

## Former Aide Heads MLK Observance



The Reverend Doctor Wyatt Tee Walker, resident minister of the Canaan Baptist Church of Christ in Harlem will speak at Redstone Arsenal's annual observance of the late Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday.

This year's observance on Friday, January 14, will consist of a reception for Rev. Walker at the Bicentennial Chapel at 10:30 A.M., the memorial service in the chapel at 11, and a luncheon for guests of the command at the Officers' Club immediately afterward.

Soldiers and government employees who wish to attend the memorial service on the Arsenal may do so without charge to leave.

However, attendance of off-post memorial activities must be charged to annual leave.

The memorial service is also open to the public.

Rev. Walker was executive director and chief of staff of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference for Dr. King from 1960 through 1964, a period considered to be the most important years of the nonviolence movement. Rev. Walker served as organizer for the movement which grew around

the charismatic leadership of Dr. King.

After earning a chemistry-physics degree with top honors from Virginia Union University in 1950, Rev. Walker turned to the ministry, took two degrees in religion there and later a doctorate from Colgate-Rochester School of Divinity, while serving as minister at the historic Gillfield Baptist Church in Petersburg, Virginia.

Rev. Walker and Dr. King met while in college. In 1958 Dr. King named Rev. Walker to the National Board of the SCLC, then in 1960 promoted him to chief of staff.

In 1965 Rev. Walker became pulpit minister of the Abyssinian Baptist Church of New York, the largest single Protestant congregation in the world. He also handled an executive role in the Negro Heritage Library Publishing Company, a firm devoted to cataloging the Black role in American history.

From 1966 until 1975 Rev. Walker served in New York as Special Assistant to the Governor on Urban Affairs. In the early 1970's he was visiting or adjunct professor at three major seminaries.

## Downgrade Actions Continue To Reduce

Federal managers agree that the acid test for a Civilian Personnel operation comes during a reduction in force.

MICOM's Civilian Personnel Division is in the midst of concluding what may be the largest transfer of function ever, staffing two new commands simultaneously by tracking and transferring more than 7,000 full time civilian employees.

Everyone got a job offer.

Only 169 had to be offered downgrades on Nov. 22. Many of these are getting better offers, and the number of downgrades is expected to be reduced substantially.

Anyway you want to measure it, the CPD staff did very well. People in CPD say they did the best they could, and by any standard used to measure what they did, their best was very good indeed.

Since early October the doors in Civilian Personnel Division buildings have seldom been closed until well into the night. They've been open on Saturdays and Sundays like any other work day.

Many, many employees in CPD poured effort into assigning people to new jobs in MIRCOC and MIRADCOM.

"Something most people didn't realize is that we spent hours and often days, trying to save people from being downgraded," Berney Waite of CPD said. "We'd work and work to find a way to avoid downgrades." Waite headed the CPD group placing people in MIRCOC.

And Helen Hughes, who headed the group placing those who transferred to MIRADCOM, added, "It paid off. We had a much higher figure initially, and we now have it down to a total of only 67 downgrades in MIRCOC, MIRADCOM and RASA.

We're deeply concerned about people, and are continuing to do whatever it takes to reduce those numbers. This will go on until the end of January as retirements, reassignments, promotions, transfers and resignations create vacancies. People being

downgraded are priority candidates for all vacancies for which qualified.

Hughes and Waite said their teams had been aided by people from throughout the Command. Managers detailed individuals to help, or loaned them as required. This is still going on.

The Directorate for Management Information Systems printed more than 6,000 letters of offer as well as retention registers and other documents used in the placement process. The assistance provided by the Technical Services Branch of CPD in coordinating the services of DMIS was invaluable.

People from all branches of Personnel volunteered to help after regular duty hours and on weekends. Hughes explained how she had rotated personnel in her Branch to perform different phases of the operation so that each would get overall experience. "If we have another such realignment in the future,

these people will be ready to work on it. They've had the experience," she said.

"During the whole operation there was no concern about who did what. Everyone was willing to do what was needed to be done. We all made xeroxes, compiled lists, checked records. There was excellent esprit de corps. It was share and share alike."

At the same time all this activity was in progress, CPD had to carry on their normal recruitment and placement of critical personnel. Managers were asking for people in areas that were building up, and they needed them as soon as possible to get on with their missions.

Each time before one of these jobs was filled, a careful review and search was made of records to assure there were no violations of rights of people already in the workforce. "We went through the RIF rooms to check and double check on people involved in transfer of function," Hughes and Waite said.

# Let's Get With It!

The soldier who tries to stuff a 38 inch belly into 34 inch fatigues is going to find that just buying larger pants won't solve his problem anymore.

Since the Chief of Staff, General Rogers, assumed his duties, there has been greater emphasis on physical fitness and appearance. The Chief is an old soldier and knows that it is important, "We just have to have soldiers with stamina, who don't get defeated on the battlefield just by fatigue or poor physical condition," he said.

The old PT and Weight Control book, AR 600-9 has been thrown out and the new version will really lay down the law. Some of the items in the new reg. will include new weight scale, one that is tougher and very realistic, every officer and soldier (regardless of age or duty) will get with the PT program on a regular basis and everyone under the age of 40 will take a PT test and be expected to pass it.

Obese troops will find themselves visiting the dispensary to get rid of some of the excess fat. Chapter 2 of the new reg. spells out just how much you can carry around. It also divides overweight and obese into two categories. A soldier may be overweight (muscular and big boned) and not be obese. If a soldier is just plain fat with no medical explanation, the doctor will recommend a weight reduction plan. Any GI with history of obesity who doesn't respond to weight reduction may find himself taking off his uniform for good.

PT and Fat are not the only items that the Chief has in mind. He talks appearance too, "We've made a commitment to the public and to our Congress, to our Commander-in-Chief, to the Department of Defense, that today's Army is going to have soldiers that look like soldiers!" As to what the Army is going to do about it, "We are going to hold the officers and NCOs responsible, to insure that their soldiers look like soldiers. Because example starts at the top, you can't have a leader who is an officer or NCO who is trying to implement a weight control or appearance program when he himself is fat and sloppy," he added.

For alot of soldiers, the new reg. won't be a best seller, but it spells out the message loud and clear . . . "Get with it!"

## Parts to Europe

WASHINGTON (ARNEWS) — DA officials are going to ease the strain for repair parts in Europe. According to Maj. James Hitch, Supply Policy Branch, DCSLOG, Army staffers are testing an "Air Line of Communication" for repair parts.

The test, combining the efforts of the Army Materiel Development and Readiness Command, Military Airlift Command and USAREUR and 7th Army, began this week.

The plan calls for the shipment of 13,500 short tons of repair parts to Europe by air during FY 77. The parts are placed on pallets and shipped from the New Cumberland Army Depot through the Military Airlift Command to Rhein Main and Ramstein airbases in Germany.



Jr. Officer of Month . . . . CWO2 Crabb

The first thing Chief Warrent Officer 2 Richard L. Crabb does when he comes to work every morning is sit down and listen to a pair of tape recorders.

During Alabama's night, calibrations problems can arise for Army activities during the day in such places as Germany or Guam. Crabb's tape recorders in the U.S. Army's Metrology and Calibration Center at Redstone are attached to special direct-line telephones linking them with Army units throughout the world.

Callers describing their problems are recorded, Crabb plays them back, then while the other side of the world sleeps, calibrations specialists troubleshoot them here. Then Crabb tapes the solutions for playback on a return call that night.

CWO2 Crabb has been selected as the Junior Officer of the Month by RASA. He is from the 95th Service Company and is assigned to the Metrology and Calibrations Center as supervisor for Army calibrations activities overseas.

Crabb joined the Army in 1961 in his hometown of Clovis, N.M. He served in Aberdeen, Europe, Okinawa, Vietnam, and Korea before coming to Redstone. During the past 16 years he has worked in radar repair, air defense technology, radio propagation activities, and finally Calibration.

Crabb completed his education at the Roentgen Institute of Physical Science, a part of the University of Wuerzburg, and in Germany. He holds a Bachelor's and a Master's Degree in communication electronics from Wuerzburg.

## Instructor Reaps Suggestion Bonanza

Wesley C. Ruth, an instructor at the Missile and Munitions Center and School, has been awarded two checks totaling \$945 for suggestions he made for improving the Nike missile radar simulator used in training at the school.

Ruth, who has worked at MMCS over 14 years, received the awards through the Department of the Army suggestion program. He teaches simulator operation and repair in Nike Division.

He was awarded \$520 for suggesting that insulators between transistors and heat sinks in the acquisition chaff simulation circuits be removed, and \$25 for suggesting the removal of insulators in the simulator power supply. Com-

pared, the improvements are expected to save an estimated \$4,785 in operating costs yearly.



# MARED Applications

MICOM officials are urging eligible employees to apply for DARCOM's 1977 Materiel Acquisition and Readiness Executive Development (MARED) program now open to individuals in grades 13, 14, and 15 who have significant duties directly related to supply, procurement, quality and reliability assurance, materiel maintenance management and science and non-construction engineering.

Applications must reach Activity Career Program Managers by Jan. 21.

Instructions for applying were sent to more than 1200 MICOM employees last week.

The program offers an opportunity for eligible personnel to receive competitive training that could lead to top flight positions, Grade 16 or higher, in DARCOM or other elements of the Department of Defense. Both formal training and developmental productive work assignments which challenge and expand managerial and technical abilities are included for personnel selected to participate in MARED.

Individuals who apply must be willing to relocate or move to other organizations, and must remain in Federal Service for a minimum of five years. Those nominated for the 1976 MARED program and not selected must re-apply for the 1977 program.

Intent of MARED is to develop individuals so they will be ready to assume higher level positions as vacancies occur. Promotions come about as the result of competitive procedures under the

appropriate career program or other merit procedures.

Instructions sent to eligible employees said that, "In addition to basic requirements for applying, personnel must have demonstrated high level intelligence, initiative, imagination, judgment and superior potential for advancement to managerial positions of great responsibility."

Basically the application and nomination process consists of: application by the employee; rating by his or her supervisor; indorsement by the Activity Career Program Manager; technical review by the Civilian Personnel Office; review and rating by the MICOM MARED Board, and nomination by the Commander.

Application, supervisory appraisal and Individual Development Plan forms may be obtained from Jessie Blevins or Dorothy Graham, Civilian Personnel Division Training and Development Branch, Bldg. 7437, Room 128, or by calling 876-5850 or 876-5814. Further information about the program may be obtained from the MICOM MARED Action Officer, Delia Black, at 876-5814. Three MICOM employees were selected for the 1976 MARED program, Ernest Young and Henry J. Valades of Maintenance, and James H. Seagraves of the ARTADS Project Office.

All applications, complete with appraisals and Individual Development Plans in original and 10 copies must be forwarded to the Activity Career Program Manager. Applications not submitted through channels cannot be accepted.

The WO4 portion of the board will consider WO3s from the primary zone with a date of rank not later than Sept. 30, 1972.



# Coffee Going Up in Vending Machines, Too


Coffee is America's No. 1 beverage. It gets us to work and helps keep us going.

Coffee was important to Americans as far back as the revolution in 1776, and even before. (Rumor has it that the Boston Tea Party of 1773 would have ended 10 minutes earlier if the participants hadn't insisted on taking a coffee break). And it's not too far-fetched to envision a modern day revolution—in the offices and factories throughout our land—if coffee was not available to all of us at work.

According to Joel and Karl Shapira, authors of "The Book of Coffee and Tea," the United States imported 20,288,508 bags or 2.7 billion pounds of coffee in 1975—and that is virtually all of the coffee consumed in the U.S. During 1975, actual coffee drinkers consumed an average of 3.6 cups a day, while overall consumption totalled more than 13 pounds per person.

Well, coffee drinkers, you've been paying more for your cup of coffee at home and in your favorite restaurant (in case you haven't noticed). Now brace yourselves, for the day of reckoning is close at hand here at Redstone. What we're really trying to explain, as gently as possible, is why the price of coffee in the vending machines soon will be increased to 20 cents. We're not happy about the news, neither are our coffee vendors.

We're sure that you won't be either. But a glance at the accompanying chart may help you understand why higher prices are necessary.



\*The cost of coffee has risen in excess of 147% from July 1975 until now!

Why such a giant increase in the price of coffee beans in the past 18 months? The reasons are numerous and include a frost in Brazil, a civil war in Angola, torrential rains in Colombia, and an earthquake in Guatemala—all the key coffee-producing nations. These and other factors have cut down

the coffee supply; in the face of constant demand, prices are forced higher and higher both at the wholesale and retail level.

So drink up, savor every mouthful...and while the price outlook is not very encouraging, let's hope some relief is on the way.





# Born To Illustrate

Careers sometimes spring from youthful mischief. Boyish deviltry grows into a man's handiwork, often to the amazement of parents and teachers who find themselves praising what they once scorned.

So it was with the artistic career of Thomas H. Darling—he signs his work Tom Darling—who has worked in the Graphic Arts Department at the Missile and Munitions Center and School since 1959 and now is its chief. He first flexed his talent for illustration clandestinely at Christ Church School, a preparatory academy he attended in Saluda, Va.

"Sitting in church I found that illustrating empty pages of church books was more fun than listening to the service," Darling recalled recently. "In study hall at school I could do a lot of drawing as long as I pretended I was working."

"I got caught. I was given a few demerits. That's how I got started."

For a while, it was simply an entertaining way to pass the time, but when Darling reached the age when decisions had to be made on the course of his life, his older brother, who also had a flare for drawing people and things, stepped in. It was my brother who persuaded my parents to send me to art school," Darling said.

The school was at the Museum of Industrial Arts in Philadelphia, and Darling studied there from 1931 to 1933, after which he moved to Washington, D.C., to attend fine art classes at the Corcoran Galleries for two years. On the side, Darling began taking assignments from Washington art editors and advertisers. Much of his free-lance work was for the monthly magazine of the National Dental Association and other health organizations.

Upon completing his studies at Corcoran, Darling was hired as art director for the Washington Times-Herald, a night job that involved supervising photo copying, enlargement, and reduction. "It was hard work," he recalled. "We worked six days a week and sometimes seven."

But Darling's schedule still permitted some free-lancing during the day, so he

secured art accounts of various advertisers in the city while also continuing his submissions to the dental association.

World War II brought Darling's Washington years to a close. In 1942, he entered the Navy, choosing medical illustration as his career field based on his free-lance experience. When his hitch was up in 1945, he set his sights for New York City, again anxious to plunge into commercial art.


He free-lanced for the next 14 years, submitting illustrations to numerous art editors. At one point, he was hired by Schenley Distilleries to animate a trio of movies on penicillin. Free-lancing was arduous and chancy, a cycle of assignments on short notice, hectic sketching and inking in, tight deadlines, and insubstantial compensation — if the editor liked your work.

One of Darling's employers was the Street and Smith publishing house, for which he drew highly romantic action illustrations for the old Doc Savage, Astonishing Stories and Shadow series. "The art editor would call on a Monday, say, with galley proofs and say he needed as many as 12 illustrations for each of three or four stories in each book," said Darling. "I'd have a week's time, often less. They wanted things fast."

He succeeded at keeping pace with editors' demands, however, eventually prospering at it. "In 1947 I made enough money in about eight months to put a down payment on a house," Darling said. "I used to get \$18 a page for comic book illustration."

In 1952, Darling's drawing of a single candle in an old-fashioned holder—"just something I remembered from my childhood," he recalled—won first place in the annual Christmas seal competition of the Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association. The candle appeared on the stamps that year.

In the late fifties a device called the teleprompter gained popularity in Army education. Teleprompters consisted of a printed, illustrated script set on rollers in an upright frame. As the rollers were advanced a complete lesson unfurled.

The device enabled a relatively inexperienced instructor to conduct classes accurately and at a speed acceptable to his students. Eventually teleprompters lost their appeal but in the meantime they were Darling's route to government employment, a welcome alternative to the frenetic free-lancing of New York.

Darling came to Alabama in 1959 on contract to illustrate teleprompter scripts. At first, the work didn't appeal to him, and after three months he was telling his employer that he wanted out. "They asked me to stay one more month, and during that month things began to get interesting," he said. "I brought my wife down, and six years later we built a house. I've been here ever since."

By then, Darling had entered the civil service and assumed the task of building a graphics department at the Missile and Munitions Center and School. Over the years, he assembled a team of artists, furnished a studio, and completed countless projects under several commandants. He said that his most rewarding association was with Col.

Charles Eifler, who headed the missile school from July 1959 to August 1961 and some years later became commander of Redstone Arsenal.

"He was great on briefings and loved to use the teleprompter," Darling remembered. "He was an intelligent man, a great speaker. I would visualize his scripts, scripts on all subjects—war and peace, what the school was doing, you name it. He'd speak on and off post, across the U.S. I felt he used me to advantage."

The talent Darling shaped into a career also suits him fine in his off hours. On sunny weekends he is in the habit of packing up his easel and watercolors and striking out into the countryside, sometimes with artist friends, sometimes alone. He paints landscapes, working quickly—a finished painting takes two hours—to accurately capture light and shadow.

"I'm a Sunday painter," he said. "I do it to relax, not to create fine art. Fine arts is a full-time job. Of course, I learned to be quick a long time ago."





# The Tech Library Has It

Everybody needs a little help now and then, or so the saying goes. Concerning the Missile and Munitions Center and School, where the majority of servicemen are students, the 'little help' could be with studies.

The majority of courses taught here consist of basic and advanced mathematics and electronics. These subjects can't be learned overnight. They require constant study and memorization. If one lesson is not understood, you can be certain the next will be harder to digest.

The 'little help', which isn't so little, is available at the MMCS Technical Library. The Library can be very beneficial to a student who's weak academically.

A substantial amount of information is available in applied and pure sciences,

basic math, algebra, geometry, electronics, technology and management, to mention only a few categories.

There are 250 current periodicals that update the information in the books. These range from popular electronics and mechanic magazines to the more technical Electronics Technician and IE Transitions.

In addition to the reading material at the library, audio and visual aids are available. There are 570 audio and video cassette tapes and film strips covering basic math and electronics as well as foreign languages, personal finance and sports.

The individual stations are equipped with TV monitors and video cassette recorders. One of the rooms is large enough to accommodate six to eight people for group study.

A microfiche reader-printer is also at the library. Microfiche is like microfilm but is printed on plastic sheets instead of film.

Although the supply is limited, unclassified reports covering lasers, missiles, military science and even government-industry relationships are on hand.

Two electric typewriters are at one's disposal.

"What we don't have in this library, we can inter-library loan from local college and university libraries and also government and public libraries," said Eva M. Cathey, the administrative librarian.

The MMCS Technical Library also has a complete catalog on what's on hand at the Redstone Scientific Information Center. A soldier can check here for a certain book before going to RSIC.

A Student Library Committee was organized to increase student participation in the library. The committee was organized according to a TRADOC regulation. Sgt. 1st. Class Ronald G. Ap-

plegate, administrative NCO of headquarters, School Brigade, is committee chairman.

Members were chosen by Second Battalion, one representing each student company. PFC. Clifford Johnson, 4th Student Company; Pvt. Rodney Dean, 6th SC.; Pvt. Wayne Knight, 7th SC; and Staff Sgt. Alan Watley, 8th SC, make up the body, which will advise the Library Advisory Committee on matters on student interest and needs.

The Library Advisory Committee in turn advises the Director of Support, Col. William A. Green, on matters pertaining to the library services.

At a Student Library Committee meeting, Dean stressed the point of making students more aware of the library and what it has to offer.

"I've talked to several people who use the library and they are tremendously satisfied," noted Johnson. "The library has helped them with their AIT studies and a few have been helped with their college courses."







# Don't Be Surprised

When you arrive at work one morning and are greeted with a message to go to personnel for a records audit, don't be too surprised. It's a simple procedure—it's just remembering to go and getting there that's hard for many soldiers.

An audit of your official 201 file required annually during the

month of your birthday, although at Redstone a soldier may be called on more often because of the fast turnover of people. The official file is the only file considered by the Department of the Army promotion selection boards.

Requirements for 201 file and emergency data forms audits are outlined in AR 680-2 and 640-2-1.

"The audits are for the soldier's benefit," Master Sgt. Larry Hodge, non-commissioned officer in charge of enlisted records, said. "The career management of any one soldier is based on their records. Selection for promotions, advanced schooling, and reassignment are also based on the soldier's records.

"If the information is incomplete, an accurate decision can't be made," Hodge said. "The purpose of the audits is to insure

that the information is up-to-date and correct, with no omissions."

Upon entering the personnel office for your audit a records clerk will go over your 201 file with you. Anything found missing from your file will be placed in it. Officers must keep an up-to-date photo in their 201 file.

Records audits are mandatory, but according to Hodge, Military Personnel has problems getting soldiers to keep their appointments.


