those units.

As do many other military installations, Redstone contracts with a civilian firm to dispose of garbage. The General Accounting Office (GAO) noted differences in the way bases handled such contracts and criticized the Department of Defense for spending public funds for personalized garbage pickup.

One result was an Army decision to standardize garbage collection policy. A subsequent


change to Army regulations (Chg 18 to AR 210-50) said in part:

"Curbside or service drive refuse collection will be used unless another collection system provides a cost or environmental advantage to the government."

The reference to the environment was inserted to cover Alaska where snow sometimes makes it difficult if not impossible to tote garbage cans to the curb.

Redstone's garbage contract expires Oct. 31. The contract to take effect Nov. 1 will not require the contractor to provide pick up in the rear of the houses and instead will state that the cans will be moved to the curb by the housing occupants.

World wide, the GAO estimated, that having military families tote their own garbage to the curb would save millions of dollars annually. How much it will save at Redstone will be determined when the bids come in for the new contract. Under the present contract the Army pays \$3 a month per house.



## Curbside Pickup

There have been expressions of concern from some military personnel over the change. One

reason for concern is the standard Army furnished garbage can in

# Do-It-Yourself Maintenance Tried

A change in maintenance practices, on a trial basis, for family quarters in selected areas on Redstone, and increased emphasis on do-it-yourself repairs to all quarters by occupants, is coming in October. If the new maintenance program is effective, it will be extended to all quarters on the Arsenal.

Family quarters on Wadsworth, Ripley and Bomford Drives and Wherry units on Benet Circle, Buffington Drive and Flagler Plaza are covered by the new maintenance program.

It will work like this: each set

of quarters will be furnished a Family Housing Maintenance card, called an Ice card. When quarters are in need of repairs not classified as self-help, something the occupants can do themselves, the card is to be placed in a window which can be easily seen from the street. Cards should be in place no later than 8 AM on Tuesdays and Thursdays. A Facilities Engineer truck will be driving through the designated area to locate cards and take care of the maintenance problem.

If a quarters is not reached on the day the card is displayed, the

workman will visit them on the next scheduled date.

Excluded from the program are heating, air conditioning or appliance repair. These problems, and emergencies, should be called to the Housing Maintenance Unit, 876-5851.

Starting Oct. 4 in all family housing areas, requests for maintenance will be carefully screened and items considered to be a self-help nature will not be performed. Also, occupants clearing quarters will be expected to have all self-help items accomplished.

Exceptions to the self-help policy will be made for dependents residing in post housing while the sponsor is on an unaccompanied overseas tour.

Majorie Campbell, chief of the MICOM Housing Management Division, said that quarters occupants will be furnished an updated list of items available through the self-help program by Oct. 4. She emphasized that quarters occupants are not allowed to work on electrical systems except to replace light bulbs and broken switch or outlet plates.

## Deputy Secretary Here Sept. 30

William P. Clements, Deputy Secretary of Defense, will visit Army agencies at Redstone Arsenal and in Huntsville and make a speech here on September 30.

The 59-year-old Texan has been the number two man in DOD since January, 1973. Before that, he had been chairman of the board of a company whose major activity is drilling oil wells.

Clements will address a dinner meeting of the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the American Defense Preparedness Association at the Redstone Arsenal Officers Open Mess.

The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. Tickets are \$6 and may be reserved by calling 876-3005.

A graduate of Dallas public schools and Southern Methodist University, Clements served as chairman of the university's board of governors from 1965 until 1973.


## Remember Sergeant Fields?

## GI Enrollment Hits New Peak

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — A record 2,821,514 persons training under the GI Bill during fiscal year 1976 represented the peak enrollment in the 10-year educational assistance program, VA officials say.

The enrollments represented a 4.8 per cent increase over the previous year when the rate of increase over FY 1974 was 14.1 per cent.

Trainees under all VA educational programs in FY 1976 totaled 2,950,279. Training was provided 80,659 eligible sons and daughters and 19,092 spouses, widows and widowers under the dependents' educational program. A total of 29,014 disabled veterans received rehabilitation training, according to VA officials.

More than 6.5 million veterans and service personnel have received some form of training under the current GI Bill since June 1, 1966, including 5.1 million Vietnam-era veterans. During the 12-year life of the World War II GI Bill, 7.8 million persons received training. The Korean Conflict bill attracted 2.4 million participants

during its 12½-year history.

Participants rates of all those eligible under the current program have exceeded those of its two predecessors. Particularly impressive has been the 63.4 per cent participation by Vietnam-era veterans. The participation rate was 43.4 per cent among Korean War vets and 50.5 by World War II veterans.

Enrollment in college training by Vietnam-era veterans (36.0 per cent) has far surpassed trainees from World War II (14.4) and the Korean War (22.0).

New trainees in FY 1976 totaled 736,000, down from last year's 890,000. Of the new trainees, 76 per cent entered at the college level, exclusive of correspondence programs.

Veterans have eligibility for educational training for 10 years after release from active duty. For farm cooperative, apprentice or on-the-job training and flight training, eligibility ceases 10 years from date of last separation from military service after Jan. 31, 1955, or Aug. 30, 1977, whichever is later.

## MMCS Men Recieve CSM Appointments

Reaching the rank of Command Sergeant Major might appear a far shot for some Army enlisted people, but for two soldiers at the Missile and Munitions Center and School it has become reality.

Sergeants Major Billy E. Prysock and William J. Fortner, both of Company A at the school, were chosen by the Department of the Army Command Sergeants Major Selection Board in June. The board was made up of officers and CSM's.

Appointees are named at the direction of the Department of the Army to keep

worldwide CSM strength constant.

"I won't be moving into a new job right away," said Fortner, "When a vacancy comes up, in the school or MICOM, I will move into it."

Fortner, who is chief instructor for the Munitions Department, said that at first he was hesitant about applying. "I didn't think I had what it takes. But my name came up and I was chosen. 'I'm going to give it a try.'"

# EPMS — How To Get There



**O**ne challenge the Army has to deal with is how to get there (balanced grade structure) from here (promotion frustration and opportunity for advancement in career development.)

"There are several ways EPMS will correct the situation without creating an upheaval in career progress and development," says Sgt. Maj. Don Weber, a member of the EPMS Task Force.

(Details are spelled out later in this article.—Ed.)

Weber points out that once the Army brings its grade authorizations on line with the DOD grade allowance and budget, "it will allow the commander to requisition replacements with a higher assurance the requisitions will be filled with the right soldier

wearing the right stripes."

Second, it will take the sting out of MOS-mismatch and help the soldier to see his or her Army career in the right perspective.

Third, it will provide the training and education a soldier needs to have the kind of a career he or she wants.

Fourth, EPMS will establish procedures for the soldier to prove his or her qualification for promotion through performance. Opinion will have little influence on how well the soldier does the job.

"As I said in the beginning, EPMS is a program to allow a soldier to move from the bottom to the top in a job he or she likes," Weber repeats.

"Also it will allow a better opportunity for promotion by structuring each military occupational specialty (MOS) and career management field (CMF) in a similar manner."

The sergeant major gets us another cup of coffee and, as it cools, begins to explain carefully the four cornerstones of the Enlisted Personnel Management System: Training, Evaluation, Classification and Promotion.

"We used to train a soldier, classify him or her in an MOS and skill level, evaluate performance and then consider promotion," Weber continues. "That system had three flaws."

"First, it assumed the training was adequate. Second, it assumed all soldiers who finished the training were of equal competency in the acquired skill. Third, the skill identifier in some instances didn't match the grade or true level of achievement. By this I mean, a specialist six has the same skill level as a specialist four.

"Let's take the information specialist field as an example.

"After basic training, the soldier goes to a school for journalism training. The soldier who graduates at the top of the class gets the same skill identifier as the bottom graduate.

"Is it possible the number one graduate might have had a higher skill level than the soldier who graduate at the end of the class? Or that the bottom graduate might have acquired a skill level somewhere between rather than the lowest possible skill level?"

"But the way the system of personnel management was structured, both graduates were automatically given the same skill level without any attempt to measure real quality. The system assumed both graduates were equal when, in fact, they may not have been.

"In short, opinion decided the quality of performance rather than thorough evaluation.

"Yet," Weber adds, "we treated their achievement—or lack of it—with equality. The system made no provision for excellence in training and learning, excellence in performance by the soldier who cares, tries and works hard at getting ahead.

"EPMS aims to correct that by allowing a soldier to move from the bottom to the top in a job he or she likes, and with some solid help from the Army along the way," Weber says and reaches for his pen.

Weber begins to outline the training program aimed at taking a soldier to the top. The help he refers to involves five levels of specialized training.

They are BCT/AIT and four levels of NCOES: Primary NCOES, Basic NCOES to include the primary technical course, Advanced NCOES, and Senior NCOES.

"Let me point out that each level of specialized training is tied to a skill level," Weber says. I'll go into more detail on that when we get to the classification phase of EPMS."

Weber charts the NCOES training a soldier will receive or be considered for during his or her career.

He interrupts his sketching to say, "talk about a moving train! How the folks at TRADOC and here at MILPERCEN wish we could stop this freight for about a year and design the training—all cut and dried."

Weber shakes his head at the impossibility of his thought.

## Training- the first step

The sergeant major begins a discussion of training under EPMS and points out commanders will conduct two levels of NCOES training.

"First, there will be a primary NCOES course of approximately four weeks in length for combat arms soldiers. This course will be branch immaterial and train soldiers for key duty positions of grade E5. This course will be mandatory for promotion in the combat arms.

"Training at this level, for the combat support and combat service support MOS, is being worked out by the trainers. Field commanders will select attendees for this course and it (PNCOC) is new.

"Second, the Basic NCOES course will continue under EPMS. This course aims to get the E5 ready for the key jobs at grade E6. The training will be conducted at installation/division level rather than at service schools for combat arms MOSs. Combat support/service support MOS training will still go to the service school for the primary technical course training," Weber explains. "Hopefully we will train more soldiers and at the same time take fewer soldiers away from their units. We're talking about a four-plus week course with the soldier being selected for attendance by the field commander.

"Third, the Advanced NCOES course of some 10 weeks will continue under EPMS. The big change will be teaching our E6s the key duty positions of a sergeant first class. In a nutshell that means only E6s will be considered for attendance. DA will make the selection of soldiers to attend this course level training.

"Fourth, the Senior NCOES courses will prepare a sergeant first class for the duties of a master sergeant," Weber adds.

He pauses to point out that Senior NCOES will be a series of courses conducted at installation/division level in some type of nonresident mode. Participation will be by application.

"The Sergeants Major Academy has purposely not been addressed in connection with the five levels of training," Weber says. "The Academy is considered the soldier's premier school and will operate under EPMS exactly as it does today."

Weber anticipates the next question.

"Attendance at any one of these schools will expose and prepare the soldier for the skill level required at the next higher grade. School attendance alone will not guarantee promotion eligibility. Promotion will depend also on performance. Performance is still what counts in EPMS," he says.

"Just get to the part where I'm the SMA."

# Means Tells Patriot Story In Speech

"We have not reached the finish line yet, and I see no let up in the pressure, but those of us involved in the Patriot program understand the challenge, accept it, and look forward to it with confidence," Major General Charles F. Means, Patriot Project Manager, said here Thursday night.

Means, speaking to the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Association of the U.S. Army, was reviewing project management and the way the Army conducts its weapons acquisition business today, by reflecting on the Patriot air defense system, the story book success the program has enjoyed thus far, and the work that remains to be completed.

Means cited four key elements that determine success or failure of a missile program today as it moves from research and development into production and, eventually, deployment.

—Need, or requirement. Must be stated in simple words so that all people understand the need for the new weapon.

—Money. Enough of it, sometimes a lot of it. Enough particularly to meet the requirement and to cope with risks associated with new development. Ideally, dollars would be approved for the life of the program. In reality, however, funds must be sought every year—rejustified and re-argued—as part of the budget process.

—Support. From all Army elements, Department of Defense and support of Congress. "I call these corporate support," Means said, "and all these factions must be prepared to face the inevitable technical setbacks that come in the development phase." This corporate support is not always as strong as it should be.

—Technical success. The weapon system simply must work. There is no substitute for success in development programs.

Patriot, expected to be the cornerstone of field Army air defense in the sophisticated, highly technical land warfare environment predicted for the 1980s and beyond, will cost \$5.9 billion dollars—\$1.7 billion to develop, and \$4.2 billion for hardware to field.



Means

Consequently, Means for the past three years has spent a lot of time, he said, answering two basic questions about Patriot.

One is: "Will it work?"

And the other is: "Is it worth it?"

Does it work? Yes. "I don't think any system the Army has developed has gotten the study and scrutiny given Patriot," Means said.

It started in 1965. By 1973, the program had passed through five years of advanced development and entered engineering development, time enough to justify, in theory, the technical feasibility and cost effectiveness of the program. A development program costing \$900 million was approved and Raytheon, the prime contractor, was awarded \$560 million in 1972 to complete engineering development.

In 1973, however, Defense Department officials, and members of Congress, expressed concern about the projected cost of the program and Patriot technology, particularly the missile guidance concept.

"We were told to slow the development program until we could prove in actual flight tests that the guidance worked," Means explained. "We were also told to look again to determine if we still had the most effective solution for the Army's new high to medium altitude air defense system."

The decision to stop the engineering development program had major consequences.

The Patriot Project Office and the Army had to redirect the program with the contractor, get ready for a test program to prove the guidance concept, reach agreement with Army and DOD on what was required to prove that the guidance did, in fact, work.

"We had to move quickly, change just about everything we were doing and we faced increased costs and a program stretchout," Means explained, "possible causes for terminal illness." Many felt the program redirection marked the beginning of the end for Patriot.

But the government-contractor team pulled it off and the rest is history.

"We put together the proof of principle program, got 16 missiles and a year to do the job," Means said. The end result was one of the most successful flight test programs in DOD history. All test objectives were accomplished in the first six shots and of 14 guided missiles actually fired, only one was considered a failure.

Is Patriot worth the cost?

"The decision has been made that Patriot is the solution to the Army's high and medium altitude air defense needs after 1980," the general said. "We are committed to that solution. We cannot afford the time or the dollars to start over or try and come up with an alternative."

Means recalled the first firing and the excitement of that initial test.

The Army had planned to begin firings in October 1974 but had difficulty getting the hardware, had some support problems at White Sands Missile Range and needed more time to get the firing crew ready.

"It was clear to me that the future of the program depended on whether we succeeded or failed. Success was more important than time. So I decided that regardless of the pressure to fire missiles, and we had plenty, we would not fire until we were certain we had made a very possible check."

October came and went, then November, December and "... We finally fired in February." The test got off to a shaky start.

"When we arrived early at the test site, the first thing we learned was that the countdown had been stopped. All power had been lost to one of the tracking radars. We could not go without it and it took several hours to restore power. We learned that the failure was caused by a bobcat which climbed a power pole, stretched over two high voltage terminals and shorted out power to the radar."

Finally, the test proceeded and time came to launch the drone.

"We sat there listening to range communications, heard them say the drone was climbing, everything looking good, when someone suddenly said:

"The target is out of control."

Means said his first reaction was anger for it meant more delay. Then, someone on the radio said the target was headed for Launch Complex 38 and his anger turned instantly to concern — and maybe even fear.

"We were in that launch complex but, more importantly, just outside was our Patriot radar, the only one in the world and it would take nearly two years to replace. I remember thinking if the drone hits the radar, we are not meant to make it.

"Well, the drone missed the radar, but only by one hundred meters. Right then I knew we had it made. We went ahead, fired and had a text book perfect test."

By coincidence, at that very moment in Washington, Norman Augustine, Under Secretary of the Army, and Lt. Gen. Howard Cooksey, Deputy Chief of Staff for Research, Development and Acquisition, were sitting before a congressional committee defending the Army budget for Patriot.

"Someone slipped them a note and they reported our resounding success to the committee. Our corporate support had eroded but the turn around started that day. I prefer not to linger over what might have been if the note had said the test was a failure."

Good tests continued after that.

According to the Detachment Commander, 1st Lt. James Heusmann, a representative requested volunteers for the job.


"I threw it open to all permanent party members," he said.

on the causes of arthritis. The Muscular Dystrophy Association sponsors research and patient service programs for Muscular Dystrophy and related neuro-muscular diseases.

Muscular Dystrophy afflicts millions and may strike anybody, regardless of age, sex or race. Approximately two-thirds of the victims of the most virulent form of dystrophies are children between the ages of three and thirteen.

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation supports a nationwide network of more than 100 centers for

diagnosis, treatment, research and education in cystic fibrosis and other lung and related digestive diseases. It conducts programs of public and professional education, and supports research programs throughout the country.

Cystic fibrosis is inherited by approximately one of every 1,500 babies, the result of both parents carrying a recessive gene. It is estimated that one of every 20 persons is a carrier of this gene and that there are approximately ten million carriers in the United States.

Research sponsored by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is working toward a procedure in which carriers of cystic fibrosis can be identified before they have children.

## CHAMPUS Year Ends October 1

October 1 marks the start of a new year for CHAMPUS outpatient deductible certificates.

Defense Department officials remind beneficiaries of the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services that deductible certificates issued for FY 1976 will not be valid after September 30.

The outpatient deductible is the initial amount a beneficiary must pay each fiscal year before CHAMPUS assistance is available for outpatient expenses.

For an individual, the deductible is the first \$50 of authorized outpatient charges

in a fiscal year. A family group of two or more is not required to pay collectively more than the first \$100 of authorized outpatient charges in a fiscal year.

To obtain a deductible certificate, a beneficiary should accumulate itemized bills or receipts for outpatient services during a fiscal year until they total \$50 or more for one patient or \$100 or more collectively for a family.

Then, the bills or receipts should be sent, along with one claim form per patient, to the organization that processes outpatient claims for the geographic area where the beneficiary normally receives care.



use here. The cans are made of steel, cost \$22.85 and weigh about 30 pounds each, empty.

A change to curb pickup—particularly for military families living in some of the large multiplex housing units—presents the prospect of lugging the can and its contents a considerable distance.

The Housing Management Division, RASA, plans to issue plastic containers weighing six to eight pounds with first priority to multi-plex units where the carry distance to the curb will be greatest.

There are 100 light weight cans in stock, 300 on order and plans are to order more after Oct. 1 when additional funds become available. RASA does not plan to issue light weight cans to every military family unit, however, nor will there be enough light weight cans to do that.

The galvanized steel cans will continue to be issued other quarters. Military families who may wish to purchase their own refuse containers of lighter weight may do so. Unless some public health problem develops, trash bags are also an acceptable substitute.

The Housing Management Division will advise military families living in government housing of any change in garbage pickup dates that results from the new contract and how long containers may remain at the curb before being returned to the rear of the house by the occupants once collection has been completed.

Now, garbage is picked up in the quarters area twice a week, Monday and Thursday in some sections; Tuesday and Friday in others. Trash too large for containers such as brush and scrap lumber is picked up Wednesday.



Both the Army and the Hispanic Americans in uniform are coming to grips with the problems faced in the service through the equal opportunity programs.


Despite these problems, Hispanic Americans have served as soldiers since the Revolutionary War and their loyalty and devotion, in war and peace, has seldom been surpassed.

Acronyms tend to make grammarians gag, and some computers can't digest them either.


Take for example the problem this command's short title poses to computers that write and address letters.

Two letters that arrived last week shed some light on who Mr. Usamicom is. There appear to be two, one named Cdr, the other with the given name Cg. The letters to Cdr and Cg Usamicom announced a special magazine subscription offer and were over the signature of a publishing executive.

The special offer also was ex-



tended to a third Redstone addressee, Cgusa Mi Com.

Cdr's letter, more personalized than the other two, made reference to "the Usamicom household".

"I am writing this letter only to a carefully selected audience", the publishing executive confided, and "The list upon which I found your name would indicate that you are an involved and informed

individual". Also, "You can be certain that this letter is not popping up in everyone's mail in Redstone Arsl".

Letters to non-persons pop up because of the way some computers are programmed. They require input with combinations of letters resembling a name. Before being fed into the computer the acronym has to be

converted to capital and lower case letters and spaced. Sometimes an honorific such as Mr. is assigned.

"Should you decide not to accept this unique invitation", the letters to Cgusa, Cdr and Cg advised, "please do not (letter emphasis) pass it along to anyone else. We would rather that you simply throw it away". The advice was well-taken.



**PRIVATE FIRST CLASS KEN STARLIN, 5th SC** — "It's up to the woman. If she feels she's capable of qualifying in the field, let her do it. They can have anything they want as long as they can do it."



**STAFF SERGEANT JULIOUS MANNING, HHD, MICOM** — "I think if a woman is mentally and physically able to withstand the physical and mental pressures and is trained for it beforehand, they should let her. Women shouldn't be shown any special consideration and they should be made to perform their duties when they're called on. A woman should be able to function just like any other infantryman."



**SPECIALIST FIVE PAM WALLACE, 5th SC** — "It depends on the woman. Each woman should be given the opportunity to get involved in combat arms. On the other hand, those who feel they don't want to shouldn't be forced."

**SPECIALIST FOUR GARY STEVENS, HHD MICOM** — "It is more or less dependent on the woman's previous training and her mental and physical capabilities. We must be able to overcome the mores of our society that people have set down before women are fully able to participate in combat arms."



**STAFF SERGEANT GERALDINE ELY, HHD, MICOM** — "Women aren't physically built to tolerate the pressures of the field. Mentally they can take it, but physically I don't think they can. I know that I couldn't do it."



**No Go for Women in Combat**

Women have scaled one equal rights hurdle after another, with the latest being the nominations and appointments of several women to the service academies. The banning of sexual discrimination in jobs, pay, credit, housing, education and athletics was widely supported. To most people, fairness in such areas was basic. However, with the recent acceptance of women into the formerly all-male academies, many are questioning the role of women in combat.

Gaining appointment to West Point or Annapolis was a step forward for equality. But what happens after commissioning? Will women officers be assigned to administrative positions or shore berths, or will they end up in combat?

Traditionally, Army policy has ruled out assigning women to combat duties. While there is no statute specifically directing the Secretary of the Army not to make such assignments, the policy is grounded in precedent, and public and Congressional sentiment.

Title 10, U.S. Code on the Armed Forces, prohibits female members of the Air Force and Navy from being assigned to aircraft engaged in combat missions or on vessels other than hospital ships and transports.

There are existing regulations that translate national policy into the Army's own.

Army Regulation 611-201 prevents assignment of enlisted women to 35 combat or close combat support jobs.

AR 600-200 prohibits assigning enlisted women to Category I units, defined in AR 310-25 as those whose mission includes seizing and holding ground in addition to destroying the enemy or whose mission includes destroying the enemy in support of ground gaining troops.

AR 310-49 prohibits assignment of women officers to Category I units, and AR 611-101 forbids assignment of women officers to combat arms.



All teams planning to compete in the league this year are asked to have a representative at the meeting.



## Know Your Ducks!

Alabama's hunting season opens Saturday at sunrise as gunners have the opportunity to take four teal on the first of an eight day special season.

There will probably be a few duck hunters out that early, but the war begins for real at noon Saturday with the opening of the first half of the dove season.

Redstone Arsenal gunners will be allowed to hunt both teal and doves provided they have complied with other requirements.

Teal hunters, in addition, will have to have a new duck stamp. Arsenal hunters must have attended a hunter safety orientation, must have paid a \$5 fee for

an arsenal hunting permit and must have in possession a valid state hunting license.

Those planning to hunt on the state waterfowl management area at Swan Creek must also have a special permit that can be obtained at the management area office.

Once the paper work has been completed, hunters afield for teal had best know their ducks. There are three species of teal, but there are plenty of other local species including wood ducks that are not legal targets.

Dove hunters can take 12 birds each day. Shooting hours run from noon until sunset.

## Special Fund Tags on Sale

Arsenal hunting and fishing permits went on sale this week at the Rod and Gun Club with the \$5 fee earmarked for a special fund to improve wildlife habitat on post.

Individuals who apply to hunt or fish on the arsenal must produce the permit—good for one year—issued upon payment of the fee.

The Rod and Gun Club, at the northeast corner of the intersection of Martin and Patton Rds. is open from noon until 8 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and from 11 a.m. until 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The Huntsville Concert Band is open for additional membership. A meeting to sign new members will be held at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, in the band room of Westlawn School.

The group consists primarily of adult members with former musical ex-

perience in high school or college bands. The band, under direction of Ralph Dials, presents concerts in the local area.

Additional information may be obtained by calling the Arts Council at 539-2592.

The club grounds are also the site for the hunters' orientation, a mandatory stop for anyone planning to hunt on the installation.

Two orientations have been held to date with a total registration of slightly more than 1,400.

Individuals applying to hunt, including those who plan to be afield during the popular deer hunts open to the public, must have the arsenal hunting permit and must also have attended the orientation.

Two more are scheduled, on Oct. 9 and Oct. 17. Each begins at 1 p.m.

# Professionals Vote On Union Affiliation

Some 1,200 civilian employees of MICOM in professional occupations are eligible to vote in an election tomorrow to determine their desires concerning union representation.

The Fifth District, American Federation of Government Employees, petitioned the Department of Labor on behalf of Local 1858 asking for the election after at least 30 per cent of the employees in professional occupations asked for the election.

The Department of Labor will supervise the election which will be administered by MICOM.

MICOM and Local 1858 have agreed on the mechanics of the voting.

Voting will be by secret ballot at nine locations within MICOM.

The language of the ballot, specified by the Department of Labor, presents this question to the voters:

Do they wish to be represented for the purpose of exclusive recognition by Local 1858?

Notices of election posted throughout the command include a sample ballot.

Managers and supervisors of MICOM are required by DOD and

Executive Order 11491 as amended to maintain a role of neutrality as to preference for union or non-union representation, but should encourage all eligible voters to participate in the election.
