Lack of Progress Calls for New Plan

Changes are coming in MICOM's approach to EEO and the special personnel programs supporting it as a result of a study by a task force charged with finding out why things are not working and coming up with ways that will.

MG George E. Turnmeyer, MICOM commander, okayed a switch in tactics — but not in strategy — recently after hearing proposals on how the task force recommendations (See Box) will be put into effect.


"We've been trying to pass for three years and haven't made much of a gain. Now we're going to run the ball," Turnmeyer said. "What we have been doing simply has not hacked it. We have to try something new."

The report the task force produced after four months of study indicates the old ways not only did not work, they sometimes hurt.

Overly optimistic hiring and promotion goals for minorities, for example, "frustrated just about everyone concerned" while "the emotional content" of some formal EEO and Race Relations training turned people off, the study found.

The task force urged strict adherence to the merit system; emphasis on recruiting minorities and women at career entry levels and promoting from within rather than recruiting at higher grade levels.

Citing a need for much broader understanding at all levels, the

Recommendation

The MICOM Task Force studying EEO and related special personnel programs made nine specific recommendations. MG George E. Turnmeyer ordered them carried out and tasked the Civilian Personnel Division to give him progress reports every 60 days.

The recommendations include:

—Develop better data base and ways to forecast future personnel needs.

—Use available skills in the Redstone commuting area for work force analysis and to set minority hiring and promotion goals.

—Ask DA's okay to begin paying part of each MICOM co-op's college tuition...expand program from 24 to 40 spaces.

—Split the MICOM Upward Mobility program. New programs to be Growth Opportunity—OJT and schooling—to help individual get minimum qualifications to compete for a higher grade; and Advancement Training—competitive selection, OJT and schooling—promotion after satisfactory completion.

—Revise the para-trainee program...train current employees to enter career fields...set aside 40 spaces and ask DARCOM to exempt them from priority placement requirements.

—Give a two hour course on test taking techniques to help employees get ready for the PACE or similar tests.

—Use all means to increase work force understanding of personnel programs, EEO and affirmative action policies.

—Make available task force drafted brochures—Supervisor's Guide for Personnel Management and Affirmative Action; Employee's Career Development Guide; Guide for Prospective Employees and an information pamphlet on PACE.

—Assign Equal Employment Opportunity Officer a larger role in recruiting qualified minorities.

As specific actions are taken, additional information on them and the task force findings, will be published in this newspaper and passed to individuals by other means.

report also called for "realistic" goals consistent with expected job openings and people likely to be available for recruitment.

Although special training programs have caused individual hopes to rise, the report said, declining hires and promotion chances locally have slowed EEO progress and probably will continue to do so for two to three more years. It adds that things will not improve much until cut backs in local federal employment and pressures to roll back grades ease up, making the point that both these factors are beyond local control.

While the task force forecasted rough sledding for a few more years, it predicted a radical change in about four years when "serious trained personnel shortages" are expected to open new opportunities for hiring and promotion. It urged overhaul of personnel programs to set up a mechanism now to get people

ready to move up when the opportunities come.

Luther F. Adams, MICOM Civilian Personnel Officer, asked for the special study last January. Convinced local programs had bogged down, Adams went to Turnmeyer and got a quick okay for an internal study to find ways to get things moving.

Named in March, the task force finished its work in late July. Operating under Adams' direction, the group, headed by Col. Robert W. Gruen, included: Marian S. Czachowski, ILD; Bobby F. McDonald, Maintenance; William L. Strickland, R&D; Herbert H. Ward, P&P; Elizabeth Watkins, DMIS, and for a time, Joel D. Mathis, Product Assurance. Charles Ray, EEEO; Jimmy Temple, CPD, and Mary Spears, CPD, were advisors and ex-officio members.

Gruen, who formerly managed missile system and is now Chief of Plans & Analysis, candidly calls the assignment to head the study the toughest of his 23 year Army career.

He found EEO a subject of intense emotionalism, helped produce a report that he agrees may be attacked as a "management cop out" because it tries to explain MICOM's lack of progress.

But he adds quickly, "People who say our report is an excuse for inaction just haven't read it thoroughly."

Gruen has read it, in fact wrote much of the several hundred pages which include 12 annexes.

With the resigned shrug of someone who has heard the cop out charge before, he continues: "We tried to tell the truth as it came to us as we picked our way through the emotionalism and the frustration."

Emotionalism and frustration, Gruen believes, basically have two causes: little or no chance to hire and promote, coupled with widespread misunderstanding.

"Equal employment opportunity is not what people think it is," Gruen says patiently. "Many people in MICOM see it as a program of preferential treatment for blacks and to a lesser extent, women. EEO is what the law says it is...opportunity without regard to race or sex...The law says you cannot use preferential treatment for or against anyone.

"No amount of talking on our level will change the law. There's no sense getting upset about conditions beyond our control."

Lack of understanding is even more evident in attitudes of

managers, supervisors and employees toward affirmative action, Gruen says. One reason is that "the rhetoric of affirmative action is beautiful, but it is very short on specifics of just what it is or what it allows or requires you to do. One thing for certain, it is not a mandate to compromise standards or license to violate the law.

"The best affirmative action we can take now is to make a conscious effort to broaden our recruiting base. We must recruit more among blacks and women and encourage them to compete, compete for jobs as the merit system says they must compete."

Following the merit system is a recurring theme in the report. Making the system work is the way to go, Gruen asserts, rather than looking for ways to circumvent it as some employees, supervisors and managers suggest when asked for ways to help the EEO program.

And making the system work, he adds, is a job for everyone, not just the special task of the Civilian Personnel Division or the MICOM Commander.

Gruen said he began the study with a soldier's "built-in prejudice" for the civilian merit system, but emerged with new respect and appreciation for it. "Somewhere along the way I discovered it is a good system. If there is something wrong with it, it's the way people try to bend it to gain special advantages."

"Realism" and "rationality" are other recurring themes as Gruen talks about the task force report.

"MICOM must set realistic, and attainable goals," for example, aim for targets it can hit rather

than those well out of range and which simply set management up to fail, Gruen says.

"But it is not just the numbers," he adds. "We've got to change the way we think about goals. They are not quotas as many believe, but instead represent things we should be able to achieve with full support from everyone taking full advantage of all that is feasible and proper."

The thing to do now, he says, is to get ready to take advantage of new opportunities when they come by gaining a better understanding of EEO and affirmative action and what they allow or require us to do."

"We must overhaul programs through which people can advance themselves and through which jobs at all grade levels can become available to everyone without regard to race, sex or for other reasons unrelated to ability, fitness and potential for doing a good job."

CU Growing

The credit union attained a monthly growth rate of 2.0 percent in accounts under \$20,000. According to Ganzfried, this rate of growth was well above the average for Federal credit unions of similar size.

On July 31, the RFCU had 62,341 members with total savings of \$94,259,062.

Luther Adams is President of the credit union and Colonel Arthur Lange, serves as Treasurer.

Civilian, Military Raises

President Ford approved a pay raise of 4.83 percent for military and an average pay raise of 4.83 percent for GS grade federal employees. In approving that amount, he went along with the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission and the Office of Management and Budget.

The raise brings the Federal employee salaries more in line with those of private industry.

The revised military pay scales are printed in today's Rocket, the new civilian schedule was printed in the Rocket of August 25.

The increase for GS civilian employees will average 4.83 percent but an employee's actual raise will vary depending upon the person's grade. Upper-level executives will receive the largest increase with a 7.92 percent and lower grades will receive an increase of 4.24 percent.

The pay raise for military members will be effective on October 1. The raise for civilians at Redstone was effective starting October 3 and will be reflected for the first time in checks mailed during the week of October 25.





The overall raise of 4.83 percent for the military translates into a wide range of new pay and allowance rates, effective Oct. 1, as shown in the accompanying tables. Only subsistence cash is increased by direct application of the overall percentage. Under new authority granted by Congress, one-quarter of the basic pay increase is shifted into quarters allowance rates, in addition to the regular 4.83 percent BAQ raise. As a result, basic pay goes up only 3.62 percent and BAQ by nine to 16 percent, depending on

grade. Those people without dependents who do not draw full cash BAQ will receive a new partial BAQ in cash, representing most of the money shifted from their basic pay into BAQ. Barring a last minute enactment by Congress, pay for O-8 and higher will jump to \$3300 per month. Basic pay for the top enlisted member in each service will rise to \$1652.10 monthly. General and flag officers drawing the new top basic pay rates will receive more than their politically-appointed civilian bosses in Executive Level V.





Basic Increase Includes Allowances

Military personnel received a pay raise October 1, 1976, but not everyone with the same rank and time will be taking home equal pay checks.

Bachelors and personnel living off post will receive a little bit more. The reason—President Ford plans to reallocate twenty-five per cent of the October 1 pay raise to the Basic Allowance for Quarters (BAQ).

Under the President's pay shift program announced by Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld, the basic pay raise will be 3.52 per cent. The quarters allowance increases from 9.64 to 16.33 percent depending on rank. Basic Allowance for Subsistence will increase the same as the original pay raise—4.83 percent.

Payment of a partial quarters allowance, equal to the amount of the BAQ increase will be made to those members of the Armed Forces without dependents, who are on sea or field duty or who reside in military bachelor quarters.

President Ford is exercising his authority under the FY 77 Department of Defense Appropriation Authorization Act which was signed into law by the President on July 14, 1976 as Public Law 94-361.

Section 303 of the law gives the President discretionary authority to reallocate up to 25 per cent of basic pay increases into the quarters or subsistence allowances in addition to the amount of the regular raise. The decision this year was to put a full 25 per cent into BAQ and make no reallocation into BAS.

A cash partial BAQ payment, ranging from \$3.90 per month for E-1s to \$29.40 per month for generals, will go to bachelors who are not drawing full cash BAQ. The payment is being made to bachelors because of the lower value of quarters provided them.

The Department of Defense has been seeking changes in the law to give the President more flexibility in the way military pay raises are distributed in order to attempt to correct BAQ and BAS levels to make them more nearly equal to the costs they are intended to offset.

Currently, when pay raises are given, the overall average percentage—of those increases is applied equally to quarters allowance, subsistence allowance and basic pay. This procedure does not permit the level of the cash allowances to respond adequately to changes in the costs of the services they are intended

to procure or to recognize the value of military housing.

The current average cost of off-post housing is significantly above BAQ rates; the average value of government family housing is substantially above current BAQ rates; and military bachelor housing has an average value substantially below current BAQ rates.

The method used to calculate the reallocation was calculated separately for each pay grade, based on the average basic pay of all the people in that grade. An individual shift of basic pay into BAQ was not used because it would have produced different BAQ rates at every longevity pay rate of the basic pay table.

Under the method used some people will receive a small net

gain others will have a small loss. The wide range of overall percentage increases in BAQ, based on rank, are caused by the fact that basic pay becomes an increasingly higher percentage of the pay and allowances total as one rises in rank.





Moves Taxable

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Extra cash made on Do-It-Yourself (DITY) moves is taxable, say DA officials. Soldiers choosing to move themselves could be money ahead, but taxed on it, if the actual moving expenses do not exceed 75 percent of the estimated cost.

The incentive payment will be considered income and subject to federal withholding tax. The finance and accounting office will withhold 20 percent of the extra money and report it on the W-2 for that year.

DITY has been in operation since June 1 and is seen as an opportunity for soldiers, who don't mind the hassle of moving, to get paid for their own efforts. An initial estimate is made of the cost of the move by the installation transportation office. If the soldier is able to make the move for less than 75 percent of that estimate the rest goes to the soldier.





BMDSCOM Notices Passed Out

Formal notices were issued Oct. 6 to 181 Army civilian employees affected by an internal realignment and reduction in manning level at BMDSCOM.

This action is a further step in the implementation of the reduction-in-force announced in February of this year.

Civil Service reduction-in-force procedures are being used to protect the rights of individuals involved.

In summary form, the actions taken were: 181 individuals received notices; of that total 54 were offered reassignment to another job at the same grade level and rate of pay within BMDSCOM; 64 others were offered another job at a lower pay grade within BMDSCOM; 63 got notices of separation. Effective date for all actions is Dec. 10.

At the time of the February announcement there were 232 civilian employees in the com-

requirements for manpower as a result of the deactivation of the major portion of the Safeguard Ballistic Missile Defense System in North Dakota.



Soldier's Friendly Ear — Counselor

Counseling young soldiers can be tense at times. Lt. Col. Wesley A.G. Baasen, the Missile and Munitions Center and School's newly-arrived chaplain, knows that all too well.

During one session, a bitter soldier hunched over a 38-cal. pistol he said was loaded, spinning the barrel, muttering, "I'm gonna get that guy."

Baasen gathered his wits and said, "I hope it's not this guy."

The soldier rose, raised the gun and discharged it at the ceiling. The shot was blank.

At 47, Baasen (he tells people it's pronounced Bah-son) is beginning his tenth arrangement with his arrival at Redstone. His office at the old Post Chapel awaited emptily the arrival of his books. A half-dozen glass cases stared at him, reflecting his measured motions as he spoke.

"I see the job of the Chaplain Corps to be one of serving the troops any way we can," he said. "We are a friendly ear to the soldier. I would like to make soldiers feel that, in confidence of course, they can confide in the

the volunteer Army, but very little, comparatively speaking. The major problems soldiers have now are family-related—money, travel, family separations."

Born in Waco, Baasen graduated from Giddings (Tex.) High School in 1946 and went on to Texas Lutheran College, where he was a tackle on the football team. He received a degree in physical education in 1951. The next four years he spent preparing for the Lutheran ministry at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa.

Following his ordination in June 1955, he spent time as a pastor in two parishes in rural Texas and at a mission church in Shreveport, La. When his church announced a shortage of Lutheran chaplains in the services, he signed up with the Army.

"A problem I've had to confront during my ministry is how to be a pastor—a director, leader, and helper—to officers and NCO's and enlisted men of the lowest grades," Baasen said. "I like to stress availability. I want to be a friend and confidant to all soldiers, and sometimes I feel that the commander has the loneliest job in the Army. He also needs a friend.

"With me, counseling is part humanistic, part religious. Religious convictions form a backdrop—I don't want to clobber a fellow over the head with religion, but I don't hesitate to

draw in all resources, specifically Christian resources.

"The average chaplain has three congregations, I think. There are those people who he sees steadily on Sunday mornings, there is the group he sees when he visits the company areas, and there are those who come to his office for help. And there's very little overlap."

From Ft. Gordon, Baasen was sent to Korea, where he became an itinerant preacher for widely scattered HAWK air defense units. He then spent a year with a military police battalion at Ft. Hood, Tex., duty which included counseling at the stockade. In 1968, he was a brigade chaplain with the Second Armored Division, and the next year he was in Vietnam.

Following the Chaplains' Career Course at Ft. Hamilton, N.Y., he returned to advanced individual training infantry units, this time at Ft. Jackson, S.C. In 1973, he arrived in Germany to assume administrative responsibility for 12 chapels in a 1,700 square mile area around Nuremberg. While there, he organized a series of "rolling retreats" to places like Dachau, the Berlin Wall and the Nuremberg Palace of Justice, site of the war crimes trials.

"The rolling retreats were meant to draw a subtle link between places and Christian principles," Baasen explained.


Another time, Baasen was trying to help a soldier sunk in depression. At the end of the conversation, the man produced a long-bladed knife and asked the chaplain to take it. He had bought it that afternoon, planning to slit his throat. Baasen had talked him out of it.

He is a big man whose kindly smile creases the skin of his taut Texas face, a sympathetic listener who's careful about questioning the motives of people who need help. Reminiscing about soldiers he's known, his words toned with fatherliness, he seems the sort of man a potential suicide could trust.

chaplain. I've told troops, 'Do anything you like, but I hope you don't forget I'm your friend.'"

Baasen's first assignment after completing the Chaplain Basic Course at Ft. Slocum, N.Y., was with infantry advanced individual training students at Ft. Gordon, Ga. He remembers that in those draftee days, counseling at the chapel went on all day and two nights every week.

"Soldiers would line up down the hall and fill the front rows of the chapel," Baasen recalled. "In those AIT days, I saw many who wanted out of the Army—there were many who were unable to cope. We still have some of this in

"Maybe nobody got the point, but then again . . .

"I'm very new here, so I can't speak with authority on what's

needed, but I'd like to get involved with dependents. Many dependent wives, I suspect, are cloistered at home all day while their husbands

Showboat's a 'comin'

The cry of "Showboat's a 'comin'!" will herald the riverboat Sergeant Floyd into the ports of Gunterville and Decatur later this month. The Army Corps of Engineers' Bicentennial exhibit will make these stops as part of an 18,000-mile celebration voyage.

This living display of Corps and river history will be at the Gunterville Marina from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Veteran's Day, October 25. Then the Floyd will move downstream to the Decatur small boat harbor, opening from 2 p.m. until 9 p.m. on the 26th, and again 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. on the 27th.

Thirteen exhibits on board include memorabilia from early riverboat days and presentations on the history of the Corps of Engineers. The main display, uses 12 projectors and over 900 slides to follow the Corps from its beginning in 1775 up to present-day missions. The Floyd's red, white, and blue barge serves as a floating platform for local exhibits and entertainment.

The Sergeant Floyd is a 138-foot towboat, first commissioned in 1932 and heavily used on the Missouri River. Scheduled for scrapping, she was saved for her Bicentennial role. The refurbished craft pulled out of St. Louis June 17 for her grand final voyage.

The Floyd's route is a litany to the past: rivers pi, Missouri, Ohio, Cumberland, and Chattahoochee have borne her on her way, while ports such as St. Louis, Cairo, Memphis, Vicksburg, and New Orleans have made her welcome.

Her name is that of Sergeant Charles Floyd, the engineer who accompanied Louis and Clark in 1804 and died near the site of Sioux City, Iowa.

New Ideas for Laser

Dr. George Dezenberg, a research electronic engineer in the High Energy Laser Directorate, has been awarded the Secretary of the Army's Research and Study Fellowship to study and research new laser systems.

He will attend the University of Arizona for one year.

"The object of the proposed study program is to define and



experimentally evaluate new laser systems or advanced laser concepts that are of potential use to the Army, Dezenberg said.

"I hope that by working with the leading laser scientists such as Drs. Marlan Scully, Willis Lamb, (a Nobel prize winner) Peter Franken, Murray Sargent, and others, at the Optical Sciences Center of the University of Arizona for a year, I will be able to bring some new ideas back to MICOM and initiate an effort to develop the next generation of Army lasers."

Dezenberg has a bachelors degree from Auburn, a masters from the University of Arkansas and a doctorate from Georgia Tech. All degrees are in electrical engineering.

He has been at Redstone since 1965 when he came here for a two-year Army tour, then continued as a civilian employee. "My work has been in the same field since I first came to the Arsenal," he said.

Promotions Lower Second Straight Month

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — Promotions for grades E-5 through 0-6 are down for the second month in a row. DA officials say that November promotions will total 5,565. There are 6,589 October hikes planned.

Total enlisted promotions number 5,071 and will include 3,500 to E-5; 800 to E-6; 518 to E-7;

130 to E-8 and 123 to E-9. After the November hikes, 6,696 names remain on the E-7 list; 1,777 on the E-8 list and 739 names remain on the E-9 list.

Promotions to E-5-6 are made from local lists per DA published monthly promotion cutoff scores for each MOS.


DA officials forecast that

November officer hikes will total 494. There were 874 October promotions and about 905 officers promoted in September.

Officer promotions schedules call for 18 hikes to colonel; 104 to lieutenant colonel and 23 to major. Also tabbed for promotion are 185 to captain; 14 to CWO-4 and 50 to CWO-3.

After the November officer promotions 632 names will remain on the 0-6 list; 1,447 on the 0-5 list; 1,771 0-4s and 689 names remain on the CWO-4 list and 664 on the CWO-3 list.

HOW DO YOU LOOK AT THE REST OF THE SEASON?





Rockwell Wins Hellfire Contract

The Missile Command awarded approximately \$66.7 million to Rockwell International last week for engineering development of the Hellfire missile system, planned as the primary armament on the Army's new Advanced Attack Helicopter for use against hardpoint targets.

Colonel Robert J. Feist, Hellfire Project Manager, said Rockwell will perform most of the work at Columbus, Ohio, but that propellant loading and final assembly will be performed at Redstone under subcontract with Thiokol Chemical Company.

The Cost Plus Incentive Fee contract will be funded over five years.

Hellfire is a modular missile system that will provide the Army

with a family of terminal homing seeker modules, and a common airframe to engage a variety of tank and other hardpoint targets.

The initial Hellfire configuration will utilize semiactive laser guidance but the modular design can accommodate future terminal homing seekers, as technology matures, without completely redesigning the system.

The Hellfire Program has just completed two years of advanced development under competitive contracts to Rockwell and Hughes Aircraft Company.

"We demonstrated Hellfire's technical feasibility, accomplished all major test objectives established for Advanced Development, and brought the user into the program early in

development," Colonel Feist said.

Hellfire Project Office asked industry last April for their detailed approach for full scale development of the Hellfire system. Rockwell and Hughes submitted proposals in July.

The Army evaluated the proposals and selected Rockwell on the basis of cost, management, technical proposals and performance.

During engineering development, Rockwell will design, build, test and evaluate Hellfire equipment which includes the missile, launcher, ground and logistics support equipment. The company will also provide documentation to support production.

"Hellfire is perhaps one of the Army's most tested missile

systems at this stage of development," Feist said.

The Missile Command has demonstrated Hellfire's accuracy and versatility with direct and indirect launches from the ground and helicopters, against both stationary and moving targets. Army combat soldiers from the Armor and Aviation Schools have fired several missiles.

Soldiers normally don't get their hands on new equipment until much later in the development cycle, usually during operational tests, just prior to a production decision.

MICOM's Procurement and Production Directorate, headed by Colonel Benjamin Register, negotiated the contract for the Army. Fred Segrest was the contracting officer.

In producing this paper, nickel is used. Press reports state that in burning this paper, the carbon monoxide resulting from the burning process mixes with the nickel contained in the paper to produce a tasteless, odorless and colorless poison, nickel carbonyl.
